The questionaire filled out by 55 people representing all parts of Carrizozo was felt to be an accurate summary of conditions here with only a few minor exceptions.

In answer to the question "Do you consider yours a town with a future" 51 percent answered "no," 47 percent answered "yes." The group at the meeting did not entirely agree with these answers, being more inclined to think that the future of Carrizozo is what people make of it.

Another interesting conclusion reached was that Carrizozo has experienced much growth and improvement, such as new courthouse, postoffice, airport, recreation center, swimming pool, parks, school additions, hospital, improvement, new Church, and other improvements in the past ten years -- during which time the town declined 27 percent-plus in population, around 500 people, so that business conditions in town are the worst they have been in ten years.

In answer to the first question which reads: "If you were a stranger passing through your town for the first time, would you say that its general appearance is: good, fair, poor," the answers were 12 percent good, 58 percent fair and 30 percent poor. People at the meeting concluded that this was the area of primary importance to the future of Carrizozo and that they should start trying to improve

Four Corners \$35787 grant for Zozo airport

Governor David F. Cargo announced this week that he has approved and authorized the State Planning Office to endorse Four Corner Regional Commission supplemental grant in the amount of \$35,787 requested by the Town of Carrizozo.

Juniversities Study Committee headed by Sen. I.M. (Ike) Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra Counties, would center more authority in the University of New Mexico president.

The committee recommended UNM regents withdraw authority now delegated to faculty and students and reassign it to the president. Rep. Richard Carbajal, Belen Democrat, is on the legislative committee.

-After long study the panel called for creation of a UNM faculty senate, a policy to refuse admission to students suspended by another university and quick action to recover damages when UNM property is damaged.

The committee also proposed revision of faculty contracts stating ground to fire faculty members and a definite salary and promotion policy. The committee said the 580-member UNM faculty is too big to conduct business effectively. It said the present faculty-promotion policy is inconsistent

The panel was told earlier the loss totaled \$7,000 in property damage and thefts last May in occupancy of the UNM Student Union Building during a 5-day strike. The report said most UNM regents "have abdicated their responsibility." Committee recommendations will be shaped into bills for the 1971 Legislature unless changes can be effected by administrative rule.

The committee's proposed Constitutional Amendment 6 to broaden grounds for removal of state universities' regents was rejected, 73,190 to 54,737, by

voters November 3. U.N.M. President Ferrel Heady student leaders and some faculty members soundly whacked the committee's new recommendations on UNM

People think Carrizozo is worth working for

The town meeting held Monday in city hall was attended by good group of interested people who spent more than two hours discussing past, present and future of Carrizozo and made the decision at the end of the meeting to start work now, aiming for a July '71 goal, to improve the looks of Carrizozo as the one factor that needs immediate attention in an attempt to stop the continuous loss of population

The meeting was conducted by

Jerry Baker, from New Mexico Department of Development assisted by Don Montoya. The group at the meeting included Richard Coca, Joe Ortiz, T. B. Smoot, Mrs. C. A. Snow, Mrs. W.F. Hayes, Mrs E.M. Campbell, Mrs. Karen Currie, Mrs. James Steinepreis, Mrs. Bill Payne, Fred English, Vernon Petty, Wm A. Dunbar, C.E. Burns, Ralph Dunlap and Paul Payton, Fred English was elected chairman.

The next meeting date has been set for December 8 at 7:30 in

the city hall. Plans for future action will be worked on at that time. The questionaire filled out by 55 people representing all parts of Carrizozo was felt to be an accurate summary of conditions. here with only a few minor exceptions.

> In answer to the question "Do you consider yours a town with a future" 51 percent answered "no," 47 percent answered "yes." The group at the meeting did not entirely agree with these answers, being more inclined to think that the future of Carrizozo is what people make of it.

> Another interesting conclusion reached was that Carrizozo has experienced much growth and improvement, such as new courthouse, postoffice, airport, recreation center, swimming pool, parks, school additions, hospital, improvement, new church, and other improvements in the past ten years -- during which time the town declined 27 percent-plus in population, around 500 people, so that business conditions in town are the worst they have been in ten years.

In answer to the first question which reads: "If you were a stranger passing through your town for the first time, would you say that its general appearance is: good, fair, poor," the answers were 12 percent good, 58 percent fair and 30 percent president. poor. People at the meeting concluded that this was the area of primary importance to the future of Carrizozo and that they should start trying to improve the appearance of the town.

SANTA FE -- The Legislative Universities Study Committee headed by Sen. I.M. (Ike) Smalley. D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra Counties, would center more authority in the University of New Mexico

The committee recommended UNM regents withdraw authority onow delegated to faculty and students and reassign it to the president, Rep. Richard Carbajal, Belen Democrat, is on the legislative committee.

After long study the panel called for creation of a UNM faculty senate, a policy to refuse admission to students suspended by another university and quick action to recover damages when UNM property is damaged. . . .

The committee also proposed revision of faculty contracts stating ground to fire faculty members and a definite salary and promotion policy. The committee said the 580-member UNM faculty is too big to conduct business effectively. It said the present faculty-promotion policy is inconsistent.

The panel was told earlier the loss totaled \$7,000 in property damage and thefts last May in occupancy of the UNM Student Union Building during a 5-day strike. The report said most UNM regents "have abdicated their responsibility." Committee re-.commendations will be shaped into bills for the 1971 Legislature unless changes can be effected by administrative rule.

The committee's proposed Constitutional Amendment 6 to broaden grounds for removal of state universities' regents was rejected, 73,190 to 54,737, by Voters November 3.


People pickup will start immediately
