### The weak get stronger

The opening week of football in Lincoln County found two teams, Capitan and Corona who have had more downs than ups in recent years, showing strength of a kind that could put them in semifinal playoffs in November.

Capitan has to beat Clowdercroft and Tatum to win the 4C conference, Tatum on October 3 and Clowdercroft on October 31. Friday night the Tigers muddled out a 12-0 victory over the Dexter Demons and brought congrats from Coach John Dickey on the team effort. Mike Pumphrey, scored a 55-yard run in the first quarter and Robert Brown scored from the three after an 80-yard drive in the fourth period, while the Tiger defense was holding off the Demons all the way.


Statistics: Capitan 160 rushing, 0 passing, 19FD; Dexter 63 rushing, 61 passing, 9FD. Final score Capitan 12-0.

The Carrizozo Grizzlies showed a lot of spark and almost as much newness in their game with the Ruidoso Warriors, score 34-14. The Warriors scored 6 fairly easy and missed the PAT, then Lock put Zozo in the game on one-yard run followed by pass Lock to Mackey good for 2 points and looked like the Grizzlies might be in the game.

The Ruidoso rushing offense was working good for a first game and they made a lot of yards almost untouched by Grizzly hands. David Latham ran a total of 166 yards, mostly long runs to lead the Warriors. Tiny Mackey gained 86 for the Grizzlies on short yardage.

QB David Lock was calling a good opening game, scrambling much of the time due to line leaks, and when the Grizzlies looked good they looked real good, like a little sharper line play on both offense and defense plus some healed injuries would make them

The years total rain fall has been 10.01 inches. Rain in August 3.13. Rain in July 3.33 inches.

The course of a bond election for construction and equipping addition to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital at Ruidoso, originally scheduled for September 9, took a rapid switch last week when Ruidoso attorney Richard Parsons gave his opinion that the legal advertisement was defective in that it did not state the location of said construction. Parsons' opinion was backed up by the attorney general.

The board of directors of the Ruidoso Hospital, Robert McDaniel, Lew Crews, Gerald Dean, C. L. Wright and W. J. Williams Jr. made the decision to call off the election which was to have been for \$665,000 in general obligation bonds. The Ruidoso Hospital expected to seek added funds from Hill-Burton federal agency with the plans calling for \$1,018,000 worth of improvements.

There has been considerable discussion in the Carrizozo area of what this bond vote would do to chances of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo over getting Hill-Burton money to build a nursing home addition to the Carrizozo Hospital. Following cancellation of the election it became possible that needs of both hospitals be put before the public.

The board of directors of Carrizozo Hospital, Jackie Spencer, Johnson Stearns, Dimmitt Bond, Bill Edgar and Alva Sitton, met with the board of the Ruidoso hospital Monday morning in the courthouse and reached mutual agreement in rather short order.

The agreement being that voters of Lincoln County would have the opportunity to vote on bonds for needs of both hospitals. Question A will be for the Ruidoso hospital, amount of bonds the same as originally scheduled, \$665,000. Question B will be for general obligation bonds in the amount of \$142,000 for construction and equipping of nursing home addition to the Carrizozo hospital.

The Carrizozo project will cost \$220,000 with local pledge of funds making up the difference in the bond money and total cost.

To further make clear the election advertised in this issue of the News, Question A. will have squares for either yes or no vote, Question B will have squares for either yes or no vote. A simple majority for either or both questions will carry the issue. Questions A and B will be counted separately, voting on either one having no bearing on the other.

Comment was made by Robert McDaniel that we can work together now, maybe the Lincoln War is over.  
Mrs. A. N. Spencer pointed out that functions of the two hospitals are considerably different and that the bond issues would finance almost totally different needs. Carrizozo would be getting a nursing home, long considered a necessity in this area and expected by the board of directors to get the local hospital out of the red and make it a financial success by using present staff to serve more patients. The Ruidoso hospital does surgery and needs added rooms and facilities for the kind of hospital work now being done. The sketches printed in this issue show design of building with new addition on left of Carrizozo hospital. Key to rooms identify use of present structure as well as proposed addition:

1 office, 2 X-ray, 3 sterilizing, 4 operating, 5 scrub-up, 6 clean-up, 7 doctor lockers, 8 emergency, 9 2-bedroom, 10 toilets-baths, 11 isolation, 12 4-bedroom.

13 utility, 14 nurse station, 15 nurse lockers, 16 nursery, 17 lounge, 18 toilets, 19 laboratory, 20 staff dining, 21 kitchen, 22 employees lockers, 23 storage, 24 boiler.

In new addition: 25 dining-recreation, 26 work, 27 nurses toilet, 28 janitor, 29 nurse station, 30 storage, 31 bath, 32 shower, 33 mechanical, 34 dirty utility, 35 semi-private, 36 private rooms.

Both hospital boards went before the Lincoln County Commission Monday with their plan of cooperation, the commissioners agreed to call the election which will be held Tuesday, September 30.

The election call will be printed in three issues of both county newspapers. It is basically the same except for locating site and bonds needed for both construction jobs and minor changes in election officials.

Discussion at commissioner meeting centered on how long it would take the county to recover its bonding capacity. Best answer is that the county would recover bonding capacity from \$75,000 to \$100,000 each year from bonds paid off and normal increase in valuation of the county. Reappraisal will have no bearing on the bond issue. Bonding capacity of cities and schools are not affected by this county-wide bond issue.

The bonding capacity of a county is set at four per cent of its valuation. Should the total issue of bonds exceed this capacity, only the amount legally saleable would be offered for sale, the balance of bonds would be put up for sale at another time, probably a year later.

It was pointed out that the Ruidoso hospital would not have need for money for at least a year because of necessary planning to be done, whereas the Carrizozo hospital project could probably get under way in six months. Even after the start of either or both hospital projects it would be at least a year before final monies would be needed, so that bonds could be sold in two different parcels without holding up either project.

All members of both Ruidoso and Carrizozo hospital boards were unanimous in their approval of the new county projects.

# EDITOR'S CORNER

## Of spirit and determination

It would be real nice for taxpayers if all progress could be stopped and in a great many towns over the country that is the way it has been done -- to the later sorrow of local residents.

Even in a town of rather static population like Carrizozo where we lose a few and gain a few people each year to hold our own in population at best, it's necessary to provide for the needs of people, a job that can't be done in one year by any means. Keeping a town from falling apart has to be worked at each year.

Conrad N. Hilton, 82-year-old founder of a hotel empire and native of San Antonio, N. M., spoke at press conference in Albuquerque this week stating that a number of cities in both the Hilton national and international networks "are dead". Asked about what makes a city "dead", he said, "I think the spirit and determination of cities governs just how alive they really are."

Which brings us back to Carrizozo in Lincoln County and the question -- "Just how alive are we?" Strangers driving through our town and seeing all the empties on 12th street and not seeing the rec center, school, park, hospital, airport, not seeing paving, new postoffice, courthouse, might easily think they're seeing a dead town.

The people who wrestle each year with Carrizozo problems frequently get discouraged but they keep battling along, over come dead bodies, through thick and thin many times, ignoring petty jealousies and differences and Carrizozo does make progress. We're a better town now than ten years or even five years

ago in many ways. Carrizozo and Lincoln County has always had a wealth of nature's best in the way of climate, scenery, and lots of wide open space which becomes more valuable each passing year. Carrizozo particularly has a fine geographic location and hook-up for transportation by road-rail-air in all directions. The new postoffice is located here because of location solely, the News does good business over a large area strictly because of bus connections. Any other business that wants trade from our big area has the opportunity because good roads go in all directions.

Which thinking brings us down to our hospital needs -- they're more than most people know. First, the local hospital has been running in the red for years with little chance for improvement and saved only by good grace of local patron who bails us out annually. Second, extended care for our elderly is becoming more and more necessary and facilities are lacking here and elsewhere for such care.

Third, we can't count on our one doctor living and/or practicing here forever and it's essential that a hospital situation be developed that will be attractive for a doctor, now as well as in years to come.

Fourth, and last, we've got to do what is necessary to keep our town alive as such action becomes necessary. This is the year to go all the way for a nursing home addition to Carrizozo hospital.

We hope that voting property owners of this area turn out in full force to vote the needed bonds on September 30.






Willie Gattiges has Nelson by leg, Joel Barham closing in.




Tiny Mackey is carrying ball, made 15 on reverse play.



## SCMRA group makes progress

At the August meeting of the South Central Mountain Resource Area steering committee in Carrizozo a number of projects were discussed and some new proposals adopted.

Progress on various project proposals was reviewed with significant progress being shown on two road projects in Otero County (PP-25 and 26) Cornudas Watershed (PP-13), Soil Survey in Lincoln County (PP-29), Lincoln County Centennial (PP-32), Bear Canyon Dam (PP-33), and the white Oaks Area Plan (PP-37) since the last meeting. The Otero County commissioners have made agreements with the State Highway Department to prepare the roadbed and the state will pave the Pinon road this year. The same agreement is being made on the Sacramento Road.

It was also reported that it will be necessary to obtain permission from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to transfer the use of Fort Stanton water to Nogal Lake. The N. M. Department of Game and Fish is still working on this (PP-27).

There was considerable discussion on Livestock Marketing (PP-3). More definite actions need to be taken to improve marketing.

The nursing home project at Carrizozo (PP-41) was also discussed. A letter indicating the project has no priority has been received. The reasons given were not clear.

New project proposals were called for. The Executive Committee presented Project Proposal No. 44 - Telephone Service to White Oaks. Motion to accept this proposal was made by Pat Murphy, seconded by Mrs. C. A. Snow. The motion passed. The Executive Committee also presented Project Proposal No. 45 - Corona Community Park. Motion to accept this proposal was made by Walter Pfeiffer seconded by Fred Thompson. The motion passed.

New project proposals from the floor were asked for. Improvement to State Highway No. 42 was presented by Raymond Binyon seconded by Fred Thompson accepted and numbered PP-47. No other project proposals were presented.

Mr. Bell introduced Mr. D. H. (Doc) Dean, supervisor of the Claunch-Pinto SWCD. Mr. Dean commented on the problem that the Estancia RC&D was in four state planning districts and it was recommended by the State Planning Office that the portion of the Claunch-Pinto SWCD in Lincoln and Socorro Counties be included in the SCMRA. Mr. Dean requested that this be done. Mr. Gallacher, Jr., moved that the portion of the Claunch-Pinto SWCD in Lincoln and Socorro counties be included in the SCMRA. This was seconded by Fred Thompson and the motion carried. Mr. Gallacher stated he would see that this additional area be included in the SCMRA RC&D project application and plan.

Mr. Dean was appointed to the Steering Committee, representing Claunch-Pinto SWCD. Mr. Walter Pfeiffer was also appointed to the Steering Committee, representing the Corona Community Action Program.

Mr. Bell asked Mr. Fred Thompson to speak for the New Mexico Wildlife Association in regard to proposed changes in the state constitution by the constitutional convention delegates. Mr. Debert Nelson to discuss proposed changes in the water laws of New Mexico, and Mr.
