At the annual meeting that was held in Ruidoso, New Mexico the new officers were elected; Mr. Walt Jones as President, Mr. Dimmitt Bond was re-elected vice-president, Mrs. Dorothy L. Bagley was re-elected as secretary and treasurer.

The directors that were re-elected were, Tony Treat, Ivan Watson, Ellis Shildnecht, also elected was Kenneth Nosker to the Board of Directors.

At the meeting the president, appointed Mr. Bill Stephenson, from Carrizozo, New Mexico to be our organization director.

This is Farm and Livestock and Bureau month, and it is the 50th Anniversary of Farm Bureau. It started in 1919 - 1969, and our Farm Bureau Insurance service is 44 years old.

Lincoln County Farm Bureau is staging their annual membership campaigns during this month. The New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau's goal is 9,627 members for 1969. Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau now has 250 members.

## Walt Wilson back from trip to Hawaiian Islands

In recent talks with ranchers of the area we gathered the thought that the future for the cattle business is about the same as future for newspapers and like business. Livestock operators running 300 cows or more should make out, those with less will find the going tough and some may be turning to a reasonably new development -- that of leasing their land to large operators who can cut overhead by virtue of size.

Some 4,000 ranchers gathered in Hawaii the past two weeks, Mr. and Mrs. Walt Wilson among them. Walt's comments on return -- cattlemen will work to lessen imports and increase domestic demands. Action is expected immediately in New Mexico against grazing increase. Market outlook for next six months looks favorable, should hold steady for both feeder and fat cattle. Saki is served hot in Hawaii, tastes like red wine.

Mr. and Mrs. Walt Wilson have returned from the Hawaiian Islands where they attended the semi-annual meeting of the Producers Livestock Marketing Association. Walt is a member of the board of directors, representing New Mexico.

Following their tour of the islands Hawaii, Maui and Kauai they attended the annual meeting of the American National Cattlemen's Association in Honolulu on the island of Oahu. There was a large group in attendance from New Mexico including Mr. and Mrs. Will Orndorff from Bingham.

The Wilsons' itinerary included many city and historical tours and two boat cruises. On the island of Hawaii they visited the famous Parker Ranch, saw many of the volcanic areas, coffee growing area near Kona and the City of Refuge. On the island of Maui they saw the second largest tree in the world, a Banyan tree. The island of Kauai, known as the Garden Island, is considered by many as the most beautiful of all. It was here they viewed the colorful Waimea Canyon and the lovely Fern Grotto on Waialua River. At Honolulu they took time out from the cattlemen's convention to tour the Polynesian Cultural Center and the oceanic sea life park, where trained dolphins and porpoises perform.

## Severance bonds for state road work

By Gov. David F. Cargo

In my address to the opening joint session of the legislature I requested approval of a measure that would allow issuance of \$2 million severance bonds. Of this, \$1,125,000 would be used for matching funds with the Economic Development Administration.

During the 1968 session of the legislature, a similar bill was approved, allocating \$1,125,000 for secondary road projects on a matching basis with EDA.

During my address to the joint session, time did not permit me to report in any detail the projects that are underway as a result of this 1968 legislation.

I think it is important to note our progress in view of the fact that we are again asking \$1,125,000 to continue our efforts.

There are four major projects that have been initiated as a result of the 1968 legislation. These are the Upper Red River ski road in Taos County; the Clara Peak road in Rio Arriba County; the Churchrock road in McKinley County; and the Arroyo-Seco-Twining skiroad in Taos County.











# Road work

Continued From Page One

The Upper Red River ski road will be constructed at a total cost of \$847,000. Of this, \$169,400 is state money and \$677,600 will come from EDA. Construction is expected to begin next June.

It is extremely important to note that construction of this road is expected to trigger some \$4 million in private investment and 150 permanent jobs.

The Clara Peak road will cost approximately \$1,106,000. EDA will provide \$884,000 and the state and local share will be \$221,200.

This road will open up 75 million board feet of timber which will be harvested at the rate of three to four million board feet per year.

Additionally, other forest products such as aspen, Christmas trees, poles, posts, etc. will be harvested.

EDA approved the Churchrock road for a total project cost of \$2,229,000. EDA will provide \$1,783,200 with the state and local share amounting to \$445,800.

With the opening of this road it is estimated that 700 jobs will be created in one uranium mine and mill; 200 in another; and 100 in the inter-tribal museum and craft center which is proposed as a \$5 million development.

The Arroyo-Seco-Twining ski road is in EDA hands now for review, and prospects for approval are favorable.

We have requested \$1,085,280 from EDA, and state matching funds will be \$271,320.

This road is expected to trigger \$5,133,000 in private investment and 247 permanent new jobs.

I believe very strongly in this type development that will permanently boost our economy.

To recap, we are talking about slightly more than \$1 million from state and local sources generating more than \$4 million in matching funds from EDA. We also are generating 1,150 permanent jobs and some \$9 million in private investment.

At a time when we all wonder if New Mexico will be able to support the continuing Medicaid program, I think it is the best time to consider other such developments to build our economy.

I personally believe that there is no program of welfare anywhere that is a substitute for regular jobs and payrolls. It is in economic development that we combat welfare and we must continue this course.



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
