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Nursing home plans to H-B

A nursing home project for Carrizozo has been under discussion for several years and could be close to realization now if a sufficient number of local people were to express their opinions and desire for such a home here. A study made about two years ago indicated that this facility, having capacity for 16 people as now planned, should have a high percent of occupancy.

The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital Board is working on the project which would be financed with private local funds and matching money from the Hill-Burton fund, a state agency which allots money to communities they feel in greatest need of the money for hospitals or nursing homes.

The help of the South Central Mountain Resource Committee has been enlisted by Bill Atkinson and Howard Harkey meeting with the group.

Carrizozo people are invited to express their interest by contacting Alton Whittaker, hospital administrator, write the News, or talk to any state representative.

Memorial was all-day affair in early days at White Oaks

As one of your senior citizens I want to tell you what a great privilege and honor it is to be part of this wonderful occasion.

My people came to White Oaks in a covered wagon in 1887. I was then three years old, I have lived in Lincoln County all these years. It was here I started to school graduated from high school. As I look back over the years many changes have taken place. Once a prosperous and thriving mining town, now just another ghost town. I am so glad I lived here during the boom days.

In early days the G. A. R. always had their reunion here on Memorial Day. It was an all day affair. They came from all parts of the county, both the blue and the gray. They marched from the Congregational Church, led by the town band to the cemetery, held their ceremonies and placed a flag on each veteran's grave. Taps were sounded and they returned to town to a bountiful dinner prepared by the ladies of the town. After dinner they sat around on sidewalks, smoking and chewing tobacco and fighting the Civil War all over again. In the evening a program of speaking and music. I remember our girls chorus always had a part on this and three songs we always had to sing were "Battle Hymn of the Republic", "The Blue and the Gray" and "Tenting on the Old Camp Ground".

Their lines became smaller as the years passed, last time I think only four were present. They soon passed out of the picture. Good people continued their Memorial Day services. This cemetery we are dedicating today is one of the dearest and most sacred spots.

It was started in 1880 by K. P. Lodge. At first it was a small plot in the southeast corner, a few graves still remain on the outside.

It is interesting to note that one of the first to be buried here in 1881 was Jack Winters. It was he who made the first gold discovery and started what was soon to be one of the richest gold mining towns in the west. Soon more prospectors and many

people came rushing in to have a part in this great discovery. But there were sad days too, several of our townsmen lost their lives. Wm. Gallacher first fell to his death in a shaft at the South Homestead Mine in 1892. In 1893 my brother Robert Lee was killed in a blast in the same mine. He lies buried beneath the lilac bush we planted over 60 years ago. In the northwest corner are seven of the eight miners killed in the Old Abe fire in 1895. Wm. Hoyle was killed in the accident, he was a brother to Walt Hoyle, one of the owners of old Abe mine. There are many prominent citizens resting here, all had a part in shaping and molding our part of the state, our county and particularly our White Oaks. It is here the first governor of our state, his gracious wife and many of the family are resting.

Emerson Hough, who was once a resident of White Oaks, in her book "Hearts Desire" told of the red headed surveyor who was no other than our Gov. McDonald.

Our good and faithful Dr. Paden and his entire family, no night was too stormy, dark or cold for him to answer the call of the sick and some times many miles away. The honorable John Y. Hewitt-Atty and one of the owners of Old Abe Mine, Jones, Tallifeno of Young and Tallifeno Music Co, one of the first general merchandise stores, the Mayor Bros. Mr. J.B. Slack out undertaker.

Mrs. Susan McSweeney the cattle queen of the west and wife of Alexander McSweeney, killed in the Lincoln County War. There are many more I could mention. I could not forget Old Abe who came here in the gold-rush days from San Francisco. His restaurant was a very popular eating place for many of the miners and town people. Later after the boom days it was here he built a laundry which he operated until he was no longer able to work. Several years ago he died here, he had passed the century mark. Dave Jackson and his wife, Mary Jackson in his later years took care of the

SIERRA CANDIDATE HAS CONSTITUTION OPINIONS

Robert C. Cox, a rancher 40 miles west of Truth or Consequences is a candidate as delegate to the constitutional convention, subject to the special election to be held in Lincoln-Sierra district June 17.

Mr. Cox was born and raised on a ranch east of Las Cruces, has a B. S. Degree in animal husbandry from Texas A&M, was a tanker during WWII and moved to ranch he now operates after the war, Winston, N. M. is the mailing address.

The Cox family includes wife, Marilyn, Robert with GEM California, James at New Mexico State and Mark at Colorado State.

This session of work on our constitution could very well be the last opportunity for rural people and people living in small towns to stand up and be counted, is the opinion of Mr. Cox. He thinks the densely populated and liberal elements will try to dominate the constitutional convention.

The only thing that has kept taxes at a tolerable level has been the 20 mill limit and he will do everything he can to retain this limit.

Cox told the News he is opposed to centralized government from the word go, and feels that government closest to the people is the most efficient.

Voting machines have caused problems making some people go great distances to voting precinct which in effect disenfranchises some voters.

He is in favor of making it unconstitutional for any state legislature to legislate a county to death beyond its capacity to pay.

Cox said that he had no political ambitions, his main interest is to serve the best interests of the small county, and feels he can do this without fear of repercussion.

Our constitution is the supreme law of the land, our framework of government and we've got to draw guidelines for all three branches of government. Cox is opposed to the short ballot, whereby the governor could appoint his own cabinet, he would be even more opposed to the same thing on a county level. By this he means that he would oppose going away with county assessors or any other county office, and do the work from Santa Fe.

Since coming to Carrizozo Mrs. Payne has been active in the Woman's Club and is on their board of directors. She is a pledge to Beta Sigma Phi Sorority. The Paynes are members of St. Rita Parish.

Office quarters for the HDA will be in corner room adjoining the county agent rooms. The JP court will be moved to other quarters. There is no set routine or hours for the new HDA at this time.

Starting in July Lincoln County's new home demonstration agent will welcome people of all ages to come in and discuss any phase of home economics.

Chino Mines schedule tours

The 4-H members will receive training in more effective ways of working with younger 4-H members and share their experiences with other 4-H members.

There have been a few calves contracted in the area for 33 to 35 cents for steer calves and 30 to 32 for heifer calves. There is considerable in juring into calves to contract.

Lambs are contracting for fall delivery in Wyoming and Montana at 27 1/2 to 29 cents for ewe and 26 1/2 to 27 for wether lambs expected to weigh around 75 pounds.

The Lincoln County Development Association will meet June 10th at Red Cloud Canyon for a basket supper starting at 7:00 p.m. with a program on developing the Red Cloud area to follow.

Mr. Russell and Mr. Wyche of the U. S. Forest Service will outline plans for developing the Red Cloud Recreation Area. They indicated that the Red Cloud area is top priority for development in the Cibola National Forest when funds are available. Anyone interested is invited to bring their picnic basket and join the group.

The American dog tick, often called a wood tick, is most common at this time of year. If a dog is free to roam in uncultivated fields and brushlands, he may pick up hundreds of ticks a day. That many ticks can lower the animal's vitality and spoil his disposition. Check your dog for ticks periodically. Look for ticks around the dog's neck, in and around the ears, under his legs, and between his toes.

To treat a tick-infested dog, the owner can dust the animal with an appropriate pesticide, such as: five to ten percent malathion (mal-a-THY-on). The dust should be thoroughly rubbed through the hair, especially on his back and neck. Be sure to carefully read the directions on the label of any pesticide you use.

To learn more about treating tick-infested dogs, yards and homes contact the county extension office.

Several different ant species may become household pests in New Mexico this spring and summer. Most ants are relatively harmless to the home owner, but they certainly can be annoying, especially in the kitchen and food storage areas. Ants are social insects that live in colonies in the ground or in decaying wood. They often nest near building foundations, under sidewalks and in the home lawn or garden.

Ants can be controlled with Chlordane, lindane and diazinon sprays, dusts or aerosols. Apply dust or spray directly to the nest when possible. To prevent ants from invading the home, use a two percent chlordane or one-half percent lindane spray along baseboards, window sills and other areas where ants may be found. To avoid drifting spray mist, particularly in the kitchen, use a small paint brush to apply insecticide where it is needed or use a five percent chlordane dust.

Cover all foods, cooking utensils, dishes, dog and cat feeding dishes and aquarium before spraying. And apply insecticides every other week until ants disappear. Be especially careful with insecticides and commercial baits in home with small children. Be sure to follow label instructions carefully.

To rid your lawn or garden of ant colonies, a teaspoon of five percent chlordane dust spread over nesting areas is recommended. Soak the treated area with water to wash the insecticide through the soil and into the nest.

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

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


