

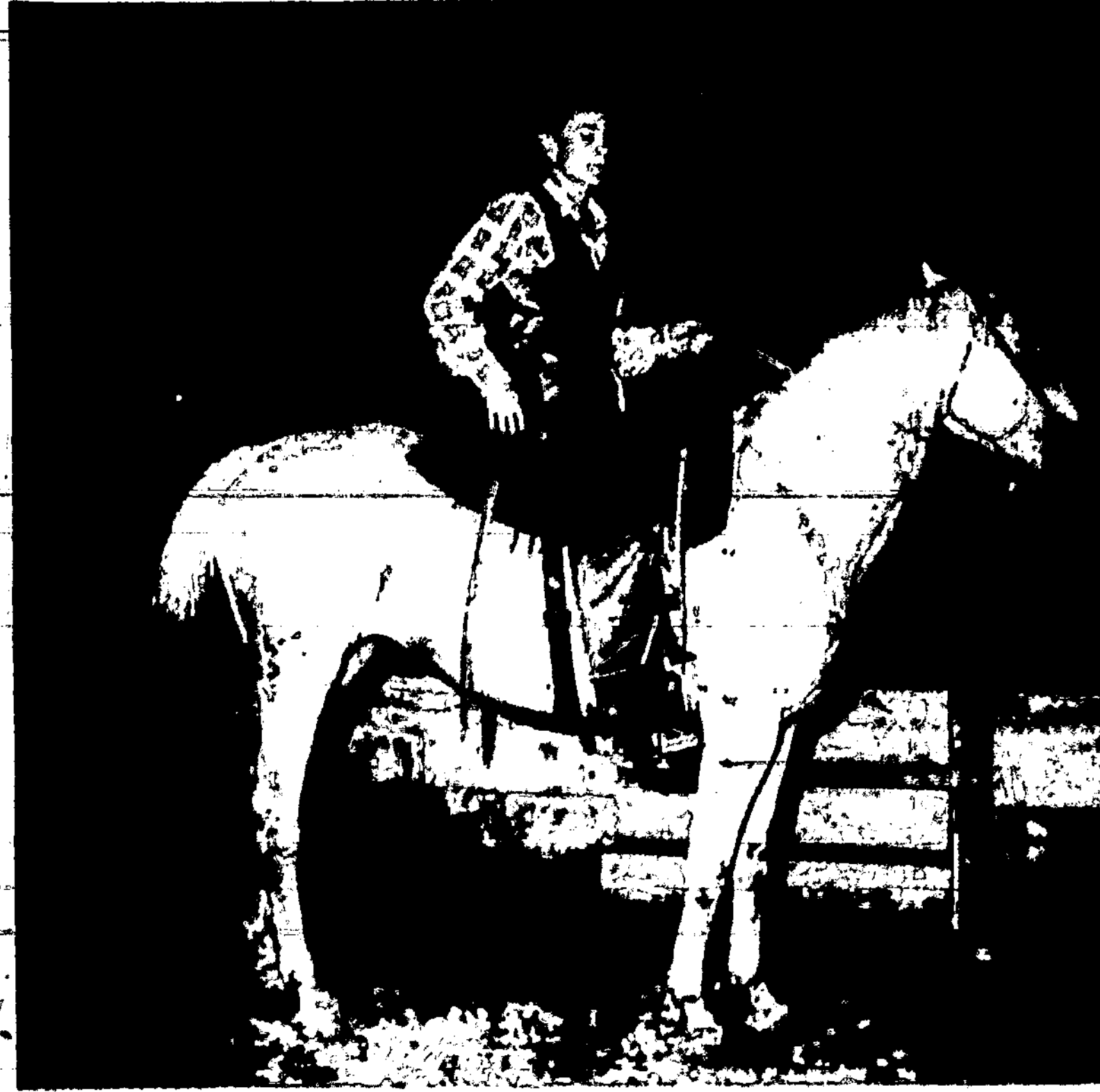

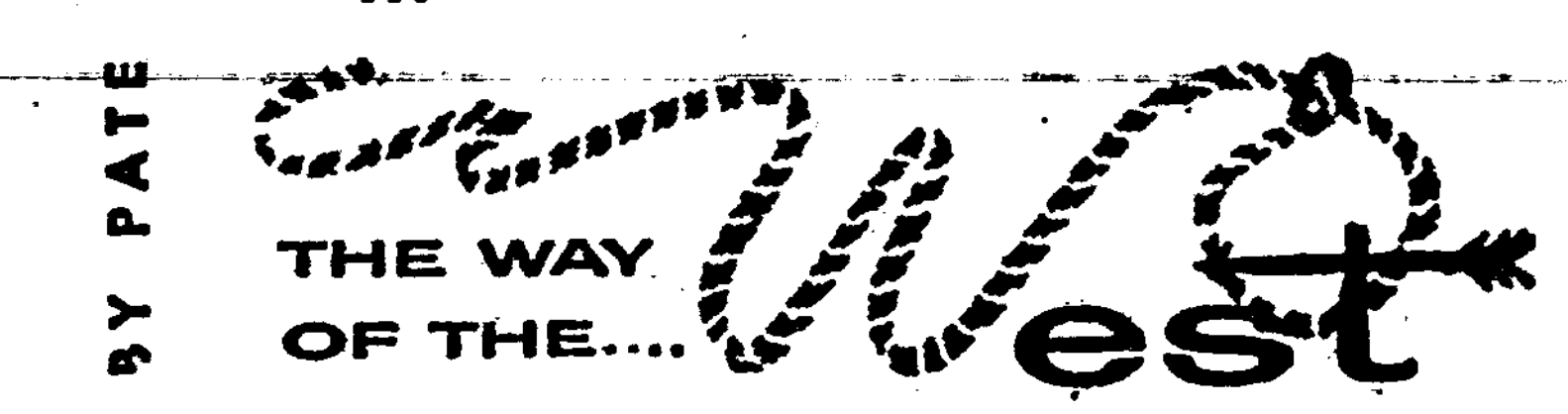

TWO BIG EVENTS SATURDAY — Pony Express Race at White Oaks 4-H Rodeo & Horse Show at Corona

Saturday, August 1 will be a busy and exciting day for a lot of Lincoln County people. The 41-mile Pony Express Race will start from White Oaks at 8:30 a.m. on its course to the John Robinson turnoff (9.7 miles) for the first change of horses, then to Encinoso School (10 miles) for the second change, then to South Base Road (8.3 miles) for the third change and on to the Old Lincoln County courthouse (13 miles) and the finish of the race.

This race is part of the festivities at Old Lincoln Town which includes three performances of the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" on Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoon, an old fiddlers contest on Saturday and Old Lincoln Days Parade on Sunday.

The 4-H horse show gets underway at 9:30 a.m. at Corona with Deborah Deerman of Anthony as judge. The rodeo events will start at 2:00 p.m. The horse show is for Lincoln County 4-H members taking horse projects. The rodeo is for any Lincoln County youngsters enrolled in county school in the year 1970.

One survivor of crash on Capitan

A search for a missing airplane began Friday when a Cessna 310 plane enroute from Del Rio, Texas to Ruidoso carrying six people and pilot was reported overdue and missing.

The plane was spotted on the steep south side of the Capitan Mountains and a search party reached the crash site early Monday to find one survivor, Betty Geyer 28, whose husband was in the search party. Mrs. Geyer's seat was in the back of the plane before the crash, it was the only seat remaining in the aircraft after the crash and was shoved forward toward the nose of the plane. She suffered ankle and pelvic bone fractures, was reported in good condition Tuesday at Roswell Medical Center.

The clocks on the aircraft, which crashed Friday, were stopped at 11:30 a.m. The airplane was last heard from Friday morning when the pilot requested weather information from the FAA at Roswell. No flight plan was filed.

Killed in the crash were William and Carolyn Sumbing of New Braunfels, the Sumbings' two year old daughter Sandy, Mrs. Geyer's mother Alma Sumbing, Gordon Lytton and the pilot Jerry Gates of Del Rio.

The airplane struck a large tree which sheared the wings and the tail fell away. Rescue operations were carried out by helicopter which landed about 1000 feet above the crash site. Bodies were first taken to the G-Bar-F ranch, owned by Gaylord Freeman.

Races honor Sweetwater-Abilene

Two feature races will be on tap at Ruidoso Downs for Friday, July 31, a race honoring both the Village of Ruidoso and KTXX-TV of the Sweetwater - Abilene area will be held. Groups representing both interests will be present to conduct post-race ceremonies in the winner's circle.

The "Village of Ruidoso Pursue" will go as the tenth race on the program, and will feature thorough bred going six furlongs for a claiming tag of \$2,000. Heading the list will be My Utopian Donna, a recent claim by Donald H. Hensley; and William Erdwurm's Enchant-layero, both very successful over the local course so far this season. Also expected to draw much of the betting public's attention will be Mikey Boy, owned by C. W. Casclo, and Lurlock, running under the colors of Buck Fallwell, Friona, Texas.

The eleventh race will be the "KTXX-TV Pursue" contested by quarter horses over the distance of

350 yards, under allowance conditions. This race, which honors the group from the Sweetwater - Abilene area television station appears to be a toss up as far as picking a favorite is concerned. There are four horses out of the ten entrants who will probably attract most of the attention in the mutuels. These are Mr. Eskimo, owned by A. Mills-paugh, San Angelo, Texas; Ralph Burleson's Vanta's Chick, from Brownwood, Texas; Lucky Face, racing under the colors of Magin and Fernando Rivas, McAllen, Texas; and Hop Chick, representing Jack Byers, Blanchard, Oklahoma. All four of these "short horses" have fared extremely well over the straightaway here at Ruidoso Downs this season, and appear primed to turn many more fine performances.

This weekend's card will be highlighted by the running of "Three Bars Handicap", Sunday, August 2, carrying a gross purse of \$10,000. First post for Friday's excellent card will be 1:30 p.m. MDT.

Robbers use rifle in holdup



IT WAS LIKE THIS — After a pair of robbers finished tying up Ray Romo at Western Texaco they covered him with tires in the back storage room, about like you see here.

Ray Romo, a family man with wife, Priscilla, and son, Ray Jr., age eight months, has been working the night shift at Western Texaco Truck Center for most of a year. He has decided he is reasonably lucky to be alive and able to continue this work.

Last Saturday morning at 5:00 a.m. two men drove up and walked in the office, one carrying a rifle. One said, "We don't want to hurt you, just open the cash register." Then they tied Ray's hands and feet together behind his back, hauled him into a back storage room and covered him with tires. From then on Ray does not know what they did.

What the two men did was determined when the station operator Bobby Hererra started checking up -- \$230.00 cash was missing and the gas tanks checked out 30 gallons short.

Romo spent approximately an hour and a half under the heavy tires, unable to free himself. He would hear motorists drive across the bell hose and would yell for help but no one could hear him. Finally a tourist, Johnnie R. Hinson of Las Cruces and Ernie Vega who works at Zanon's Diner, found him and untied the ropes, which had been cut off the sliding doors and a water hose that had been cut off and used in the life job.

Ray suffered no apparent injury but was X-rayed for possible damage from heavy tire holding him down for the 90 minutes. The tire had been damped on his shoulder.

He said the two men were around 25 years of age, one dressed in Levi's and greasy T-shirt, the other in slacks and not quite so dirty. He thought it possible they might shoot him before leaving the station, partly from recent news story about holdup at Espanola where a person was killed.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's office said no suspects had been apprehended.

Trophies selected for Billy the Kid Rodeo

Chamber of Commerce members Henry Vega, Bill Payne, Scott Lewis and Paul Payton met Tuesday evening for short session making plans for the Billy the Kid Rodeo to be held here Sunday, August 16.

Some changes have been made from last year. Entrance fees have been cut in half and contestants may pay only one fee and enter only one event if they like. Boys 11-15 bull riding \$5, bronc riding \$5, goat tying \$3, entry money. Girls 11-15 \$3 entry for each of three events, flag racing, barrel racing and pole bending.

Boys and girls 10 and under will pay \$2 entry for each of three events, flag racing, barrel racing and pole bending. Trophies to be given this year will be a \$250 specially tooled saddle for the all-around winner to be determined on points won. First place winner in each event will receive a handsome engraved buckle second and third place winners in each event will get rosettes.

M. I. Burn Bros. of Alamogordo will again furnish stock for this rodeo. Action will start at 9:00 a.m. Sunday morning. The rodeo office will be at the Lincoln County News up through Saturday, then moved to the rodeo grounds for early Sunday morning.

Carrizozo Woman's Club will handle the concession stand at the rodeo with all proceeds going to the Billy the Kid Rodeo Fund.

The annual Billy the Kid Ball will be held at the country club on Saturday night August 15 with Bob Zinn and his Mustangs furnishing the music.
