# Lincoln hospital bonds are sick

The boards of directors of two Lincoln County hospitals and Lincoln County commissioners heard report from Darrell Fowler, representing Stern Bros. bonding company, Wednesday morning that sale of two sets of bonds, \$665,000 for Ruidoso and \$142,000 for Carrizozo could not be made under existing circumstances.

The circumstance stems from three court cases challenging the validity of elections where only property owners or property tax payers had the right to vote. The Arizona supreme court has held that limiting the voting franchise to a selected group (real tax payers) violates the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution. Similar cases involving revenue bonds have been heard in other states and lawyers have concluded that in essence revenue bonds are no different than general obligation bonds.

The court decision that made the difference was handed down June 16 and all bond sales concluded prior to that time are OK. But, since New Mexico state law permits only property owners to vote on general obligation bonds and our state courts have never touched on such cases the bond election was held September 30 and the issue carried in this county.

Monday morning Fowler received legal opinion that Lincoln County bonds would not get unqualified approval from attorneys who check such items and without this unqualified approval no buy would be safe in the purchase of these bonds.

One of the possible angles would be to hold another election just for non-property tax payers, but this route probably will not be followed here. Another possibility developed in other states would be to have another election with two ballot boxes, one for property tax payers and one for non-property tax payers. Fowler said this course would be considered legal in New Mexico.

The most practical solution will be to wait until the New Mexico legislature goes into session January 14 and get the necessary legislation passed permitting all voters, both property tax payers and non-property tax payers, to vote at election for general obligation bonds.

If this course were followed and the legislature did its work by the first of February, it would take 30 days to call an election, and then 30 days to call for sale of bonds, and Lincoln County might, if the bonds carried, have money to proceed with modernizing the Ruidoso hospital and construction of intermediate care unit in Carrizozo.

Fowler said that most eastern states permit all people to vote in bond elections, that only in the western states where railroads had considerable influence at time constitutions were drawn up, were clauses put in restricting bond elections to vote of qualified electors and property tax payers. There are many counties in New Mexico at present with this same problem and all school districts contemplating construction will have the problem.

Charles Jones asked the hospital boards, "How are you going to pay your architects?" Another problem to Hill-Burton federal funds which Ruidoso expects to use.

Best route suggested by Fowler is to sit tight, let the legislature do its work, and possibly in 90 days the situation will have cleared up.

No question but that Lincoln County will have to vote again if it wants to improve its hospital situations.

Robert Cox, delegate to the constitutional convention from Lincoln-Sierra counties, spoke to a large group of Democratic women and their husbands in Carrizozo Tuesday night about the convention and the new document. It was a question and answer session after opening remarks by Mr. Cox.

Cox said they heard three to four weeks of testimony at the start of the convention and most important testimony came from six former governors, none now holding political office. With exception of Burroughs all the former governors were in favor of the short ballot which has been the subject of much discussion since the convention completed its work.

Cox said of the three officers not on the short ballot, attorney general, treasurer and secretary of state, that both the attorney general and secretary of state testified in favor of these positions being appointive rather than elective.

The convention settled on four year terms of office because of testimony from the former governors. Their thinking was that state officers spend two years learning the job, that campaigning every two years takes much time away from the job. After four years in office the people can make proper judgment of candidate at the polls. Cox said it would be a lot easier to get good men to accept appointments for four years rather than two.

Question, if new constitution is not approved is it possible to have four-year term for governor. Answer, Yes.

Q, if constitution does not pass, could the issue come up again immediately, A, yes.

Q, would you recommend a Democrat vote for or against, A, for.

Comment from Cox, I'm convinced we have more liberal thinkers in the state than I knew. They might force another constitution convention in five years. If the new constitution is adopted, the question of call for constitutional convention will go on the ballot every 14 years.

Q, What about home rule, A, taxation and home rule were key issues. Home rule allows cities to adopt charter to govern themselves and do what they want except where specifically prohibited. Charter has to be put into effect by vote of people.

The legislature has authority under old constitution, same as in the new, to change county government if desired. Bernalillo County was one that wanted to swallow up county government.

Comment, there must be a separate vote of city and county to combine the two governments. Q, no mention of state tax commission, A, I served on the tax committee, the final article in the constitution is the same as came out of our committee. The 20-mill limit was big issue but by varying assessment ratio a county can raise or lower taxes and the 20-mill limit does not mean so much. We took thirty-three and one-third assessment ratio and twenty mills and used both as ceiling figures, the only loophole now is appraised value.

This one article on taxation could make the new document worth supporting. I didn't think the short ballot was earth shaking, had the attorney general been appointed by governor they might have got together on liquor law.

No law will guarantee good people but we expect good people in government. Cabinet officers are not subject to senate approval. A governor under old constitution, has from two to three thousand appointments to make, the biggest problem a new governor has, we felt that no one man can make that many good appointments. If the governor only had to pick fourteen good men as department heads, they could appoint people under them which will simplify the appointment problem.

Comment, this constitution convention cost the state over \$500,000. The new constitution will be much easier to amend. A simple majority vote (36 in 70 member group, it now takes a two-thirds majority and a majority vote in each county to pass amendments. Under new constitution a statewide majority vote of people can pass amendments.

Q, voting age, A, we voted on 18 years first, it failed, then 19, then 20 and that carried.

Mr. Cox has answered all questions by this time and most to the satisfaction of the audience. Mrs. Cox was with him at the meeting and he said she knew as much about the convention as he did.

Mrs. Carl Jorren, president of Lincoln County Democratic Women's Club, conducted the meeting.

Q, about game department, A, objections came from fish and game department because we felt they should be under the legislature and they want to be set aside. Other departments, livestock board for one, operate on their own money.

Q, about state fair, A, no mention in new document. Q, After four years can officer run for four more, A, yes. Q, can people get good advice from appointed attorney general, A, yes. You don't always get good people either by election or appointment but we hope for good people in office and plan that way. Q, can governor re-appoint officer for second four years, A, yes, can appoint any time. Atty, gen, sec, of state and treasurer not under personnel act. It should work this way, if he's a bad governor, you're giving him enough rope to hang himself. Q, can people petition officer out of office, A, no, not one of the three appointed (above). Q, legislature has more power, A, in some areas, legislature has more to do, in matter of tax exemption it takes a two-third majority to create a new exemption by the legislature, a simple majority vote can eliminate tax exemptions. Q, about board of education, A, I'm least satisfied with the education article, it lets them handle their own money, 78¢ out of every tax \$1.00 goes to education. It's hard to talk against education. The appointive board does have merit. To elect a nine-member board the state would have to be apportioned into nine districts. It's hard to get good people to campaign, too expensive for a "no-pay" job. The legislature still has to appropriate money for education. Q, can state board of education come in and appoint local board, A, no. Local board authority is not to be diminished. Q, effect on county government, A, county government is basic. Vernon Petty, acting mayor, said that the mayor and clerk had authority to hire part-time help as needed without getting prior permission from the council. That the position of town bookkeeper should be advertised and applications taken before the job is filled on permanent basis.

The opportunity to serve in the Constitutional Convention of 1969 has been very gratifying. I have made every effort to serve the best interests of the people of Lincoln and Sierra counties in what I sincerely feel is the most important event in the State's recent history.

The great amounts of information compiled over the past six years by the Constitutional Revision Commission, the Governors Committee on Reorganization, and four weeks of concentrated committee hearing on all facets of government by nine separate committees, which included hearings from any groups and any individuals who wish to testify, made it possible for the convention to complete its work in the relatively short time of sixty-four days.

After all this information was compiled, debated and considered by the convention as a whole, the proposed document was the result. This document is the effort of seventy delegates of differing views -- each trying to serve the people he represented. Consequently it is a people's document not a political one, as very few of the delegates had ever had previous experience in government other than at a local level.

At the time of the election things were most prominent in peoples minds in this district. Taxation and local government. Fortunately, I requested and received appointment on the committees on Taxation and local government. I am very pleased to report that we have successfully written more restrictive property tax laws and local government provisions allowing more self government of local communities. No delegate got all he wanted written into the new Constitution just as no one citizen ever gets everything he wants. This proposed Constitution is the result of the thinking of seventy dedicated people from all parts of the state whose only common interest was the betterment of New Mexico.



Fresh cranberries couldn't be easier to freeze. Just place them in the freezer. That's all there is to it. They will keep their bright red plump appearance and tangy flavor. When you're ready to use them, don't thaw them out. Just cook them as you would the fresh. And, while frozen, they are much easier to chop or grind as they retain their juice.

The early-season fresh cranberries are at their peak of quality so it pays to make your purchases early and freeze some for use later on.

For holiday giving or eating at home, this cranberry-orange bread is quick and different. Cranberry-orange Nut Bread  
2 1/2 cups bisquick mix, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup flour, 1 egg, 1 cup water or milk, 2 tablespoons grated orange peel, 3/4 cup chopped fresh or frozen cranberries, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Heat oven to 350. Grease loaf pan, 9x5x3 inches. Mix bisquick mix, sugar, flour, egg, water and orange peel with spoon. Beat vigorously 1/2 minute. Fold in cranberries and nuts. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour. Remove from pan. Cool before slicing. Wrap any leftover bread tightly in aluminum foil.

This freezes beautifully so it can be done now and frozen for Christmas giving.


