English author plans visit in county during centennial

A letter dated April 15, 1969 from Fredrick W. Nolan of Chalfont St. Giles, Buckinghamshire, England, author of "The Life and Death of John Henry Tunstall", tells of his interest in Lincoln County Centennial activities and of his plans to visit the United States.

centennial, and I would very much like to be informed of any and all plans in this connection.

Nolan is one of the leading British specialists in Western Americana, has served for many years as a reviewer of books on the subject. Nolan commenced in 1953 the research which resulted in the Tunstall book. He was one of the co-founders of the still-flourishing English Society of The Westerners and has contributed articles and features on Western history to numerous English publications.

Through the cooperation of the Tunstall family, Nolan was able to present fresh inside and historical evidence about the life of Tunstall and the Lincoln County War.

The Lincoln County centennial committee has replied to Mr. Nolan's letter extending a warm welcome to visit here and participate in the centennial celebrations in the latter part of July and first of August.

The letter in part:
As a contributor in small measure to the historical documentation of those times (in JOHN HENRY TUNSTALL,) published by the University of New Mexico Press in 1965) I am keenly interested to know everything possible about the celebration. Although reviewers were kind enough to state that my book was a vital source book in any study of New Mexico history, I have never been to the United States -- although I have always hoped that one day I would be able to visit Lincoln. I can think of no time more natural, or desirable for me to do so, than at the time of the

Vote to change football classes

At a meeting called by the executive committee of the New Mexico Activity Association in Albuquerque April 19 it was voted to send out a referendum to all schools for their vote on changing classifications of schools for football competition as follows:

- AA 1201 plus
- 3A 401 to 1200
- 2A 151 to 400
- 1A Up to 150

For all sports other than football there would be 22 schools in 4A 1201 plus, 22 schools in 3A 401 to 1200, and 80 schools in 2A, up to 400.

Formation of an A Class was left open. Purpose of this new classification is to get away from B and C title, making all schools A Class.

The 44 large schools in the association feel they have the majority of students and raise the majority of money in championship play and should have a

similar say in affairs of the Activity Association.

Class C schools now have one half-vote in the association. The large schools do not want a fourth (40) basketball tournament and track meets, largely because of money needed to finance them.

Jack Mayfield of Capitan, president of Class C football conference in New Mexico, and Supt. Glen Ellison of Carrizozo who attended the meeting are of the opinion that smaller schools, those with 150 enrollment or less, need to be separated from 2A, and put into a 1A Class which would be as follows:

- 4A 22 schools
- 3A 22 schools
- 2A 32 schools
- 1A 49 schools

The suggestion was made that schools could petition to be received in a smaller division or could invite an upper division school in if that division voted to; for example, Springer with 160 enrollment might be asked to play in 1A, 150 down.

This meeting originated from request of schools in the 500-600 enrollment bracket who want change. The results of the meeting are of great concern to smaller schools who have the same problem -- that of playing competition that gives chance for some football wins during the year.

Mayfield thought the setup for basketball is working alright as it is and that any change in this area would only make worse travel problems. Both Mayfield and Ellison would like to see the 1A Class set up for football.

A committee of school men from Clovis, Bloomfield, Cobre, Aztec, Gallup and Ellison of Carrizozo will meet to make recommendations about the 1A Class. Any changes made would be for the 1970-71 school year.

The biggest crowd ever is expected both evenings as more than 50 students will participate in one of the most beautiful fiestas ever to be presented at the school.

Harry Wugalter, Chief Public School Finance Division, State Department of Education, Santa Fe, has accepted an invitation to crown the 1969 Fiesta Queen at Hondo at the close of the two-day festivities in Hondo on May 3. Many of the 29 boys dancing in this year's fiesta will be in their colorful charro costumes encrusted with white and gold embroidery and each the proud owner of a beautiful Mexican hat. Hundreds of fiesta friends who have seen the fiestas in the past come each year to again hear the exhilarating music that goes with the dances. From the moment the dancers step on the floor the applauding begins as the exciting music of Zacatecas is played. Then entrance of the dancers offers in itself an unforgettable adventure in pleasure followed by a welcome dance by the girls where the audiences are given an opportunity to see each costume in all its beauty.

From out of the past . . .
Glimpses of the life of Mary Jackson

Much has been written in the past and no doubt more will be written in the future on the life of the incomparable David L. Jackson who for more than three-quarters of a century lived in the little town of White Oaks whose growth and decay he watched almost from its beginning, and surely, to its finish. The man whose friends were legion.

But strangely enough, no one has, to my knowledge, written anything on the life of the noble woman who was his wife, Mary Jackson was by nature timid and reserved and possessed much dignity, and perhaps it was because of these characteristics that not too many people really understood her. She visited the sick and those in distress whenever she knew that help was needed and where she was sure of a welcome.

It was my privilege to have known Mary Jackson for many years--from the time I was a young girl and later when I grew up, married and started raising a family. On many occasions she was most helpful to me in many ways and I shall always remember her concern over our little ones in time of illness. She was an excellent homemaker, and in the culinary art I would say she was a master.

Once when my husband and I had been invited to their home for dinner I complimented her cooking; I said, "I wish I were as good a cook as you are, Mrs. Jackson." Her answer was, "Honey, don't forget I've been getting pots on the stove a lot longer than you have." She was the soul of generosity, and somehow she managed to find out who of her friends and neighbors were ill or had illness at home, and it would give her no end of pleasure to prepare appetizing dainties to carry to them.

When David Jackson came to White Oaks and decided to locate

there, the "Girl of his dreams" remained behind--"back in Texas," as he would say, with the understanding that he would return in one year and they would be married there, but things did not turn out that way. . . the year went by all too soon. He had steady work in the mines by now and a little money put by, and both agreed that it would be expedient for her to make the trip alone, he would meet her, and they would be married forthwith. And so it was.

Meantime he had found a little log cabin, furnished it as comfortably as circumstances would permit, stocked the pantry well with groceries and all was in readiness for Mary's arrival. The year was 1898. . . the beginning of the Jackson's married life that lasted fifty-six years.

In 1902 Mrs. Jackson returned to Galveston for a visit with family and friends and was there at the time of the unforgettable Galveston Flood. She would later relate very interesting and thrilling stories about the terrors she experienced during that nightmarish event. Most of the family's belongings were either lost or badly damaged, but they considered themselves fortunate to have escaped with their lives.

Mrs. Jackson was afflicted with arthritis for many years, growing worse as time went on, causing her long periods of confinement and much suffering. Eventually she became bed-ridden, but her faith and optimism never waned, for she was a devout Christian and she lived her life as such. A great source of her enjoyment was through reading, and she was especially fond of poetry.

Mary Jackson passed away in May 1954 and was laid to rest in Cedar Vale, that silent city where she had bade so many friends goodbye through the years, and where her beloved "Monk" (her pet name for him) joined her nine years later.

Apple Trees In Full Bloom Now

The apples should be in full bloom in the Ruidoso and Bonita Valleys this weekend, Monday the red Delicious apples were in full bloom at Hondo and are likely to be past full bloom by this weekend. The apples around Lincoln, San Patricio and Glencoe should be in full bloom this Saturday. The Golden Delicious should be in full bloom around Hondo.

Although it got 17 at Ruidoso and 31 at San Patricio on April 18th, I found good peaches around Lincoln and have reports for peaches that are still unharmed by the frost in Tinnie.

Lawns need to be fertilized at least one each year. A frequent question is -- what plant foods are needed? The answer is almost always nitrogen and phosphorus. Nitrogen is one of the most often lacking. Several management practices are necessary for a good lawn. But, you can do nothing more important than fertilize. The only exceptions are the few lawns on unusually fertile soil. Even these will eventually need some fertilizer.

There are several types of fertilizer, including compost, manure, other organic fertilizers and chemical fertilizers. Commercial materials like ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate and 16-20-0 are the most commonly used. Organic fertilizers are rapidly becoming popular because they release nitrogen slowly and therefore seldom burn the grass. These fertilizers are more expensive per pound of nitrogen.

Bluegrass, fescue and other cool season grasses are best fertilized in late fall and early spring, with light applications during the growing season. Some homeowners keep their bluegrass active all summer by making bi-weekly applications of fertilizer. Watch for diseases if this is done. Apply two to three pounds of ammonium nitrate or similar fertilizer per 1,000 square feet every two to three weeks.

The Abilene newspaper had been following normal course of promoting town beautification with moderate success, but with world-wide publicity surrounding Eisenhower the people began to get serious about looks of their town. Council up there recently passed ordinance that city would apply paint where people failed to do so.




