HISTORIANS MISS MUCH OF LINCOLN COUNTY VIOLENCE

Editor LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS Lincoln, N. M.

Dear Paul: I've taken you at your word. Here is a second installment of material on killings in Lincoln County, I have quite a supply left and thought it best to break them into two articles so that they would be easier to handle. The year 1880 seemed to be a convenient dividing point and anyhow the slaughter in Lincoln in July of that year seemed like a good climatic point

Second Installment

The editor of the Las Vegas Daily Optic drily commented, 'If a Lincoln county man would call us a liar, we would consider the source and pass on, provided it did not in the least degree interfere with his wishes in the matter. We're a timid fellow sometimes."

In February, 1880 Bob Olinger killed a man named Frank Hill. Details have not survived. Late that same month four men

entered Will Hudgen's grocery store, located half way between Lincoln and Fort Sumner, and proceeded to help themselves to the stock. Deputy Sheriff Longworth, Ben Ellis, Bill Ellis, Thomas Tillotsen, and a man named Paul took up posts on the surrounding roof tops. They shot and fatally woulded Johnny Mace (Juan Mes) and accepted the surrender of Dan Lemons and two men named Scruggs and Oates. Lemons was turned over to Olinger—for delivery to Fort

Stockton, where a reward of \$500 had been posted for his apprehension. He escaped en route, in a manner which indicated that his escape from earthly trials was of a permanent nature.

As the month drew to a close, Paz Chavez was found suspended from a cottonwood tree, and the mutual aid society at Seven Rivers dispatched Juanito Mes, said to have been a desperate character,

to whatever reward awaited him. On the 31st of May Joseph Askew (Asque) and Virgil Cullom became intoxicated and shot up the town of White Oaks. The constable sent Joel Fowler and Dan Riverhouse in pursuit of Culiom. They met him returning to town. Fowler promptly put a slug from his Winchester through the man's right lung fatally wounding him,

Meanwhile Will Hudgens had

run into Towler's saloon and asked for a gun so that he could help in the arrest. Two pistols were available, but Alex Colvin claimed that they belonged to him and refused to permit Hudgens to take them. Hudgens thereupon told him in plain language that he was no better than the men who had shot up the town. Shortly after wards I. T. McCray appeared on the scene, warned Hudgens that an insult to Colvin was an insult to him, and asked if he wanted to fight. Assuming he meant with his fists, Hodgens started to remove his gunbelt. As he did so McCray jerked his pistol and fired, but missed. Hudgens there upon put a bullet through the man's heart. He was later tried and acquitted on a plea of self defense.

On July 3 a youth named Stone was killed in Lincoln by 'One armed! Joe Murphy, Murphy was arrested and locked up. He

attempted to escape, was wounded by the jailor, and recaptured. The next morning it was found that some one-had put a bullet through his head during the night.

One Harriman, first name unknown, became intoxicated in Lincoln on that same day, was arrested, chained, and thrown into jail. That night a mob broke into the building and riddled him with

A Deputy Sheriff, name unrecorded by the contemporary papers, was said to have been a leader in the murder. The following night he was killed by a mob.

The next night a third mob invaded the jail, took a prisoner, name unknown, out and hung him,

A chance visitor to Lincoln who brought the word to the Santa Fe New Mexican remarked, "They -talk-of-such-matters down-there very casually and seemed to think it was all right. I did not wish to meddle in the affair, so did not ask any questions about it." Unfortunately, his diplomatic reticence has deprived the historian of vital data. Perhaps among our readers there are some old timers who can remember their fathers or grand fathers discussing the affair and can at least furnish the name of the deputy sheriff. He seems to have had a formidable reputation as a gunman and surely could not have been completely forgotten by those who knew him.

And then there is the story that some time during the Lincoln County War Jose Chavezy Chavez entered the jail and murdered an American who was chained to the post and had no earthly chance of defending himself. Can anyone date this and tell us the name of the victim?

Here they are.

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


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Eye witness to murder

Amanda Treat In a recent issue of the Lincoin County News there appeared an article written by Mr. Philip J. Rash, titled-Who Killed Who in Lincoln County, N. M. and in the long list of 'Killed and Killers" were the names of George Parker and George Musgraves, the latter a notorious "Bad man".

It may interest Mr. Rash (should this reach his attention) and other readers, to hear the story as it was told by an eye witness, taken from the Memoirs of my brother, Harry H. Aguayo, now deceased, who as a very young man cast his lot with the cowboys in Lincoln County, He wrote the following story:

-! The Murder of George Parker by George Musgrave Oct. 1897" "On a warm October day riders for the Bloom Cattle Company. held a cattle Roundup on the Feliz Canyon in Chavez County, N.M. about 63 miles South of Roswell. Dan Welch and I were riding the range together that day, when we noticed two men, their clothes ragged and torn, riding toward us. When they came closer we recognized one as George Musgraves who had worked with us a few years earlier. The other man was a stranger by the name of Bob Hayes, as we learned later.

"Musgraves called out to me goodhumoredly--"Hello, Harry you're still here? You must be 2. good hand," No, but I'm still here," I answered. He continued questioning me. ' Who is the Boss here?". "George Parker." "Where is he?" 'He's out on the drive." "About what time will

he be in?" "In a little while." "Who is the cook now?" "Sam Butler, the same as when you were here," "Do you think he'll give us something to eat? We laid out last night and haven't had anything to eat." I told him I was sure Sam would feed them, so they rode down to the

chuck wagon and we saw the cook

set out the food for them.

"When they had finished eating they took out their Bull Durham tobacco, rolled cigaretts and sat down to smoke. By this time the boys had begun to drop in with bunches of cattle. Dan and I took over the cattle while the other men went to camp for drinking water. As the boys rode into camp the two outlaws began asking questions of Sam Butler, the cook--Who was who? and Butler point-

ed out each rider by name, until the last three men rode into camp. Musgraves turned to me and asked, "Who are they?" I answered that one was Les Harmon, Block man and my good friend; one was Billy Philips, VVman, and George Parker, our Boss in the lead.

"The cowboys' bedrolls were scattered all around the camp and Musgraves was sitting on a bedroll near the water barrel. Parker dismounted and walked toward the water barrel, nodding to Musgraves as he walked toward him, apparently not recognizing him. Musgraves stood up quickly and held out his hand as if to shake hands, but instead he pulled out his pistol and shot Parker. four times. Parker fell, face down, and died instantly. ' In the meantime all the cow-

boys had ridden into camp, including Dan and myself, after our herd had settled down for a rest. Most of the boys recognized George Musgraves, but none knew the tall stranger with him. When Parker fell this man drew his. gun and turning to the boys said--"Keep still, boys! I will kill the first man that moves," and he held the gun on the crowd of 15 or 20 cowboys until Musgraves spoke up and said--"Boys, I don't want to hurt any of you but I came a long way to kill this ---! He has caused me a lot of trouble. He reported me to the Law for. the things he did himself, forcing me to hide out for the last few years. In other words, for branding mayericks when we were partners a few years ago." He then turned to Juan Perez, the horse wrangler, and asked him how the horses were, and the whereabouts of his own horse, Old Bay John-

"Musgraves said they would go to the Remuda and he ordered Will Tucker to go along, Musgraves rode George Parker's horse and saddle. The other man looked at the horse I was riding. which belonged to young Kirk Johnson, and began to remove the saddle. Then Kirk asked "Are you going to take my new saddle?" I need it-it's all I have." Musgraves asked the kid how much he had paid for it, and the answer was-sixty dollars. Then the outlaw put his hand in his pocket, as though to draw out money, but changed his mind and said-"I'll tell you what I'll do. Give me your name and the first time I get to a town from where I can send money, I'll send it to you." But he never did.

"The cowboys were helpless against these tough outlaws, as they had no guns in the camp. When they reached the Remuda Musgraves roped Old Grant for himself and Swallow Fork for his companion. Parker's cutting horse, although Juan Perea, the horse wrangler, warned him of his bad pitching habits. They saddied these horses and threw theirold worn-out saddles on the ground, mounted, and rode away toward the VV Ranch, waving goodbye to the cowboys, ---

"When the outlaws were out of sight we noticed a wisp of smoke coming from the body of the dead man. His clothes had caught on fire from the closeness of the 45 pistol shots. The body was turned over and the fire was quickly extinguished.

"Frank Parker (not related to George Parker), being the oldest man, then took over as temporary Boss of the outfit. He chose Dick Ballard and Tom Perry, gave each a good horse and sent them to Roswell to notify the Sheriff of the killing, after pointing out the nearest way. A posse was soon formed to follow the outlaws, and an inquest was held over Parker's body. He was then placed a in the Company hack and taken to Roswell for burial. Since he had no family, a half-brother inherited his estate which consisted of cattle and horses.

"The outlaws rode to headquarters of the VV Ranch and changed horses. Musgraves to his old mount, Bay Johnny, and another good one for Hayes, telling Fred Neighbor who was in charge, that he and Parker had traded saddles. These were the two best horses in the Remuda and now they

were gone for good. "On their way to the Felix Roundup, Musgraves and Hayes had come through White Oaks and held up and robbed the Mail hack about ten miles west of White Oaks. On their way back through

White Oaks they robbed the Mail hack again. That day as the Mail hack with a few passengers was nearing the placem the Driver was telling the passengers-"Here is where they held us up a week ago." Stepping out from his hiding place Musgraves said, "And here's where I hold you up again." and they proceeded to search the driver and passengers, cut open the mail begs looking for the pay envelopes. One of the passengers was David Tinnon who was returning home from Albuquerque where just the day before he had purchased the hat he was wearing and which evidently pleased the mean-eyed Hayes, for he reached in, took it from Mr. Tinnon's head, threw his old ragged hat away and put on the new one. However. Mr. Tinnon sayed his money by dropping his wallet to the ground-under the hackon seeing the outlaws.

1. The possee followed the trail of the outlaws for several days until they came to a ranch near the state line of New Mexico and Arizona, and when they rode up close they saw horses in a corral and noticed they were the horses the men rode away on from the VV Ranch. The outlaws saw the officer's horses and knew they were on their trail, so decided to try to escape by rushing out to the corral, mounting their horses and making a swift getaway. But there was not time enough. A fight followed, in which the tail -bandit's horse was killed, falling on the rifle which was on the saddle: He tried desperately to pull the gun from under the horse from the scabbard, but failing in this, he drew his pistol and fired at the officers. He was shot through the body and was killed, Musgraves seeing his partner was dying turned his horse and ran for cover, making good his escape. The posse could not follow him further because of the density of the trees and bed terrain; and their horses were completely exhausted from many miles of fast riding. They returned to their homes and their own pursuits.

"Muscraves had mentioned to the cowboys at one time his intentions of going to Montana, and it is evident he did, since Frank Parks ran into him somewhere in Montana fourteen years later. Parks, a cattle buyer, saw Musgraves who was with another cattle buyer, but he was not seen by Musgraves, Recognizing him, Parks went to a telephone and called the Sheriff in Roswell and told him just where he would find Musgraves: the Sheriff in Roswell wired the Sheriff in Montana to arrest Mooraves, which he promptly did, and took him back to Roswell where he was tried at the next court session and strange to say -- he was acquitted.

"In the meantime he had married and had a child one year old. His wife and child came with him to the trial. George Musgraves came from a good and respectable family, but like many another youngster of those days, drifted away from home at an early age in search of adventure."

My impression of the White Oaks program

Perhaps only once in a lifetime does the rare opportunity come to anyone of being a part of a gathering such as the one that took place on the afternoon of May 30, 1969, in White Oaks, New Mexico The occasion was the dedication of the local cemetary known as Cedarvale, as an historic site; and it might unquestionably be known as an historic site because it came into being well before the beginning of this century.



I am very grateful for your reference to the history of my grandfather, Robert Casey, and a forth - coming book written by my aunt, Lily Casey Klasner. I think you might be interested

in the reason for the long delay in offering her book for publication. Because she was unable to secure a publisher she collaborated with Mr. M. G. Fulton, who re - wrote it. Because of some differences of opinion upon which they were unable to agree, the book was not published, Mrs. Klasner became discouraged, as did one or two others who attempted re writing the book.

Before her death Mrs. Klasner gave me, her niece, a suitcase containing parts of it; she also gave me a trunk and its contents and it was the latter that was misplaced so many years. With out the contents of this trunk re- constructing her account of

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



7th to 13th. Fruit frost forecast will start in the Hondo Valley area next Wednesday, March 25th. These forecasts are available through the cooperation of the Security Bank of Ruidoso, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Babers and the U.S. Weather Bureau

The Security Bank of Ruidoso pays the local cost of getting the daily weather information to the U. S. Weather Bureau in Albuquerque, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Babers get the local observation daily and phone it to the weather bureau. The weather bureauthen consolidates this information into a larger weather map, and gives the frost forecast for different areas in the state. This information will be available for radio, TV, and other news media by noon of the following day.

The possibility of starting a Lincoln County Historical Society will be discussed at a meeting on April 4th at the Court house in Carrizozo, starting at 2:00 p. m. Jack Ritterhouse. president of New Mexico Historical Society will explain the advantages of a Historical Society. Wool sales will start April 13th in the Roswell area. This will be a scaled bld sale. The wools this year are lighter shrinking than normal and should bring a good price per pound, The majority of the New Mexico wools will be offered for sale at this time.

Many insect pests of homegrown fruit trees become active during blossom time or soon after. To protect trees from a wide variety of pests, make the first application of plant protection chemicals just after all flower petals fall. Don't apply

insect killers while the trees are in bloom! Most insecticides will kill honeybees, that are attracted to the flowers, by spraying early with a broad spectrum insect killer or combination of perticides, you can eliminate some future insect problems. For good insurance. spray all fruit trees within two weeks after flower petals fall.

Farm program studied by delegation

When agricultural delegations from developing countries come to the United States, one of their subjects of study is the local administration of farm programs through farmer elected committees, Ernest Mc-Daniel. Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, said much of the interest is because the committee system has proven itself in over 30 years of service.

The County ASC Committee administers farm action programs, including price support and production adjustment, conservation costsharing, and others. Principal programs administered by the local committee are:

1) Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) 1969 Program. Approximately \$52,000.00 benefitting approximately 102,000 acres on 49 farms & ranches. 2) Wool Program - \$283,474.00 incentive payments to the

producers. 3) Cropland Adjustment Program - Approximately \$790.0

Farmer committees were first authorized in 1933, but committeemen were appointed. Since 1936 ASC county and community committeemen have been elected. Election procedures are prescribed by Congress. "Every agricultural nation

has some type of farm program,". Mr. McDaniel said. "Administration of farm programs is complex. Our committee system is studied by other countries because through it our farmers have a direct pipline to the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington through which they can send ideas and suggestions for improving farm programs.

"Foreign visitors often maryel at the direct communication available between farmers and top agriculture officials, McDaniels said.






