to his postoffice.





Round-Up By Raiph Duniap Lincoln County Agent

Range caterpillars started hatching in Lincoln County the week of June 7th in the area north of the Capitan mountains. This area has been growing every year and is generally spreading in an eastward direction. At least 200,000 acres are included in the infested areas A survey is now being conducted to find the full extent of the infestation. These outbreaks occur in about 30 year cycles. The last out break in the area was in the late 1920's. Normally the range caterpillar does not spread over such a large area before the

population starts to decline. The range caterpillar not only denudes the range but the spines on the worm have the effect of an insect sting when livestock touch the worm. Sheep and cattle refuse to graze in areas with a heavy infestation of range caterpillars.

Take care of your horse's feet now and prevent problems during the summer. If you did not ride your horse much during the winter, its feet may be too long now. Get them trimmed before you start riding, if you don't, the toes may crack and break, and the tendons may become strained from the unnatural angle.

Horses that have stood in the barn most of the winter may have hard, dried out feet which may also cause them to break easily. Routine cleaning and the application of a foot dressing. such as neats foot oil, can prevent this. Don't wait until the hooves crack before you give them proper care. The moisture of the stall and wet lots increase the danger of thrush in the feet. Careful cleaning daily and occa-sional trimming will prevent thrush.

The stalls should be rept as clean and dry as possible, as the increase in temperature in the spring will add to the amount of ammonia given off from mainre and urine. Don't wait

for trouble to happen, prevent

Spiders are helpful creatures to have around your home and garden. They eat many insect pests, and some scientists believe spiders are more important than birds in pest control.

Most spiders are shy and would rather wait for an unlucky insect to get tangled in the web. Very few are aggressive hunters who stalk their prey. With few exceptions, if you don't handle a spider roughly, it won't intentionally bite you,

At one time or another, you may have more than a thousand spiders around your home. It's not a pleasant thought, but you'll

probably never see all of them at once. (they're active at night.) And what about poisonous spi-

ders? Almost all spiders are somewhat poisonous, but few seriously so. Even fewer are fatally poisonous. The hazard of a critical bite is exceptionally low. Statistics back him up. In the U.S. in the last 250 years. less than 100 human deaths were caused by spiders. This includes many very old, very young, or unhealthy persons, who were quite susceptible to arthropod venom. The number of deaths among healthy adults is extremely low,







"Summer time, and the Living is easy" - or so goes the song. Many of us do like to take it a little bit easier in warm month's and also enjoy outdoor eating with our families. Whether it is in the backyard or a remote picnic spot in the mountains, cooking out can be fun.

Plan your out door eating, like your regular meals, to include food from each of the basic four food groups - body building proteins, energy giving bread cereals, vitamin and mineral rich fruits and vegetables, and appetite satisfying fats and sweets, Make an outdoor meal simple. Include a main dish. something green or crunchy in the way of a salad, a beverage and a dessert. It is fun to take some dishes along already prepared and others to cook at a picnic.

Other picnic hints are: Cover dishes of salads, re-

lishes, fruits and sweets until serving time. Keep the cold foods cold and hot foods hot. Keep in mind the elements. A

fresh wind can tumble and mess an ordinary table setting. Use a heavy weight cloth or weight the bottom of the cloth. Wrap the silver in the paper napkins to hold them down.

If the area is troubled by insects spray the area before putting out food, and provide citronella candles or a "bug light" to repel insects.

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

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

Stanton workers to get pay raise

Pay raises for 25 employees of Fort Stanton Medical Center will be implemented July 1 by the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions.

The increases, estimated to add \$9,000 annually to the centers payroll, are in compliance with salary upgradings ordered by the 1969 State Legislature.

Positions affected by the current pay increases include registed nurses, licensed practical, nurses, psychogical counselors, accountants, caseworker, and selected paramedical services. Fourteen hundred lower range DHI employees received raises on January 1.

A total of 333 DHI employees are blated to receive the pay hikes next month, at an annual cost to the department of

\$117,000. Position upgradings scheduled for July 1, 1971, will raise the minimum salary for all state employees to \$300 a month, and will affect all but the few DHI employees.

New trout lake will have 130 surface acres

A new lake for New Mexico's trout fishermen is progressing according to schedule say Dupartment of Game and Fish officials.

Trotz Construction Co. signed a contract June 5 to begin work on a dam creating the lake in Catron County after the State Game Commission approved the company's bid.

The lake, to be named Quenado is in Largo Canyon 15 miles south of Quemado, N.M.

The Department of Game and Fish is building the take on U.S. Forest Service lands, Thirtypercent of the \$501,111 construction costs will come from Department bonding funds, and the balance will come from federal aid funds.

Bud Brashears, chief of fisheries for the Game and Fish Department said he is optimistic about meeting the deadline date of December for completion of the lake. If favorable construction weather continues, Quemado should be ready for the spring run off in 1971 and should then reach a size of 50 surface acres if moisture conditions are normal. In 1974, Quemado is expected to reach its capacity of 130 surface acres with a depth of about 54 feet.

First trout stocking will begin as early as the fall of 1971 if there is sufficient water stored.

From data colected by Department fisheries personnel, it is estimated that the lake will be capable of providing 124,000 man days of fishing per year.

But even without the gunfire the birds were due to leave, the National Geographic Siciety says. They abandon their roosts

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in the spring in order to nest. The eggs are laid in late April or early May, and hatch in about 11 days. Two weeks later the young are ready to fly -- just in time to feast on freshly planted farm and garden seeds.

Flocks so huge their passing blots out the sun compete with cattle at feeding pens later in the year, devouring up to 20 tons of potatoes a day. Farmers who protest that starlings eat more than the cows do are echoing complaints long heard in Europe.

A flock has been known to strip a French Village's Olive groves in less than an hour, clean a Swiss vineyard of every grape within five minutes, or wipe out a strawberry bed in seconds.

Agricultural authorities estimate that up to \$100 million in crops may be lost to birds in the United States each year. And the Federal Aviation Authority,

noting that collisions between birds and planes cost about \$10 million annually, includes black birds on its list of "the most hazardous birds."

Birds Have Friends: But blackbirds and starlings have many defenders, even though the song of the yellow headed-blackbird has been compared to the squeaking of rusty

hinges. The birds repay part of their debt to society by eating many insects that destroy crops and vegetation. The starling's long beak is particularly adept at rooting Japanese beetle grubs out of the ground.

Without any help, however, the birds have been winning their skirmishes with men since Pliny the Elder reported an unsuccessful campaign against starlings in the first century A. D.

Live owls have been tethered to ledges of public buildings, but the birds quickly learn that their enemies are tied. Alumowls and rubber snakes have proved equally ineffective.

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
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
