Hospital was busy place in December

Board of Directors to seek nursing home

The Board of Directors of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo voted unanimously at their January 6 meeting to employ the services of an architect and proceed with plans for construction of nursing home in Carrizozo.

The location of the nursing home will be on present hospital grounds, to the west, an entire new wing and separate building but in conjunction with present hospital. The nursing home will be operated by present hospital staff, with maybe some additions.

The main reason for the action by this board is that the community needs a nursing home, and this addition will be of considerable economic help to the hospital.

Board members are Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Johnson Stearns, William Edgar, A. P. Sifton and Dimmit Bond.

Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo has undergone some drastic changes in the past two years and all this improvement and modernization paid off real well when a flu epidemic struck the community and 110 people made use of the hospital during one month, December 1968.

Alton Whittaker, hospital administrator, said that about fifty percent of cases admitted had the flu.

A full page of pictures (Page 3)

shows the interior of the hospital where you can see many of the improvements made. The operating room was completely redone to conform with federal regulations. Most of the kitchen equipment is new, modern in every way and attractive, there are television sets in every room (no added charge), in fact the entire hospital has been redecorated and modernized to where it is as fine as any small hospital in the state.

The hospital has a nursing staff consisting of RN as head nurse with LPN on each shift. Well-trained nurse aids assist each licensed nurse. This protection for patients is on a 24-hour basis, seven days a week.

The Carrizozo Hospital has been approved as a Medicare Hospital, in order to comply with Medicare requirements the hospital has the following departments: Administrative, kitchen, lab, X-ray, maintenance

and professional staff.

The hub of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital is the medical department under the direction of Dr. A. N. Spencer. A courtesy staff of three medical doctors is permitted to use the hospital facilities. Two operating rooms are at their disposal.

February 1 will mark the 19th years of hospital service for the Carrizozo community. Room rates are the lowest in the state, \$20 for semi-private room and \$25 for private.

Brazilians are well educated

Miss Maria Lucia Dessen of Belo Horizonte, Brazil arrived in Carrizozo Saturday to spend a month in Lincoln County as a participant in the 1968-69 International Educational Development Program sponsored by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington.

Miss Dessen is a house guest at the Paul Ortiz home and has Evelyn Kresyman, English teacher in Carrizozo school, and Grace Romero, third grade and Miami system instructor, as hosts to show her around the country.

A welcoming group of town and school people greeted Miss Dessen at the school Saturday night where she received a key to the town from Mayor Johnson Stearns. Miss Dessen will have a number of speaking engagements in Carrizozo. In an interview with Miss

Dessen Tuesday the educational program in her country was discussed and the News editor formed the opinion that the level of education is high in Brazil, particularly in the field of language.

One, two, or three years of kindergarten is offered in Brazil but is not required. They have five years of elementary school, then go to ginasio (like our Junior high) for four years. English is compulsory during three years of junior high and French compulsory during the fourth year of ginasio.

From ginasio the student graduates to colegio which is about the same as high school in America except for years, three in Brazil. English is compulsory during all three years.

School starts in March in Brazil, runs for 180 days same as here, month off in July and months of January and February no school.

Each state has a school board and generally different school laws, the boards are appointed by the government. If a student fails two times they are dismissed from school.

School buses are used only by private schools. There are no dormitories, and students do not live on campus at any of the schools. The private schools are very expensive, and there are not enough government colleges so only the good scholars are able to pass the tough exams for college entrance.

Miss Dessen said it never cost her father a cent for her education, the universities are fully government supported. She has B.A. Degree from School of Philosophy at University of Minas Gerais. She teaches English and has a special interest in linguistics. Her salary is \$220 a month, added degrees do not help salary, raises come each five years.

Brazil has teacher associations which are optional for the teachers. Recently Miss Dessen joined a new teacher's club organized for recreational purposes and is serving on the board of directors of this club.

It is not uncommon for men teachers to teach in as many as five different schools, because of low pay they will start teaching at 7:00 a.m. and may not quit until 11:30 p.m. Many more women follow the teaching profession than men, because of the pay scale. Men can take up law of medicine and make much more money in Brazil.

A high proportion of Brazilian young people complete school, and they do not have any dropouts according to Miss Dessen. Her plans are to spend a holiday month in Europe after completing her program in the United States.

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

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




The most valuable assets of any community might be listed in this order — church, school, hospital, etc., and when many people are like they were in December the order could well be church, hospital, school. Carrizozo









Two Hondo Valley apple growers will be on panel discussions at the Fruit Short Course at New Mexico State University next Thursday, January 16th. Bert Pfingsten is on the orchard heating panel and Lualo Zamora on the marketing panel.

Fruit growers are urged to attend the short course at the Agriculture Bldg. and visit with N.M.S.U. staff on their problems.

The program starts at 9:00 A.M. and concludes at 7:00 P.M. with a meeting of the New Mexico Apple Council. The program includes marketing, orchard heating, farm cold storage, shipping regulations, side line orchards as related to small grower or commercial grower and roadside marketing.

The vegetable short course will be the next day, Friday, January 17th at N.M.S.U. It includes discussion on onions, lettuce financing, and chile plant tours. Plan to attend both days.

The Lincoln County Development Association met Monday, January 13th at the Silver Dollar in Tinnie.

The group was brought up to date on the Fort Stanton Caves and recommended that the caves be considered as the project for Lincoln County under the Four Corners Development. The group recommended that the State Park and Recreation Commission be allowed to buy the land containing the caves and develop them.

The group decided to sell memberships and buy membership plaques. It was suggested that we have bumper stickers and decals to promote Lincoln County.

The Lincoln County centennial will be sponsored by the Lincoln County Development Ass'n. A meeting of community represen-

tatives will be held in the near future to develop a plan. Ideas discussed were: A booklet on early happenings in Lincoln County essay contest by old-timers on historic happenings in the area, a plate on the commemoration of the centennial, and a Lincoln County centennial pageant with each community presenting an historic scene from their community.

To be successful, the cooperation and help of everyone in the entire county is necessary. The Lincoln County Development Assn. can only coordinate the activities. With good planning we could get national publicity.

If processing is considered it must include an estimate of

potential production by varieties. Alternative methods of setting up a processing plant were discussed at length. Vegetables such as chile, carrots, cabbage, beans and black-eyed peas were mentioned for a processing plant.



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

Miss Marcla Corbett, granddaughter of Mrs. T. E. Kelley of Carrizozo, is serving with the Peace Corps in Rampala, Uganda in East Africa. The following is an excerpt from a letter to Mrs. Kelley last week. "Am now at a Ugandan work camp. We're working with about 20 Ugandan college and high school students building a home for the students who have no place to live. Building the houses is a lot of work but great fun - we got big handfuls of clay mud and silt it at the walls - they're sort of adobe style. We also get to wade knee deep in mud getting it ready. Never thought I'd end up making bread just like copapillan over a fire in the middle of the jungle - it's the bread we eat for breakfast. Meals take a lot of work, especially over open fires, but are really good. "Am amazed at the African girl in charge of cooking - somehow she manages to get three meals and afternoon tea out for over 50 people and is the only one of us who manages to stay clean and neat-looking. "There are five adorable children who live across the road and visit frequently. They are very patient with my bad Luganda. I asked them if they'd ever seen a lion - they got very excited saying they had. Where? In the circus! So you see it's quite tame even out here."

Miss Corbett is a graduate of Whittier College in California and while there spent six months in Denmark as one of a group of exchange students.
