



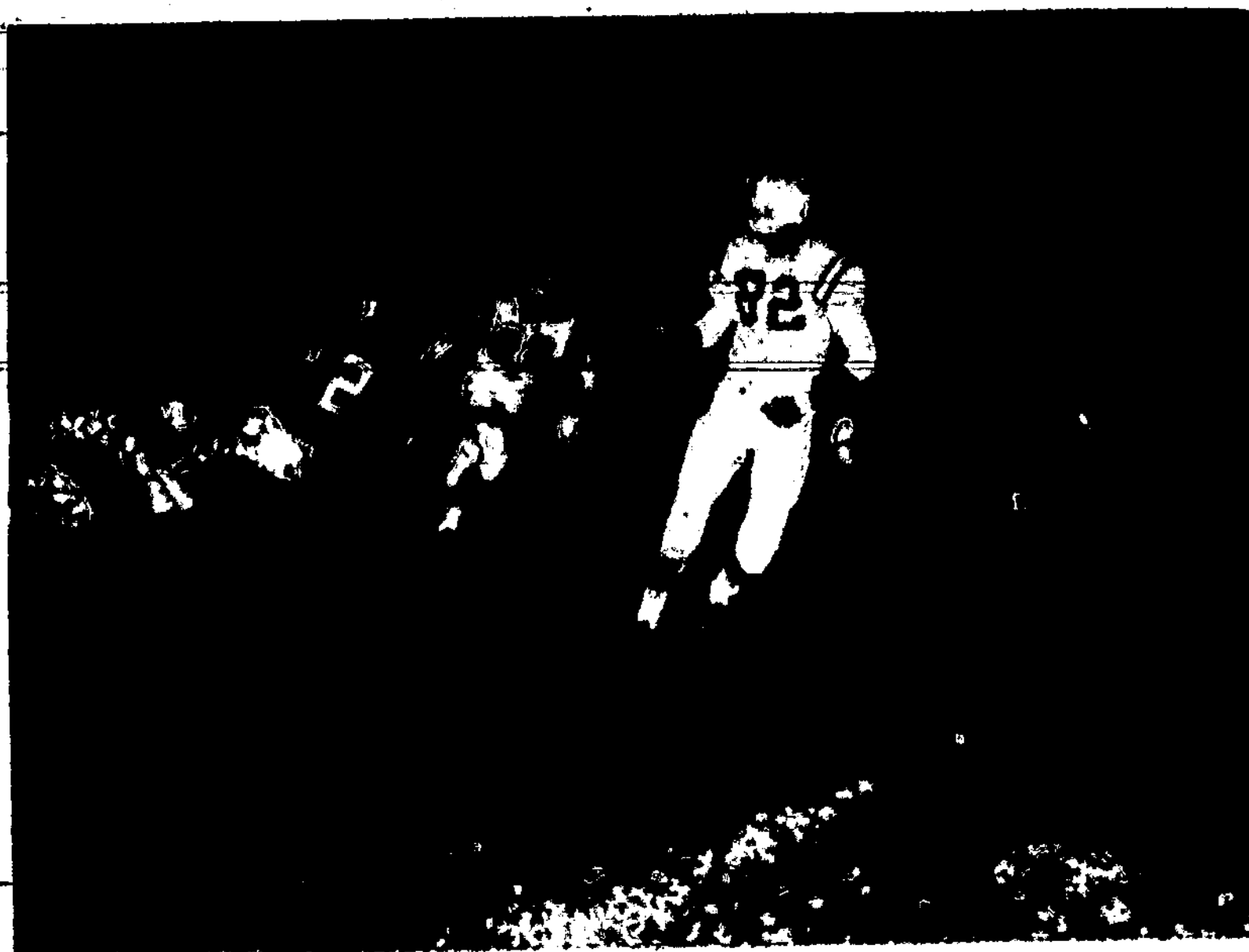

# Inside THE CAPITOL

LAS VEGAS—Top Republican candidates appealed for support at a San Miguel County GOP fund raising dinner that attracted 400 at \$15-a-couple.

U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Albuquerque, was master of ceremonies. Running for reelection in Northern District I, Lujan replaced Republican Gov. David F. Cargo. Cargo was removed as master of ceremonies at the National Republican Committee's direction. Cargo did not attend the dinner.

Lovington Republican Anderson Carter, running for U. S. Senator, told the responsive crowd: "I have never tried to build a political career by tearing down or dividing up the state." Governor-running Pete Domenici of Albuquerque advocated teamwork to build New Mexico economically. Domenici said: "We can't have prosperity in one part of New Mexico at the expense of poverty in another part."

The Democratic candidates caravan campaigned in Chavez County Wednesday and Lea County Thursday. U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya and Bruce King, the Democratic governor candidate, were still leading but Carter and Domenici were closing the gap. A poll taken for Domenici showed Pete trailing King by only 3.5 per cent with 20 per cent of voters undecided.

Lincoln County Democratic Chairman Fern Sawyer charged State Rep. Ralph Petty Jr., Ruidoso Democrat, "is working for the Republican ticket." She said Petty, unopposed for reelection, is backing Carter, Domenici, State Sen. Joe Skeen, the GOP lieutenant governor nominee, and U. S. Rep. Ed Foreman, Las Cruces Republican. Skeen is a Lincoln County rancher.

The Democratic chairman said: "I think that's unethical." She said she campaigned for Petty, youngest member of the legislature, when he was elected in 1968. She said Petty has said he will change his voter registration from Democratic to Republican. Petty is on the general election ballot as a Democrat. He represents Lincoln and Sierra Counties.

Repeated efforts to contact Petty for comment were unsuccessful. Fern Sawyer commented on Petty's campaign activities at a meeting of Democratic county chairmen and candidates in statewide races at Las Cruces.

Republican Arthur Evans of Caballo, Sierra County, was Petty's general election opponent. But Evans withdrew the day before the withdrawal deadline Sept. 22 on grounds his post as manager of the Ladder Ranch would not permit campaigning. National Republican Committeeman Robert O. Anderson of Roswell owns the ranch.

**SPECIAL NOTE** -- State Rep. Ralph Petty Jr. has informed the News that he will have answer to statements by Buckles next week.

Pharmacist Tom Hamilton, Alamogordo Democrat, is favored currently over Alamogordo attorney John Conway, the Republican candidate, in the Lincoln-Otero Counties race for a state Senate seat. Skeen is vacating the seat to run for lieutenant governor.

Democrats rate the lieutenant-governor race in Lincoln County as close. But the Domenici-Skeen team is considered the leader in normally Republican Lincoln County over King and State Rep. Robert Mondragon of Albuquerque, the Democratic lieutenant governor candidate.

U. S. Rep. Foreman is regarded as the leader over State Senator Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, in Lincoln County. Democrats forecast victory over Carter in Lincoln County for U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya. But Democrat Montoya lost Lincoln County by 243 votes to Las Cruces Republican Edwin L. Mechem, then the incumbent U. S. Senator, in 1964 despite the landslide against Republican Barry Goldwater.

The U. S. Senate confirmed Mechem as a new federal district judge in New Mexico. Mechem was appointed by President Richard M. Nixon.

Former State Rep. John F. Bigbee, Encino Republican, is favored to win election to the State House over Santa Rosa Democrat Robert J. Gerhardt in the Guadalupe, DeBaca and Torrance Counties district. Gerhardt is an outgoing Guadalupe County commissioner. He operates a ready-mix concrete business. Bigbee is a rancher. Bigbee will likely carry DeBaca and Torrance Counties and lose Guadalupe County November 3.

Bigbee was chairman of the Revenue Committee in the 1969 constitutional convention. Retiring State Rep. Jeff Good, Fort Sumner rancher, is backing Bigbee. In Quay County King was regarded as the favorite over Domenici in the governor's race. King has strong farmer-rancher support in Quay County. Senator Montoya is considered the favorite over Carter in Quay County but Andy is scoring gains. U. S. Rep. Lujan is regarded as a strong leader over Democrat Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe in Quay County.

Domenici called for changes in New Mexico welfare operations. Pete said: "The Medicaid program as it affects patients in state institutions is going to be solved forthwith or else. While the private institutions of this state are receiving their payments from the federal government the state institutions which are entitled to federal benefits are not getting the money."

Domenici specified Los Lunas Medical Center as an example. The center is part of the State Hospitals-Institutions Department complex.

## News and Notes

If your autumn meals have taken a turn for the ho-hum, they can be perked up with thrifty cuts of beef. New Mexico State University offers a publication to help you with your planning. The booklet called "Treats from Thrifty Cuts of Beef" gives buying suggestions, recipes and directions for cooking the less tender cuts of beef. It also discusses meat tenderizers and how they work. An alphabet of taste teasers is also included. The booklet is available at the County Extension Office.

Christmas giving is not too far away to start thinking of useful gifts. Is there anyone on your list who would welcome a basic cookbook? There are 10 very good suggestions outlined in the leaflet "Selecting a Basic Cookbook." This leaflet is a part of the Family Living series from the New Mexico State University and is also free for the asking at the County Extension Office.

Extension Clubs around the county have been active in many programs in the last several weeks. The Ama de Casa Club in the Ruidoso area, decorated a float for the Aspencade parade. The Carrizozo Junior Homemakers met to make tufted pillow tops and plan programs for the coming year. The Corona Extension Club will hold their regular monthly meeting on Oct. 22nd and discuss new Christmas ideas.

## Banks major lenders to N. M. ranchers

New Mexico banks remain a major source of credit and other financial services to farmers and ranchers, according to Johnson Stearns, President, Citizens State Bank, who represents the New Mexico Bankers' Association as Lincoln County Key Banker.

Based on the 28th annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural and Rural Affairs Committee of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Stearns reported that at the beginning of the year, New Mexico banks were helping farmers and ranchers with \$89 million in loans, 12 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$81 million in production loans and \$8 million in farm and ranch mortgages. At the same time, \$84 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies; \$58 million by Federal Land Banks; \$54 million by Production Credit Association; and \$8 million in non-real estate loans, plus \$1 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration.

ion. About 57 per cent of the non-real estate credit extended by lending institutions to New Mexico farmers and ranchers came from banks.

Mr. Stearns said that "bankers in New Mexico are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers and ranchers."

The increased use of credit by farmers, according to Mr. Stearns has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm and ranch families.

Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers and ranchers, contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm and ranch families have \$249 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 81 per cent of the total capital requirements of farmers and ranchers.

Mr. Stearns stressed the importance of farmers and ranchers and bankers working closely together to improve farm and ranch financial arrangements. He reported that nine out of ten insured banks throughout the country had agricultural loans outstanding, with nearly 94 per cent of the banks in New Mexico extending credit to farm and ranch people.

## Pritchett is S.S. Registrar

The selective service board has appointed Austin Pritchett of Ruidoso as an additional registrar for that area. He will be sworn in by the local clerk, Elizabeth Jackson.

Selective Service nationwide are destroying all records from 1922 to 1935. Original birth certificates and marriage licenses are being returned to owners by mail if address is known.

Regular board meeting will be on August 20 at 1 p.m. Anyone having business with the selective service board may meet with them at that time.

Call for September will be one for induction. The number remains 195.

## Ranchers do analysis of forage recommend

Alamogordo, New Mexico was the scene of a series of important meetings: 1) The annual meeting of the Public Lands Council, and 2) The mid-year meetings of ANCA's and the National Wool Grower's Public Lands and Forest Committees.

The groups analyzed the forage recommendations of the Public Land Law Review Commission report. Emphasis was placed on the matter of grazing fees with

the spotlight on the permit value factor, tenure and the new "dominant use theory." A legislative drafting committee has been formed to assist Tom Cavanaugh, general counsel of the Public Lands Council in formalizing legislative proposals which will be introduced to Congress in the beginning of next year. Committee members are Leonard Horn, Reuben Pankey, Joe Burke, Harry Lee, James Coughlin, Edwin Marsh and C. W. McMillan.

During the Public Lands Council's annual meeting, Harry Lee, San Mateo, N.M., was re-elected president and James Coughlin, Yarnell, Ariz., was elected VP. C. W. McMillan, ANCA, was re-elected secretary and Edwin Marsh, NWGA, Treasurer.

The Council realigned the composition of its executive committee by electing a member from each contributing state. Members of the executive committee are Coughlin, Arizona; John Weber, Calif.; Lawrence Phelps, Colo; Walter Little, Idaho; Lewis Archambeault, Mont.; Karl Weikel, Nev.; Lee, N.M.; Denny Jones, Ore.; Charles White, S.D.; Wesley Aagard, Utah; and Tye Moore, Wyo. North Dakota and Washington did not have representatives at the meeting but are being asked to submit nominations.

This group of over 70 ranchers had coffee at the Recreation Center in Carrizozo then went north for tour of the Bill Gallacher ranch.

### Act test given in ZoZo school

Students at Carrizozo High School (and neighboring communities if they desire) who are planning to attend college will have two opportunities to take the ACT Test Battery at Carrizozo during the 1970-71 school year.

The 1970-71 ACT test schedule (with registration periods in parenthesis) for Carrizozo is: Dec. 12 (Oct. 5 to Nov. 9); April 24 (Feb. 1 to March 22).

Students can obtain registration packets and other ACT information from Mrs. Emma Catherine Lawson, Carrizozo Guidance Counselor.

Last year nearly one million students in the U.S. and overseas wrote the five-part test, which is required or recommended for applicants at more than 1,800 colleges, universities, two-year colleges, scholarship agencies, and athletic conferences. It is required by almost all New Mexico Colleges.

The ACT Test Battery includes a series of tests designed to measure a student's ability to perform the kinds of intellectual tasks typically required of college students. Subjects covered are English, math, social studies, and natural sciences. Another part of the examination consists of questions about the student's academic and non-academic background, immediate plans for college, and career aspirations.

Fee for the test, which takes about 3-1/2 hours to complete, is \$6. Results are sent to colleges and other institutions designated by the students.

Mrs. Lawson recommended that students write the ACT test either late in their junior year or early in the senior year. This is to allow the students and their parents and counselors to make maximum use of the resulting ACT reports as valuable consulting tools in pre-college planning.

With national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa, ACT is a non-profit corporation that provides educational services for use by students and institutions of higher education in the United States and overseas.

## Tax rates for November Notices

Property tax rates for all taxing jurisdictions in Lincoln County shown below are the rates which will be used in computing tax notices which will be mailed to taxpayers in November.

Rates have been converted to dollars and cents per thousand dollars of assessed value. Assessment ratio is 33-1/3 percent of market value.

Under "other" levy is shown the Lincoln County hospital tax levy.

The school levy includes \$5 per thousand for the county school levy. Since this is distributed on the basis of total students within a county, the particular school district may receive a greater or lesser amount than the \$5 per thousand levy will produce.

The state relinquishes \$2.20 per thousand of its levy - 50¢ per thousand to the counties and \$1.70 per thousand to the schools.

## 65-day quail, chicken & pheasant season set

Santa Fe, N. M.—A 65 day continuous quail season was set last week by the New Mexico State Game Commission at its September meeting here.

The statewide season, which will run from Oct. 31 through Jan. 3, 1971, has a bag limit of 15 quail per day with 30 in possession, singly or in aggregate of all species. Legal shooting time is one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

In addition, the Commission approved the recommended seasons for prairie chickens and pheasants. Prairie chicken dates are Dec. 5 through Dec. 7 in the southeast portion of the state, with bag limit of three and possession limit of six birds. Legal shooting hours for prairie chicken and pheasants are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The pheasant season is Nov. 28 through Nov. 29 statewide, with a limit of two cocks per day.

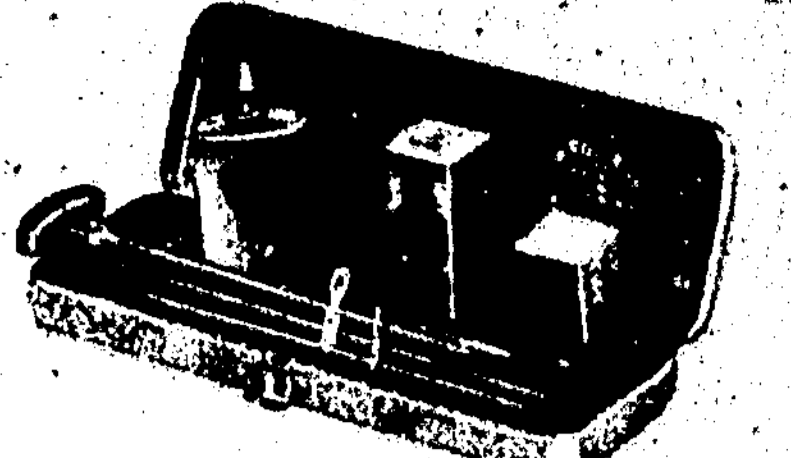
During the 65-day quail season, sections of the Bosque del Apache National Refuge will open to quail and rabbit hunting. Refuge land lying east of the Bureau of Reclamation channelization project and lands lying west of the AT&SF rail road right-of-way will be open.

The bag limit on all species quail season is the same as the one approved last year although the previous season was a long one, it was split by the big game seasons. This year, the season will continue through the big game seasons with the early opening giving hunters a chance to harvest some of the quail that are lost to natural mortality.

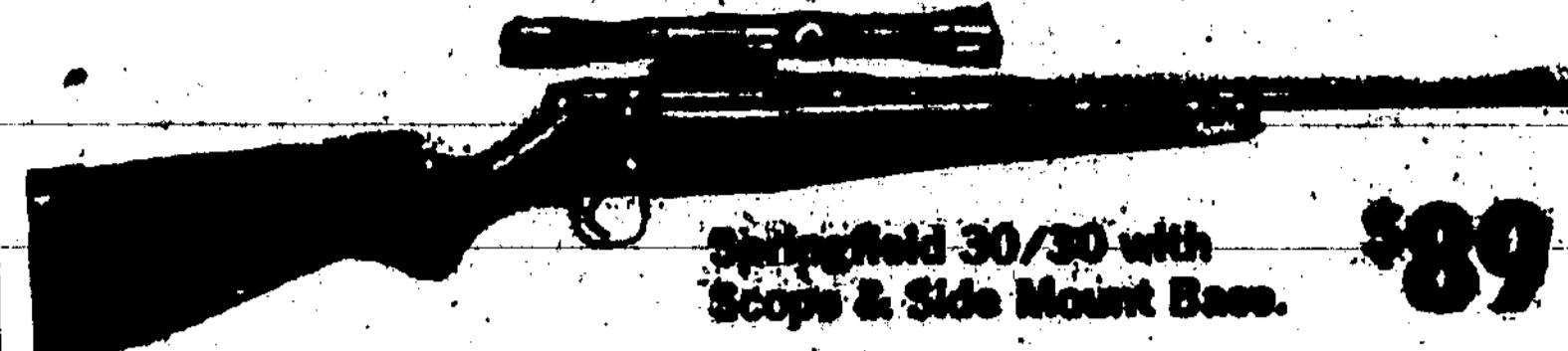

## Oddities in 1970 NM election handbook

A handbook on elections in New Mexico dating back to statehood, has been issued by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico. The

book is full of facts and figures, some of which voters will surely have forgotten, or never knew.

Item -- for the first twelve years following statehood control of the legislature was with the Republican party. Since that time Democrats have had control, in the 29th session there were 45 Dem. and 25 Rep. in the House, 25 Dem. and 17 Rep. in the Senate. Women have played quite a part in New Mexico legislature. Starting in 1953 Mrs. Wayne Bell served, and the last woman to serve was Mrs. Roy Wells in the 1959-64 term.

Lincoln County has its place in New Mexico history as the residence of our first governor, William C. McDonald. Governor McDonald was born at Jordanville, New York, of the state's several governors Ezequiel C. de Baca, Arthur Seligman, Edwin L. Mechem, John F. Simms R., were born in New Mexico. Both candidates in the present campaign are native born New Mexicans.

States supplying governors for New Mexico include: New York 2, Ohio 2, Chihuahua, Mexico 1, Kansas 4, Missouri 3, Tennessee 1, Pennsylvania 1, Texas 1, and Michigan 1.

Lincoln County voted Democratic five times in the governor race, in 1911, 22, 32, 40 and 54. Which means Lincoln voted Republican 23 times in the governor race.

New Mexico has always voted for the successful presidential candidate since statehood.

## Home rule

### law explained

A proposed constitutional amendment to allow the residents of New Mexico municipalities to exercise home-rule authority will appear on the November general election ballot. The "home rule" amendment, as it is commonly called, will appear as Constitutional Amendment Number 1 on the ballot.

Home rule is the power given to the residents of a city to govern themselves. Passage of the amendment will not automatically mean home rule for all municipalities in the state.

Before a city could exercise the power granted in the amendment, the residents would have to adopt a charter setting up the organization of their municipal government. This charter would impose limits of the government and would outline the duties of the government.

A constitutional amendment is necessary for the municipalities to have the power to exercise home rule authority. The present constitution allows municipalities to exercise only those duties specifically granted by the legislature.

Under home rule, a municipality would be able to exercise all powers not specifically prohibited by the constitution, the legislature or the charter.

Cities now have powers specifically granted to them. Home rule cities would have powers not specifically prohibited.

In 1969, the New Mexico Legislature passed a home rule amendment which was scheduled to go on the November 1970 ballot unless a new constitution was passed. The New Mexico Constitutional Convention met in the fall of 1969 and drafted a document which contained home rule authority, but the constitution was rejected by the voters at a December 1969 special election.

This year the legislature decided to withdraw the home rule amendment it had passed during the 1969 session. In its place, lawmakers passed a home rule amendment which was similar in most respects to the home rule provisions of the proposed constitution. This amendment must be approved by a majority of those voting on the amendment before it may become effective.

There are three major steps before home rule may be exercised by any municipality. The first is proposal of an amendment by the legislature. The second step is passage of the amendment by the voters of the state at the November election. The third step is adoption of a charter by the voters of a municipality.

The proposed amendment also contains a provision to allow districting for the election of members of local governing bodies. This districting authority, which could be exercised by home rule and non-home rule cities, will be discussed in a later article in this series.

## Merit scholarship competition schedule

Carrizozo High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1972 should register now to participate in the 1971-72 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal Gerald Lee announced today.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide Merit Scholarship competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST). The test will be given only once during this school year. Our school is scheduled to give the NMQST at 9:00 a.m., Tuesday, February 16, 1971.

NMQST participants pay a \$1.25 test fee. When the test is given on a Saturday the school may charge an additional fee of up to \$1.25 to cover administrative costs of testing on a nonschool day.

When his NMQST scores are reported, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him understand his scores and compare his test performance with that of other high school students across the country. The handbook, which contains information about making college choices and financing a college education, is furnished as part of reporting the student's test results. Other interpretive materials are sent to the school.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Merit Program Semi-finalists and, if they advance to Finalist standing, they will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration.

About 24,000 students have won Merit Scholarships in the fifteen Programs to date. Approximately 2975 new winners of Merit Scholarships entered college this fall.

## Hamilton attacks state drug abuse

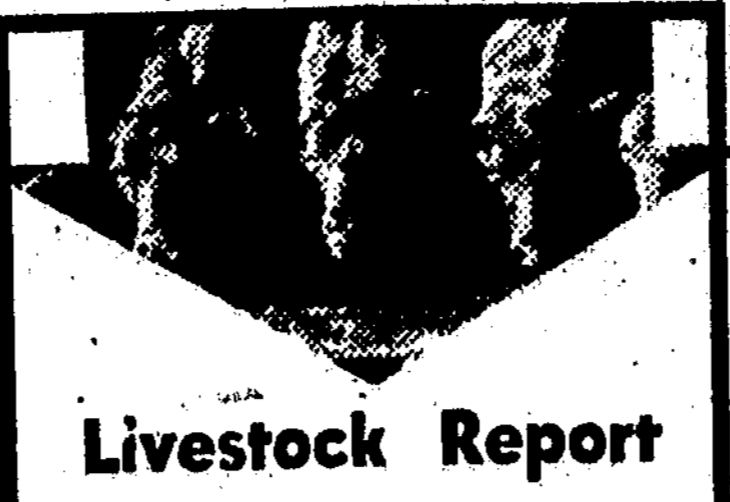
"Drug Abuse is rampant in New Mexico. This grave fact is our most pressing problem," according to Tom Hamilton, Democratic Candidate for State Senate, Post 23, representing Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Hamilton said, "While our State ranks 37th in population, it is tenth from the top in Drug Abuse." He went on, "The illicit distribution of drugs in New Mexico has reached a crisis proportion. If elected to the State Senate, I pledge to work tirelessly to correct this terrible situation."

Hamilton continued, "Personally, I feel we need much stronger penalties for illicit drug suppliers and pushers. We need to see that all segments of our population become better informed and educated on the consequences and dangers of drug addiction; and we need to increase the powers of our law enforcement agencies to efficiently deal with the problem."

Hamilton served as president of the New Mexico Pharmaceutical Association and is a member of that organization's Committee on Drug Abuse Education. The Alamogordo candidate said, "I feel that as a result of my professional training in pharmacy and particularly in pharmacology (the effect of drugs on the body), I can do an outstanding job in spearheading a campaign in the legislature which would be aimed at eradicating this terrible threat to our citizens, particularly our youth."

Hamilton said, "The penalty for supplying drugs should be so tough that pushers could not afford the risk." He pointed to the Lindberg Act and its effectiveness in curtailing kidnapping in the nation.



## Livestock Report

Futures traders are beginning to focus their interest on the USDA's quarterly cattle on feed report for 22 states which will be issued at 2 PM CDT on Thursday, October 15. As always with cattle on feed reports, opinions vary on what it will estimate. Recent figures indicating daily slaughter of cattle under federal inspection has ranged up to 126,000 head, leave the impression among a number of observers that the report will show substantial marketing during September. There is much less agreement on placement of feeder cattle during September.

The idea that placements will be up from 1969 is fostered by the estimate that the calf crop is up 2 percent from a year earlier. Also, reports for the six leading states and the 22 states indicated that placements were up six out of the last eight months. Only May and January showed decreases in placements. There are those also who think the doubt about the corn crop due to the blight may delay some buying by corn belt feeders, tending to reduce September placements. However, other observers feel placements during September may show little increase and possibly a decrease from a year earlier. They note that Southwestern feedlots are very current in their holdings of finished cattle and that their total inventory of cattle is far below capacity even though there has been little if any expansion in pen space during the past year.

Central market observers say they have been receiving less cattle weighing 500 to 800 than in other recent years. Two reasons are cited, 1) Southwestern feedlots have been buying light cattle all during 1970, reducing the number of yearling-type cattle available this fall; and 2) Feed supplies have been abundant in the Dakotas, Montana and Wyoming, allowing ranchers to hold their cattle longer. One rancher is reported to have harvested 24,000 calves of hay compared with about 16,000 in other recent years. Recent feeder reports indicate snow and colder weather has prompted movement of cattle down from the mountain areas, but it is reported that calves dominate these drives.

SCMRA Meeting at Ft. Stanton

The South Central Mountain Resource Area executive and steering committees will meet October 20 at Fort Stanton. The program will be presented by Miss Carole Gorney of New Mexico Hospitals and Institutions. A tour of Fort Stanton Hospital will be conducted at noon.

## More crayfish going to South Dakota lakes

Personnel from the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks are currently in New Mexico to get some more crayfish from Nogal Lake north of here.

The particular species of crayfish acts as a control on aquatic vegetation and South Dakota personnel took 5,000 of them last

fall for planting in some of their lakes in the Black Hills.

This year, the South Dakota personnel will be assisted by New Mexico Department of Game and Fish fisheries personnel in trapping the crawdads. At the same time, plans call for catching enough of the crayfish to also put them in New Mexico's McGaffey, Laguna Larga and San Gregorio lakes, where aquatic vegetation problem exist.

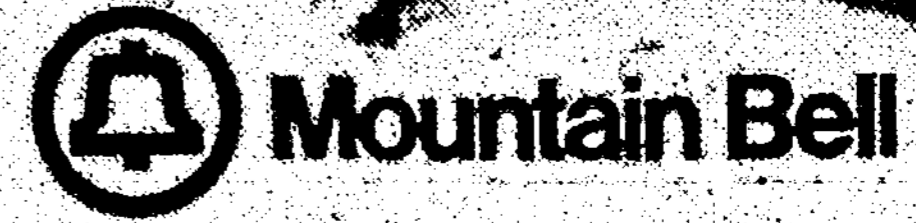


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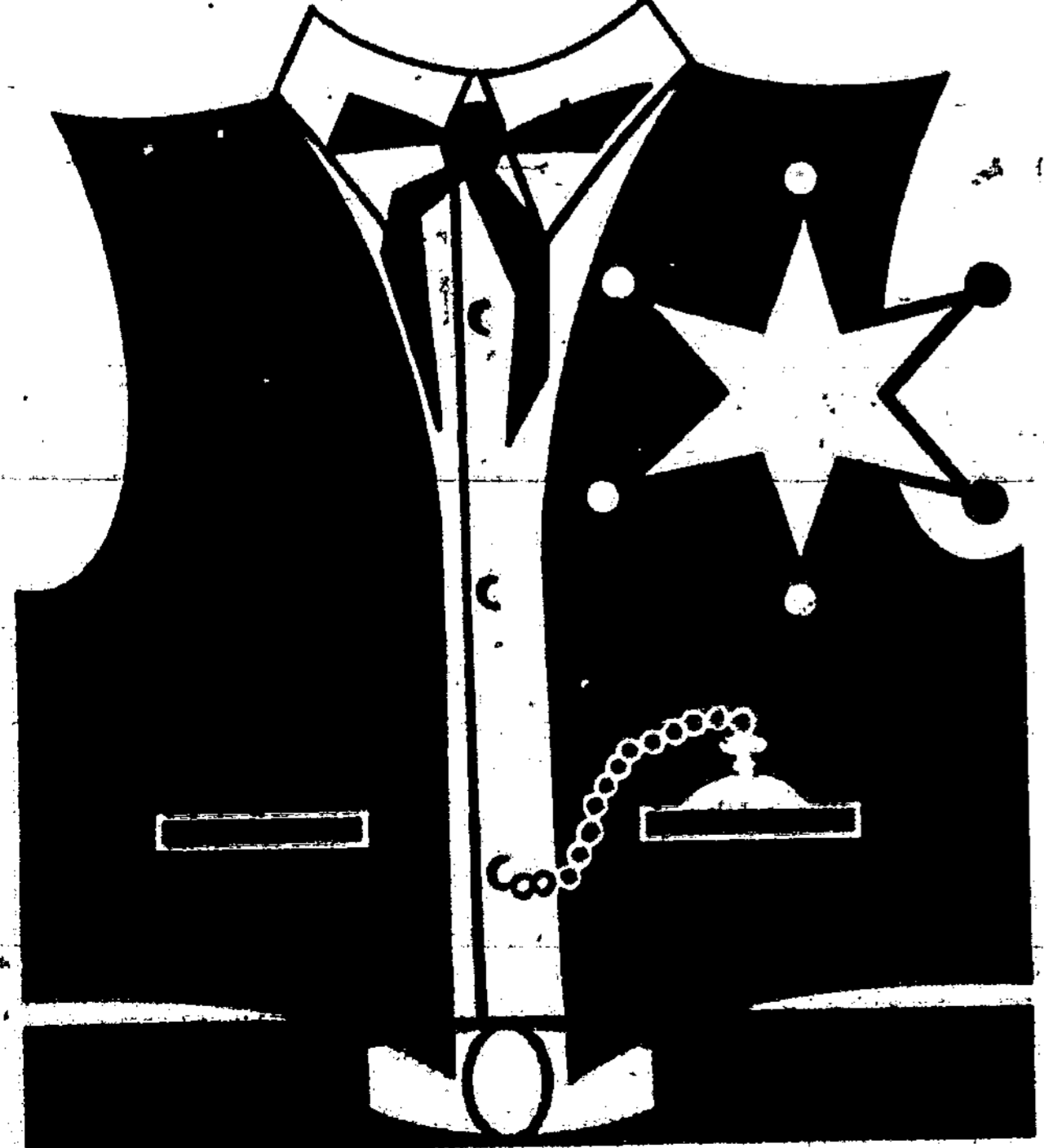

Constitutional Amendment I  
**HOUSE PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 14**

29th LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - 2nd SESSION, 1970

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 6 TO PROVIDE FOR MUNICIPAL HOME RULE.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 10 of the constitution of New Mexico by adding a new Section 6 to read: "A. For the purpose of electing some or all of the members of the governing body of a municipality:

- (1) the legislature may authorize a municipality by general law to be districted;
- (2) if districts have not been established as authorized by law, the governing body of a municipality may, by resolution, authorize the districting of the municipality. The resolution shall not become effective in the municipality until approved by a majority vote in the municipality; and
- (3) if districts have not been established as authorized by law or by resolution, the voters of a municipality, by a petition which is signed by not less than five percent of the registered qualified electors of the municipality and which specifies the number of members of the governing body to be elected from districts, may require the governing body to submit to the registered qualified electors of the municipality, at the next regular municipal election held not less than sixty days after the petition is filed, a resolution requiring the districting of the municipality by its governing body. The resolution shall not become effective in the municipality until approved by a majority vote in the municipality. The signatures for a petition shall be collected within a six-months period.

B. Any member of the governing body of a municipality representing a district shall be a resident of, and elected by, the registered qualified electors of that district.

C. The registered qualified electors of a municipality may adopt, amend or repeal a charter in the manner provided by law. In the absence of law, the governing body of a municipality may appoint a charter commission upon its own initiative or shall appoint a charter commission upon the filing of a petition containing the signatures of at least five percent of the registered qualified electors of the municipality. The charter commission shall consist of not less than seven members who shall draft a proposed charter. The proposed charter shall be submitted to the registered qualified electors of the municipality within one year after the appointment of the charter commission. If the charter is approved by a majority vote in the municipality, it shall become effective at the time and in the manner provided in the charter.

D. A municipality which adopts a charter may exercise all legislative powers and perform all functions not expressly denied by general law or charter. This grant of powers shall not include the power to enact private or civil laws governing civil relationships except as incident to the exercise of an independent municipal power, nor shall it include the power to provide for a penalty greater than the penalty provided for a petty misdemeanor. No tax imposed by the governing body of a charter municipality, except a tax authorized by general law, shall become effective until approved by a majority vote in the charter municipality.

E. The purpose of this section is to provide for maximum local self-government. A liberal construction shall be given to the powers of municipalities."

Section 2. Constitutional Amendment No. 4 proposed by the first regular session of the twenty-ninth legislature is withdrawn from submission to the people, and the secretary of state is directed not to place the proposal on the ballot.

Section 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 15**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING ARTICLE 7 AND ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE 7 PERTAINING TO THE ELECTIVE FRANCHISE.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 7 and adopting a new Article 7 to read: "Section 1. Every citizen of the United States who has attained the age of twenty-one years, who has resided in New Mexico at least twelve months and in the county ninety days next preceding the election and who meets the requirements of local residence provided by law is a qualified elector and may vote in all elections except as may be otherwise provided in this constitution. Residence requirements for United States presidential elections may be provided by law.

Section 2. The legislature shall provide for the registration of qualified electors as a requisite for voting. No person shall register or vote who has been convicted of a felony within the United States unless his civil rights have been legally restored. No person shall register or vote who has been judicially determined to be incompetent because of mental illness unless the incompetency has been legally removed.

Section 3. The legislature shall provide for absentee voting. The place and method of voting and the administration of all elections shall be provided by law. The legislature shall enact laws to secure the secrecy of the ballot and purity and fairness of elections, and to guard against abuse of the elective franchise.

Section 4. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes for any office shall be declared elected to that office. The joint candidates receiving the highest number of votes for the offices of governor and lieutenant governor shall be declared elected to those offices.

Section 5. Election results shall be canvassed and certified, and election contests determined as provided by law.

Section 6. General elections shall be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year.

Section 7. Elections held in the political subdivisions of this state, excluding elections for county officers, shall be held at times other than general or other statewide elections.

Section 8. Boards of registration and boards judging elections of county officers and general or other statewide elections shall include members of more than one political party and shall be constituted as provided by law.

Section 9. A. Every citizen of the United States who is a legal resident of the state and is a registered qualified elector of the state, is qualified to hold any public office

except as otherwise provided in this constitution.

B. The legislature may provide by law for such qualifications and standards as may be necessary for holding an appointive position by any public officer or employee.

C. The right to hold public office in New Mexico shall not be denied or abridged on account of sex, and whenever masculine gender is used in this constitution, in defining the qualifications for specific offices, it shall be construed to include the feminine gender.

Section 10. The right of any citizen of the state to vote, hold office or sit upon juries shall never be restricted, abridged or impaired on account of religion, race, language or color, or inability to speak, read or write the English or Spanish languages except as may be otherwise provided in this constitution.

Section 11. No person shall be deemed to have acquired or lost residence by reason of his presence or absence while employed in the service of the United States or of the state, nor while a student at any school."

Section 12. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 7**  
**LAW 1970**

**29th LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - 2nd SESSION, 1970**

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO PERTAINING TO STATE EXECUTIVE OFFICERS AND THEIR TERMS OF OFFICE.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read: "The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands, who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of four years beginning on the first day of January next after their election. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected jointly by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices.

Such officers shall, after having served one term, be ineligible to hold any state office until one full term has intervened, except that the lieutenant governor may be eligible to hold the office of the governor.

The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government.

Upon the adoption of this amendment by the people, the terms provided for in this section shall apply to those officers elected at the general election in 1970 and all state executive officers elected thereafter. Provided, no person who has been elected to a state executive office prior to the adoption of this amendment for two successive terms shall again be eligible to hold the same office unless one full term has intervened; provided, further, the commissioner of public lands, the attorney general and state treasurer, elected to a two-year

term in 1968, are eligible to hold the office of commissioner of public lands, the attorney general or the state treasurer, respectively, for one four-year term following his present term, but thereafter shall not again be eligible to hold the office of commissioner of public lands, attorney general or state treasurer, respectively, until one full term has intervened."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 3**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING SECTION 4 TO ELIMINATE THE STATE LEVY FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL FUND.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12 of the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Section 4.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 5**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT OF ARTICLE 19 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING SECTION 5 PERTAINING TO RESTRICTIONS ON AMENDMENT OF SECTION 1, ARTICLE 19.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 19 of the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Section 5.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6**

**HOUSE FLOOR SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 13**

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 13 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR THE REMOVAL OF MEMBERS OF BOARDS OF REGENTS OF STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 13 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. The legislature shall provide for the control and management of state educational institutions by a board of regents for each institution, consisting of five members, who are qualified electors of New Mexico. No more than three members of each board of regents, at the time of their appointment, shall be members of the same political party. The governor shall, with the consent of the senate, appoint the members of each board of regents for staggered terms of six years or less so that no more than two terms expire in any one year.

B. Members of boards of regents shall not be removed from office except for financial conflict of interest, incompetence, neglect of duty, malfeasance in office or as otherwise provided by law. Removal proceedings may be initiated by the governor or by a two-thirds majority vote of all the members of the senate. No member shall be removed without notice of hearing and an opportunity to be heard having first been given the member under rules promulgated by the supreme court. The supreme court has exclusive original jurisdiction over proceedings to remove members of a board of regents."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 23**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 14 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW ESTABLISHMENT OF STUDENT LOAN PROGRAMS BY THE STATE.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 14 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Neither the state, nor any county, school district or municipality, except as otherwise provided in this constitution, shall directly or indirectly lend or pledge its credit, or make any donation to or in aid of any person, association or public or private corporation, or in aid of any private enterprise for the construction of any railroad; provided, nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the state or any county or municipality from making provision for the care and maintenance of sick and indigent persons, nor shall it prohibit the state from establishing student loan programs for post-secondary students at educational institutions under the exclusive control of the state."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 8**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 16**  
**29th LEGISLATURE - STATE OF NEW MEXICO - 2nd SESSION, 1970**

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY REPEALING ARTICLE 8 AND ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE 8 PERTAINING TO TAXATION AND REVENUE.**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend the constitution of New Mexico by repealing Article 8 and adopting a new Article 8 to read:

"Section 1. As used in Sections 1 and 2 of this article:

- A. "property" means tangible property;
- B. "assessed value" means the proportion of taxable value to which property tax rates are applied to compute the property tax;
- C. "taxable value" means the value of property for property taxation; and
- D. "qualified voter" means a registered qualified elector who owns property that is subject to property tax.

Section 2. A. Different methods for valuing different kinds of property may be authorized by law. The percentage used to determine assessed value shall be provided by law, shall be uniform on all property and shall not exceed thirty-three and one-third percent of taxable value.

B. Property taxes may not exceed twenty mills annually on each dollar of assessed value. However, the twenty-mill limit does not apply to:

- (1) property taxes for special purposes on specific kinds of property;
- (2) property taxes for public debt; and
- (3) property taxes authorized by law and approved by a majority vote of the qualified voters of the taxing district voting on the proposition. The manner in which the twenty mill is allocated to the taxing districts shall be authorized by law.

C. Property tax exemptions may be provided by law if approved by two-thirds vote of all the members of each house of the legislature. However, personal property exemptions may be provided by law if approved by a majority vote of all the members elected to each house of the legislature. Property tax exemptions existing upon the date of the adoption of this amendment remain in effect. Property tax exemptions, including exemptions existing on the date of the adoption of this amendment, may be repealed by law if approved by three-fifths vote of all the members elected to each house of the legislature.

D. In addition to such property tax exemptions as may be provided by law, the legislature may exempt from taxation:

- (1) the property of each head of the family to the amount of six hundred dollars (\$600);
- (2) the property, including the community or joint property of husband and wife, of every honorably discharged member of the armed forces of this country who served during any period of armed conflict under the orders of the president of the United States, or the widow of such honorably discharged serviceman, in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000); and

(3) the property of the United States, the state or its political subdivisions, community ditches and the laterals thereof, churches, all property used for educational or charitable purposes and all cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit; provided, however, that any property acquired by churches, community ditches,

property acquired and used for educational or charitable purposes, and property acquired by cemeteries not used or held for private or corporate profit, where such property was, prior to such transfer, subject to the lien of any tax or assessment for the principal or interest of any bonded indebtedness shall not be exempt from such lien, nor from the payment of such taxes or assessments.

Section 3. All public money not invested shall be deposited in national banks in this state, in banks or trust companies incorporated under the laws of this state, or in savings and loan associations in this state whose deposits are insured by agency of the United States. The interest from the deposits shall be applied as provided by law. The conditions of these deposits shall be provided by law. All public money, other than state permanent trust funds and public personnel retirement trust funds, if invested, shall be invested in interest-bearing securities. State permanent trust funds shall be invested as provided by this constitution. Public personnel retirement trust funds shall be invested as provided by law.

Section 4. Any public officer making any profit out of public moneys or using the same for any purpose not authorized by law, is guilty of a felony and shall be punished as provided by law and shall be disqualified to hold public office.

Section 5. No execution shall issue upon any judgment rendered against the governing board of any political subdivision or against any officer of any political subdivision upon any judgment recovered against him in his official capacity and for which the political subdivision is liable, but the same shall be paid out of the proceeds of a tax levy as other liabilities of political subdivisions and, when so collected, shall be paid by the county treasurer to the judgment creditor.

Section 6. Bonds of the state, a political subdivision or its dependent district and the income from the bonds are exempt from taxation."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

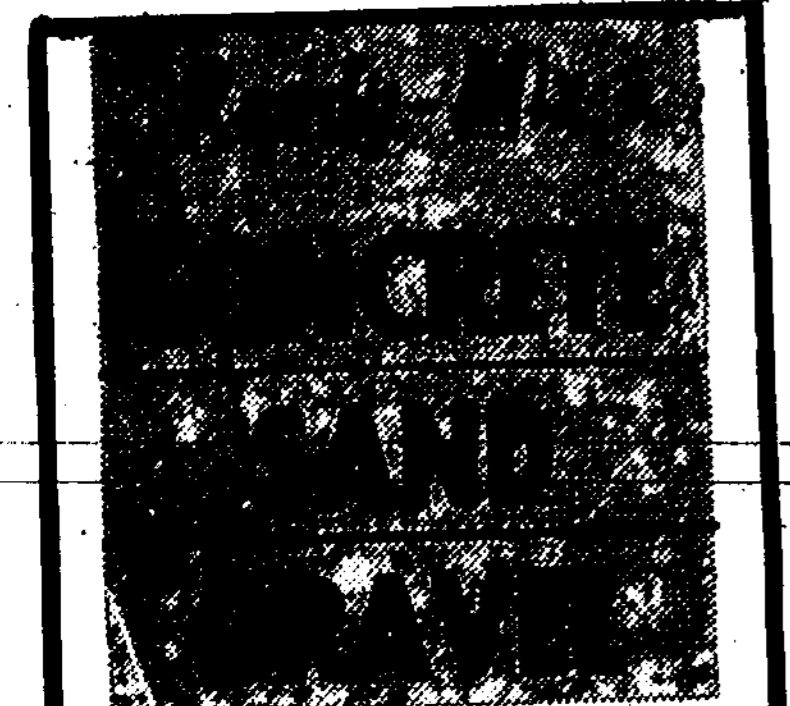

The Carrizozo Grizzlies play

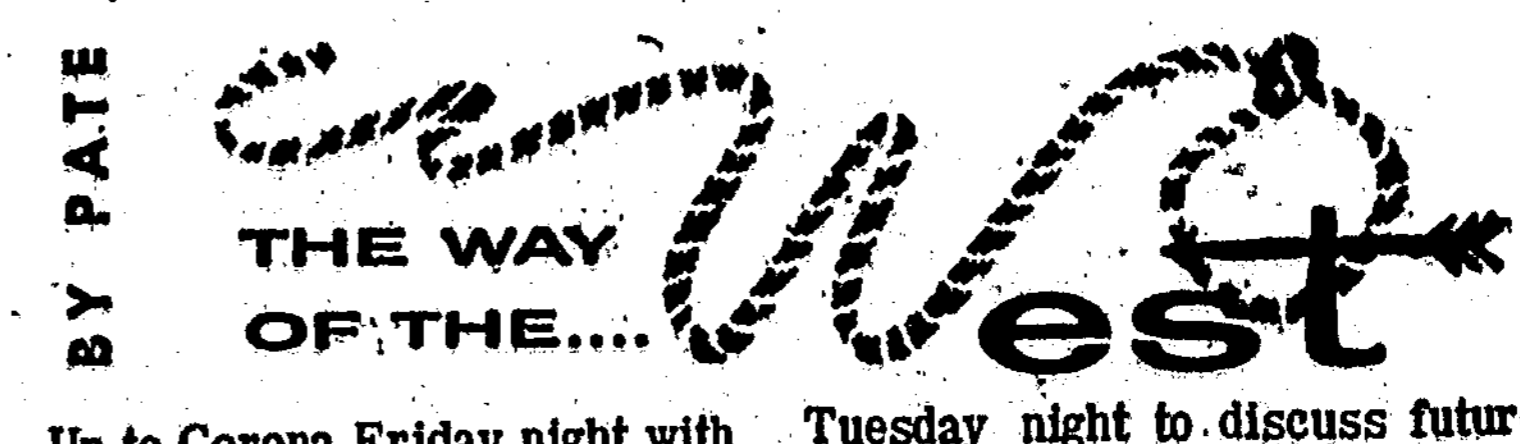

 not have the horses to win.

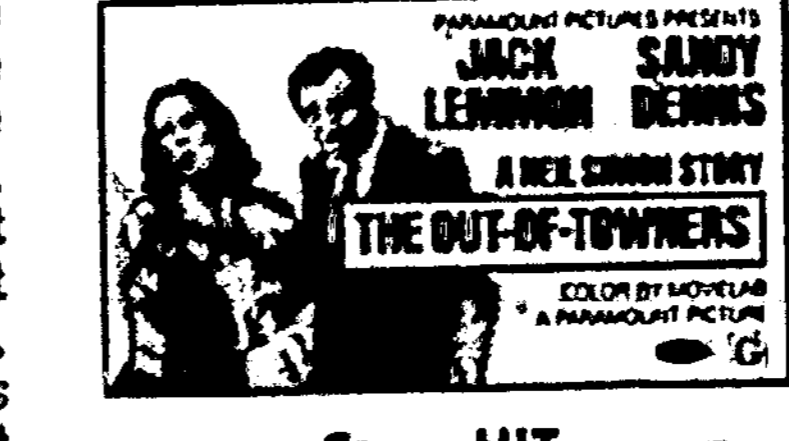
The Corona Cardinal band,
