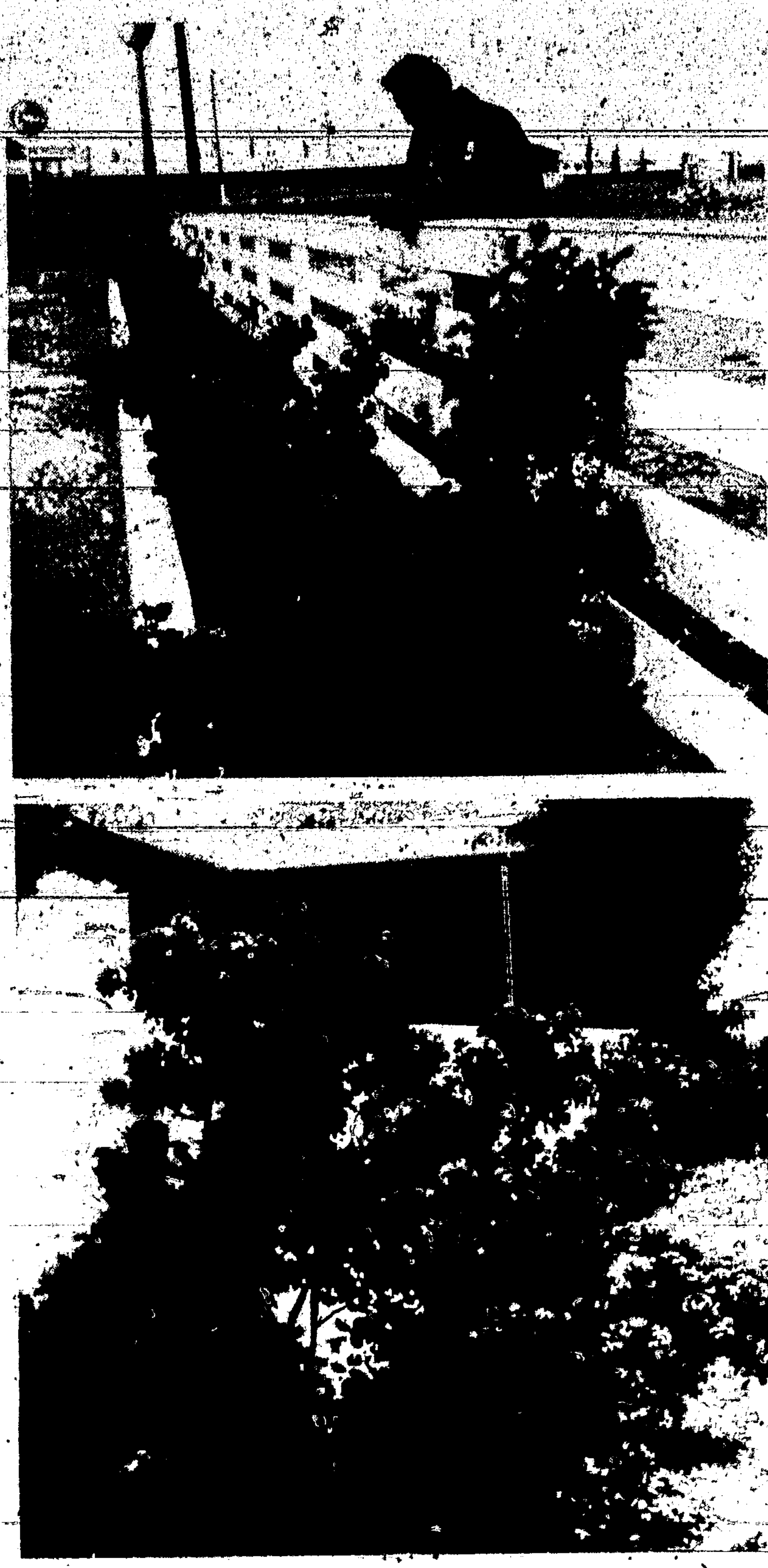

COUNTY BUDGET SHAPING UP No opposition to landfill

The special hearing called by Lincoln County commissioners on the sanitary landfill to be established on the N1/2 of Section 16, R14E in the triangle between Ruidoso, Capitan and Alto drew a small crowd at the court house Tuesday and no serious protests.

There was some question about the amount of trash that might blow off vehicles going to the landfill which would litter the country side. This item will probably be covered by the set of regulations for the disposal of solid waste to be adopted by the commission -- yet to be worked out. The tentative set of rules has this paragraph on transportation:

The movement of solid waste from the point of collection to the point of destination shall be in vehicles from which waste cannot blow, spill or leak and which are approved by the county.

The only holdup on getting the landfill in action at present is getting the lease from the state. Commitment for funds have been received from several sources \$8,600 from Ruidoso, \$2,000 from the Forest Service, \$500 from Fort Stanton Hospital and Boys Camp, and approximately \$5,600 expected from sub divisions in the area.

The sanitary landfill is expected to be self-supporting but \$13,200 has been put in the new budget to get the project underway.

After the discussion of the landfill Commissioners Don

Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace worked on several other projects during the meeting Tuesday.

The total footage where lots can be assessed in sub divisions for road maintenance was being worked up which meant a lot of adding machine work and after this job is complete the commission will arrive at the total number of miles of road to be maintained. The assessment figure will be .00708 cents per foot, with \$1.00 minimum.

The county budget hearing will be held July 14 and the commission is well along in preparation of the new county budget, generally higher than the 1969-70 budget.

Widest choice for lieutenant governor in primary election Tuesday, June 5

The off-year primary election in New Mexico will be June 2, 1970 and this election is unusual in the fact that there are nine candidates for the office of lieutenant governor on the democratic ticket and six candidates for governor on the Republican ticket.

Voters can make several decisions before they get to these offices.

Democrats can select between Joseph Montoya and Richard Edwards for United States Senator. Harold Runnels has no opposition for U. S. Representative.

There are three Democratic governor candidates and the race is reasonably hot, the pre-election winner depending on who you are talking to. The candidates are Jack Daniels, Bruce King and Alexander Sceresse.

After voting for lieutenant governor Democrats can choose one of four secretary of state candidates, Bonnie Davies, Charmaine Crown, Betty Florina or Pita Gonzales.

For state auditor on the Democratic ticket are: Frank Olmstead and Guyton "Sheep" Hayes, Kornegay unopposed for state

treasurer. David Norvell and Gary O'Down for attorney general, Lloyd Miles and Alex Armijo for land commissioner, John Flynn and Floyd Cross for corporation commission, Finis Heidel and Donnan Stephenson for supreme court justice. Two other justices unopposed.

Don Hancock and Tom Hamilton are state senator candidates for the Lincoln - Otero district.

Other Democratic candidates include Ralph Petty, Jr., Billy Gene Payne, Kenneth A. Huey, Austin A. Pritchett, Charles Jones, James Strong and Margaret Ellison, all unopposed in the primary election.

The race for U. S. Senator on the Republican ticket has been heating up more every day. The three candidates are Anderson Carter, Harold Thompson and David Cargo. Ed Foreman is unopposed for U. S. Representative.

The six-way governor race is a dandy with Pete Domenici, Edward Balcomb, Tom Clear, Junio Lopez, Edward Hartman and Stephen Helbing as candidates.

Joseph Skeen of Lincoln County is opposing Paul Becht of Santa Fe in the lieutenant governor race on the Republican ticket.

Robbin Bishop is unopposed for secretary of state, Larry Humphrey and Richard Martinez are Republicans seeking state auditor job. Lawrence Hess unopposed for state treasurer.

Two Republicans are in the attorney general race, David Sierra and Gerald Pittman, also two in the land commissioner race, Leo Dow and George Beach. Russel Bradley for corporation commissioner and John Watson for supreme court are unopposed. Thomas McKenna and Ernest Corey are both in the race for supreme court justice for 8-year term position 1, Daniel Sisk unopposed for position two.

John Conway of Alamogordo is unopposed in race for state senator for Lincoln - Otero district. Arthur Evans and W. E. Rush, both of Truth or Consequences are candidates for state representative from Lincoln - Sierra district.

Holt Lovelace, Don Stark, Alice King, Mabel Vigil, Marlan Schlarb, Ernest Sanchez and Kenneth Nosker are unopposed as county candidates on Republican ticket.

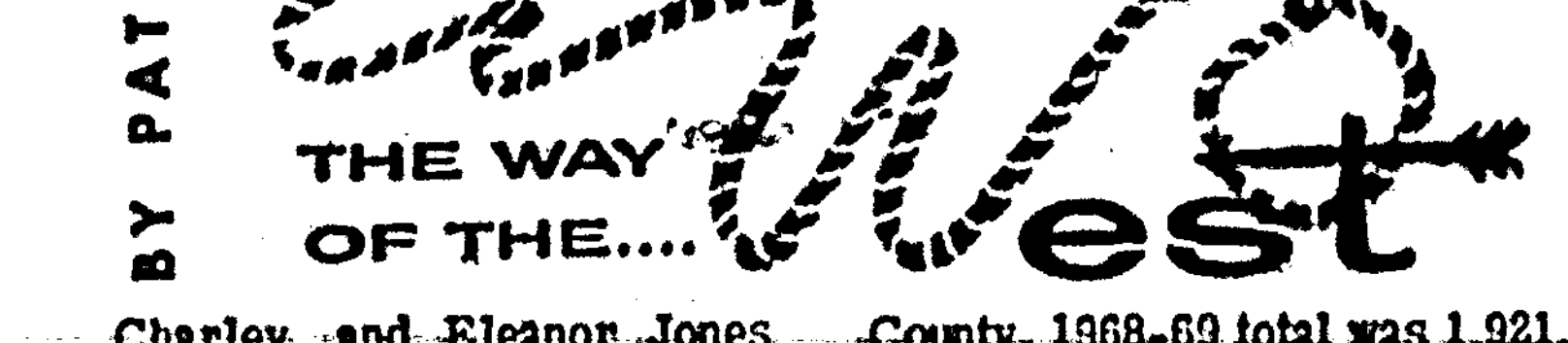
Six furlong contest named in honor of Ruidoso News editor Hugh Stiles

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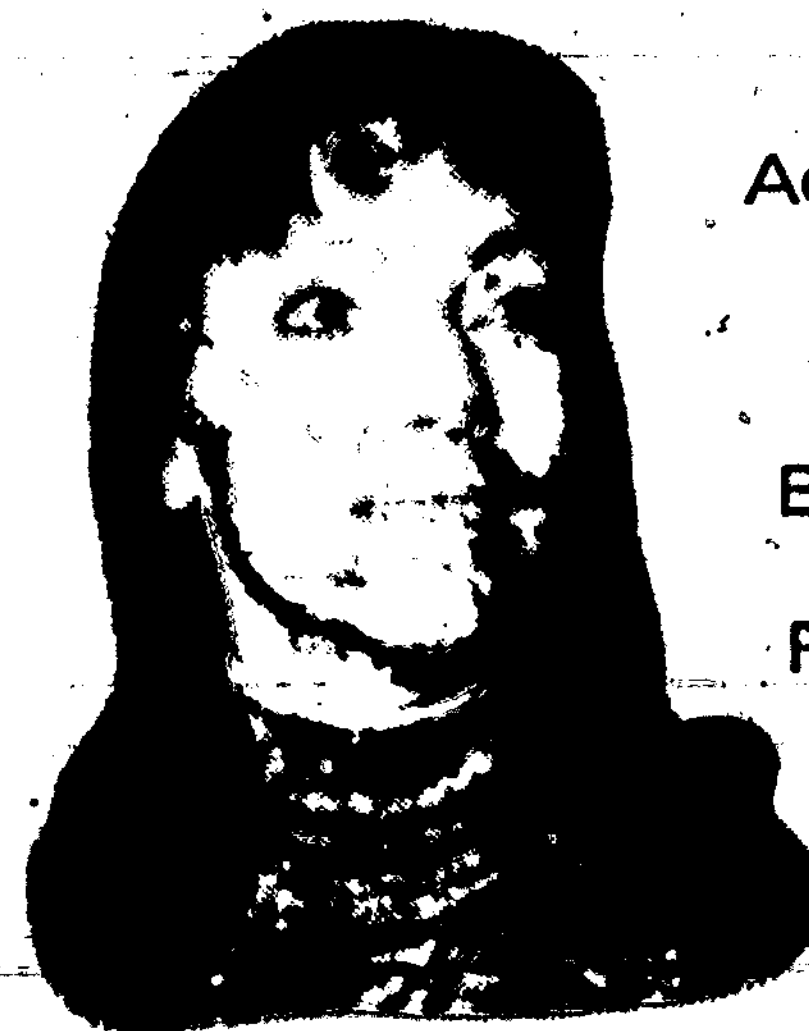

The sun did stand still

Did you know that the space program is busy proving that what has been called "myth" in the Bible is true? Mr. Harold Hill, President of the Curtis Engine Co. in Baltimore, Maryland, and a consultant in the space program, relates the following development:

"I think one of the most amazing things that God has for us today happened recently to our astronauts and space scientists at Green Belt, Maryland. They were checking the position of the sun, moon, and planets out in space where they would be 100 years and 1,000 years from now. We have to know this so we don't send a satellite up and have it bump into something later on in its orbits. Many visitors expected at Malpais

Carrizozo, N. M. -- Lava, long admired in its natural state in Lincoln County, for its aesthetic beauty, now is being developed by a Carrizozo firm into what is becoming a popular decorative siding for buildings.

Lava's architectural potential lies in that it is easy to work with and immune to weather or discoloration having long been exposed to ages of hot summers and cold winters in its natural state. It is also low in moisture absorption.

With dramatic decorative effect, lava gives the richness of tapestry plus a beautiful play on lights and shadows. With all its feelings of strong elegance, it is moderate in cost.

The Twin Peaks Products Co., Inc., located three miles northwest of Carrizozo near the Malpais lava bed, is shipping an average of one train carload of lava per week to Eastern markets, and supplying local market demands.

At an early date, Fay Harkey, president of the company, estimated that his firm can be shipping three and four carloads a week to building suppliers throughout the Midwest, East and Southwest.

He said his firm recently had received an order that will require about 200 carloads of hand selected lava to decorate the buildings of a national restaurant chain.

The firm markets both lava and cinders. The Twin Peaks name comes from the two volcanic craters 20 miles north of Carrizozo from which the cinder is extracted.

"Luckily, each peak furnishes a different color cinder -- red and black," Harkey said.

Harkey pointed out that the lava on his property differs from most of the 40-mile-long bed in that it is already broken into chunks and blocks. Although he had no studies made he believes the molten lava flowed to the south onto what is now part of his property must have hit a small lake causing the lava to harden in small chunks quickly rather than settle into the flat

mass which is characteristic of the rest of the bed.

MORE FACILITIES

The Twin Peaks Products Co. recently opened an office in Carrizozo and added a large diesel hauling vehicle to make hauls to within 600 miles of Carrizozo.

Harkey says it still must grow to meet the increasing demand.

"The firm started at my home on the edge of the lava beds," Harkey said. "People would drive up and want to buy some of the lava either by the piece or by a pickup load.

"Later I started shipping some as a sideline to an El Paso building materials supply company and then the market just started growing," he said.

The firm now is also shipping volcanic cinder chips which are glued to panels for decorative sidings. They are composed of one-quarter inch thick plywood board covered with a strong adhesive on which the crushed cinder is spread.

Aggregates, black cinders, crushed lava, crushed marble, crushed stone which he markets is used for accent and distinction in gardens and flower beds. It is also used as a ground cover for commercial purposes to eliminate excessive care and expense.

In Carrizozo distinction in the garden has been achieved through the use of lava chips and cinders. Lincoln County Extension Agent Ralph Dunlap pointed out that the cinders help the plants they surround to resist infection through health giving properties of minerals contained.

The combination of volcanic cinders with plants, trees, patio stone, concrete blocks and walls as used in Carrizozo produces a pleasing picture in the gardens and yards.

Lava used as a focal point is becoming popular with churches, banks and commercial places. Several churches in the Midwest have used lava siding from Carrizozo, including the Saint Stephens Episcopal Church in St. Louis, Mo., and a church in Memphis, Tenn.

Architect Charles E. Nolan Jr. used it as a design accent for

the front of Trinity Lutheran Church in Alamogordo, New Mexico.

"Lava has become more popular and accepted in construction use. As it becomes better known and the availability improves, it should become even more popular," Nolan said.

Harkey is not worried about ever running out of the lava or cinder. He estimates there are about 5 million tons of cinder in the two peaks and an undetermined amount of lava.

And wouldn't this be a better world in which to live if every one in it would follow this wee bit of advice? Let's try it! The year is still young and resolutions are still in order.



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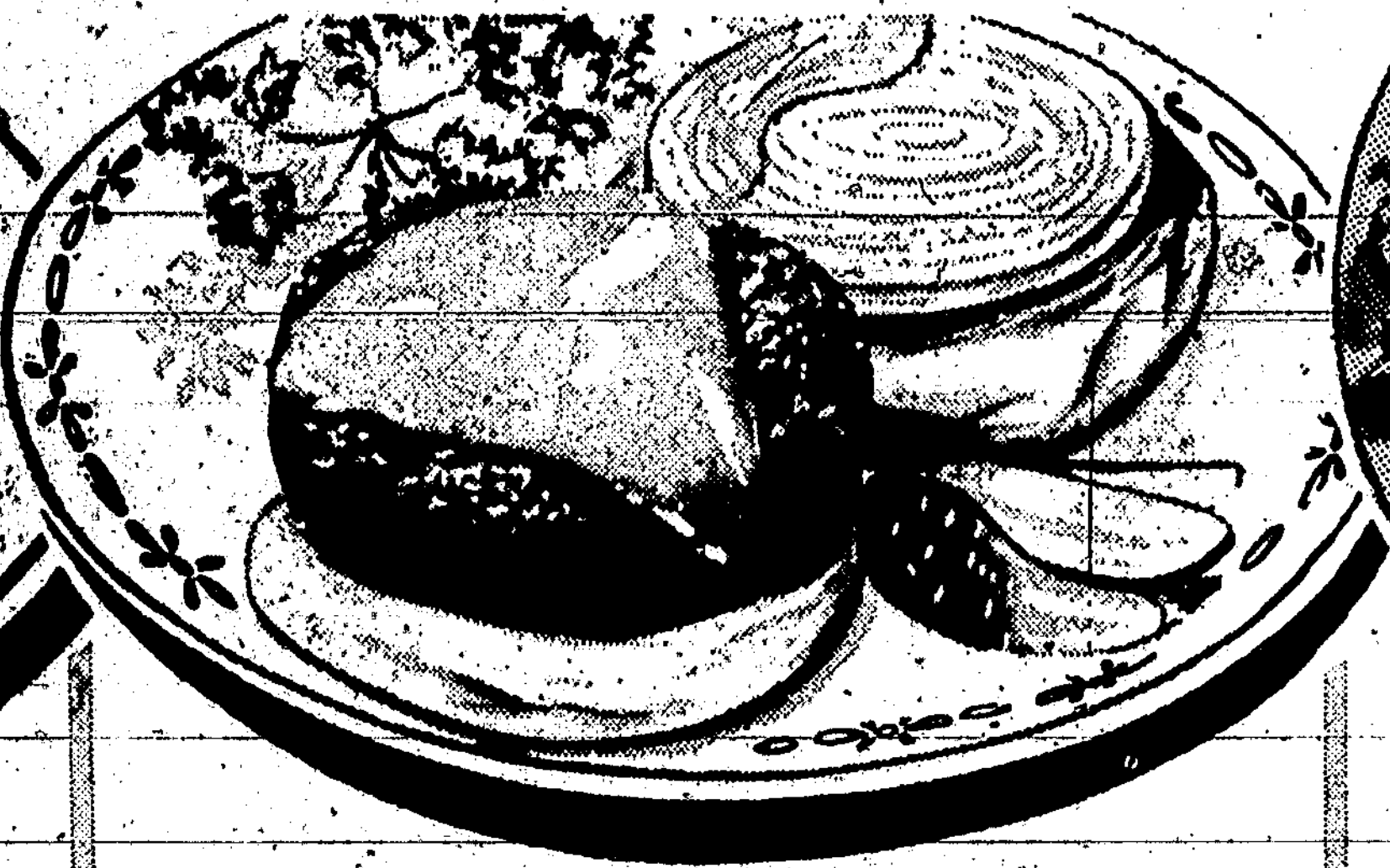
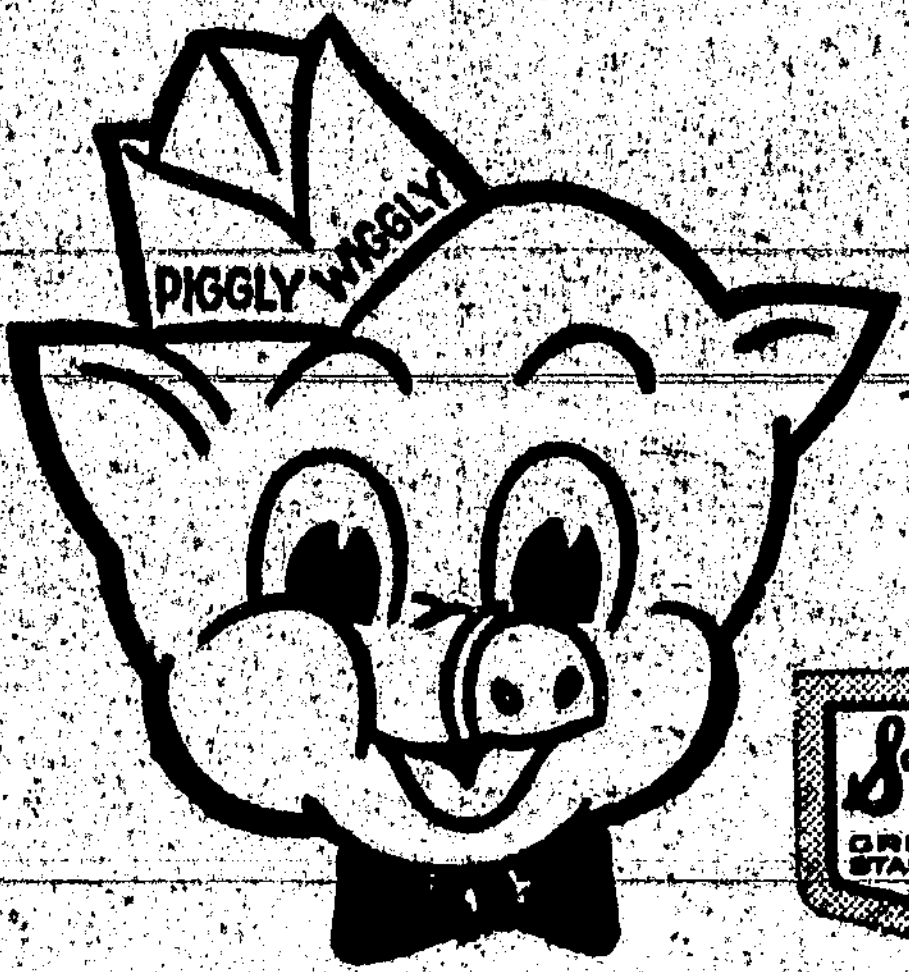

Report from Lincoln Co. Development Ass'n.

Minutes of the May 21, 1970 meeting.

The Lincoln County Development Association met May 21st at Red Cloud Canyon, southwest of Corona.

The minutes of the April meeting were read and approved. Committee reports were then made.

A. T. Pfingsten reported that there was no water available for Nogal Lake from the Fort Stanton water on the Bonito.

Ralph Dunlap brought the group up to date on the policy adopted by the Board of Directors on Fort Stanton. It was:

To: Lincoln County Development Association Directors:

We need to establish a policy for Lincoln County Development Ass'n. on the Fort Stanton Development plans. These plans are outlined in the April 12th, Roswell Daily Record. Basically it called for research in the western 80% of Fort Stanton and a recreation area at Feather Cave and Fort Stanton Caves eastward.

The present thinking is that we endorse this plan for development of Fort Stanton. At the same time we request that the Fort Stanton Caves be further investigated for opening to the public. This would make necessary more time and money by the Bureau of Land Management in this area. If they are not going to develop the Caves, we would request it be given to the State Park and Recreation Commission to develop.

Bert Pfingsten added that Mr. Sawyer and Mr. Campbell of BLM have done a study of the Caves in the last year and have a very interesting set of color slides.

Holt Lovelace reported that the county plans to improve the road from Highway 54 to the forest line in the near future.

Don Stark read a letter from the Post Office to Walter Henn approving the Pony Express race on August 1st.

The program for the evening was on State Highway 42. Don Stark asked that the group participate in the discussion. Both Don Stark and Holt Lovelace emphasized that the plans for the road improvement are only tentative and require a cooperative agreement approved by the State Highway Commission.

The tentative plans are to have the county build the road bed and the State Highway Department to oil the road. It is possible that 12 to 14 miles will be done this year.

Holt Lovelace - We plan to meet with the landowners along with State Highway representatives to review the plans. This has to be a joint effort.

Merritt - The county and state have offered to help. We in this area should cooperate with them. We have needed this road for a long time as it has a large tonnage of ranch supplies, feed and livestock hauled over it. Let's don't let it fall through.

Lovelace - We need to build up the road and need to have the cooperation of the landowners.

George Hanson - The rancher wants to know if and when it will be fenced.

Lovelace - The publicity is premature. County equipment will be used to build the road bed.

Brown - I work for Mr. Raney and he wants a fence on his portion of the road. The livestock loss makes a fence necessary.

Merritt - I feel that the west end of the road carries the most traffic but I would like to have the east end paved too. I can get right of way and water needed.

Stark - We are not forcing this on anyone. We only want to help the area.

Shrecengost introduced Paul Brecht, candidate for Lt. Governor.

The next meeting will be in Capitan in late June. The date to be set later.

Round-up

By Ralph Dunlap

The 1970 apple production is estimated to be over one million boxes. The New Mexico Apple Council met last Saturday and gave this estimate of production. Rio Arriba and Santa Fe county production is estimated at 350,000 boxes, Lincoln County, 200,000 boxes, San Juan 200,000 Bernalillo Sandoval 35,000 and Otero, Chaves at 40,000 boxes.

After a dinner at the Wortley in Lincoln, the group toured the packing sheds and orchards in the area.

The Lincoln County Wool Judging team of Carol Cooper, Cristina Pacheco, Ray Sisneros and Allen Sultemeyer, placed first in the Senior Wool Judging contest and had three of the top five individuals in the contest. Carol Cooper was the high point with 439 out of a possible 500 points. Cristina Pacheco was third, and Ray Sisneros tied for fourth in the individual scoring. The team will go to Sonora, Texas to the National Wool Judging contest June 8th to 11th. They are sponsored by the New Mexico Woolgrowers.

"Damping - off", as many gardeners know it, refers to the failure of some seed to germinate and to the collapse of seedling plants at the soil line, due to attack by fungi in the soil. Many

soil - borne fungi can cause damping - off. These organisms may attack the seedling before it emerges from the soil or may become a problem after plants have emerged from the ground.

The destructiveness of this disease depends upon the amount of fungus in the soil and on the environmental conditions. An abundance of moisture in the soil and cool soil temperatures are especially favorable for the development of "damping - off" fungi.

Several control measures can be used to stop the spread of fungus growth. Seed and soil treatment, along with sanitation and protection of the seedlings, will go far in keeping problems to a minimum. Seed rots can be prevented by treating seed with either Captan or Thiram fungicides.

Further development of the disease once it has started can frequently be stopped by watering the seedlings at five - to - seven day intervals with a fungicide such as ferban, ziram, captan, thiram, zineb, or tolpet (one to one-half tablespoons per gallon of water).

The surface of the soil should be kept as dry as possible, since moisture favors disease organisms. Watering should be done in the morning and preferably on bright days. Sunlight

raises the temperature and evaporates moisture from the soil surface.

Pipe line tours to be taken June 4-5

The Las Cruces, Bureau of Land Crueses District Manager, J. W. Young, announces a bid invitation for construction of pipelines in Lincoln, Sierra, Otero, and Socorro counties, New Mexico.

Prospective bidders are urged to make an examination of the work sites. Two days will be required to inspect the sites. The first days tour will start at 8:00 a.m., June 4, 1970 at the U. S. Post Office, Carrizozo, New Mexico; the second day tour will start at 9:00 a.m., June 5, 1970 at the U. S. Post Office, Truth or Consequences, New Mexico.

The work consists of furnishing and installing approximately 22 miles of "plastic" water pipe, four storage tanks, 18 troughs, and 26 guzzlers. The completed watering facilities will provide drinking water for livestock and wildlife on the public domain.

HIGH ON AC TESTS

Five Carrizozo juniors took the American College Test, which is required for admission into all New Mexico colleges, on April 25. Scores which were received this week indicate that they rank high in all tests, with the mathematics tests ranking exceptionally high. Math scores ranged from the 93rd to the 98th percentile, which means that of all the high school juniors in the United States who take the test

and go on to college, 93% score less than 29 and 98% score less than 32. The scaled scores range up to 32. Composite scores, which are used as a good indication of college success, ranged with this group from the 72nd percentile to the 99th percentile.

Students taking the test were Janie Chavez, Marc Ellison, Donald Ham, Dan Harkey, and Susan Harkey. Dan Harkey was high point man, ranking at the 99th percentile in natural science and composite, and at the 98th

percentile in math. These scores are very influential in helping the young people obtain college scholarships, as well as being used by college advisers to place them in the proper level courses in college. These five taking the test are 16% of the Junior class. That's a high figure to be above the 93rd percentile!

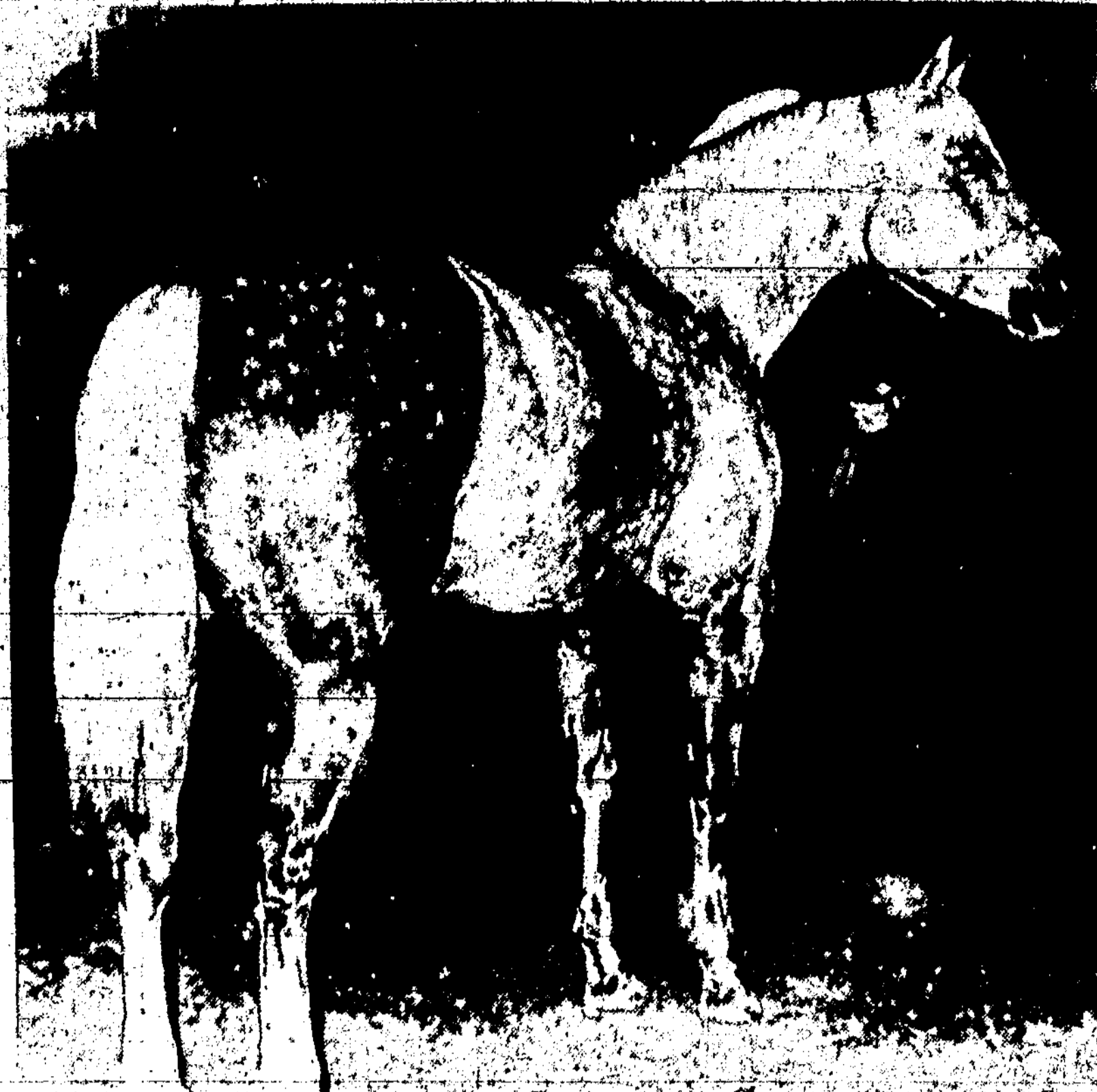
