## Ranch life in Lincoln County was struggle from the start

Sun-up, June, 1905, A crashing Nevertheless, we were glad that front-door knock at the ranch home the Harper children, Jim. of Dr. J. M. and Anna Lacy Simms. Gretchen, and Rachel, were there, Joe Wingfield, our neighbor: "Put on your britches, Lacy, and show me where to put this beef steak!" Tied to the back of his saddle was a hind-quarter of beef. Our ranch peighbors did this several times during our six years in southern Lincoln County, They knew of our straightened circum-

Our family had moved from Hopkins County, Texas, early that year, hoping that my father might regain his health. It was a struggle from the start George Hyde, who sold to us, hadn't been able to make it. We soon learned that we couldn't live from selling alfalfa, regetables, truit, and eggs from the three irrigated acres and the forty acre pasture, even though we had our own milk, butter, chickens, eggs, fruit, and vegetables.

The Luciano Chavez family lived just across the north branch of Three Rivers Creek, three hundred yards away. The Lincoln Otero County line ran between our houses. They spoke little English and we spoke no Spanish, but we became fast friends. They shared frijoles and chili with us. From them I had my first bite of dried green chili. It was so hot that I have often said that when I had to spit it out, it started a grass fire. Mrs. Chavez was formerly Lucas Crawford, wife of Andres Crawford,

Without other near-by Lincoln County neighbors, the Ellises , Calfees, and Nabours west of us, and the Sheffy and Truax families who were raising angora goats north of us, we would have been very lonesome. The Joe Wingfields, Frank Goodins, Fred Crosbys, and Joe Blackwells, all with children, to the south of us, meant just as much to us. Widow Susan Barber and her right-hand man, Pompey, were farther away to the south-west.

Most of the above ranchers, together with all Mexican families along the river were being bought out by U. S. Senator Albert Bacon Fall and began to leave before we did in 1911 Fallhad aiready bought the Pat Coughlan ranch and land leases near the El Paso and Northeastern Railway depot and so was building up a great land - cattle empire, beginning at the northwest side of the Mescalero Apache Reservation and extending to the south end of the Malpais on the west. Only one rancher, Pete Crawford refused to sell to Fall,

Pete was born in 1883 near the Lincoln County line, and just recently finally sold to Thomas Fortune Ryan III, who bought the Fall property.

In 1306 Father secured the \$50,00 a month rural route contract for carrying the mail from the railroad depot to the Three Rivers post-office, ten miles east at the south end of the Godfrey Hills, There J. W. Blackwell, postmaster, had the only store between Tularosa and Carrizozo. The mail contract, plus credit at Joe's store, enabled us to remain in Lincoln County.

When Monroe Harper, just east of us, put in 40 acres of apples, there was less and less irrigation water for us. His hogs ran loose and ate most of our watermelons.

No one had electric lights, telephones, or refrigerators, Mail order catalogues were as indispensible as family Bibles. The County seat at Lincoln and Titsworth's store at Capitan were an over-night trip away.

The nearest dentist was 40 miles away. My brother Denton decided not to put up with toothaches, left home, found work in J. W. Prudes store at Mescalero, got near to a dentist, and found a wife, May, daughter of the Reformed Church missionary, the Rev. Richard Harper.

The only school was two miles south, elementary, one teacher, a post I held in 1307-09. There, under my instruction, my youngest brother, Eugene, learned to read and write, and later became a practicing physician for 35 years in Alamogordo.

As for social life, my sister Mary, teenager, had but one girl friend of her age, Florence Nabours. She finally found another congenial friend, Grace Spence, at Carrizozo, whose father was a

lawyer and ran a furniture store. There were hoe-down barn dances at the school house and at Blackwell's store, An all-night and breakfast dance at Mrs. Ellis's ranch was unforgettable, certainly to her two Callee nieces. Her husband had been killed in the

Lincoln County War. We were really thrilled when our historically important V. L. P. neighbor, Mrs. Susan Homer McSween Barber invited our community to a baille. She was known as the "Cattle Queen of New Mexico". After McSween's death in the Lincoln County War, she had married George Barber, She divorced him in 1397 and moved near to the Three Rivers area of Lincoln County, After selling to Fail in 1917, she moved to White Oaks where she was buried in

By 1307 our Morgan - breed horse, shipped from Texas, had grazed his teeth to the bone and died of starvation. My younger brother, Donald, then needed a horse for carrying the mail. How we came by two horses is quite a story. The Mescalero Indian family, the Shantas, lived near the northwest corner of the Apache reservation, "Shanta-boy's" wife, after three days in labor, couldn't give birth, and in desperation,


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### Town Council

AN EARLY-DAY REPORT FROM CAPITAN PROGRESS

Providence has done more and man has done less for Lincoln county than for any section of the southwest. We can say it without fear of successful contradiction, that Lincoln county is richer than any other section in the territory.

Lincoln county includes the largest and richest mineral belt in the territory, which has not yet been prospected, let alonebeing developed. The deepest mine in the county is the Old Abe at White Oaks and next to it outside of White Oaks, is the American mine at Nogal. throughout the country in the form of springs and running streams. The streams which flow down from the White mountains are the purest water found in New Mexico. It is a pure and healthful draught of life saving liquid, fresh from the brew of nature. The climate is the most perfect

to be found anywhere, or at least that is what competent government experts say. The United States Government, recognizing this fact, has located the National Marine. Hospital for consumptives at Fort Stanton, five miles from Capitan. In the mountainous parts, which include two thirds of the country, spring reigns perpetually. The thermometer rarely everregisters as low as zero in winter or reaches the 80 degree mark in summer The rainfall averages from 10 inches per annum on the plains to 120 inches high up in the mountains. The average rainfall in Capitan is about 60 inches per annum. In most parts of the country the average rain fall is ample for the growing of crops.

established here, North Capitan is the coarcamp. and home of the miners, also the present terminus of the El Paso & Northeastern railway. It has about 700 inhabitants. It is like any coal camp in its long rows of red houses and its excellent hospital, fine depot, large mercantile store, and but one saloon. No more allowed by the company.

The camp has eight mines numbering from one up. Of these Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 7 and 8 are in operation, and yield between 500 and 600 tons of coal daily.

There are five distinct stratas. ranging from 4 to 6 feet in width, underlying the district parallel to each other and extending no man can tell how far. That brief review of the first year of the 60s, with accent on changes, could be repeated nine times to bring us up to the 70s. Many good friends of several generations have died, probably 90 percent of nine graduating classes in all towns of the county have moved to where the action is and Carrizozo's population going into the 70's is some figure less than 1500.

.The shift from railroad-ranching economy to tourist-ranching economy has left scars that are slow to heal. The town center. once along the railroad track. has continued to move toward the highway and spread until such as a center hardly exists any more leaving buildings eroding with time and disuse.

Making a profit from ranching has meant doing a lot of the work yourself, with maybe one or two helpers where ranches used to employ six to a dozen or more families all meaning business for the town. There has been continual consolidation on the railroad and no reason to think this trend will stop with impact on town business almost equal to the loss of ranch employment.

Tourist and/or traveler business is not what we'd call big in Carrizozo but it's sure one of the good things going for the town and could account for half the lobs.

A great many good things have happened to Carrizozo which make life more pleasant here than most places on this earth but so far these good things have not attracted people. A new courthouse built in the 60s employs about the same number of people, a new postoffice is small gain with a dozen employees instead of four. new paving is wonderful, natural gas a positive plus, rebuilt electricsystem was progress, newsirport might open the way for future development, addition at fire station was necessity as were the several school buildings erected in the 60s, However, with exception of six new jobs at PO, none of these good things have brought more people to town.

Another good thing happens to be the generous nature of two of our residents who provided us: with park, recreation center and have helped with numerous other projects, making life more enjoyable for those of us who live here





# Questions and Answers on the Draft

Mr. R. L. Sherrill: Chairman of Local Board No. 14 announced that listed below are questions and answers concerning Selective Service random sleiction sequence procedures relating to the areas in which it is believed there is the greatest public interest:

Q: My birth date was drawn number 216 in the lottery. I am in school and will be until June 1973. Will the 216 number apply when I enter the pool in 1973 or will that year's number control? A: The random sequence number you acquired in the December 1969 drawing will apply so long as you remain subject to induction for military service.

Q: Presently I am in Class II-A but this deferment will expire on February 28, 1970, I have number 306 from the lottery. I will become 26 on May 1, 1970, If the local board does not reach my number before my 26th birthday, what will my status be?

A: If the local board has not reached your number before your 26th birthday, you will, upon reaching age 26, leave the pool of those available for induction as part of the 1970 first priority selection group.

Q: If a local board must select. three men to fill a call today for five, all of whom have the same birthday, which three would they take?

A: In the event that two or more men have the same birth date within a local board, their sequence of induction will be determined by the first letter of their names (last name and, if necessary, first name) which have been arranged in a random sequence of the alphabet established during the drawing that was conducted on December 1, 1969. Q: I am 19 years old, have no basis for deferment, and have sequence number 300. If I am not inducted in 1970, can I be inducted in 1971 or in subsequent years? A: You are liable for induction to age 26 or to age 35 if you are or have been deferred. In 1971 you will have a decreased vulnerability, However, if the calls for manpower in 1971 are so highthat they cannot be met by the 1971 selection group the local boards will then select from the supply of manpower that might be left over from 1970. As each year goes by without your induction taking place you will have a decreasing vulnerability.

Q: Next February I will turn 19. Do I enter the lottery pool on that date?

A: No. You won't be included in the random selection sequence LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS, THURSDAY, JAN. 1, 1970, PAGE 9

in 1970?.

A: No. because the total man power requirements are not known and cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

Q: I have random sequence number 75. When my local board inducts me will other local boards be inducting registrants with this same sequence number?

A: Not necessarily. It is expected that all local boards will be proceeding at about the same pace, varying percentages of their registrants in deferred status, and do not have the same number of registrants with the same birthdays, they may not be inducting registrants with a particular random sequence number.

Q: I have sequence number 250. If I want to volunteer for induction, will my local board wait until they reach sequence number 250 before they will accept me as a volunteer? A: No. They may accept you as a volunteer prior to reaching your random sequence number in the induction processing.

Q: I am 19 years old and now deferred as a student. My random sequence number is 300, If sequence number 300 is not reached in 1970 in my local board, will I be home free when my deferment ends in 19732

A: No. If at the time you are classified I-A in 1973 your local board has not reached sequence nymber 300 in their induction processing, you will simply be placed in that sequence and you may or but because local boards have may not be reached for inductionin 1373. You will still have sequence number 300. If at the time you are classified I-A your local board has reached random sequence number 300 in 1973 you at any one time all available, will be subject to induction at the head of the 1373 selection group,







Father died of tuberculosis in October of 1907. No preacher for a funeral. No money for a grave stone. But after a few weeks we found that A. B. Fall family had placed a beautiful marble stone at the grave. Forty years later the body and stone were removed to

Alamogordo when Mother died.

After Father's death and my move to Alamogordo as County Superintendent of Schools, our youngest brother, Eugene, became seriously ill with an abdominal obstruction. The nearest medical help was west of the mountains near Oscuro, a homesteader doctor, Dr. Ranneger, Mother and sister Mary were alone with Eugene. Mary was not used to riding horseback but she saddled Roan, our cow-pony, climbed through canyons unknown to her, 1000 feet higher than our house, and reached Oscuro at dark. She and the doctor both returned at once on horses, but it was so dark that they lost the trail and Mary away, and sister Mary anxious that he could lead them back home. Dr. Ranneger wanted to operate at once, but mother was afraid of the risk. He showed her how to massage the impacted area and went home, Mother "doctored"

During father's last months of life I was running for the position of County Superintendent of School in Otero County. I lived six months in Lincoln County and six in Otero County to prove up on 160 acres of a homestead right. After I took office in January of 1909, mother and the three younger children moved into a pinon-pole, mudroofed two-room shack north of the irrigated area, where she had taken a homestead right for her self. It was at the edge of an arroyo where just enough spring water ran to fill one barrel a day.

With me gone, brother Penton had to give Old Roan the rein so to be married in Alamogordo to John Hutchings, ex-chauffeur for General John Pershing, mother sold everything to A. B. Fall and joined me in Alamogordo, thus ending six years of an unforgettable ups and downs life in Lincoln County.
