

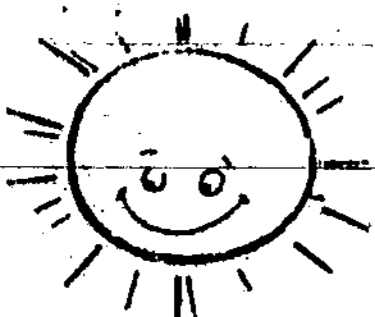

## Allotment up 26 head

The VI Allotment on the Smokey Bear Ranger District which is located at the north end of the Lincoln National Forest has been granted a temporary increase of twenty - six head of cattle for 1970. Mr. A. Freeman, Jr., of Chicago, is the Permittee on the allotment. The allotment is managed by Mr. Fred W. Pflingsten who lives at the G-F headquarters which is located within the allotment.

The allotment contains 13,000 acres of suitable grazing land on the Forest and 2,300 acres of suitable grazing land on land owned by Mr. Freeman. The allotment runs along the south side of East Capitan Mountain.

The Permittee has installed miles of new fence and pipe line so that sound range management practices could be implemented on the allotment. A management plan was prepared by the Forest Service and Mr. Pflingsten in 1967. Rest rotation grazing was started in 1968. The allotment is divided into thirteen pastures and three traps. The Permittee has done woodland control and cholla eradication work on the allotment.

The Permittee's work has made additional forage available for livestock. The fencing and water lines have opened up ungrazed land for livestock. The rest rotation system of grazing provides rest for the grass. This rest, in turn, increases the vigor and quality of the grass.

The Forest Service and the Permittee agreed that the range was improving and that an increase in the permitted numbers would not damage any of the resources. A joint inspection of the allotment was made in the fall of 1969, and it was decided to grant a temporary increase to the VI Allotment. This temporary increase will be made permanent after five years if the range conditions remain the same or improve.

## Money for state park

Congressman Ed Foreman has been informed by the Department of Interior of a Federal Matching Grant of \$11,960 from the Land and Water Conservation Fund. It will serve Lincoln County and the title of it is, Valley of Fires State Park Sponsors The New Mexico State Park and Recreation Commission. It is to improve the facilities at the existing Valley of Fires State Park by constructing trails through lava beds, installing picnic tables, a modern restroom and water system. It is located three miles west of Carrizozo on U. S. Highway 389 and 129 miles South of Albuquerque.

## Trash situation solved

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark and Holt Lovelace entertained a couple of dozen residents of the Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Fort Stanton areas, plus Forest Service representatives at a meeting lasting most of Wednesday afternoon where the problem of a trash disposal for that area of Lincoln County was pretty well worked out.

The commissioners would not commit themselves to an opening date for the sanitary landfill but it could happen in 60 to 90 days.

One of the problems solved was release of grazing permit on 280 acres, Sec. 16, Twn. 10, Range 14 East, by Rydan Limited, which lease runs to October. This release and phone commitment by Bureau of Public Land removes the hazards.

The commission will apply for a business lease on the 280 acres, located four miles east of Angus and central to Capitan, Fort Stanton, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, which should be granted in a matter of weeks. The Soil Conservation Department will be asked to survey the depth of soil.

Maintenance of the sanitation project will be under the

county road department, with good probability that it can be self supporting by charges of 50¢ for pickup or two - wheel trailer load of trash, \$1.00 for truck, and \$2.50 for packer type trash truck. This plan is being followed by a number of other towns now.

The county has no money now for such a project but the road department can do some of the work and Ruidoso is expected to help with the work.

Carrizozo has its own land fill dump and distance would be too great for Carrizozo to use this dump. Corona has a dump problem expected to get worse where Forest land is being used for dump and the trash burned with fill or covering.

A law effective the 26th of this month prohibits burning of trash, but towns under 5,000 population are exempt under this law, was the talk at the commission meeting.

Areas to be served by the new land fill will be Capitan, Fort Stanton, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Angus - Bonito, Forest Service. If it works out on a per - load basis any one can haul trash to this dump and pay for their load. Some discussion of new airport in Lincoln County at possible

cost of \$500,000. Conclusion reached was to wait until new council is installed in Ruidoso and find out if this council is interested in pursuing the project. An airport committee was appointed by the commissioners some time back, but if the Ruidoso officials decided the project was not feasible at this time the committee would become inactive. Municipal elections are March 3, new officers take over shortly after that date.

## District pairings to be made Sunday

The 1-69170 basketball season is right down to tournament time and following games this week end which will be the wrap up of regular season play the placings for the district tournament will be made Sunday in Artesia by coaches of the district.

The tournament gets underway at Ruidoso February 26 running through Saturday. First and second place teams in district standings, probably Hagerman and Eunice, will pass the first two rounds of play.

Game 1 will match the 4th and 9th place teams at 2 p.m. Thursday. Game 2 matches the 6th and 8th place teams at 3:30. Game 3 the 3rd and 10th place teams, game 4 the 5th and 7th place teams Thursday night.

There are ten teams in the district. Supt. Wesley Lane of Cloudercroft is district chairman, Ken Newton of Ruidoso will direct the tournament.

## Mail delivery service to be improved

Postmaster Roy Harmon said today that a new order from Postmaster General Winton M. Blount will mean substantial improvements in mail delivery services.

Postmaster General Blount has advised the local postmaster of provisions of a new order making home delivery services available for the first time to 4 million Americans.

The service improvement applies to persons served out of 18,700 first, second and third class post offices over the country that do not have city delivery services. Affected are those postal customers living more than a quarter mile away from these offices and less than half a mile away, persons living less than half a mile away previously had not been provided this service.

To get the new service it is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmasters to provide it, and a majority of those to be served must want the home service.

Under Mr. Blount's order, those living less than a quarter mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at these offices.

"But," the postmaster noted,

"that's no more than a few blocks". This order, however, will make the home deliveries available wherever desired by the majority of those living beyond a quarter mile.

"This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where large numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties."

The expansion of services should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery service areas - under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommendations of local postmasters - by February 1, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery stops to already existing rural delivery routes, or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural route for the purpose, and, a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

## Alabaman will preach

Rev. Dick Sigler, Pastor-evangelist with the General Board of Evangelism of the United Methodist Church will be in Lincoln County for five special services starting in Capitan Methodist Church on Sunday, February 22, through the 24, and then coming to Carrizozo for two services in Trinity Methodist Church on February 25-26.

Rev. Sigler grew up in Buckatuna, Mississippi. He was active in sports, president of senior class and MYF during high school and was called into the ministry at an early age, he accepted Christ when he was 17 years old.

During his college years Dick was sports editor of the school annual. He was active in the Ministerial Association and held a number of crusades during the summer vacations. While in seminary he was pastor of the Elizabeth Methodist Church in Elizabeth, Indiana.

In 1952 he was appointed to the Seminary Methodist Church in Hattiesburg District of the Mississippi conference. In 1957 he became a member of the Alabama - West Florida Conference and has served at Georgiana, Montgomery and Opp.

## Recreation sites attract more people each year in N. M.

The population explosion is resounding in New Mexico's recreation areas.

Last year, Elephant Butte Lake and Caballo Lake, two of the State's more popular water recreation sites, attracted more than 1,000,000 people -- an all time record.

This year, Albuquerque people seeking privacy at the Cienega picnic grounds in the Sandia Mountains sometimes discovered they could not even find a vacant parking space.

Although the experts agree such overcrowding does not yet pose a major problem to New Mexico's outdoor recreation sites, they suggest it could develop into one. "We can look forward to more crowding", conceded Perry. "The trend has been up since World War II."

Perry said use of National Forest recreation areas in 1968 amounted to 3,400,530 visitor days, a seven percent increase from 1967. However, Perry estimated use in 1969 might soar 15 percent above the 1968 figure an all time record increase. Early in 1969, James Dillard,

Director of the New Mexico State Park and Recreation Commission also expressed that. "We're experiencing quite an increase in state park attendance." As it turned out, the state parks had a final count of 4,510,000 visitors at the end of 1969, in comparison to 3,876,551 visitors for 1968, or approximately a 13% increase.

"Visitation is growing faster than the State's population, declared Frank Kowski, Director of the Southwest Region for the National Park Service. "There is usually a six to ten percent increase (in attendance) yearly with some fluctuations."

Dillard also believes the outlook for the future is not so dim. He said that the State Park and Recreation Commission has little problem in acquiring more land for future park sites.

"Within the last 32 months, there have been four new parks completed." Land sometimes is donated to the Commission's cause, and New Mexico Governors "always want some part in helping state parks to grow and develop."

## Petition to ask for predator 10c a head

Lincoln County Woolgrowers met at the Carrizozo Recreation Center Tuesday. Gene Wright started off the meeting with a discussion on the Wool and Lamb market. The wool mills are carrying a small inventory of wool and are only buying as they need the wool. The present wool price has a weak undertone and is not likely to improve for the next few months. Woolly produce on 50 % of the wool that we use; the remainder has to be imported.

The 1969 incentive payment is estimated to be 65% to 70% of the net wool sales. Woolgrowers received the average of 40¢ for their wool last year.

The lamb market is enjoying the best prices since 1951. Some spring lamb contracts are for 31 to 32 cents per pound with April delivery. There are fewer lambs in feedlots than in the past few years.

The flat pack for wool bags was recommended by both wool warehouses in Roswell. The flat pack helps the wool grower display and sell his wool to a better advantage. The new red plastic wool bag was shown to the group. The bright red color helps the manufacturer locate the plastic particle if it gets in the wool, whereas the burlap can

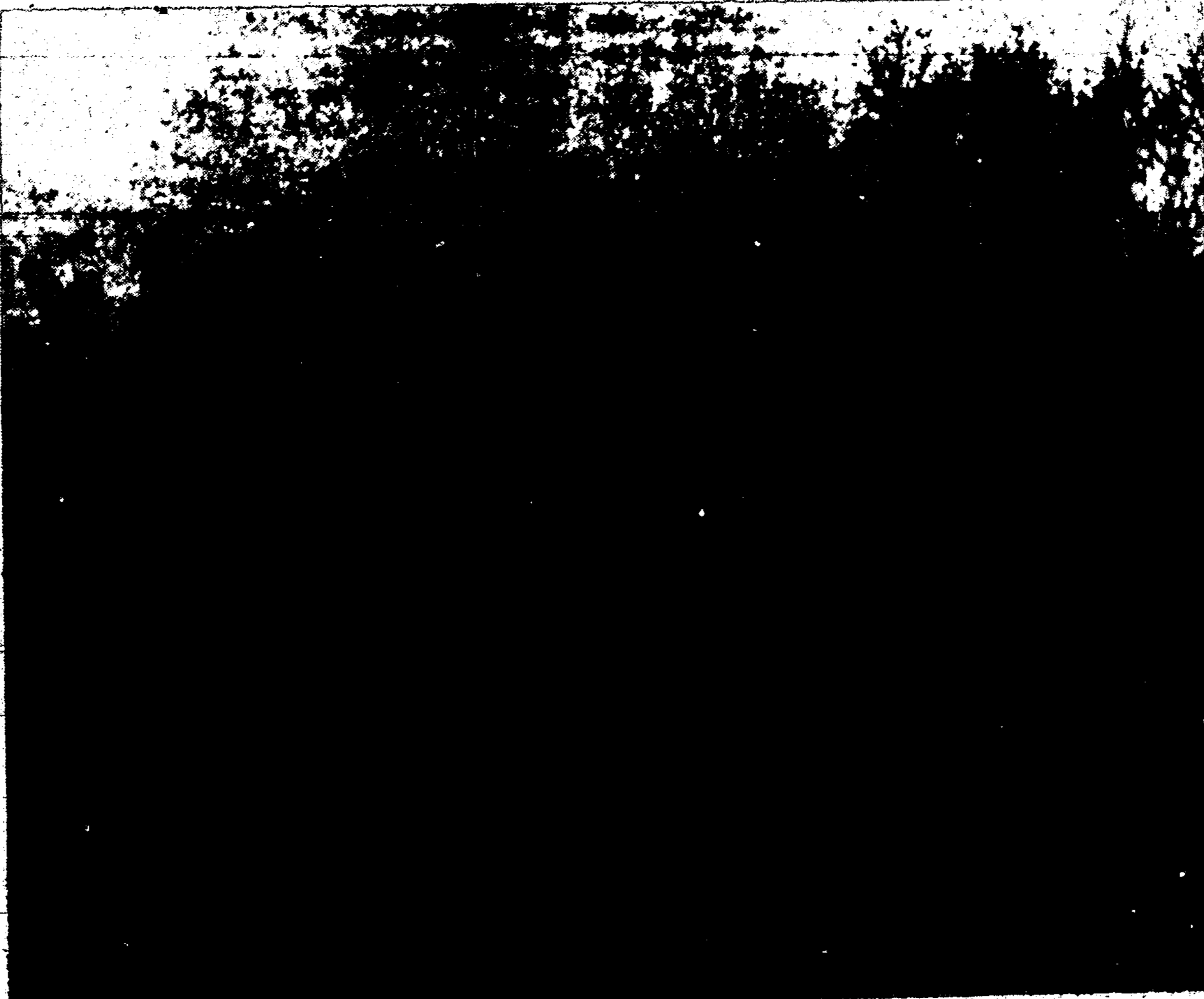
other plastic bags makes it hard to find due to the light color of the fiber.

The afternoon program was on predatory control. John Cooper presided over the meeting. The present predator control assessment expires at the end of 1970 and needs to be renewed if the live stock owners want to continue the program. Bill Rightmire, of the Fish and Wildlife Service reported that there are 3 and 10/12 trappers working on predatory control in the county with over one third of their cost from county predatory control assessments. He pointed out that owners have to request predatory control before their personnel will work on their property.

The group decided to circulate petitions asking for ten cents per head on cattle, sheep and goats. The petition signer can designate whether he wants cattle and or sheep and goats to be assessed, if 51% of the owners of cattle and or sheep and goats sign the petition the program can be continued.

Growers at the meeting asked that the annual wool school possibly be held in Capitan in July.

A delicious lunch was served to 65 people by the Carrizozo Junior Homemakers Extension Club.

Darling has been associated with Capitan school for 19 years, as coach, principal and superintendent.

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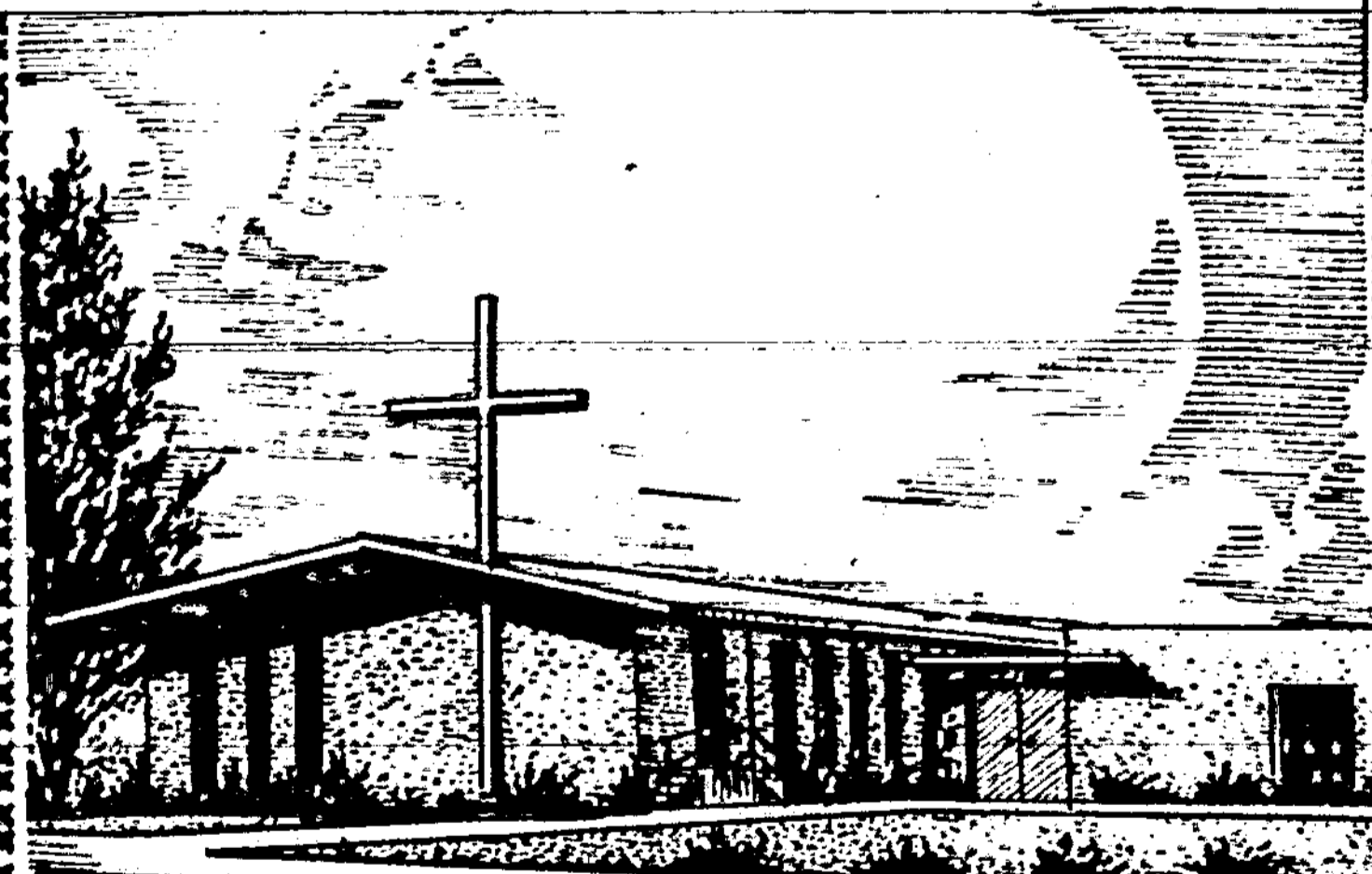

## Transportable radars will cost \$8.1 million

White Sands Missile Range has announced the award of a \$8.1 million U. S. Army contract to commence production of a new generation missile-tracking radar.

Under the contract to the RCA Missile and Surface Radar Division, five AN/MPS-36 transportable radars will be built. Three of the instruments will be deployed at WSMR, one at the Kwajalein Test Range in the Pacific Ocean and one at the Tonopah Test Range in Nevada.

At WSMR, where nearly 2,000 rockets and missiles are fired annually, the new radars will be employed to pinpoint trajectory and velocity of targets flown over the range. It is the first instrumentation radar to have the capability for direct measurement of a target's radial velocity as an inherent part of the system design.

With its 12-foot diameter antenna mounted on a 36-foot trailer and its electronics contained in a 40-foot van, the radar can be transported to a tracking site anywhere on or off the 4,000 square-mile range and be in operation within eight hours after arrival.

The AN/MPS-36 can track targets travelling up to 40,000 miles per hour at ranges to 32,000 nautical miles, measuring range to within five feet at that distance. It can determine velocity to within one foot per second.

The instrument capitalizes on a unique application of the doppler principle -- the shortening and lengthening of radio signals reflected from a target as it travels toward or away from the radar -- to achieve the precise velocity measurement.

It makes extensive use of integrated circuits for reduced size and improved reliability. The entire system is designed to be hauled at speeds up to 60 miles per hour over a highway or over more rugged terrain at slower speeds. It also can be transported by aircraft or ship. The AN/MPS-36 is the latest in high performance instrumentation radar utilized at WSMR, and its versatility will introduce an important new dimension to range tracking systems.


