

Frontier Days started in 1800's

Many former residents of White Oaks, New Mexico can remember when the Fourth of July was a real big day for people from all around the southwest, back when placer gold was being mined in Baxter Gulch and such as the North Homestake, one of the richest strikes of the region, was pouring out gold.

Special events such as wild burro roping, goose scramble, foot races, and the extemporaneous happenings will be just as old-timey as they were in the 1800's and will be fun to watch on July 4, 1969.

Dude Maricle of Las Cruces will cook up a barbeque feed for noon lunch, actually food is available all day, and the action hardly stops for noon. Officially the events for men and younger people start at 1:00 p.m. There will be jackpot roping for all comers, amateur or professional, calf roping, steer riding, open pole

bending and barrel races for the girls. White Oaks is located in a beautiful vale, site of the recently dedicated Cedarvale Cemetery where New Mexico's first governor is buried. Surrounded by mountains clothed at their base with pinon and cedar trees, and further up toward their lofty summits with giant spruce, pine and oak, White Oaks is ideally situated as a Lincoln County recreation site.

You can enjoy a buggy ride, see matched horse races, take a tour through the area at 6,600 feet above sea level and enjoy the healthful climate — all of this on the Fourth of July in one of Lincoln County's most historic towns.

Saturday was the first day of summer and it was a cool 90. Only about six months until Christmas, the year is half gone.

Fall big game seasons set

A 6-day deer season in southeastern New Mexico was the major change in the state's 1969-70 big game hunting seasons and regulations as set by the State Game Commission in its May meeting. The southeast season will be open Nov. 8 through Nov. 23, with a nine-day season in the southwest to be open Nov. 8 through Nov. 16. The regular deer season in the north will be Oct. 25 through Nov. 9. In addition to deer, the Commission set seasons on elk, antelope, turkey, bear, Barbary sheep and squirrel and grouse. Deer bag limits in all three areas will be one-fork-antlered buck with the exception of the Zuni Area in the north and the Sacramento and Guadalupe where some either sex validations will be available by drawing. A total of 1 special deer seasons were set for various dates. The general bull elk season will be open Oct. 4-12 with unlimited number of licenses available. Limit will be one mature bull and the season will be open only in northern New Mexico. Seven antelope seasons were set with up to 4,000 permits. Five will be 1 1/2 day hunts and there will be one two-day rifle hunt and a special two-day bow season both in the Tres Piedras area. Bear seasons in a variety of areas around the state will vary in dates from August 9 through Dec. 25. Turkey seasons will be concurrent with deer seasons in areas where turkey hunting is allowed. Two barbary sheep seasons were set. The Hondo season will be Jan 10-Jan. 18 with up to 60 permits available and the Canadian Canyon season will be Feb 7-15 with up to 50 permits available. The limit on the Hondo hunt will be one sheep of either sex, while the limit on the Canadian hunt will be one sheep of either sex with horns at least 5 inches in length. Local artists work on display include paintings by Bud Payne, Grace Jones, Frances Degner, Mrs. Adams, Joy Lynch, Audrey Coca, Anita Sparkman, Nancy Knight and Pat Flatley. Some interesting antiques include a side stand 150 years old that had belonged to Mrs. Mabry Burns a brass bucket dating back to 1851 found in the White Oaks draw, exhibited by Mrs. Clara Snow, a square hall taken from the old L. C. Courthouse, made by L. N. Bailey about 1880. Saddle pill bags used by Dr. W. H. Smith, grandfather of Evelyn Seay approximately 100 years ago. A portrait of Gertrude Carpenter, painted by Gussie Taylor, 67 years ago a prized possession of Mrs. Clara Snow. A doll carved from Ivory soap, silver water pitcher and tray, a photo album 150 years old with hand painted china cover and many other interesting things. Some interesting old Indian items were exhibited by Mary Johnson. In crafts there were attractive plaques displayed by Ruth Wilson, Johnny Bond, Clara Snow and Janice Gnatkowski. Tooled leather pictures by Johnny Bond and a tooled leather bag by Sharon Smoot. Bud Payne had hand made rings and Bala ties and a plaque commemorating the A Bomb on July 16, 1945 at Trinity Site done in trimmets. An attractive pheasant feather hat made by Pat Flatley, rattlesnake necklaces and Oja De Dios, paintings on rocks and many other interesting items too numerous to mention. All combine to make a very interesting display you won't want to miss. RED CROSS NEWS Helen has been declared a disaster area due to recent flood. The American Red Cross is assisting in \$182,000 housing renovation project for the next two weeks. Stallion Site getting new water system Construction workers at Stallion Range Center, largest outlying station on White Sands Missile Range, have started work on the first phase of a half-million-dollar water project. In the northwest corner of the range, Stallion is more than 100 miles from the main post and some 40 miles west of Carrizozo. For many years, it has been necessary to haul in all potable water used at Stallion in tanker trucks. A 750-foot well drilled in 1960 has been providing non-potable water. For the past two years, more than 200,000 gallons of potable water per month have been hauled from a well on the Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge, several miles west of the Stallion complex. Before that, potable water was hauled from a well in Mockingbird Gap, some 22 miles to the south. The four-phase project calls for installation of a complete new system, including the drilling of an additional 750-foot well, installing pumps and storage tanks and building and placing in operation a two-unit desalination plant complete with chlorinating system and equipment for automatic operation.

Blowout causes truck wreck

A United Van Lines truck out of Atlanta, Ga., was wrecked at 7:25 a.m. Tuesday two miles south of Corona on U. S. 54 when the right front tire blew out causing the truck to go off the shoulder on right side of road and then whip back a cross. The truck was traveling south. The pictures by Byron Yancey show how the truck was tore up, bad enough that it took an hour to pry the cab apart to get the driver out. Byron is road patrol foreman in that area and had Pete McCloud and Alva Winchester, both blade operators, plus Bud and Jim Bagley, Earl Rope, John Ernest Tracey, Bill Winchester, Mike Luera, A. C. McCord, Lee Mulkey and others helping with the job. They used the front loader and a handman jack to spring the cab apart from the bottom, talking about an hour because the driver (name not available) was wrapped around the steering wheel and injured so they had to be careful. When the truck came apart the steering wheel came off with the tipup cab and the men couldn't break the wheel to release the driver so they had to jack the cab apart. The driver was conscious all the way and told the workers when they were hurting him. Bill Galney the tractor owner was asleep in the box back of the cab. He was first taken to Vaughn then Austin Wooten made the trip to Vaughn and took Galney to Alamogordo. The driver also was taken to Alamo hospital, suffering from chest injuries and possible leg fractures.

In 1970 the permanent opening dates for the regular deer seasons will be moved back one week to the first Saturday in November in the north and the third Saturday in November in the south.

They had a grand time and were happy to be home again. We are still having dry weather with high hot winds. We have a time keeping enough moisture to hold everything alive.



State making more ghosts

New Mexico is full of ghost towns and there is probably no way of keeping the few remaining small communities from becoming ghost towns — but the fight ought to be made, for the sake of the small communities threatened with extinction and because of the fact that most actions working hardship on the real small towns will also, in time, take their toll of population from towns slightly larger, in the 500 to 1500 bracket.

Ghost towns came about for a number of reasons, like mines shutting down, train tracks taken up, people finding out this isn't dry land farming country, improved highways that have drawn trade to the cities, and the fiasco of government agents thinking homesteaders could make it on 160 acres or a quarter section in New Mexico. Most of these things happened in the first half of this century.

Trends in the second half of the 20th century are no different, only for different reasons. Now we have a greater degree centralization of government, with much business that used to be handled locally now being taken care of in Santa Fe. Merger of county governments is talked, property appraisal by the state is definite possibility, and all too many programs are planned in Washington with the expectation that they will fit our community as well as others — they don't.

Right at our back door is the proposition of closing Encino schools and bussing the students to Vaughn, maybe some to Moriarty. Naturally the Encino people oppose this action because their school is the only payroll in town, and more than that, the Encino people don't favor their children going to Vaughn, because of the bus trip and the fact Vaughn is not their school.

Encino people cite such reasons as few dropouts, good vocational training, constructive 4-H and ranch related programs, and fact that high percent of Encino students going to college... become college graduates, for keeping their school open.

State people look at the per-student cost, \$1200 at Encino as compared with \$600 state average, all due to small enrollment, look at the heavy teacher load, nippick at equipment and facilities and say such a school does not meet state standards.

Right there Encino tax payers need to stand up for their rights. Actually Encino school patrons will be fighting a monopoly and it's a tough one... made up of all the larger cities of the state with their lobby forces, lots of political muscle, and their hands on a large part of state school money.

The worst thing state school people could do is try to put the same brand on all our youngsters, or use the same pattern and mold for all education in our state. Let Encino do a bit of its own molding to the liking of parents and teachers in that area — our thinking is that Encino youngsters will come out as well prepared to face life in these United States as the average, or better than from any of the larger schools.

It's no cinch at all that Encino can keep its school doors open — but the fight sure ought to be made — with help from all the smaller towns of the state.

The only damage likely to occur to grass as a result of a hail storm may result from soil compaction. Grass will give when hit by hail and will not be damaged from the hail itself. Pruning of stripped bush and tree branches should not be done unless the branches are mangled as a result of being struck by hail.
