Survey loused up Ancho route

Things don't always work out like they are expected to or ought to, is about the way it is with the Ancho school bus routing. All school patrons with children coming to Carrizozo school from the Ancho area met with the school board Tuesday night in an attempt to iron out a situation that started out looking beautiful and turned out bad.

Barney Roper is the Ancho school bus driver, his route totals 121.66 miles, he leaves Ancho ahead of 7:00 a.m. and picks up his first students at the Walt Wilson ranch at 7:00 a.m. The bus has been arriving at school at 8:30 a.m. and has record of being late only three

times in four years. Last year the idea developed that a feeder route from Clamuch area might come down by McKinleys, Gallacher, Lovelace and Shafer and either meet the big bus at the highway or come on to town which would cut down on amount of time students spend on the bus considerable. This idea looked good enough that one of the Ancho school patrons asked for survey of route by state bus people.

Along about the time the survey was completed the situation changed. Gary Lovelace family moved out of the area, the McKinley children were going to school at Corona and it just was

not practical any more. Then came the survey from the state which did not please the Ancho patrons because the bus route did not go all the way to the Barham house, Harkeys and Wilsons, which might have cut 30 minutes off the total bus time but would have made a real inconvenience to families involved.

R. C. Barham was asked at the meeting if he would transport his children (Joel) to highway for \$10 a month. His answer was "no". Chance of theft of tires and parts from vehicle is too much risk when vehicle is left parked at highway while youngsters are at school.

School patrons at this meeting were Walt Wilson, Lee Straley, R. C. Barham, L. Y. Jackson, Roy Shaw, Howard Harkey, Bill Gallacher, Tom Knight and Bob Shafer. They were in close agreement that the county ought to spend more time grading the school bus routes. Walt Wilson could not remember when grader was up his way but it must have been early in 1969.

Tom Knight was spokesman for group which had one meeting prior to meeting with the school board. Their desire is that the Ancho school bus route be left just as it is now and that the school board request that the state not follow the survey. The Ancho parents expressed willingness to present their case in Santa Fe if necessary.

Howard Harkey said there must be some lack of understanding on part of bus driver about his present contract. Roper figured he drove 500 miles in 1969 that were not paid for, but was not at the meeting so the matter could not be clarified. According to Harkey the bus driver is not sure that he should be going to all the homes.

Tom Knight reminded the school board that when Ancho, one of the richest areas in the Carrizozo district, was taken in they were assured that the patrons would get good bus service. That was a long time ago, said Knight, but we're still there and we still remember the promise.

Matter of some children not riding home on the bus each night which saves a few miles for the driver was discussed. School has policy of making contract with driver for the season based on total miles of the route and feels no need to check on total miles driven each day.

Sup. Ellison pointed out that the state might save as much as \$2,000 a year with feeder routes. The Ancho patrons don't want feeder routes.

Ray Wells said that the board mainly wanted to know that the Ancho school patrons were in agreement on their request. They were.

The bus goes from Ancho to Wilson, back to Ancho, to Straley to Knight, to Barham, to Gallacher, to Shafer and to school. Return trip starts at Shafer and unwinds same as pick up. Permission was granted by board that the bus may now arrive at school at 8:45 instead of 8:30 a.m.

The Carrizozo school board will present the Ancho case to the state by phone Wednesday and followup letter with no real trouble expected.

BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD FOR COUNTY NON-TAXPAYERS

Lincoln County will have an election prior to the primary election setup especially for non-taxpayers who will have the opportunity to vote on issuance of \$865,000 in bonds for modernizing the county hospital at Ruidoso and construction of intermediate care unit in Carrizozo. The exact date of this election will be set by county commissioners at their March 9 meeting, expected to be early in April.

You can see from this that our aim is to make our Christian faith more than a small compartment of our lives. We are convinced that either our faith should effect every area of our lives or it is worth nothing. We believe that all of our lives can have true meaning only as we are properly related to Christ. I hope to see many of you in the services, and am praying that we shall be better people as a result of these days together.

Clerk sets up election calendar

The 1970 primary election calendar was announced this week by Alice King, Lincoln County Clerk. The calendar is issued by the Secretary of State.

The calendar begins with the election proclamation being issued by the governor March 2, and ends July 31 with destruction of contents of the ballot boxes.

NEW MEXICO 1970 PRIMARY ELECTION CALENDAR

March 2, 1970 (Monday) Governor Issues Primary Election Proclamation. Secretary of State certifies Proclamation to County Clerks. Last date to change or indicate Party Affiliation.

March 4, (Wednesday) Binders to be returned to County Clerks by Municipal Clerks.

March 18, (Wednesday) Final date for County Clerks to notify County Party Chairmen of appointment to Precinct Boards.

May 5, (Tuesday) Last date to accept application from or mail Absent Ballot to Federal Qualified Elector.

May 11, (Monday) Absent Voter Register sheets to be mailed to Secretary of State and Party Chairmen.

May 13, (Wednesday) Earliest date for County Clerk to send certified lists of Registered Voters to Secretary of State and Party Chairmen.

May 18, (Monday) Absent Voter Register sheets to be mailed to Secretary of State and Party Chairmen.

May 19, (Tuesday) Ballots must be printed and in hands of County Clerk.

May 20, (Wednesday) Last day for County Clerk to notify Precinct Boards by mail of date for schools.

Vourazeris leases the Old Parsons Hotel

Edward Penfield of Lincoln and H. Elfred Jones of Carrizozo, owners of the Old Parsons Hotel, and mineral properties, announced this week that they have leased the hotel to Glenna Vourazeris of Albuquerque who will assume active management of the property February 28.

Under the new management, meals, hotel accommodation, beverage refreshment, and other facilities will be offered on a hospitality basis.

The hotel was built in 1900 at the time the Parson Mine and Mill was a going business. Penfield and Jones bought the property from J. H. Fulmer and Associates and have since done extensive remodeling of the property.

The Gold Diggers Room was added with bar and dance space, the entire structure redecorated and remodeled without taking away any of the flavor of the original construction. There are 30 beds in the hotel, some rooms with as many as four beds.

Land Bank Loans up in 1969 year

When making his year end report in January, Wm. G. Plested, Jr., president of the Federal Land Bank of Wichita, predicted long-term farm financing geared to the '70's will provide for variable rates of interest. "This will provide flexibility with safety and protect the borrower and the lender from quick shifts in the cost of money," Plested said. According to Plested, "New Mexico farmers and ranchers borrowed \$7.6 million from the Land Bank in 1969, compared to \$5 million in 1968."

Forecasting the amount of capital farmers and ranchers will use in the '70's, Plested pointed out the increase during the past decade in average size of Land Bank loans closed -- from just under \$10,000 to about \$30,000. "While helping farmers and ranchers grow and expand," he said, "the Land Bank has had a spectacular growth -- from an unpaid principal balance amounting to just over \$196 million at the beginning of the 1960's to approximately \$596 million at the end of 1969." Although there was a substantial reduction in number of farm and ranch units during the '60's, the number of Land Bank loans in the four-state area increased from approximately \$1,500 to over \$5,000.

Every home gardener who has grown roses is familiar with powdery mildew. This white, powdery, fungus disease can best be controlled at this time of the year by selecting resistant varieties and by using dormant sprays. Powdery mildew resistant climbing rose varieties include Red Radiance, Summer Snow, Blaze and Paul's Scarlet. Bush roses resistant to mildew include Sutter's Gold, Helen Trambel, Etolle De Holland, Lowell Thomas and Carrousel. Most seed catalogs list varieties resistant to mildew. These resistant varieties should definitely be planted in areas of the garden where the disease has been severe. Most gardeners recognize that this disease is most troublesome in areas that are partially shaded and where plants are crowded. Disease development is also favored by warm days and cool nights. Dormant sprays, containing lime sulfur applied before leaf development, are effective in reducing mildew incidence. Lime sulfur is available in several

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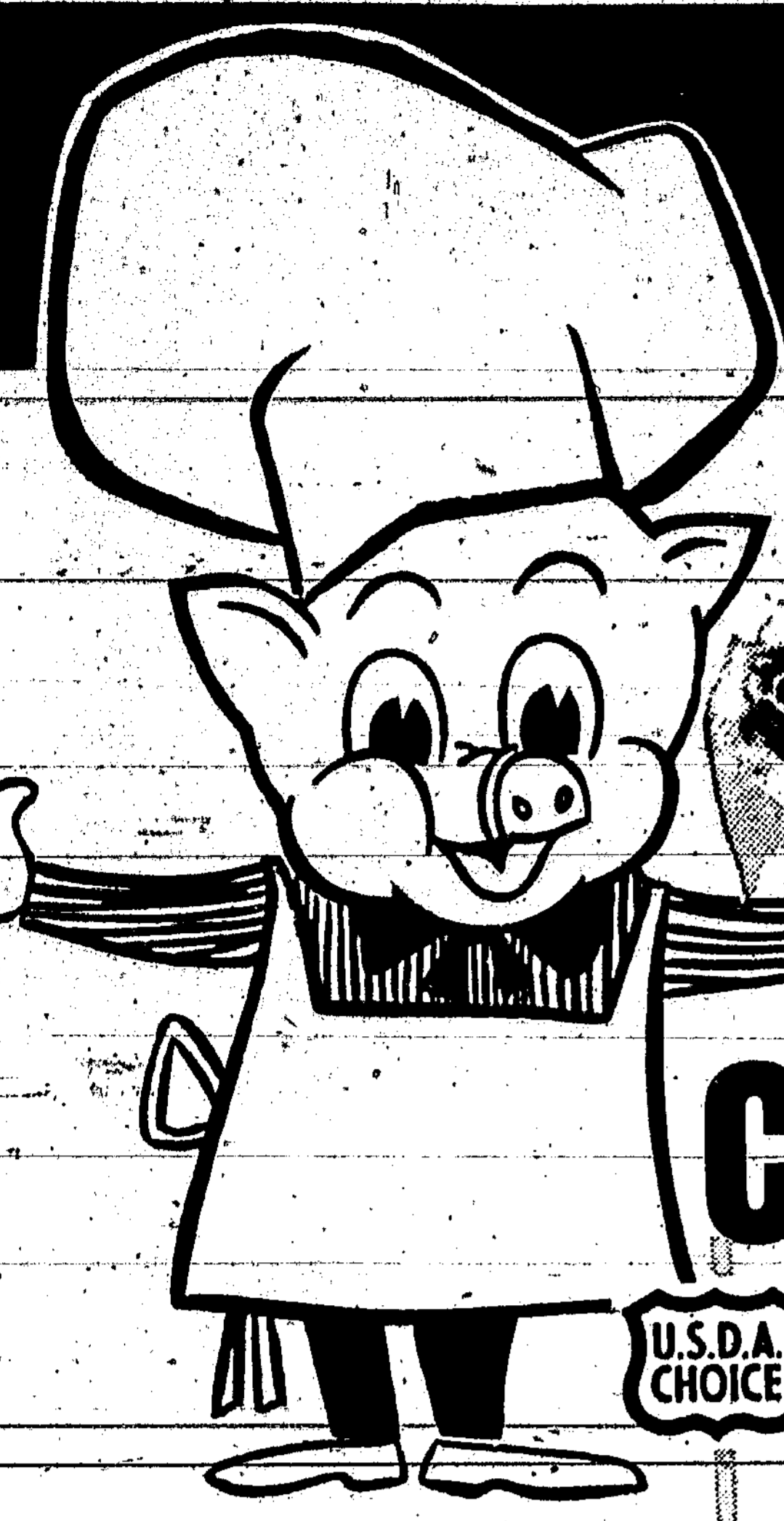

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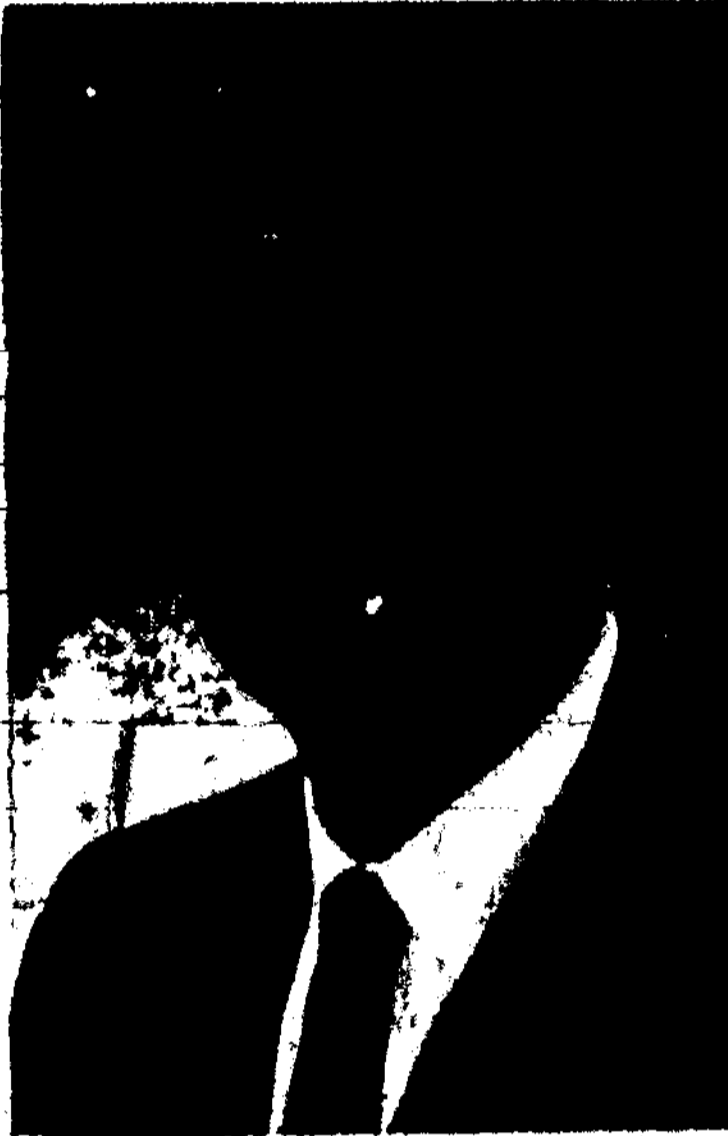

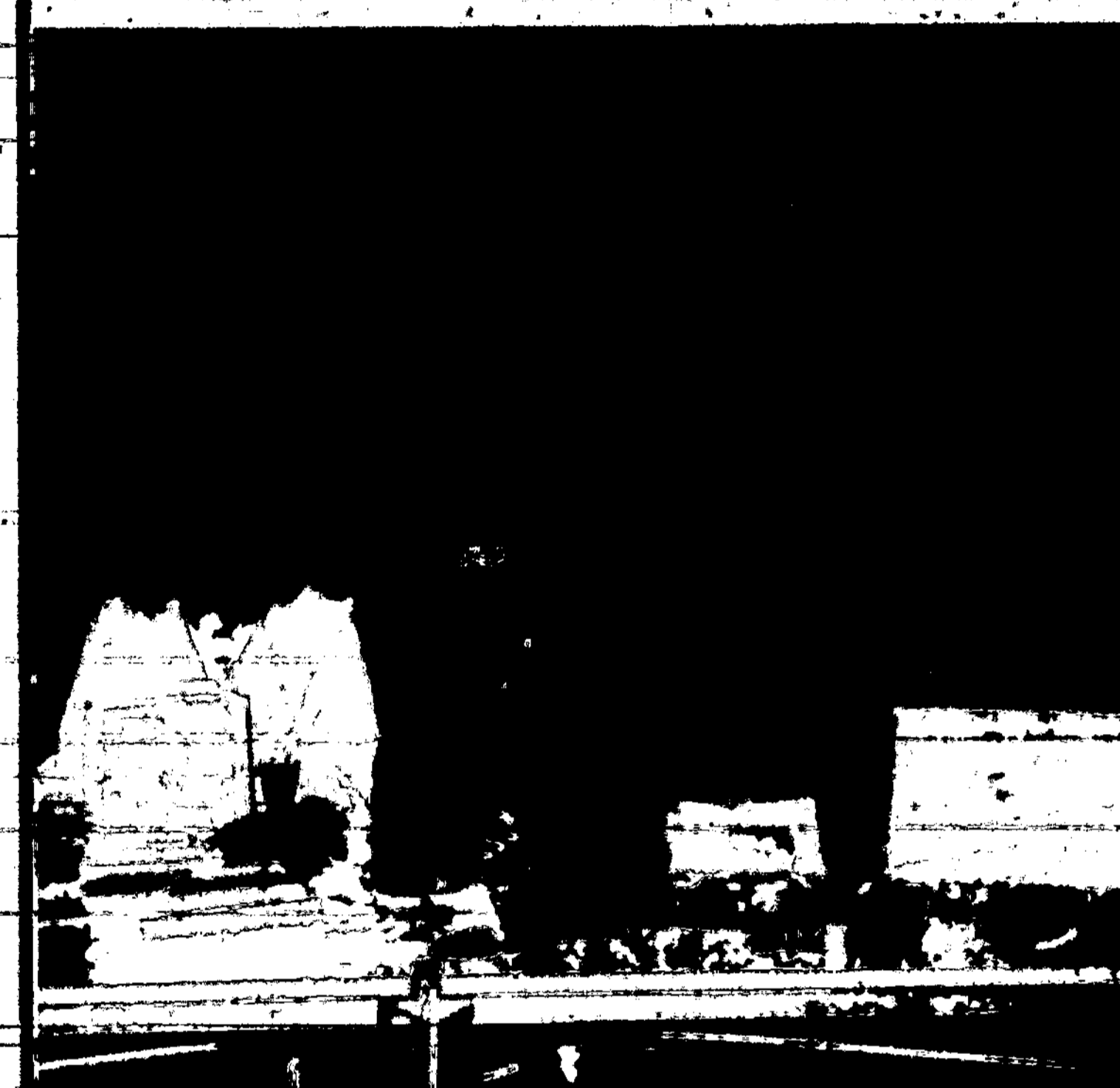
