Zozo Grizzlies start district play Friday

After beating both Capitan and Cloudercroft in District 4C the Carrizozo Grizzlies play their first game in 3C Friday against Mountainair, an undefeated team and one that will go about 180 pounds per man in the front line, and more meat on the hoof behind. The three teams in District 3C are Zozo, Mountainair, and Reserve. The Grizzlies play Reserve on October 23.

Against Cloudercroft Friday night the Grizzlies went up against the hardest hitting team of this season according to Coach Tommy Rannell. The Bears wanted to beat Carrizozo real bad and were playing to win.

The difference was in Zozo's defense where Rusty Leslie, Dee Douglas and David Look did an outstanding job. About seven of the Grizzlies play both defense and offense and frequently see 60 minutes of contest.

On the def-off side Charles Mackey and Milton May were honored as outstanding offensive and defensive players for the month of September by Carrizozo Rotary Club at its October 2 meeting.

Ben Stuteville, back on the squad after back injury which kept him out for three weeks, took a little while to get his timing back but then he carried for two touch downs, and five and ten yard runs and also ran a kickoff back 60 yards which set up the last Zozo touchdown.

Ray Roper, carrying lots of tape on his knee, wasn't hampered too much. He made 143 yards rushing and scored one touchdown.

Willie Gallegos, sophomore back, also had a good night taking one short pass and running 70 yards for a touchdown.

The Grizzlies will have the entire squad suited up for the Mountainair game, a win here is a must if the Grizzlies are to get in the state playoffs. The Mountainair team is big and heavy, an undefeated team that will come to Carrizozo carrying a six to twelve point advantage on paper.

CAPITAN TIGERS FINALLY COME UNTRACKED 21-7

After losing three games the Capitan Tigers finally got going to take a homecoming victory over Tatum 21-7 Friday. This was a district game leaving the Tigers needing only a victory over Cloudercroft on October 31 to win the 4C District.

The Tigers had 164 yards rushing and 87 yards passing while Tatum piled up 167 yards rushing and 66 passing. Capitan scored in the first, Tatum in the second and Capitan again in the third and fourth quarters.

TWELVE CORONA CARDS COULD WHIP MOST 12's

If the Corona Cardinals could take 12 of their players against 12 of any other team, like Mountainair, the Cards would probably wear them down and come out winner. With a small squad, they just naturally wear down and the bigger squads win.

Such was the case with Mountainair, winner 38-10 over Corona. Mountainair did all of its scoring in the first three quarters. Corona racked up its 16 points in the last quarter on runs by Erramoupe and McKibben.

Homecoming celebration Friday

This weekend will be one of the biggest on Carrizozo school calendar with one of the district's real tough football teams coming to contest the Grizzlies, four queen candidates, a warmup football game, pep rally and big dance after the game Friday. It stands to be a full weekend of activity. Students have been campaigning all week for their favorite queen candidate, Miss Geneva Lueras represents the senior class, Miss Julie Narvaez the juniors, Miss LuEllen Harkey the sophomore

class, and Miss Geneva Narvaez the freshmen. The student body will vote Friday morning to select their homecoming queen. Announcement will be made at halftime of the game and the queen will be crowned by Billy Ortiz, president of the student council. On Thursday at 6:00 p. m. there will be a warmup football game, Carrizozo freshmen playing the Ruidoso freshmen. Following this game there will be a pep rally and bonfire at the baseball

field. Friday at 2:00 p. m. a big homecoming parade will assemble to march down Central (US54) to the Y, then make a U-turn and parade back to the starting point at the Crossroads Motel. The parade is open to any person or group who might want to enter a float, clown, odd vehicle, bicycle or any sort of parade entry. Kino Ortiz will be parade marshal, followed by the Grizzly band and a number of

school floats and other entries. Several parade entries are expected from business places in town. Prizes will be awarded to the best floats. Time of the big game is 7:30 p. m. on Laabs Field, Carrizozo Mountainair. There will be a homecoming dance in the gym for all students and alumni following the game.

Sub-div people want road maintenance

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace presided at a public meeting in the courthouse Tues. at 4:00 p. m. called for the purpose of discussing a new law which permits the commission to adopt by resolution the proposition wherein they may assess property owners in sub-divisions for part of cost of maintaining roads.

Such maintenance program is not now being carried out because the county has not accepted such sub-division roads as part of the county road system. All property owners at the meeting, particularly those living in Sun Valley, expressed their dissatisfaction with present road maintenance. The sub-division developers at the meeting figured out that they would be ahead by having the county do maintenance

work because their roads would get maintenance work four to six times a year at less cost than they are now paying for less maintenance work. Last year Lincoln County spent \$85,563.61 to maintain 3,162 miles of county roads which money came 95.6 percent from sale of vehicle license tags and 4.4 percent from the Forest Service. No property tax money

is now or has been spent on road maintenance. The county commissioners told the group at the meeting that they were spending all available money on maintenance of present county road systems and that if the county were to take in sub-division roads, it would necessitate purchase of more equipment and employment of another man, and probably a new road district set up containing some 150 miles of roads. The money would have to come from some new source.

The county is now levying a full five mills property tax for operation of the county -- every thing but roads. Under the law no money may be transferred from the county general fund to the road fund. Property owners at the meeting figured out that when all lots were sold in the sub-division where they lived, the sub-dividers would be through, through with road maintenance and everything else, so that road maintenance would eventually become the job of the county. If it were to be done, and opinions of property owners at the meeting were that they want the county to take over the job now.

Dick Parsons, attorney from Ruidoso representing Lakeside Edelweiss, North Park, Fawn Ridge, and Mohaco's 18 sub-divisions, spoke first and said that the general feeling of his clients was that the burden of road maintenance should be spread over the entire county. The statute does provide that a county-wide levy could be made, and it would be more equitable to levy on the entire county than just the property owners in the sub-divisions. Parsons said his people felt that a levy on sub-divisions for road maintenance might slow up or stop future sales of lots.

Tommy LaMay is the road man in the Alto - Ruidoso area, his district has 211 miles of roads, runs clear to Carrizozo. Stark said the county could not buy more equipment for his district, and asked, "What is going to happen to satisfy HUD?" Mrs. Helen Craig said her family has lived in Sun Valley four years, pay the biggest property tax of anyone in Sun Valley, that holes in the asphalt roads are big enough to bury a horse. She said she knew that Johnny Mobley, Sun Valley developer, had purchased close to 100 yards of asphalt but she figured only about 15 yards were used in Sun Valley and did not know where the rest went. The county supplied trucking for \$9 1/2 yards of asphalt on June 25.

Sam Montgomery, developer and contractor, said he was concerned about big sub-division coming in, doing their own paving, and having topvelty. Montgomery said that one big development is in the planning stage now which will have paved roads with curb and gutter. Mrs. Craig said, "I'll pay my share. We can't get anything done and must have roads." It had been pointed out that maintenance of sub-division roads would cost 1.2 cents per lineal foot or around \$1.00 to \$1.25 per lot per year. The commissioners had figured out approximately cost based on one sub-division selected at random.

Don Rash said their problem was getting out after snow storms, that if the maintenance cost is all you said, I'm all for it. Walton Hall said he had just spent \$5,000 getting roads ready for fall, he thought the levy ought to be county-wide, was for any thing to fix roads. Question of what future commission might do came up. Atty. Bill Payne said any future commission will have obligation to carry out program. Sooner or later the county will have to take over.

Sverrd Johnson said he had lots in Sun Valley, their roads have always had holes, they were told its up to the county to take care of the roads. The commissioners should talk to developers and keep them straight. Johnson said he would go along with Mrs. Craig, will pay his part. Stark commented, the phrase "county will take care of roads" is in common use. Jim Kerley, developer, said he has about 12 miles of roads, would like to see the county do the maintenance work if the cost is equitable. Would be better for me than what I have now.

Mrs. Craig said that Sun Valley residents would rather see the asphalt covering ripped up and gravel put down to get rid of the holes. Leroy McKnight, county road foreman, said the county did not have equipment to maintain asphalt roads. Stark pointed out that if the county took over the job of maintaining sub-division roads that both gravel and asphalt type would be maintained. "We got thousands of lots where roads are not being maintained," Stark said.

Montgomery said that the people he has sold lots to would not object to maintenance cost but it might scare off new developers. Kerley asked if you could exclude those developers who are maintaining their roads, answer was that any developer showing cause why a particular sub-division should not be included, could be excluded from any maintenance assessment. 37 work 2 years off

A letter from the New Mexico State Highway Department to Lincoln County Commissioners dated September 29 reads as follows:

Following the request made by Lincoln County to the State Highway Commission, September 18, 1969, for completion of State Highway 37, personnel in the Department have studied this matter further.

The uncompleted gap carries a critical rating and there is no

question as to the need for its improvement. The difficulty lies in financing the work. We have mentioned previously that due to the overwhelming critical needs over the State, we cannot concentrate funds for several years on one route. The earliest date we can schedule another project on SR 37 is 1972-73 fiscal year. The project is recommended to be included in our program for that year. If there should be any development that will allow us to expedite the project you are assured that we will do so.

Some of the baked products which were entered in the Women's Division at the New Mexico State Fair were of such excellent quality that the recipes are being made available to all homemakers. In the breads division, the Banana Nut Bread was outstanding as to texture, flavor and moistness. The Prickly Pear Marmalade was a winner and I feel the recipe is most interesting and that it could be added to your Southwestern Foods file.

Banana Nut Bread
Cream together: 1 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
Beat in: 2 eggs
Sift together and stir in: 1 3/4 cup flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda.
Stir in: 1 1/2 cups mashed

bananas, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Pour into 2 6 1/2 x 3 x 2 inch loaf pans and bake at 375 F for 45 minutes.

Prickly Pear Marmalade:
Recipe from the kitchen of Mrs. John B. James, 1908 Muriel N.E. Albuquerque 87112.

2 oranges, finely chopped (peel and pulp)
1 cup thinly sliced lemons
4 cups water
Sugar - measure for measure with cooked fruit
4 cups chopped fruit of Prickly Pears spines removed.
Wash oranges, remove stem and blossom ends; slice and chop in fine bits. Wash lemons, remove stem and blossom ends; thinly slice. Combine citrus fruits with water. Let stand overnight (12-18 hours) in cool place to completely dissolve pectin from white inner peel of fruit.

Heat over low flame to boiling; reduce heat to simmer and cook until fruit is tender. Cool. Add chopped prickly pears. For each cup fruit and liquid, add 1 cup sugar. Bring to boil and boil rapidly to jellifying stage. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

The marmalade requires time for setting to a jelly-like consistency.


There has not been a killing frost to date but it is growing colder, so may arrive any time.




