### district court auditor's report

Billy M. Williams completed an audit of the Third Judicial District Court in Lincoln County on Dec. 2 which shows that people in the courf and courthouse business are human -- even though auditors may be immune to human foil and foibles.

Purchase vouchers were found to be in order and personnel records were being maintained as

In June 1969 the district attorney's office in Don Ana County purchased office equipment in amount of \$1,391.00. Lincoln County was not villed for its 15% share and the auditor states that had Lincoln County been billed the DA's office would have shown an over - expenditure of \$315,30 for capital items. The \$208.65 due Dona Ana County is shown as a current liability.

The Lincoln treasurer taxes inadvertently made an extra general fund transfer to the DA's office of \$411.00, which resulted in a \$411 over - expenditure in the DA's office.

The treasurer also inadvertent-Ty classified a fine of \$190 as District court fee in December 1968. The over - expenditure of \$197.17 in other fees in the court fund resulted from reclassification of expenditure of \$253,20 for exhumation of three bodies.

The district attorney drew \$50 for registration fee for national conference on narcotics in Chicago, travel and per diem for this meeting was allocated 60-25 - 15 percent among the three

The D4 drew \$336,40 for travel. per diem and registration fee to the national district attorney's midwinter conference at Las Vegas.

Nevada. The auditor is of opinion that the district attorney was not entitled to mileage payment of \$60 as part of cost of charter flight to Santa Fe to attend department of finance and administration budget meeting, The total cost of flight was paid by court fund and out of general fund of Dona Ana County, and the Illinois, Texas, California, DA submitted expense voucher to the three counties for \$69.00. apparently for the same meeting,

Williams says that the district attorney has been inconsistent in his allocation of capital expenditures and out of state travel "Ontario, Canada. between the three counties. contrary to effective budgetary controls and accurate reporting.
