Zozo tops Ruidoso four ways Monday

Carrizozo Grizzlies wrestlers beat Ruidoso 26-21 Monday, the Zozo freshman team which is undefeated, beat Ruidoso 43-37, the B squad took the Warriors 47-43, and the varsity won a thrilling game from Ruidoso 61-56 to make a clean sweep of four matches for the day.

Coach Lee Fleming said he feels the Estancia game, won by Carrizozo 59-49 was a turning point of the season for his team. They out rebounded Estancia 59-39, and the team really started helping each other and pulling together in that game. Shooting was common, only 31 percent in the first half and 39 in the second. Free throw accuracy only 33 percent, but defensive work and hustle made the difference.

Lots of visitors at Zozo school meeting

Carrizozo school board, short one member, met Tuesday night with 35 visitors present. Present were Ray Wells, Mrs. Billy Stephenson, Paul Ortiz, Rankell Greer and Supt. Glen Ellison. The group of visitors included several teachers as well as school patrons.

The meeting was delayed for some time and several phone calls made to find out if Ziggy Lessau, the fifth member of the board, was coming. He was not contacted and did not attend the meeting.

Board President Ray Wells opened the meeting with a welcome to the visitors. Minutes of Dec. 9 and Dec. 29 meetings were read and approved. Supt. Ellison asked about inclusion of letter from teachers but no action taken.

The board agreed that \$12,000 of school money should be drawing interest and will be invested for this purpose.

Policy changes were discussed. Retirement age was set at 65. Teachers will now accumulate sick leave at the rate of 10 days a year up to 60 days. All other personnel of the school will accumulate sick leave at rate of 5 days a year up to 20 days. Girls are permitted to wear slacks on cold days.

The ski program started last week with \$1000 from Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer to kick it off. The first trip was made Sat. ski run was rocky, they need more snow at Sierra Blanca for a good ski season. Cost to each school skiler is \$3.00, cost to school \$8 per

student, 57 have signed up, lessons not included in cost.

Evaluation of hot lunch program was made last week, a part of the state-wide school evaluation. Major change at Carrizozo has been addition of baker in afternoon which has helped considerably and also made better use of commodities. The school will get report of evaluation in near future.

Ancho school bus route has been put in Mrs. Roper's name. She is hauling 23 in 30 - passenger bus, route soon will have twenty seven passengers. She was to get new bus but size will depend on whether or not route remains unchanged. The school board to survey both the Roper and Forsythe routes.

President Wells read code of ethics which was discussed by the board at its December 29 meeting. The code is part of the evaluation to be conducted next month.

Next item on agenda was superintendent's contract. Wells called for executive session. Before the board retired in this session Prin. Ben Pritchett made comment that he had sat in on graduate class at Eastern University where Supt. Ellison made presentation. He did excellent job and Pritchett considered him one of the deepest thinking men in regard to modern education he has met. Over the state people in education circles consider him top.

After short executive session of board in adjoining room, Wells announced that vote on superintendent contract would be put off in hope that Lessau might get to the meeting.

Scholarships offered for nurses

Carrizozo hospital board meeting Monday heard details of a plan that has good possibilities of relieving the shortage of nurses in the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital at Carrizozo.

It amounts to establishment of two scholarship arrangements at professional nurse schools with provision that these nurses will return to work in the Carrizozo hospital.

The scholarships will be worth \$2,000 each toward the two-year study necessary to attain a registered nurse certificate. The scholarships have been set up by Dr. and Mrs. A. N. Spencer and as soon as formal arrangements are made with nurse schools the scholarships will be available to any qualified young woman.

In addition to the scholarships, Ruth Totten RN has started work at the Carrizozo hospital on the 2 to 10 shift which has made things much easier for Head Nurse Margie Whittaker who has been on 24-hour call.

The hospital board, composed of Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Dimmit Bond, Johnson Stearns, Bill Edgar and A. P. Sifton, took some necessary action to raise wages at the hospital and at the same time raise room rates.

The government forced a raise of wages for non-professional help last February, wages going from minimum of \$1.30 per hour to \$1.45. To balance this increase the hospital board voted to raise wages of professional help ten percent. Most hospitals including Ruidoso have been charging for meals served to hospital staff members and the board discussed this at length but decided that they would continue the program of free meals at a cost of over \$5,000 a year because wages in Carrizozo hospital are still lower than in other hospitals.

Room rates in Carrizozo have \$20 a day for semi-private room, and \$25 for private room, the lowest in the entire area. These rates will be raised 25 percent to \$25 for semi-private and \$31.25 for private room - still the lowest hospital room rates in the area.

The board heard a financial report from Alton Whittaker, hospital administrator which shows the institution going along about as good as always and the board saw a bank balance of \$2,587.20 as of December 31, 1969, this with good help from the special endowment fund and \$15,000 from Medicare during the fiscal 1968-69 year.

The board was especially complimentary to the administrator and head nurse Mr. and Mrs. Alton Whittaker and the staff of the hospital for the way the hospital has been operating.

Walt Henn is guest speaker at Arts - N - Authors Branch

HOLLOMAN AIR FORCE BASE, N.M. -- Walter R. Henn, artist and author of Lincoln, N.M. will be guest speaker at Arts - N - Authors Branch 121. Armed Forces Writers League 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 21 at the Whispering Sands Community Center.

Interested persons are welcome and there is no charge.

In Dallas, Texas, before settling in Lincoln in 1965, Henn taught at the Ed Young and Art Center Schools, was artist for a couple of large printing houses, Art Director at McMains - Melton Advertising Agency and ten years was Art Director and Production Manager for Grant Advertising Agency of Dallas with International headquarters in Chicago, Illinois. He painted in his spare time, exhibiting occasionally in local galleries. This he may have continued had he and his wife Nora not visited Lincoln. "It was love at first sight," they say. And it was Lincoln County's gain.

Henn designed the Lincoln County Centennial commemorative medallion which is already on its way toward becoming a collectors item. He paints and writes about the local scene. His series of ink and wash drawings of old houses of Lincoln and a bit of their history is on exhibit in the Old Court house Museum in Lincoln. His articles and illustrations have appeared in various newspapers and magazines in the southwest. He designed and illustrated a Carrizozo brochure, complete with maps of tours in the area.

On several occasions Paul Payton, chairman of Lincoln County Centennial Publicity Committee has pointed out Henn's contribution to publicizing attractions of the area with his illustrations. Neatly framed Henn's drawings hang on walls of the Lincoln County News offices.

Mrs. Robert O. (June) Meitz, secretary of Arts - N - Authors, and who serves on the Lincoln County Centennial Committee with Henn said, "the League is fortunate to have Henn speak. Especially so because he is our first artist author speaker, rounding out the Arts - N - Authors desired program for the year 1969-70."

Henn has been asked to bring with him his portfolio. His fine art may be seen at Gallery III in near - by Ruidoso. He is also represented in galleries in Dallas, Lubbock, Midland and Roswell and his paintings are in numerous private collections.

Born in Rochester, N.Y. Henn's first training was at what is now known as Rochester Institute of Technology. He studied under such instructors as Clifford Ulp and Ralph Avery. Then came five years in the Army during World War II; the last year spent as an art instructor in Army Air Force

When the Henns visited Lincoln in 1954, they found their future home town. Here artist Henn could have a quiet life of painting and depicting the graphic history of Lincoln County - seemingly the perfect second career, and they started working toward that goal. Finally in mid 1965 they acquired the old Baca house in Lincoln and started that new adventure.

Newspapers have used drawings from Henn's Walking Tour of Old Lincoln Town Portfolio of Prints of Historic Buildings in Old Lincoln Town with a Few Notes in publicizing Billy the Kid country.

His commissions have included Trinity Site and other places of interest in the southern part of New Mexico. Possibly his most popular drawing is that of Smokey Bear Museum at Capitan, N.M., the home of Smokey Bear.

Mrs. Henn describes her husband as, "always a happy, easy going individual; one of those lucky persons who's always known what he wanted to do, and luckier still, could do it."

Those of us who worked with Mr. and Mrs. Henn during the year long Centennial Calendar of Events found them most enthusiastic workers - true to their way of life in Lincoln, the town they fell in love with at first sight.

Courthouse heating contracted

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace met Monday to work out three problems, one, how to keep the heating and cooling systems working in the courthouse, two, realignment of road work, three, hospitalization insurance for courthouse people.

After discussion with Bill Downs, sales engineer for Johnson Service Co. of El Paso, the commissioners decided the contract with the Johnson company for preventive maintenance work on the courthouse heating and cooling system.

The first thing to be done will be to get the system in working order and Downs said that a man would be in Carrizozo Monday to start on that job, probably taking three days.

The Johnson service people are trained to handle both electrical as well as plumbing work which has been one of the problems in the past. The county would have a man fix a motor, or a man fix the heating and still the entire system would not function properly. It has been an expensive experience for Lincoln County, one of the factors that decided the commissioners into the preventive maintenance contract.

The county already owes the Johnson company \$325 for service which will be paid. The cost of putting the system into working condition was estimated at \$200 to \$400 and Downs said the county will not be billed for over \$400 for the startup.

The contract will be effective February 1 and will be for sum of \$1500, the startup cost will be added to that figure and the county will pay on the contract each month.

Discussion of filters came up. Downs said they could be cleaned about once every six weeks. There are several big filters in the system that probably have not been cleaned or changed in five years. The county has boiler insurance. All county road maintenance men were at the Monday meeting. First order of business was to find

Legislation may clear bonds for intermediate care unit

Legislation will be introduced into the 29th Legislature which convenes this month intended to clear up the situation where bonds have been voted for new construction by counties, towns, schools, and voting limited to property owners only. Such voting has been determined to be illegal in several cases and the fact established that all eligible voters, whether or not they pay a property tax, should be allowed to vote.

The discussion draft of the Act relates to indebtedness of political subdivisions and providing optional election procedures for approval of bonds.

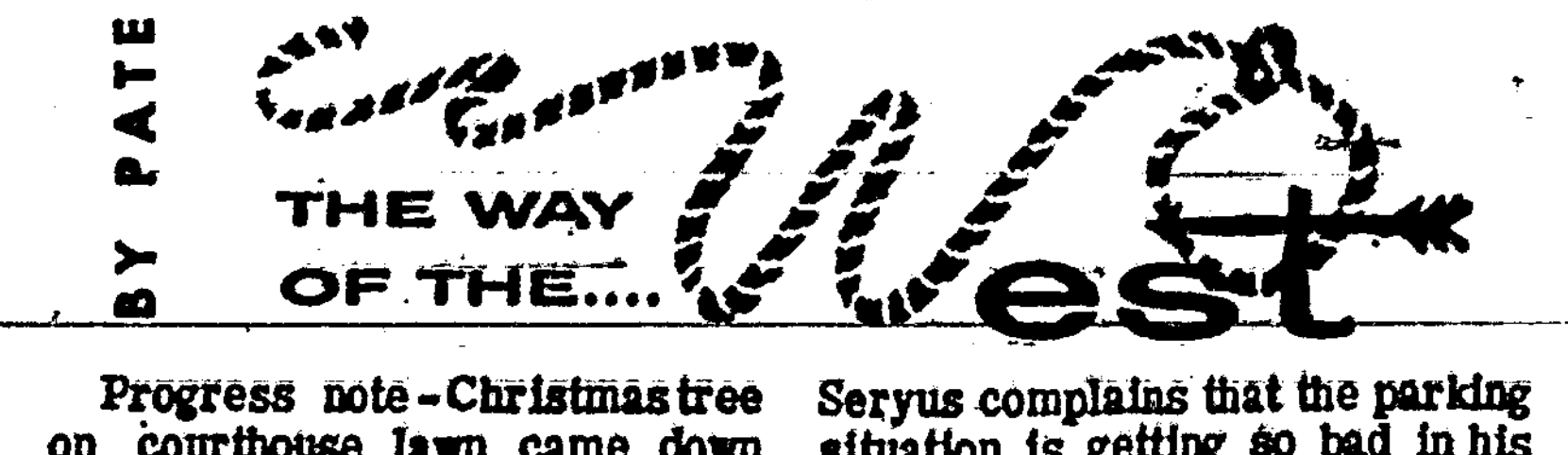
Section 3 of the Act deals with election procedure whereby elector specified by the constitution of New Mexico (property owners) and all other registered qualified electors of the political subdivision proposing to issue bonds, may vote.

Such electors are placed in two classes, property owners and non property owners. The proposition may be submitted to the two classes of electors at the same time or at different times. Votes cast for and against each proposition by all electors voting on the proposition will determine the outcome of the election.

Section 5 of this discussion draft reads as follows: VALIDATION-- All actions heretofore taken by any board in calling, holding and canvassing an election on a proposition to create a debt and issue bonds are validated and confirmed.

Even though this paragraph may be taken to mean that the recent election in Lincoln County where bonds were voted for both hospitals in the county could be validated, it does not mean that they will be validated by the bond companies who have to sell the bonds.

The probability is good that Lincoln County will have to vote again to modernize the Ruidoso hospital and add intermediate care unit in Carrizozo. In any case, the situation should be cleared up by April.

By 2:15 p.m. we were at the Youngsian Helipad where we boarded a helicopter bound for Osan Air Base. Upon arrival at Osan, we were met by Colonel Liles, Commanding Officer, 6314th Support Wing, who escorted us to the Osan Base Exchange where there was a big sign out front.

"Welcome, Mrs. U. S. Savings Bonds," complete with red, white and blue streamers waving from it. Here I visited with a large number of military and civilian personnel on a personal interview basis. It was again time to "fly" literally in our chopper back to Seoul.

This clear, crisp, sunny day gave me an opportunity to take many pictures of the rugged mountainous Korean countryside. (I just got the slides back and they are gorgeous). The terrain there reminds me a great deal of the area around Capitán and Ruidoso, New Mexico, where I was brought up.

I felt right at home even though I was in the Orient. We arrived in Seoul, were hustled into the waiting sedans and whisked to the American Embassy for the 4:30 appointment with Ambassador Porter, a most charming diplomat.

We again had only an hour to get ready for a reception and dinner that evening. When I walked into my room there were four dismayed Korean workmen sitting on the floor of the bathroom. They had been repairing the plumbing and accidentally knocked my only bottle of make-up to the floor breaking it into many pieces.

Fortunately they had not tried to clean it up and I was able to salvage enough into a plastic prescription bottle to last out the rest of the 3-week tour. By the time they vacated the bathroom and the maid cleaned it up, I had 25 minutes to shower, make up and dress for the evening. Believe it or not I made it.

Lt. Col. Hawkins picked us up and we went to the Golf Club for the reception which was to begin at 6:00 p.m. Our receiving line lasted 45 minutes, then I was free to sample some of the Korean delicacies prepared at the Golf Club, for this reception hosted by American Express Company, Military Banking Division, which also sponsored my whole three week tour in the far East and Southeast Asia.

It was again time to run to the USOM Club for the Army Finance Association Dinner Meeting at which I was the guest of honor. This consists of over 100 people (civilian and military) working in finance throughout the Eighth U. S. Army in Korea, so many of them came a long distance on a cold, snowy night. I am humbled by being so honored by these fine people.

During the course of the evening I was made an honorary member of the Army Finance Association, Korean Chapter, and presented with a beautiful engraved brass plate. For entertainment we were presented a program of beautiful girls of the Song Jook Won

Orphanage. After the program, the Keeley's and I were presented with an autographed album which the girls recently cut entitled "Daddy Bug Boots". Stan Bronson taught the girls many of their songs and joins them in singing on the recording. Following the dinner a group of us adjourned to the top of the Tower Hotel, built high on a hill in Seoul where we could observe the lights of the city twinkling in the cold, crisp night. It was certainly an impressive sight, but by 11:30 p.m. we had to rush back to Sejong in order to be in before curfew.

This had been a full day, a rewarding day, and indeed a most unusual Valentine's Day.

Legion oratorical contest at Hondo

Quotations from originals by George Washington, before he became the first president of the United States reveal how keenly delighted he was to witness our new nation, telling itself how to set up the only "true" people's government "this world has ever seen. This rugged infant became our United States Constitution, which was ratified and became effective 183 years ago.

Again in 1970, the "people's" constitution of the United States is being tested. The American Legion's 33rd National High School oratorical contest is designed to give a fresh informal referendum on the suitability of our constitution to take all of us through this new decade of strife and sudden opportunities. The Legion is confident that a fresh

look at our 183 year old document is resulting in an overwhelming re-ratification in the minds and hearts of our 200,000 population.

The subject of the 1970 Oratorical Contest, in all high schools of our nation, is on some selected phase of the placing of power and protection by the constitution of our fifty United States.

Also, on the attendant duties and obligations to be performed by every citizen, thereby assuring preservation of our democratic purposes, and the protection of our human rights.

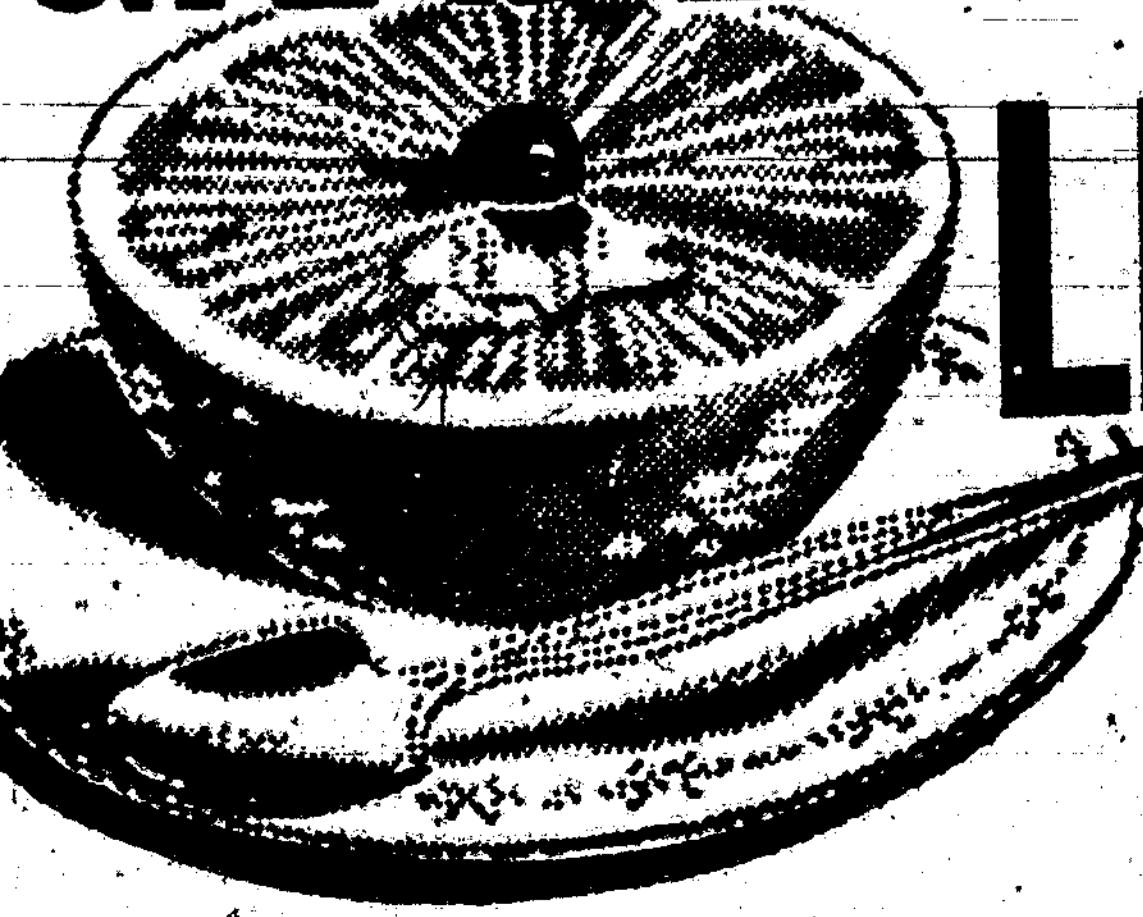
