At the time it became necessary to select a different site for Carrizozo's new post office, after restrictive clause was found in title to land first selected, Carrizozo downtown people stated they would help if necessary to purchase another site.

The Postoffice Department agreed to a cost of \$8,000, the town agreed to take up difference in cost which has amounted to about \$2,000.

Several business men in the postoffice area have stated they will contribute generously to this fund and any individual in the town who wants to have a hand in helping Carrizozo along the route to a new postoffice is invited to contact the Citizens State Bank or Lincoln County Abstract Co.

## A. E. Mulkey has new hobby

It used to be arrowhead and Indian artifact hunting that occupied the A. E. Mulkeys at Corona. Mr. Mulkey grew up at Progresso now a ghost town, between Cedarvale and Willard but once a thriving railroad community. His father was the boiler maker for the railroad. They scoured the country side for 30 years until now they have an exceptionally fine collection of arrowheads and other Indian items. More recently Albert found an old Sears weaving loom in loft of an old house. It was in bad shape, rats had eaten part, some parts missing but the loom was in good enough shape that Albert saw a challenge in the project.

He rebuilt the loom, it looks fine as you can see in picture. Made shuttles in all sizes, taught himself to weave and now his evenings are occupied with making rugs in many colors.

Just to see this loom in operation with Albert at the pedals is a real thrill, and then to view the finished product, one run taking as much as 50 hours or more, makes you believe that A. E. Mulkey is

a talented weaver as well as a high class mechanic. Stop at the Corona Motor Co. when you get a chance, if Mr. Mulkey does not have a rug on display he's liable to take you to his house and show you the whole works.

### Big game seasons will be discussed

Southeast New Mexico Sportsmen will have the opportunity to express their opinions concerning the 1969-70 big game season and the bird seasons in a meeting on April 12 in Roswell. The meeting will be at 415 North Richardson at 10 a.m.

All southeast New Mexico sportsmen are invited to attend this meeting and express their ideas with reference to the 1969-70 big game and bird seasons. The meeting is being held at this time in order to allow the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish officials time to consider the sportsmen's recommendations before making final recommendations to the Game and Fish Commission at its May meeting.

County who are not acquainted with the country will not know just where major apple orchards are located in the county -- they're not hard to find.

Entering the county from east on US70-380 visitors will travel on up US380 past Riverside where first orchards are located, and the viewing will be good all the way past Picacho, Tinnie, Hondo and on up the valley past Lincoln where the last orchard on this road is located near Big Rock.

By turning left up US70 at Hondo visitors will see many orchards, all from the road, up as far as Glencoe. It makes a nice loop drive when apple trees are in full bloom, from Hondo to Ruidoso, to Capitan and back to Hondo, or start at Ruidoso or Capitan.

Cool weather has held back the apple blossoms and they're not expected to be out in colorful fashion until the weekend of April 19-20, a week later than shown on centennial calendar. Peach trees should be in bloom a week earlier than the apple trees.

It's more than interesting to make an early trip into Lincoln County, like April 12-13 and then come back a couple of weeks later to see the full beauty of numerous fruit trees in bloom.

When apple trees were first planted in Lincoln County is not exactly known. They were brought here by Spanish settlers from Marzano coming from the country above Mountainair. It would be interesting to know just where the oldest apple trees are located.

People exploring the backwoods, up Nogal and Tortilla Canyon will find apple trees, probably blooming around April 27, that have not been tended for many years. Apples from these trees are small and tart, make a fine additive to cider.

The old varieties included Ben Davis, Wolf River, Arkansas Black, Black Twig, York Star's first improve variety and a lot of others not so well known.

Apples to be harvested this year in Lincoln County will include Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Staymen, Rome Beauty, as well as quite a few peaches and cherries. There are 1800 acres of apple trees in commercial production in the county.

Continued warm weather like days of April 1-2-3 can easily wreck all blooming schedules and put the apple orchard people to work. Normal course of events is for the trees in the lower elevations, around Hondo, to bloom first followed by blooming higher up around Lincoln. The spread of full bloom can vary two to four weeks depending on the weather.

Apples can be real good each crop for Lincoln County, barring bad freeze and bad market. The orchard people stand a chance

of producing more income per acre than from any other crop. Trees have to be eight years old before they start to pay their way. Newer trend in orchard planting is to plant smaller trees closer together. The majority of Lincoln County apples are shipped to Texas, last year lots of Lincoln apples were processed in Colorado and California.

One old variety Wolf River produces a huge apple, sometimes four inches in diameter, is excellent for cooking but poor eating. Some of these trees are still growing in the county.

Apple blooms are all much the same color, a pale pinkish white. Peach blossoms have more red in their coloring. Cherry blossoms have pink deeper in the blossom and pear blossoms are near all white.

No need to drive off any highway to view the beauty of fruit blossoms in Lincoln County. Most of the orchards can be seen from Highways 380 and 70.

## Sunrise Service set for Easter

To quickly find the right speaker for the Lincoln County Centennial Easter Sunrise, who knows the long history before Lincoln County came along, plus a fine sense of God's purpose for the future that is rushing upon us, is almost impossible. However, the thread of history points to a near-neighbor, whose people roamed our hills 900 years before Lincoln County was authorized by the United States.

The nationally active president of Mescalero Tribal Council, Wendell Chino, is also an ordained minister of the Reformed Church. His heavy tribal duties have prevented time for preaching. However, he has made an exception for this once-in-a-hundred-years event.

When we add Mescalero Apache history to Lincoln County history, we reach back a bit more than half to the first Easter which was nearly 2000 years ago. There are now about 2,500 Apache in New Mexico and more than 8,000 Apache in Arizona.

As all present, at 6:01 a.m., ponder the three crosses on the central hill in the Valley of Fires Park, listen to the resurrection hymn of the County

### Demo committee to meet Ap. 11 in Alamo

All Lincoln County Democrats are being urged to attend the meeting of reorganization committee, to write new party rules, which will meet at 7:30 p.m. April 11 in Alamogordo, place to be announced later.

Penrod Toles has put together a committee of 21 people from all parts of the state to recruit the rules. This large committee has been broken down into subcommittees to meet in various towns.

Committee No. 3 meeting in Alamogordo will be chaired by Sen. Jerry Apadoca, other committee members are Darwin Sprouts, Fern Dunn, Gale Tower, Tom Morris and David Salman. Counties included are Dona Ana, Otero, Lincoln, Chaves, Addy, Lea, Roosevelt, DeBaca, Curry and Quay.

Senate Bill 1, the school money bill, was a good piece of legislation at \$27.8 million according to Lincoln - Sierra Representative Ralph Petty, Jr., but after a session where tax payers were screaming loud and the money was cut back to \$11.7 million -- it was poor legislation and Lincoln County schools will suffer as will most small schools of the state.

Forty percent of the 11.7 million in new school money will go right into the Albuquerque school system.

According to Petty, Ruidoso and Carrizozo could have small increase but not at all certain, depends on local money, Hondo and Capitan will operate on same money as this year and Corona will gain because of its size.

The pitfall in distribution of school money under Senate Bill 1 is that Lincoln County schools have to pick up extra local money to bring school funds up to 100 percent of need as estimated by the state. Lincoln County has not been reappraised, may not be for two years, so no extra money expected there. The county has been operating on thirty-three and one-third percent which was made mandatory state-wide.

Rep. Petty's main quarrel with Senate Bill 1 is that taxes were raised all over the state, yet

Albuquerque is the only school system to really gain from tax increases. Income taxes were increased four times, corporate taxes were increased sixty-six and two-thirds percent, motor vehicle taxes were increased thirty-three and one-third percent, the four percent sales tax applies to state-wide -- expected to raise \$25 million in new dollars, of which Lincoln County schools will receive none.

Petty voted against Senate Bill 1. It was no help to the home folks, Petty told the News.

According to figures issued by the state, Carrizozo school needs \$286,668 for the 1969-70 school year. The state guarantees 85 percent of this figure. This way Carrizozo school will automatically receive \$200,668 which is 70 percent of need, local money is expected to increase this 70-percent figure up to 85 percent of need, if local money falls short then the state will supply funds for Carrizozo up to 85% of need, or \$243,667. All of which means that Carrizozo could be operating on \$243,667, 85 percent of need instead of the 100 percent needed and the difference is \$43,001.

All the state figuring was based on average daily membership in Carrizozo school of 431. The ADM this year is 446.

More than 50 hand made posters were produced by members of Beta Sigma Phi sorority.




CLOSE FINISH -- David Roper had to put it out to win the 220 in Tuesday junior meet.

# Grizzlies 3rd

## in relay meet

Saturday the Carrizozo Track team won the third place trophy in the Grizzly Relays. The winning team was Tularosa and the second place team was Ruidoso. There were 11 schools at the meet.

Track star Charles (Tiny) Mackey was a standout for the Grizzlies as he scores 21 points in the meet and broke both the school record and meet record in the pole vault with a vault of 12'1/4". Tiny also won the 220 yard dash with a time of 24.0 he came in second in the high jump with a leap of 5'7".

Mackey also anchored a leg on the 880 yard relay team that won second, and anchored a leg on 3rd place mile relay team.

Albert Hernandez easily won the high hurdles with a time of 17.4 and tied for second in the lows with a time of 23.4. Albert also ran the 880 yard relay team.

Jody Wrye, a sophomore, won 2nd place in the 880 yard run with a time of 2:11.6 and little Marcos Barela won 2nd in the 2 mile run with a time of 12:02. Marcos is a freshman. Others placing in the meet were the 880 relay team, Mackey Stutville, Hernandez, D. Roper. The mile relay team placed third, the team members were Mackey, Stutville, R. Roper, and Leslie. Frank Klein placed 5th in the discus and 5th in the javelin.

Carrizozo's 47 man track team travels to Dexter April 12 for its next meet.

The Ruidoso Warriors led throughout most of the track and field meet and held a slight 67-61 advantage prior to the last event, the mile relay.

Ruidoso's hopes for its first major meet championship in two years vanished as the Tularosa relay team raced to a 3:46 win and the Warrior foursome faded to fourth.

Final results of the 11-team track and field meet included: Tularosa 71; Ruidoso 70; Carrizozo 55; Vaughan 28; Capitan 27; Estancia 27; Cloudercroft 22; Dexter and Quemado tied with 13; each; Lake Arthur 13; and Hondo 0.

The Ruidoso 440 and 880-yard relay teams proved unbeatable in winning their events with times of 4:02 and 1:38.0, respectively. Warriors Rick Scott, Jack Valliant, Donnie Klein and Pat Farrar made up the winning relay teams.

Farrar again demonstrated his outstanding ability as a runner in winning the 100-yard dash with a time of :10.6. Robert Cope of Cloudercroft finished behind Farrar with a time of :10.65.

Scott's brilliant performances in five events earned him the meet's high point individual award. He was first in the 180-yard low hurdles and broad jump, the lead off man on the winning 440- and 880-yard relay

teams and finished second in the javelin.

Scott accumulated 23 individual points, Charles Mackey of Carrizozo 21 and Bob Munn of Tularosa 14.

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

## The slant of things!

It is true even of small weekly newspapers that readers better understand the writings when they know the person who wrote them. It's even more true of larger daily newspapers, and when it comes to reading political reports in books or national magazines the problem of sorting out the truth is double tough. Sorry to admit it, but all of us typewriter guys have some sort of slant, one way or another.

Stewart Alsop, Newsweek writer (one of their good ones) recently asked the question, "Do book reviewers ever read the books they review? More important do liberal-intellectuals ever pay any attention to facts that do not accord with their preconceptions? Then he cites instances. Two reviews of Robert Kennedy's book about Cuban missile crisis 'Thirteen Days', one by John Kenneth Galbraith and one by David Schoenbrun both passed over an important point, Kennedy wrote Stevenson (Adlai) at the

Dear Paul:

In your issue of March 6, your editorial description of all the tax measures before our legislature as a 'rat's nest' is most apropos. Also apropos is your comment that an excessive number of tax measures . . . serve largely to confuse the already confused tax structure of the state and make equality of taxation more unattainable than ever."

For your possible interest, I have been trying to get together a reasonably accurate picture of the per person tax load in New Mexico and enclosed herewith to you a copy of the result so far. The figures are tentative, but after some dissemination, to this point no corrections or changes have yet been received.

Incidentally, my personal opinion is that under proper legislation, and local administration, real estate ("advalorem") taxation can be about the most equitable and locally observable and controllable form of taxation! Along with this, that it has been badly booted around and misunderstood and that the revaluation programs (sincerely advocated by many good people) were in fact ill conceived and have therefore resulted in even more confusion, plus a great waste of money.

In the near future I hope some public discussion for our real estate tax situation, with some positive proposals, can be instigated.

NEW MEXICO PEOPLE, AND FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL TAXES.

These figures are as of fiscal 1967, and are based upon New Mexico population of 1,003,000, and on New Mexico household averages 3.8 persons each, or 263,947 households or "family units" (the national household size is 3.27), and upon a national population of 200,000,000. Per Person

Share of state government taxes (\$284,000,000) . . . \$283.15 Share of local government

taxes (\$278,100,000), municipalities plus counties etc.) 277.27 Shares of federal taxes (\$149.6 billion) . . . 748.00

Total per person . . . \$1,305.32 Total per family . . . \$4,972.00

The foregoing does not represent the per person share of the total spending figures. The federal government particularly has been operating as a deficit so that in addition to the taxes actually collected each year, there is (into 1968) an accrued federal debt of \$358,000,000,000. (How it grows? The federal spending in fiscal 1967 -- \$158.4 billion and with \$149.6 billion raised in taxes, see above, the deficit was \$8.8 billion. For 1968, after estimated taxes to be collected of \$155.8 billion, to apply on estimated spending of \$175.6 billion, the estimated deficit was \$19.8 billion.)

Per person share of national debt . . . \$1,790.00 Per family share of national debt . . . \$6,802.00

IT'S GOING UP! There has been a progressive rising, an upward trend as yet unchecked, in the foregoing figures. As an illustration, the per person share of federal taxes collected for the 1966 fiscal year was \$707, for 1967 (see above) it was up to \$748, and for 1968 it was \$779. If we were on a pay-as-you-go basis, the 1968 figure would go from \$779 to \$878! But we pay more later for what we 'save' now.

WHY FIGURE 'Per Person?' No matter what talk there is about 'shifting the tax load', taxes always end up on the mass of the people, on the 'average' worker and family -- there are more of them! The 'larger' tax payer's get their tax money back from the 'smaller' tax payers, even partly back from those who are 'on relief', by one way or another, hidden taxes, price additions, 'capital gains' devices, etc. The 'shifting' of the tax load is from the 'underprivileged', and from the 'overprivileged', on to the vast majority in between, Example? The great hoax of the graduated federal income tax, from 1913 and the 16th amendment to the U. S. Constitution. The income tax device was supposedly going to shift the burden of taxes onto 'the rich'! It didn't finally work out that way -- witness all workers struggling with their income tax burdens today, and witness the massive machinery, paid and unpaid (and burdensome), to take the tax money from the workers before they get it. The income tax money 'from the rich' is but a minute fraction of what is needed for a rapacious federal government. The spending lid blew off when the planners, the world-cavers, discovered "with-holding."
