## Driver killed in wreck south of Corona



L. A. Campbell, age 25 of Portales, was driving truck loaded with 134 head of cattle going north on US54 January 15 and apparently came off the hill a tenth mile south of Corona too fast and possibly his load shifted which caused the truck to lay over on its right side.

Campbell was crushed in the cab and pronounced dead on arrival by Wooten ambulance at the Carrizozo hospital. The accident occurred at 1:00 a.m. The body was returned to Portales for burial.

A total of 21 cattle were lost in the wreck.

The investigation was made by State Policeman Albert Clouse.

### DEER CAUSES WRECK OF LUMBER TRUCK

Floyd Richey of Eagle, Texas, was herding a load of lumber going north on US54 January 21 when a deer jumped out in front of the truck and in swerving to avoid the deer the lumber truck turned spilling lumber all over the area but doing no damage to the driver.

The accident happened at 6:00 a.m. 16 miles north of Carrizozo. Investigation was made by State Policeman Robert Watson. The lumber was from Alamogordo.

## Stearns files for mayor

Mayor Johnson S. Stearns, 53, has filed as a candidate for reelection for a two year term as mayor in the March 3 municipal election here.

Mayor Stearns filed his declaration of candidacy at 2:25 p.m. Monday in the office of Nellie Baker, town clerk.

There are two positions to be filled by the spring elections in this Lincoln County community. Mayor for two year term, two councilman positions for a four year term each and municipal judge for a two year term.

The only other filed candidate for any of the offices to date is Bill G. Payne for municipal judge.


Stearns will be seeking his second consecutive term as mayor. He was first elected to the post in 1968.

"I am vitally interested in the welfare of the Carrizozo people. I feel that every individual should serve his community and this is the way that I think I can best serve my community," Stearns said in filing his candidacy.

Stearns' first elective position was in 1958 to the Carrizozo School board, where he served as president for six years.

Listed among the mayor's various current community activities are secretary of the board of the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo; secretary of Nogal Mesa Ranchman's Camp Meeting; supervisor of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation.



**Travels with Joy Berlemann in Korea**

It is time to travel further into Korea with Mrs. U. S. Savings Bond - Mrs. Joy Berlemann. Saturday, Well, I awoke about 4:00 a.m. again this morning and was dismayed to see more snow coming down. It was beautiful but meant that we would likely be grounded and not get up to the 2nd Infantry Division at the DMZ since that would require travel by chopper. By 7:15 when we again joined Lew and Dick at the USOM Club for breakfast, the snow had stopped so our hopes were up again but no, during the meal, the snow started again and soon Lt. Col. Hawkins received the phone call which told us we would go only to the 7th Division and by sedan. Well, this sedan trip gave us a chance to see the country side from the ground, a 45 minute trip took an hour and a half. We arrived at the 7th Infantry Division and visited with Major General Smith, Commanding General, 7th Infantry Division. As we were preparing to leave and rush back to Seoul by sedan, someone said, 'Wait a minute', we got word a chopper is coming to pick you up. This gave us time to visit the 8th U.S. Army NCO Academy.

I spoke to the 40 to 50 students, then we all had time for a cup of coffee with the Academy Commandant, Lt. Neely. It was inspiring to talk to someone so intensely enthusiastic about his job of training the "backbone of the Army".

We again boarded the helicopter and were off to the 4th Brigade 2nd Infantry Division where I was to make the presentation of the 2nd and 3rd Year Secretary of the Army Savings Awards to Lt. Col. Tharp, Commanding Officer, 3rd Battalion, 23rd Infantry. After the awards were made, I spoke informally to the men assembled there, we all had cake and then the Keeley's, Lt. Com. Asche, and I were bundled up in flak jackets, "pot" helmets, placed in open jeeps and driven through axle-deep red mud and snow up to the fence at the DMZ. We were quite a procession, gun jeep with three men and a mounted machine gun led us out, then Col. Tharp and I were in the second jeep, with three jeeps behind us, one for each, Jerry, Ursula, and Dick Asche. Each jeep had a driver (armed) and an escort who was armed. In my case, Col. Tharp and I were joined by a Captain who rode shotgun and armed driver. The Col. commented that he had not had so much protection for a two star general who had visited there the previous week. As we drove toward the fence, we passed the "Weapon light line". At this point, all the men placed loaded clips in their weapons and had it been night, the drivers would have blacked out the lights.

Now that is an experience and that really makes you think -- even if you had not thought while being outfitted in a flak jacket and pot helmet.

We have only enough of this trip for another issue. To me, it is of great interest and I sincerely hope everyone who knows Joy can feel every minute of her trip. The joy, anxiety and all. She is still on trips and doing grand work.

Those attending from Corona besides the family were, Mrs. Gertrude Allen, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil McCord.

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

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## 14 projects going on range at end of 1969

Fourteen Army construction projects costing a total of \$3.5 million were underway in all parts of White Sands Missile Range at the end of 1969, according to a year-end status report issued this week.  
Construction contractors from New Mexico, Texas, California and Massachusetts are carrying out the building program. The largest single contract amount is \$1,274,280, while the smallest is \$18,844.  
Four new facilities -- a ware house, a maintenance building, a service station and a shop with paint-spraying facility -- are being erected in the West Area of Holloman Air Force Base. Two sheet metal buildings are being erected in the North Area of HAFB.

The second largest contract, totaling \$771,200, was awarded last April to the Burn Construction Co. of Las Cruces. Listed as Schedule A of the Phase II Range Facilities Program, this job calls for construction of 56 instrumentation sites in widely scattered and remote areas of the range. Complete with gravel access roads and concrete pads, the sites will be used for mobile cinetheodolites and tracking telescopes.  
Third largest job, at \$266,931, consists of building and installing two water desalination plants at Stallion Range Center. The contract was awarded last March to Ionics, Inc., of Watertown, Mass. This project is 98 percent complete, with final completion scheduled next month.

The Burn Construction Co. of Las Cruces has a \$249,705 contract for miscellaneous projects making up Phase III of the Range Facilities Program. These projects include a masonry addition to the King-I control center at Holloman, to be used for communications facilities; a frequency monitoring station at Jess Site, just north of the Small Missile Range; a masonry addition to Building 21235 in the Nuclear Effects Laboratory complex; a tracking station at Ruth Site, in the southeast corner of the range; a tracking station at Rita Site, south of Oscura Range Camp, and a tracking station at Rob Site, approximately 20 miles south of Stallion Range Center.

Another job being carried out by Burn Construction Co., at a cost of \$175,351, is listed as Schedule A of the Stallion Range Center water supply project. It calls for building two pump houses and four oxidation ponds providing and installing two pumps, and supplying and installing connecting water mains and lines. Eighty-five percent complete, this project is on schedule.

The Pittsburgh - Des Moines Steel Co., Santa Clara, Calif., has a \$61,300 contract for Schedule C -- building and installing an elevated 100,000 gallon water storage tank at Stallion. This portion of the water project is 99 percent completed.  
Largest of the 1970 jobs, at \$231,900, will provide launch facilities at Launch Complex 38 for the SAM-D (Surface-to-Air

Missile -- Development) missile test program. The contractor is John R. Lavis of El Paso. The job is 10 percent complete, with final completion set for August 16, 1970.

Other 1970 projects include a road paving job at Stallion Range Center, reroofing a missile assembly building (1538) in the Technical Area, and two separate contracts involving repairs and replacements of heating and air conditioning systems in 79 buildings in all parts of the main post area and Technical Area.



Ewe feeding is most critical during the last four to six weeks before the lambs are dropped. The unborn lamb makes its most rapid growth and about 60 percent of its total growth during this period. At this point the energy requirements of the ewe go beyond what she gets from a ration of alfalfa hay alone.

Farm flock owners should begin feeding a concentrate feed--such as milo, corn, oats or barley during this period starting with two-tenths of a pound per day and increasing steadily so that by lambing time the ewe is getting one-half to one pound of grain per day. The exact starting time and the amount fed will depend on the condition of the ewe. This feeding program will also help prevent ketosis or pregnancy disease.

Ketosis is a nutritional disease. It usually occurs when the feed cannot furnish as much energy as the body needs to meet requirements during the periods of stress. At this point the animal draws on body fat to supply the energy requirements. An incomplete break down of body fat causes formation of Ketones which in turn depress the appetite.

Under any circumstances watch the flock closely for early symptoms -- loss of appetite, weak animals that lie around, gnashing teeth. There may be temporary blindness or breath may smell like acetone. A cup of molasses or glycerol diluted with a cup of warm water and given orally will sometimes bring relief if the condition is found in time. However, the disease is usually fatal, and prevention by proper feeding is much simpler and more economical.

Air time will be 11:30 a. m. with Mrs. Ladonna Robson, Extension Information agent, as hostess. Guests from outside Extension, as well as specialists of the Cooperative Extension Service at New Mexico State University will make appearances. The 30 minute program may also be seen at 8:30 a. m. Sundays on KRDD-TV El Paso, Texas. Subjects ranging from the pruning of trees, to the preparation of nutritious meals, to money management, to entertaining projects for the younger set, will be aired on the new series.

Powdery mildew, which was prevalent on most home gardeners' vegetable and ornamental plants last year, can be largely avoided by using resistant varieties. Some gardeners have given up growing zinnias because their leaves become covered each year with the powdery, flourlike growth of the mildew fungus. Rose lovers are also plagued with this disease. In fact, some of our most popular ornamental and vegetable plants are attacked by it each year. Mildew can be controlled by continually using fungicides such as Acti-dione PM, sulfur and Karathane, but the easiest method of control is through the use of resistant varieties.

Powdery mildew resistant climbing rose varieties include Red Radiance, Summer Snow, Blaze and Paul's Scarlet. Bush roses resistant to mildew include Sutter's Gold, Helen Traubel, Etoile De Holland, Lowell Thomas and Carrousel. Most seed catalogues list varieties resistant to mildew. These resistant varieties should definitely be planted in areas where the disease has been severe.

A few minutes of rest before meal time will get a child in a more relaxed mood to eat if they have been playing hard. Plan bright, colorful foods to eat. Give your child a variety of textures in foods -- chewy meats, crunchy cereals, crisp fruits and vegetables and smooth soft puddings. 
# Lincoln County Property Owners





## Blue Ribbon City competition open

Twenty-two New Mexico communities have responded to an invitation to participate in a "Blue Ribbon City" competition to select the community that is making the most of its tourist, industrial and liveability potential.

The competition, which will culminate next fall with the selection of the "Blue Ribbon City" for 1970, was initiated by the New Mexico Department of Development in cooperation with six development-oriented organizations.

"We've already sent out invitations to every incorporated city, town and village in New Mexico," Gordon Byrd of DOD said. "So far 22 have responded indicating a willingness to participate."

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## Bank Group Lists Gains During '69

ALAMOGORDO -- Banks fully integrated into the Bank Securities chain enjoyed a growth of 7.4 per cent in resources during the 1969 calendar year. It was disclosed this week in annual statements published by Bank Securities, Inc.

Combined resources of the four banks totaled \$45,610,092 at the close of 1969 as compared with \$42,359,400 a year earlier.

THE FOUR banks are Security Bank & Trust of Alamogordo; Citizens State Bank of Vaughn, Carrizozo and Estancia; First State Bank of Cuba, Bernillo and Corrales; and American Bank of Carlsbad. The majority stock of each is held by Bank Securities, Inc., which was certified as a registered bank holding company last February by the Federal Reserve Board of Governors.

Combined deposits of the four banks as of Dec. 31 totaled \$41,980,501, up 6.9 per cent from a total of \$39,257,489 a year earlier. Their portfolios of loans totaled \$23,487,618, up 17.5 per cent from \$20,042,708 a year earlier.

Assets of the bank holding company itself jumped from \$702,350 on Dec. 31, 1968, to \$5,066,904 as of Dec. 31, 1969. The pro forma statement of Bank Securities, Inc., for Dec. 31, 1969 -- showing how the end-of-year statement would have looked had the individual banks been fully integrated into the holding company at that time -- projected total assets of \$2,895,233.

THE BULK of the assets reported at the close of 1969 was in the form of capital stocks and debentures of the four member

## Lewis Merritt reviews past accomplishments

Ralph Petty, Representative from Lincoln County, made the trip down to Roswell last week to hear Supervisors from the Macho - Roswell Soil and Water Conservation District point out the impact of the conservation dollar on the economy. Chaves County legislators, Commissioners, Chamber of Commerce officials and other interested persons listened as Lewis Merritt, speaking for the supervisors, reviewed the accomplishments for the past year and thanked those present for their support of the District's program. Bill Atkinson, Project Conservatorist, using visual aids, showed how money spent for conservation projects mushrooms throughout the District for equipment, labor, materials, gasoline and oil, insurance, advertising, and taxes, so that the community and individuals, as well as the land, benefit.

It was pointed out that Community benefits grow from a successful District program. Some of the results of such a program are: An increased tax base, flood protection, community development, income - producing recreation, clean water and pure air, conservation education, and beautification.

Objectives for the District listed were: An agriculture - related pollution survey and flood protection. Legislators commended the District for looking and planning ahead and trying to anticipate problems before they occur.

The Great Plains Program was discussed, and it was explained that each acre under contract is treated according to its need, and that no farm or ranch unit is too small to be included. Much of the land in the Macho - Roswell District in Lincoln County is ranch land, so livestock pipeline, erosion and brush control, and range management are the primary Great Plains contract measures in that area.

Alton Corn, Lincoln County rancher, reviewed the Conservation Crusader Pledge and each person present was presented with a copy to sign.

## Local ASCS office

welcomes questions

Questions about agriculture programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture -- in particular, those on crop allotments, price support, loans and payments, diverted acres, and cost sharing for conservation practices -- are welcomed at the Lincoln Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office.

Those mentioned above are programs administered by ASCS. "However, our county office people will do their best to see that any and all questions about U. S. Department of Agriculture programs and services are answered," said R. Archie Perkins, Chairman of the Lincoln ASC Committee.

"Frequently, we have to call upon another agency, such as the

## Soil Conservation Service or the Farmers Home Administration, to get the details. The various agencies all cooperate well with each other. After all, we're all working for the same person -- the U. S. taxpayer."

He said that the Lincoln ASCS Office workload is mainly involved with the Wool Program, Agricultural Conservation Program, Crop Land Adjustment Program. It also handles other programs such as Wheat and Feed Grain Program, Rural Defense.

Visits to the county office, phone queries, or written requests for information are all welcome, Mr. Perkins said. The County ASCS Office address is Box 706, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301. The phone number is 648-2381.

County office personnel are: Earlena Tubbs and Allen K. Trammell.

The farm programs are administered locally by a farmer-elected ASC County Committee headed by Mr. R. Archie Perkins. Other committee members are Ernest McDaniel and Fred Pfingsten.

"Committee members too are always glad to answer questions about farm programs," the Chairman said.

## Juvenile office has 194 cases

The Juvenile Probation Office at Ruidoso handled a total of 194 cases during the year 1969, one less than 1968, of these 31% or 62 were non-residents of Lincoln County. This is a 25% drop from the 260 cases handled in 1967.

Juvenile Traffic cases in Lincoln County are showing a steady decline due to the policy of holding driver's licenses from 15 to 90 days, depending upon the offense. It is a rare thing that a juvenile repeats on traffic offenses as he learns the first time that his privilege to drive is a very precious thing and he tries to protect that privilege by being a more careful driver. 110 traffic cases were handled in 1967, the first year the policy was placed in effect, 95 cases in 1968 and only 71 cases in 1969, of these 71 cases, 61 were boys and 10 were girls. This should tell the boys something -- 28% of these violations were non-resident.

Other referrals were curfew - 11, fighting - 19, drinking 21, runaways - 15, sniffling glue - 3, truancy - 15, breaking and entering - 9, car theft - 4, shop lifting - 3, larceny - 6, vandalism - 7, miscellaneous - 8.

Two boys were committed to the New Mexico Boys' School at Springer, one to Boy's Ranch at La Jolla, two boys and one girl to the New Mexico State Hospital at Las Vegas for treatment and observation. We should be very proud of our children in Lincoln County as the National trend for Juvenile Delinquency is increasing tremendously.

# Nogal Story

The site of the Nogal Nugget, a pioneer newspaper of the 1890's was excavated at Nogal under the direction of Joe W. Allen last November. Allen is an archaeologist associated with the Museum of New Mexico, Santa Fe.

A major portion of the remains of this historic structure was about to be destroyed by a highway project, and with the help of Skippy Padilla, Jr. of Carrizozo and John Baxley and Herman Philpott of Capitan, Allen recovered invaluable information about life in early territorial New Mexico. The information recorded and material collected is now in storage at the museum in Santa Fe where it will be preserved for future generations of New Mexicans.

All that remained of the actual building were the stone foundations, which measured about 60x70 feet. The rest of the building was probably constructed of wood like many of the hastily erected structures of those frontier boom days.

Material recovered in the fill of the old foundations included some of the actual metal type, and such household objects as pieces of patent medicine bottles, buttons, old shoes, parts of little girls doll and a broken poker chip.

Some old editions of the Nogal paper were found at the County Court House in Carrizozo and they shed some insights on the editors and their policies in Nogal before the turn of the century.

The printing office was started in 1887 - eight years after gold was discovered at Nogal - and operated until 1891.

The first paper printed there was the Nogal Nugget. It was published every Thursday and subscriptions were sold at a cost of two dollars per year. In 1890 the editor H. L. Harris predicted a bright future for the Nogal area. He advised "Home - Seekers and Investors Whose Eyes are Turned Toward the Great West," that Nogal was not only an excellent area for agriculture and stock raising but it also had an apparently inexhaustible quantity of gold, silver and other valuable minerals in the surrounding mountains. He mentioned further for business opportunities the reader

should "look over the columns of the Nugget. It is a small showing, but the best we can make." In that same year of 1890 the Nugget was sold to the Lincoln County Farmers' Alliance and Industrial Union, a syndicate that owned several newspapers. The name of the paper was changed to The Liberty Banner. The paper got a new editor, J. E. Wharton, and to the supposed pleasure of Nogal - the subscription rate went down to one dollar a year, the cheapest newspaper in the territory.

In 1891 Wharton's contract expired and a new editor, J. F. McDowell took over. Wharton remained in Nogal as school master.

The new editor McDowell became involved in the Farmers Alliance and Industrial Union political movement and used the Banner's office as a meeting hall. He also branched out into the restaurant business and served food to his bachelor friends. It is also noted that he tried his hand at preaching, however prior notice was given that no collection was to be taken.

The last paper to be published at Nogal was in the first week of March, 1891. It was printed and edited by "devil" or editor's apprentice - Ed Coe. The printing office was then moved to Lincoln where it completely collapsed a short time later. It's demise was probably due to unpopular editorial policies of the Farmers Alliance and Industrial Union.
