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Jailbreakers loose in Carrizozo Saturday

Carrizozo had some extra excitement early Saturday morning for an hour or so when Town Marshal Choncho Morales spotted a car heading west on US 380 and decided to make a routine check around 3:30 a.m. He flashed the car but the driver played an old trick by making quick U-turn heading back toward the Lava Vista courts, Morales was right behind them but two occupants of the car had time to stop, jump out and start running from point back of Eddie O'Brien's house. The two subjects were tracked across to the old airport and from there toward the Spencer ranch and the Malpais. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department identified the two suspects as Paul Weldon Nichols, white male 31 years, and Ricky Lee Cleland, male Indian 19 years who broke out of the Chaves

County jail February 27. An interesting sidelight to this chase is possibility that one of the two men might have bought bus ticket and left Carrizozo at 9:45 Saturday getting off at El Paso. Mrs. L. V. Ladd reported that the young man bought two tickets and asked her if he could cash one if his friend did not show up. She told him he would have to cash the ticket here or send it to Roswell. Her thought was that the other man might try to flag the bus down then the ticket-buyer would produce the other ticket for his friend but it didn't work that way. The one man with two tickets went all the way to El Paso. Marshal Morales recovered the car, a 63 Corvair. At that time it had not been reported as stolen. State Policemen Bob Watson and Andy Benevidez assisted with the search.

While enjoying the hospitality of delicious doughnuts and hot coffee, the Sunrise Team confronted the centuries - old question as to the true meaning of Easter, both in the year 33 A.D. and in this present year 1970. After 1937 years, those present in Hondo found them selves agreeing that Easter came into this work, three days after the violent death of Christ. Amazing changes in American agriculture

Amazing changes in American agriculture were cited today by R. Archie Perkins, Chairman of the Lincoln County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee as "believe-it-or-not" facts of the last two decades.

"We've seen more change in 20 years than we had in the 80 years before that," he said. "Back in 1870 one farmer provided food and fiber for every five persons. It took sixty years for that ratio to double -- by 1930 one farmer was growing food and fiber for every 10 persons. By 1960, the ratio was one farmer to supply every 25 persons. Today one U.S. farmer provides food and fiber for about 45 persons," Mr. Perkins said.

This rapidly increasing efficiency, he said, means that Americans today pay only about 16 and a half percent of their disposable income for food --

less than any people anywhere have ever paid. Disposable income is after taxes income -- the money people actually have for spending purposes.

Other changes cited include the drop in farm population -- down to 10 million today from about 26 million in 1947. During the same period, farm consolidation has cut the number of farms in half -- from 6 million to 3 million.

The land in farms, however, remained relatively unchanged -- about 1.1 billion acres.

"What it adds up to is a technological and economic revolution in American agriculture, I think more Americans need to realize that agriculture is not a static industry, but is actually one of the leaders in our technological progress," Mr. Perkins said.

National Wildlife Week March 15-21

"Seen Any Wildlife Lately?"

That's the question being asked by the National Wildlife Federation and its 49 state affiliates as the theme of the 1970 National Wildlife Week scheduled for March 15-21.

National Wildlife Federation officials, feel that this theme focuses on the importance of wildlife as a measure of environmental quality.

"By asking this loaded question, we hope to motivate people into taking stock of their world. And when they look around to discover less wildlife habitat and poorer environment than five years ago, we want them to realize that the same barrage of pollution, carelessness, filth and destruction that threatens the animal world is threatening us."

Paul Rydings, of Socorro, president of the New Mexico Wildlife and Conservation Association, the NWF affiliate in New Mexico, said, "The theme of this year's observance is particularly important because it asks each of us to reflect on our nation's vanishing wildlife heritage and ponder the effect on our own lives."

Increasing air and water pollution, persistent pesticides, unplanned highways and urban sprawl are steadily gnawing away at this nation's wildlife resources. A staggering 89 American wildlife species are on the brink of extinction caused not by hunting but by the destruction of their habitat.

"Wildlife is a sensitive yard stick for measuring the livability of our environment," Rydings continued. "With the accelerating deterioration of urban and suburban areas in many parts of the country, about the only wildlife many of our citizens have seen lately are sparrows and pigeons."

in dairy judging

Ward Alford of the Corona Mavericks 4-H Club was the high point individual in the Junior Division of the Junior Dairy Judging contest last Saturday at Price Black Farm at Arrey, New Mexico. He scored 178 points out of a possible 200. The team of Tawnya Alford, Melvin Yancey and Dale McConnell placed second in the Junior division. There were 53 teams in that division so they did very well. Other 4-H members participating in the judging contest were Leslie Carnell, Mel Gnatkowski, Phoebe Foster, Amy Foster, Janetta Foster, Brett Carnell, and Alton Wilson. They were accompanied by Mrs. Rogene Alford, Mrs. Mary Ellen Payne and Ralph Dunlap.

Are you polluting your neighbors orchard? Many fruit growers neglect their orchard and not only do damage to their own orchards but to their neighbors as well. This pollution can be in many forms such as disease and insects. The codling moth is one of the major insects that spreads from orchard to orchard.

Now is the time to clean up your orchard and prune it properly. The next step is to plan an insect control program. Codling moth traps can be used to time sprays better. When you spray do a complete job and be sure no apple tree is missed. It just takes one unsprayed tree to infest the entire orchard with worms. The codling moth normally can fly about a half mile, but has been known to travel four miles.

In crossbreeding, you have to know where you are going before you start," says A.L. Lane, Extension Livestock specialist with the University of Arizona. Tucson, Lane addressed a Livestock Feeder's and Cattle Growers Short Course Tuesday (Feb. 24) at New Mexico State University.

"We need to select things we are really looking for in (beef cattle) crossbreeding," Lane told his audience. The livestock specialist talked on "Crossbreeding Programs in Arizona." He used photographs of animals to make points about the cross breeding programs he is familiar with. Lane admittedly was biased in favor of cross breeding in beef cattle herds. "I am pushing for cross breeding," he said, "because I do see some excellent results." Lane qualified his praise of cross breeding programs by saying that he was aware that cross breeding would not work in some places.

The daily gain on beef calves is the important thing in judging a beef herd, Lane said. He gave an example of work in Arizona where the Hereford calves gained one and two-thirds pounds per day; Hereford - Angus calves gained two and three-fourths pounds of weight per day.

"The percentage of calf crop is second in importance in putting money in your jeans," Lane maintains. Much of the information presented by Lane dealt with cross breeding programs involving Brown Swiss, Hereford, Angus and Charolais breeds. The livestock specialist has praise for the crossbred beef animal for its ability to stand up under summer heat. "When summer comes and the weather is hot, crossbreeds really stand out," Lane said. He maintained it has been his experience that straight bred Hereford cattle had trouble contending with heat.

Lane listed adaptability, fertility, milking ability, calf gainability and carcass desirability as some points to be considered in a cross breeding plan. He then outlined one way of establishing a cross breeding program. The 1970 Livestock Feeder's and Cattle Growers Short Course at NMSU was one of the largest attendance-wise in recent years. The course began Monday and lasted two days.

Information about forest prospecting

Prospecting and mining activity within the Lincoln National Forest is on a small scale with little high grade ore being produced. Mining activity dates back to the 1870's. In 1872 the General Mining Laws were enacted. These laws are defined in Circular #2149 which can be obtained from U. S. Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management.

The general public has not been adequately informed as to the Forest Service's purpose or policy concerning the prospector and the mining laws as they pertain to public lands. This has led to many misunderstandings between the Forest Service and the prospector or miner.

There are six steps a miner must take to locate a mining claim on public lands according

to the mining laws. They are listed below:

- 1.) Determine that the land is open to mining locations. Some areas have been withdrawn from mineral entry by Congress.
- 2.) Do sufficient prospecting to determine that the land contains valuable mineral.
- 3.) Actually physically expose or discover a valuable mineral deposit.
- 4.) Distinctly and clearly mark and establish the boundaries of

the claim on the ground so that it can be readily identified.

- 5.) Post the notice of location of the claim in a conspicuous place, usually at the place of discovery.
 - 6.) Record an exact copy of the location notice in the County Clerk's office in the county in which the claim is located.
- Departure from the mining laws scores the problems. Cabins are built on the claims and soon these cabins are used

for purposes other than mining, such as summer homes, hunting cabins, or rental cabins. Some cabins are never finished and are left to rot. Discovery pits are left open where people or live stock can fall into them. Old machinery is left on the site and roads are improperly built. This leaves unsightly scars on the land. Public lands are some times unlawfully posted as private land, causing misunderstandings with other users of the

National Forest, such as hunter, hikers and picnickers.

These problems can be averted by following the mining laws. Cabins are to be used for only mining purposes, and discovery pits are to be fenced to prevent injury to humans and livestock. Abandoned pits are to be filled in; this is in accordance with the State Mining Safety Code. Public lands are not to be posted. The Forest Service is willing to help the miner locate an access

road in the best possible place. A relinquishment of improvements allows the Forest Service to remove old cabins and junk from the claim without expense to the owner of the claim. This relinquishment does not question the validity or invalidity of a mining claim. In some cases miners have been very cooperative in helping clean up their claims. Some have started fencing their discovery pits, and others have asked for and

received advice in the road location. This is a tremendous step toward providing a greater benefit to all users of the National Forest lands. The Forest Service has no intention of depriving anyone from prospecting or working a valid mining claim. Mining is recognized as a valid use of National Forest lands, with minerals being one of the many resources found within the National Forest.
