## Commissioners decide Corona roads stay open

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace heard a report from Board of Viewers appointed June 4 to check on County roads 60, 61 and 67 along the north county line east of Corona which became necessary after request of James R. Woods that these roads be abandoned. Mr. Woods aim, according to men on viewing board, was to better control deer hunters.

Smith Peters, Carl Hiner and Rand Perkins made up the viewing board. Corona school bus travels No. 60 all the way. All three viewers agreed that one public road needs to be kept open, none recommended that any road be closed although admitting possibility that little over one mile stretch between 60 and 61 could be closed.

The commissioners made their decision that all three roads would be kept open.

Other action included approval of two plats submitted by Neal Chapman of Timberlane Hills and Mohaco and new plat of Pine Cone Valley for Villa Madonna Corp. Also a unit size plat of Alto Lake Golf and Country Club subdivision was approved.

The commissioners passed a resolution to effect that all tentative roads in new subdivisions shall meet county specifications and certified on final plat before commissioner approval.

A representative of bonding company and administrator of hospital of Ruidoso talked with commissioners about bond issue expected to be over \$500,000. to be voted this fall for addition

to the county hospital at Ruidoso.

Coy Maroney requested transfer of liquor license ownership at Hondo Trading Post from Joe Phillips to Maroney. Commissioners will OK soon as transfer comes back from Santa Fe.

Two insurance bids were let, one to Moore Agency on contractor equipment, one to Swearingen Agency on liability and workmen's compensation.

Commissioners have been advised not to take any action on Sunday liquor sales until the law is clarified.

A meeting will be held July 11 at 1:30 in the courthouse with county airport committee to discuss progress of this project. Next regular meeting is August 5.

# EDITOR'S CORNER

## Funds ought to be jiggled

The News editor is completely in sympathy with efforts of our town council to stretch money far enough to cover an annual \$3,000 loss at the swimming pool. Every youngster ought to learn to swim, might save his or her own life some day with that ability. Besides all that swimming is the most fun on a hot summer day.

However, swimming is not for every youngster and that leaves a lot of young people unoccupied. A complete recreation program does lots of things for young people, but

this week with four youngsters in court we are thinking mostly of giving the youngsters plenty to do, arouse their interest in healthy, active doings which (not a complete cure) tend to keep young people out of trouble.

Could well be that loose ends at the swimming pool ought to be brought together - higher prices and shorter hours - so the town could put some money in a complete recreation program. It could be worked out for the good of all concerned.

## Thanks to some Texans

With a half century of mining going on place in Lincoln County it comes as somewhat of a shock to see around two hundred people in one room in this town all with the same idea -- that mining and milling in Lincoln County can and will be a profitable industry.

Frankly, we believe they are right in their thinking. These good people all came from parts of Texas around Andrews and Snyder. Looked just like our neighbors on most sides, friendly, sincere, and the kind of people who would be an asset to our town if they all lived here.

Chances are real good they will be a big asset to our town, even though they live in Tex.

Already they've spent some \$40,000 with local merchants and another \$33,000 in wages most of which circulated locally. From what other one source have we got that kind of money in a short time?

The wages will continue because the mill operation these people have invested in will continue. Could be that this is only the start. Scott-Tex, Inc. has ideas of building a real big mill here, in the million dollar class and after seeing the kind of people who are running the operation and the kind of people who are backing them up - we think they mean serious business.

Congratulations and thanks to those Texans for their interest in our town.

## Jail might help

It's that bad in Carrizozo now for another reason. Freight trains are completely blocking pedestrian traffic from one side of town to the other and for long periods like on June 26 when walkway was blocked from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m. and people wanting to cross the track got message from train master that they could walk to the overpass.

Something will have to be done, probably won't be easy

and several arrests might be the quickest solution.

We can recall a news story telling about trains going too fast through a western town which made the town officials very mad at such lack of concern for lives of local residents. Uphor was that local officers arrested the train crew, can't remember what penalty was paid but the trains were slowed down.

## County reports \$75,509,000

Taxpayers reported income totaling \$75,509,000 on their 1966 Federal individual income tax returns, according to a new Internal Revenue Service publication. The booklet makes available for the first time income and tax data by major postal ZIP Code, classification, William M. Coard, District Director of Internal Revenue for New Mexico said today.

The District Director added that 1,980 of 13,932 returns filed were in the \$10,000 or more adjusted gross income level.

Mr. Coard said that the new booklet marks the first publication by the Federal Government of financial statistics for small areas in which the postal ZIP Code system has been used for geographic classifications. Previously such IRS data were available only for each state and the 100 largest standard metropolitan areas.

Other data relating to Carrizozo show that 13,932 returns were filed, including 8,585 joint returns. The new IRS publication also reports that in 1966 taxpayers claimed 43,472 exemptions, including 24,040 for themselves and 19,432 for their dependents,

according to Mr. Coard. On a state-wide basis, individual income tax liability totaled \$182,822,000 on adjusted gross income of \$1,745,316,000.

Since the ZIP Code system tends to reflect transportation patterns and patterns of commerce, the statistical material in the new publication will be especially useful in approximating Carrizozo marketing or commuting areas, Mr. Coard said.

## 62 billion KWH highest on record

Almost 62 billion kilowatt-hours of electric energy were required by Rural Electrification Administration borrowers during fiscal year 1968 to meet the needs of rural consumers, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today. This kwh input is the highest

for any year on record. It is a gain of 5.5 billion over the fiscal year, and is 38.6 billion greater than the input required by rural electric systems in 1958.

These are some of the figures in the 30th Annual Report of Energy Purchased by REA Borrowers for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1968. The report, available from REA, contains detailed information on the amounts of wholesale power obtained by rural electric systems from all sources in meeting the demands of the people they serve. More than 5.9 million rural consumers in 46 states were then on the lines of REA-financed electric systems. New consumers continued to be added at the rate of 150,000 a year.

Of the 61.9 billion kwh put into rural electric systems during fiscal year 1968, more than 19.5 billion kwh, or 31.6 percent of the total, was purchased from commercial power companies. The companies realized \$143.4 million from sales of wholesale power during the year to REA-financed rural electric systems.

About 24.1 billion kwh, or 38.9 percent, was purchased from federal sources and 4.4 billion kwh, or 7.1 percent, was bought from other public

agencies. The remaining 13.9 billion kwh, or 22.4 percent, was generated by REA borrowers themselves.


The cost of energy purchased during fiscal year 1968 averaged 0.63 cents per kwh, compared with 0.64 cents the previous year and 0.70 cents in 1958.

# What's Cooking

IN LINCOLN COUNTY

This is the first of what I hope will be continuing, articles of information for homemakers. We will try to have news about extension clubs, 4-H Clubs and other activities homemakers are involved in. I would like to invite you to come visit with me in the County Extension Office in the Courthouse Annex and let me know what you would like to have help with.

We don't have to be too observant to realize that food prices have really shot up in the last several months. All of the homemakers I have been talking to keep asking themselves how they can feed their families attractive, nutritious meals and still stay within the budget. One of the primary areas of concern is with the protein portion of a meal. Have you thought about using eggs as a main dish? Eggs have been and are at the present very reasonably priced protein.

There are a few things you will want to know about purchasing eggs. Always look for the USDA shield on the carton it will have the grade and size of the eggs on it. This official grade shield certifies that the eggs have been graded for quality and size under Federal-State supervision. The grade refers to the interior quality and condition and appearance of shell. The grades we can purchase are US Grade AA, A and B.

The Grade AA and A are ideal for all purposes, especially good for frying and poaching where appearance is important. Grade B eggs are good for general-cooking and baking where appearance is important.

A few tips on buying and using eggs are:

Buy eggs from a refrigerated case and refrigerate eggs promptly at home, with the large end up, to help maintain quality.

Use only high-quality, clean eggs with round shells when making egg nog, milk shakes or lightly cooked dishes.

Cook at low to moderate temperatures—high temperatures and over cooking toughens eggs.

Eggs are nutritious! They contain significant amounts of vitamin A, iron, protein and riboflavin (vitamin B2), as well as smaller amounts of many other nutrients. An economical main dish is this Egg and Vegetable Casserole—4-6 servings.

Mixed vegetables, canned or frozen (cook according to

plg. directions) or a combination of left over vegetables... 2 cups; Eggs, hard-cooked, coarsely chopped 6; onion, finely chopped 1/3 cup; olives, green or ripe, sliced 1/2 cup; pimiento, chopped 1/4 cup; cream of mushroom soup condensed, canned 10 1/2 oz. can; salt, if desired 1/2 teaspoon; shredded wheat, crushed 1/4 cup; cheddar cheese, shredded 1/4 cup.

Preheat oven to 350 F. (Moderate). Grease a 1 quart casserole. Combine vegetables, eggs, onion, olives, pimiento, soup, and salt. Pour into casserole. Toss crushed shredded wheat together. Sprinkle over casserole. Bake 30 minutes, or until bubbling hot. Calories per serving: about 205. Menu suggestion: Serve with a green salad, hot bread, and fruit for dessert.





REALTY FAST REPLACING  
MAN-IN-THE-MOON MYTH  
White Sands Missile Range, New Mexico, Aug. 21 - The romanticized "man-in-the-moon" myth is fast being replaced by reality as the world becomes more concerned with putting men on the moon.  
White Sands Missile Range, which recently announced its radar support of the Apollo Project is already involved in projects related to moon studies. One program, missile crater study, is earning a key spot in the national space effort.  
Instituted at the range in 1964 the program is a study of craters produced by impact of missiles into the desert sands. Its purpose and applications are manifold—the most unique being its value in the man-on-the-moon project.  
The study is being conducted jointly by White Sands Missile Range, U. S. Geological Survey and Ames Research Center of National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).  
By studying man-made craters, astrogeologists can learn physical characteristics of the moon and other planets.  
Robert W. Ball, range project engineer, explains that already results of missile impact craters have been used in interpreting lunar photographs sent via satellite. Data from crater experiments is being used in the Surveyor and Apollo programs and also as part of astronaut training.  
The project works like this: Scientists use chemical explosives to form craters and also to calibrate equipment used to measure seismic shocks. The known energy of the explosion produces a crater. Then this crater is mapped and a unit for comparison is established.  
By comparing the known crater characteristics with the characteristics of the craters on the moon, scientists can predict the hardness and physical characteristics of the moon's surface.  
Geologists compare the structure and form of the craters with lunar craters seen in satellite photos. Photographs confirm that the lunar landscape is dotted with craters.
