## Paving probable on road State 42

A rather complicated deal was worked out by the commissioners which should see 12 or more miles of State Road 42 east of Corona paved in coming months. The county will bring the road up to grade with added equipment loaned by Transwestern Pipeline Co. The state will bring in a crusher and do the blacktopping to complete the job.

The road work will start at end of present blacktop on 42 and go for around 12 miles east

and fix up one of the muddiest stretches in wet weather and one of the rockiest stretches on this entire road. The new paving will connect with 15 miles of paving that Transwestern has already put down on road to its booster plant. Work should start in about 30 days.

The commissioners have requested that Charles Nolan, one of the architects on Lincoln County courthouse, be present at the commissioners meeting May 21 to assist in working out some needed repairs. The commissioners will be doing budget work that day and need assistance in the courthouse repair job.

The North Ridge Subdivision three miles south of Capitan, NE 1/4 Sec. 32 W 1/2 Sec. 33, was approved by the commission.

Two cattle guards will be installed by the state on Hwy 37 at entrances to Loma Grande Estates on the Nogal Mesa. Jerry Knotts will furnish the pipe and the county will build the guards.

## Ruidoso Downs racing situation was uncertain at press time Wednesday

Judge Wald Spless, chief judge of the Court of Appeals, is presiding in the case being heard in Santa Fe to try to determine who will operate Ruidoso Downs this summer. The case has become one of the most complicated in history of New Mexico courts. It has more than a dozen parties and involves the issue of who will conduct racing, who will have the concession, and \$2.5 million of damages claimed by several parties against four members of the State Racing Commission.

The hearing started Monday, went through Tuesday and was

going on Wednesday when this newspaper went to press.

William C. Gallacher of Eagle Nest, a member of the State Racing Commission, told Judge Spless Tuesday that he slowly changed his mind over a period of months as to who should have the license to conduct racing at Ruidoso Downs. Gallacher testified he voted to issue a temporary license to Newco, then began to have doubts when evidence showed them to be in poor financial condition. At the final hearing last month he voted to give the license to the Jockey Club. Opening date of the racing season is set for May 23.

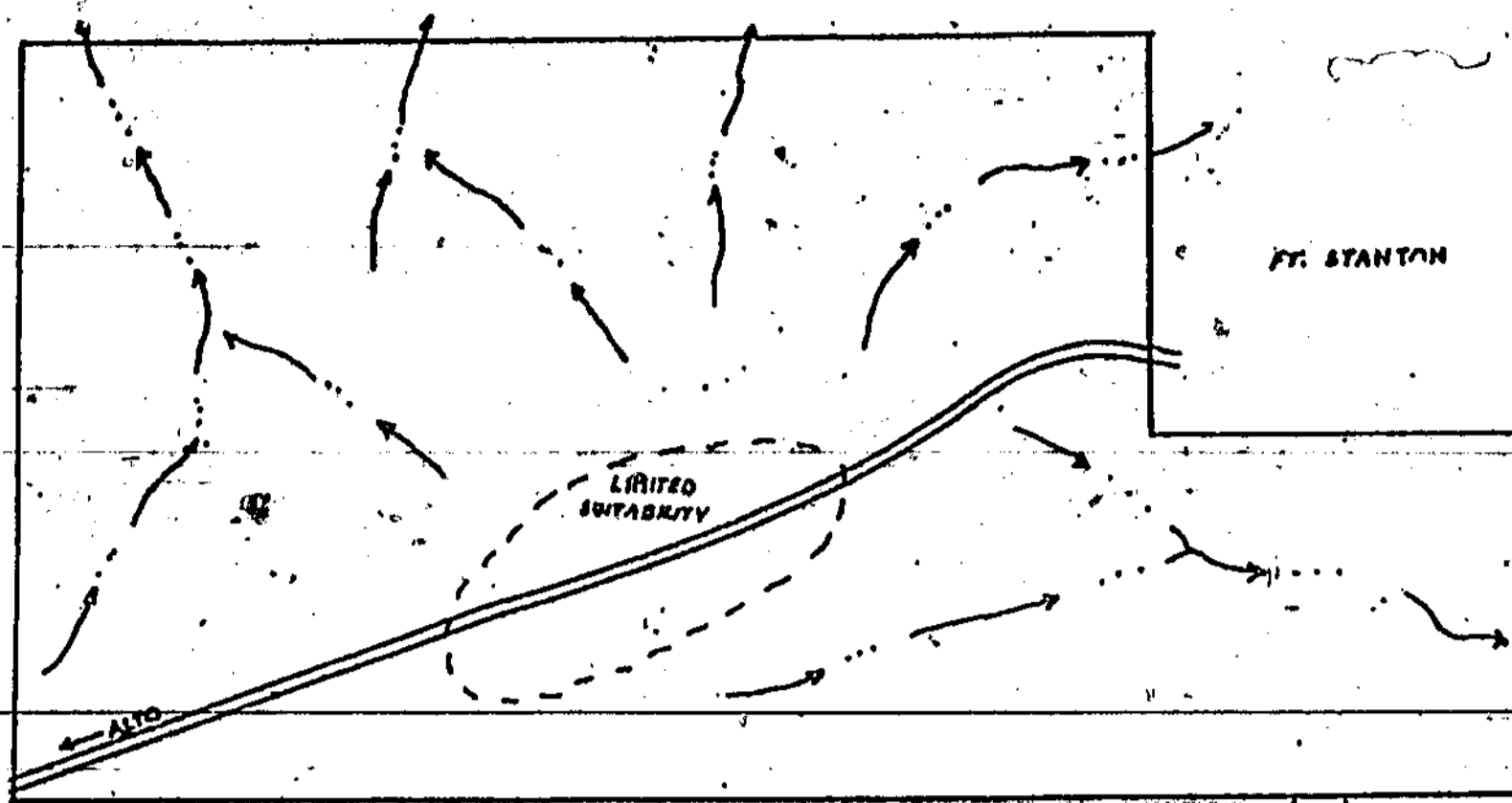

## Public hearing on sanitary land fill will be held Monday, May 25th

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace, meeting in Carrizozo Tuesday set the date for public hearing on the proposed sanitary land fill on the N 1/2 of Sec. 16 R14E T105 in the center of the area between Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Alto, Fort Stanton and Capitan.

The meeting will be in the commissioner's room in the courthouse starting at 1:30 p.m. State Engineer Sam Davalos and District Sanitarian will be present.

The problem in Lincoln County has been one of finding any kind of site to be used for a sanitary land fill and the present site is considered one of the few, if not the only one, available in the entire area.

Herbert D. Hathcock of Alamo-

gordo, with the State Land Office, met with the commissioners Tuesday and the land fill site was discussed. Mr. Hathcock will investigate possible usage of the south half of Section 16 which would extend the usage for a number of years.

Discussion at the meeting brought out fact that too much garbage and sewage is now being disposed of improperly in the Ruidoso area and that the county must improve its methods immediately.

The map shown here indicates location of the site on north half of Section 16. The suitability report from the Soil Conservation Service rated this area as having good drainage characteristics, favorable slope limits, non-stony, no flooding hazard, no danger of contaminating ground water.

## Walter Hubbard found dead Sunday at his mine in the Jicarilla Mountains

Walter Hubbard has been a friend to a great many Lincoln County people going back to 1932 when he first came to this country and worked for a time for the Southern Pacific railroad.

He stopped in the News office Thursday of last week saying that he thought he would go up to his mine in the Jicarillas that day to continue his work. He had been to a meeting at the courthouse and had visited a number of other people.

Mrs. Hubbard's sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. John McKibben, Fountain Valley, California were here last weekend for a visit and wanted to see Mr. Hubbard before they left so they, together with Mrs. Hubbard, drove up to the mine late Sunday. C. W. Haley, who has patented mining claims dating back to 1929 in the area, joined them on their walk up to the mine.

Mr. Hubbard was not readily available so they looked around. Haley saw a window glass that had blown out and stepped over to look at it when he saw an arm stretched out on the ground around the corner. Another step and he saw Walter Hubbard lying where he must have fallen when his time came. There was no sign of any struggle, death must have been instantaneous.

State Policeman Robert Watson, Under Sheriff Moses Sambrano, Judge Friday Sherrill and Paul Payton, with Walt Wilson as guide, went up for investigation shortly after dark Sunday evening. Vernon Petty followed with the Wooten ambulance and the body was brought back to Carrizozo that evening.

Funeral services will be held at 11:00 a.m. Thursday (today) at the Chapel of Roses Mortuary. After the service the family will accompany the body to the crematory in Albuquerque.

He is survived by his wife, Ruby, and one daughter, Mrs. Bob Trout of Lovington, one brother, Wendell E. Hubbard of Los Angeles and one sister, Mrs. Spencer Rugbee of Redondo Beach.

When the News office used to be in the Baker building Mr. Hubbard had his business office next door and we found at that time that Walter was a most obliging person and helpful when the opportunity presented itself. He would help us with our mechanical projects as well as with mailing our newspaper.

Walter was born in Huron, South Dakota on July 30, 1903. He was a graduate of Los Angeles Polytech High School and attended Cal Tech. After his work with Southern Pacific he returned to California where he married Ruby Christianson in 1946. He returned to New Mexico with his family in 1961.

He worked at Douglas Aircraft as an engineer in precision parts, later at Trona and National Supply as a chemist. He learned much during these years which knowledge he applied to the development of mining in the Jicarilla area.

Walter had technical knowledge far and beyond most any person of the Carrizozo area and felt he knew the proper way to unravel the complex ores found in the Jicarillas. A good friend gone to his reward -- we'll miss Walter.

## Hospital bonds sell at 6.7790

At 10:30 a.m. Tuesday a bid opening on \$590,000.00 in Lincoln County general obligation bonds was held in the commissioner's room in the courthouse.

A combination of three companies, Quinn & Co., E. F. Hutton & Co., and Bosworth, Sullivan and Co. had the low bid with an effective interest rate of 6.74936. Bonds maturing 1971-76 carry 6 percent coupons, 1977-83 6 1/2 percent coupons, 1984-85 6 3/4 percent coupons, 1986-89 7 percent coupons.

The gross amount of interest to be paid will be \$522,875.00 less premium of \$867.50 making net interest paid by the county. Other bids went 6.7790 interest 6.80559, 6.82997 and 6.9077 effective interest rates.

Ben R. Stillwell, representing Stern Brothers & Co. of Albuquerque, estimated that the county possibly save \$38,000 in interest money at this time over what the interest rate would have been following the first election. It was a heck of a good bid, Stillwell said.

Johnson Stearns, member of Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo board of directors, was present at the bid opening and said they had met with their architect two weeks ago and made two minor revisions, that they will hold another meeting with architect May 15 and should be ready to call for bids on the Carrizozo Intermediate Care Unit by June 1.

## Zozo Council works on sanitation

Fred Wood, Lincoln - Otero Sanitarian, was present at the meeting of Carrizozo Town Council Tuesday night to discuss sanitation in the town. A law going into effect July 1 prohibits any burning of trash within the town limits.

The Council expects to increase garbage pickups in town by the first of July and is working on a new schedule now. It may become necessary to put a man on this job full time.

It is equally important that all people have covers on their garbage cans and the town will be working to see that this sanitary requirement is met. Covering garbage cans is required by town ordinance.

Dogs running loose get to be a worse nuisance about this time of year and Carrizozo is on a normal course -- lots of loose dogs around town, some scaring and biting people, getting in other people's yards and in general causing many complaints. The council has instructed Marshal Morales to take action on any complaints received about loose dogs.

Bids on sale of gasoline to town were opened, Conoco was low. Occupation licenses were approved, minutes approved and bills paid.

Marshal Choncho Morales had three young boys as his guests at the meeting so they might see how the town government operates.

Clerk Nellie Lee Baker presented a rough draft of the new budget, not balanced yet but expected to be up some because of paving at the airport.

The council is working on a share - the - cost paving project with the State Highway Department. Some paving will be done in the area around St. Rita Catholic Church and around the Carrizozo Cemetery.

**Round-up**

By Ralph Dunlap

Dr. Lewis-Holland talked to a group of 34 interested persons about the results on the cross breeding studies being carried on by New Mexico State University at the College Ranch and Fort Stanton. He emphasized that this was only one year's results and that these results might not be the same in the studies over several years. The cross breeding studies include Hereford and Brangus breeds. The results after one year showed that the Brangus cows produced 20 pounds more calves in a year. The calves from Hereford cows were lighter but are gaining better in the feed lot.

The crossbred Hereford-Brangus cow produced 21% more calves due to better fertility and higher livability of the calves.

Dr. Bobby Rankin illustrated the many different methods of carrying out a crossbreeding program and some of the problems of managing a cross breeding program. Both speakers emphasized that cross breeding requires that you use high performance individuals for the different breeds, otherwise, the product is only carrying out a program of mongrelization.

Coffee and donuts were served by the Lincoln County Farm Bureau, who sponsored the program. Controlling garden pests is considered a major problem by many "green thumb" enthusiasts. But it doesn't have to be -- if the home gardener will

spend a few minutes in making sure he has chosen the right materials and then use them correctly.

Gardeners apply pesticides when vegetables break through the soil, and continue at 7-10 day intervals until harvesting. Cover the entire part of the plant above the ground. Also leave a few weeds around the edge of the garden and spray them heavily to keep invading insects under control.

When using the sprayer method, the 1 1/2-gallon pressure type is recommended for best results. The three to 3 1/2 gallon sprayer is good, but too heavy for practical use. Fly sprayer mechanisms are rated very poor on the basis that they require too much time to perform a satisfactory job. Sprinkler methods are not only slow but very wasteful. Malathion or Sevin are excellent insecticides for garden insects. Thiodon or Sevin are more effective in controlling the tomato fruit worm and corn ear worm. For leaf and fruit diseases, zineb, maneb, or captan are recommended. Gardeners can buy pre mixed materials which contain pesticides that control both insects and diseases. They are available in either spray or dust form, and contain malathion, methoxychlor, and zineb or captan.

Many gardeners do not use pre-mixed chemicals. They prefer to buy chemicals and mix them for specific insect or disease control. This practice often results in a substantial saving in purchase price.

Follow all instructions printed on the container. Pesticides are

time-saving allies to the home gardener when used properly, but when used carelessly, they can become a potential threat to man.

Iron chlorosis can be controlled with the addition of a soluble iron compound. Soluble iron can be applied directly to the plant as a foliage spray, or it can be added to the soil. The two best iron compounds available locally are iron sulfate and iron chelates. Both compounds

have certain advantages and disadvantages. The same can be said about soil and foliar applications.

Iron chelates are more expensive than iron sulfates, but they are more effective. Iron sulfate is cheaper, but it is necessary to apply large amounts. Foliar sprays give a rapid control of chlorosis, but the control is temporary. Soil applications of soluble iron are slower to control chlorosis, but the control is

longer lasting. NMSU Circular 421, "Control Iron Chlorosis," discusses the chlorosis problem and lists foliar and soil application rates for iron sulfate and iron chelate.
