Shorty Dawson remembered by many old timers in county

Fred E. "Shorty" Dawson passed away at the Veterans Hospital in Grand Junction, Colorado on March 27, 1970. He will be remembered by many of the Old Timers in Lincoln County. Jess Dawson, his brother, came to Gavilan Canyon and bought a place right above Ernest & Nora Blood, about 1913, he was later joined by Shorty and another brother Ben, around 1914. Shorty was born in Iowa on October 19, 1883 and was never married. He has several nieces & nephews in the Chicago area. He homesteaded near Indian Tank, north of Carrizozo, and his homestead is now part of the Gallacher Ranches. He was a World War I veteran and lived at Nogal before being con-

tinued to veterans hospital on account of illness. He managed the Carrizozo baseball team in the early days here, when baseball was the official sport of all the towns in this area and making the sports headlines. He was a good boxer and entered the boxing rings before admiring fans many times in this area. He admired his friends, was loyal to his country and held great respect for our American flag. Services were conducted at Chapel of Roses in Carrizozo by Vernon Petty, at 10 a.m., Wednesday, April 1st and he was laid to rest in the Angus cemetery. Pall bearers were Bob Shafer, Bob Stearns, Bill Gallacher, Jr., Mert Zumwalt, Ralph Forsythe and Roy Harman.

Senate and treasurer jobs may be open

With the filing deadline next Tuesday Lincoln County could well be without a candidate for state senator, the office now held by Joe Skeen who has announced his intention to run for Lieutenant governor. The News has heard some talk about candidate in Otero County but no names mentioned as possibilities in this county.

County commissioners Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace told the News Wednesday that they would be candidates. Jones first served as commissioner in 1952 and is serving on his 6th term. He feels that a turning point for Lincoln County is right at hand, there is much to be done and wants to stay with the commissioner job. Jones said he had never worked with finer people than Stark and Lovelace, the job of commissioner has not been political in any way. He is happy that Carrizozo will have a new intermediate care unit, and that re-appraisal is finally getting underway. Lovelace told the News he was real proud of the way the present board has worked together, spending lots of hours all for the good of the county. He thinks

the county is moving ahead rapidly and said he has enjoyed working with the other two commissioners. Lovelace is a resident of Corona area, Jones lives north of Capitan. County Clerk Alice King has announced that she will seek a second term in that office. Mrs. King has done a marvelous job of taking care of increasing county business and should know this job as well as a person can.

Marion Schlarb, county assessor, has just been through the task of putting assessments on plates and automating much of the assessor's work which has been a big job that required careful attention to detail. Re-appraisal will require more of the same, Marion probably will file for re-election, no definite word Wednesday.

Kenneth Nosker, incumbent probate judge for Lincoln County has announced that he will seek a second term in this office in the June 2 primary election. Nosker will run on the Republican ticket.

He has been active working at many civic chores in the county as well as serving as commissioner. "Everything has worked out fine during my present term of office," Kenneth told the News. There have been no complaints from attorneys and he has turned out probate work as fast as possible.

Ernest Sanchez who is completing his first term as sheriff of Lincoln County has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election in the June 2 primary on the Republican ticket.

Sheriff Sanchez has three years experience as undersheriff in addition to his present term in office. He has attended numerous FBI schools and has spent considerable time in the study

of state laws. He feels that this experience qualifies him better than ever as a candidate for the office he seeks.

The Sanchez family lives in Carrizozo where Ernest 16, James 17 and Steve 10 attend school. His wife, Oralia, and Janice age 18 months are at home here.

New Mexico Association of Counties, going over the program and making plans for the convention of counties to be held in Ruidoso April 30, May 1 - 2.

53 go to polls for bond election

In an election that really didn't mean much except to satisfy legal requirements, 53 non-property tax paying voters went to the polls in the five precincts set up for this election.

This will be quite an occasion in Lincoln County. Officials from all counties in the state are expected to attend, a great many state officials, and all state candidates who file for election will be invited (but paying) guests.

Five negative votes were cast to 48 affirmative on the two issues. One general obligation bonds in sum not to exceed \$685,000 for construction and equipping county hospital in Ruidoso by making addition to present hospital. Two, general obligation bonds in sum of \$142,000 for construction and equipping of intermediate care unit, to be an addition to the present county hospital in Carrizozo.

A large number of suppliers in all fields of service to counties will be on hand with booths and displays of various kinds. Don Stark is heading up the planning committee.

Court Ruling Changed
Anderson Hay and Grain Co. filed suit against Sam Dunn and Virgil Welch as partners in feed concession, seeking payment of \$13,567.85 allegedly owed on purchase of grain. The district court awarded judgment against Welch but dismissed complaint against Dunn. The issue on appeal was whether Dunn actually was a partner. The Supreme Court ruled that evidence pointed to Dunn being a partner with Welch and directed the trial court to enter a new judgment against both Dunn and Welch.

Caster heads Capitan school

The Capitan Board of Education has employed Ira Caster, 49, as superintendent of schools for the next term. Mr. Caster and wife, Mary Lou, live in Albuquerque. They have one son, Bill, who is a senior at Western University in Silver City.

I had the opportunity to visit the Port of Long Beach and see the Queen Mary now being renovated. To accomplish this they removed all of the stacks. She was dry docked and permanently coated below the water line. A special compartment was built on the tall section below the water line in the Maritime Museum section which will be the finest of its kind in the world.

I was told even though all propellers were removed except one in this compartment which will enable visitors to see the huge propeller continuously turning. It was very interesting for me to learn and hard to believe this huge ship will eventually accommodate a 400 room hotel including museum, ballrooms, many shops, dining rooms and many other things of interest.

It is predicted that when this ship has been completed and restored to its authentic condition plus the many added features due to modernization air conditioning and communications, etc. it will be moved to the permanent location which is known as Pier J. of the city of Long Beach to which it will be docked.

This is many acres of land that was filled in by materials sucked from the ocean. In conjunction to the Queen Mary there will be parks, large hotels, etc. on this land.

It is expected that this entire project when completed and opened to the public will attract as many if not more tourists from all over the world, as we all know Disneyland has.

It, of course will be a National Convention Center.

It is hard to conceive the many hidden requirements to accommodate this many people.

There are super freeways under construction which will interlock to a bridge nearing completion from down town Long Beach across the harbor to the ship and the many items of interest on the Beach of Pier J.

Phillips 66 sponsors pitch, hit and throw

The LaMay Distributing Co., together with Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, is sponsoring Phillips 66 official major league baseball pitch, hit and throw competition in the area served by LaMay Distributing which includes Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Local contests will be held in both counties the weekend of May 23-24 and the local winners will go to the district contest in Albuquerque June 6-7. The big payoff will be for district and division winners and their parents who get to attend the national all-star baseball game and national finals July 14.

The competition is open to four different age groups, 9-10-11-12 years and boys who become 9 years old before July 1 can enter, or boys who won't be 13 before July 1 can enter.

The youngsters are well defined and any youngster may pick up his entry blank and set of rules at any Phillips 66 station in this area.

Pitching competition is based on five throws over a 46-foot distance and points are given on accuracy of the pitch. Hitters will have two chances and points will be given on the longest fair ball. The throwing competition will be a throw from home plate to either first or third base and points will be given on distance ball travels on the fly, and minus points if ball lands to the right or left of the foul line.

Each participant will receive jacket patches, the local winners will receive pitch, hit and throw plaques, warmup jackets and winner patches.

Dale LaMay said he would take the local winners to the district contest in Albuquerque. Parents have to come in with boys when they sign up.

New Supt. from Quemado

The Carrizozo Board of Education made the decision Tuesday night to offer contract for position of superintendent of schools to James Steinepreis, now superintendent at Quemado. According to President Ray Wells the contract offer was accepted.

Steinepreis has been superintendent at Quemado for three years and has ten years of teaching experience in New Mexico.

He was born in Las Vegas, N. M., and attended high school and college there. The Steinepreis family includes his wife and two children, a girl of 14 and a boy 12. His job in Carrizozo starts July 1.

Other action at the board meeting was to grant a leave of absence to Grace Romero who will start work on masters degree next year. The senior class will take trip to Lake Texhoma, near Dallas, leaving on the 20th of May and returning May 24th.

Commission determines land fill site

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace were in session Monday in Carrizozo with several important pieces of business to work out.

Bud Starkey, District Forest Ranger from Ruidoso, and Tim Collins, Forest Service engineer from Alamogordo, met with the commissioners to go over the sanitary land fill situation.

The commission received a report April 9 from the Soil Conservation Service on the north half of Section 16 which, after much discussion, seemed like the only possibility in the Ruidoso area for this purpose and the decision was made to start using this site. The survey was made by Billy Ray Littlefield, district conservationist. Starkey commented that both

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs dumps are full and they may now be dumping trash in areas where it will be hard to move a second time. It was also pointed out that the new law going into effect July 1 will prohibit trash burning by communities of any size, Starkey said that trash handling now is really illegal, does not conform to any standards but there has been

little choice in the matter up to date.

Starkey was asked if there were other areas in Lincoln County that might be available for land fill. His answer was that the Forest Service has been trading off the good stuff, meaning level areas that might be used, to let Lincoln County develop in the Ruidoso - Alto area, and all that was left were tight canyons which did not have sufficient level acreage or had drainage problems.

The south of Section 16 may possibly be a better land fill site than the north half and the commission will ask the Soil Conservation Service for a survey of this acreage which could be available in October.

The survey of the north half of Section 16 indicates that it is not the most desirable site -- but it was agreed by both the Forest Service men and the commission that they have little to choose from and that this site has the following advantages: 1) drainage characteristics are alright, 2) slope limits are favorable, 3) area is non-stony, 4) no flooding hazard, 5) no danger of contaminating ground water, 6) soil reaction is favorable, 7) depth to hard rock ranges 4-6 feet. The commission will explore the depth with dozer which can penetrate rocks better.

The worst thing about this site is that it is not large enough to last that section of the county for a period of 20-30 years and the commission considered the fact that such sites being hard to find now -- they can be much more difficult to find in coming years, which is the reason for exploring the south half of this section now.

The possibility exists that federal money may be available to help communities in sanitary land fill work and Fred Wood, Lincoln - Otero sanitarian and Samuel Davalos, engineer for Department of Health and Social Services, will be asked about obtaining federal funds.

Chairman Stark talked to Haskel Smith, head of State finance department, on the phone during this meeting and agreed that the commission would draw up a resolution and mail to Smith that day. The resolution states that the county will accept services of the state property appraisal department and that the county become liable for expenses of the re-appraisal.

The re-appraisal work is expected to get underway by the first of May and Smith told Stark that work remaining was not of major proportions. It will mean some \$40,000 to Lincoln County school if this reappraisal is completed in the next few months. The county will get back one-half mill, the schools 1.7 mills.

The sale of \$590,000.00 general obligation bonds for Lincoln County's two hospitals was set for May 5 at 10:30 a.m. in the courthouse.

Money for the paving will come from three sources, the FAA and Four Corners Agency providing 80 percent of the funds and the balance from local sources. The town will assist with the construction work.

Weber to discuss minerals

The next meeting of the South Central Mountain Resources Area steering and executive committees will be held at the courthouse in Carrizozo starting at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, April 28. Robert H. Weber, senior geologist, Bureau of Mines and Minerals, will be on the program to discuss the purpose and objectives of the bureau. He will also discuss the mineral potential in Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Three new projects have been received by SCMRA and were recommended for approval at the

March 17 meeting. The first one was a request from the people of the Bonito community for assistance in obtaining electricity. The area needing electricity is above Bonito Lake and involves more than 35 users.

The second project was described as paving the Bonito Creek Road from Angus to Tank Canyon. Bob Scriber stated that this road has heavy use and was definitely a county road that should be paved and given high priority.

The third project was a request from Town of Carrizozo for assistance in getting an electrical caution light on US 54 at the dangerous of turn. US 54 makes a south edge town at that point and has been the scene of several wrecks and could lead to loss of lives.

The March 17 meeting in Alamogordo was concluded with a progress report on several projects.

State Park**

Following is text of talk by Gregory Gray at Easter Service.

**THE RESURRECTION
(Mark 16: 1-8)**

After the Sabbath day was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices to go and anoint the body of Jesus. Very early on Sunday morning, at sunrise, they went to the grave. On the way, they said to one another, "Who will roll away the stone from the entrance to the grave for us?" (It was a very large stone.) Then they looked up and saw that the stone had already been rolled back. So they entered the grave, where they saw a young man, sitting at the right, who wore a white robe -- and they were filled with alarm. "Don't be alarmed," he said, "You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was nailed to the cross. But he is not here -- he has risen! Look, here is the place where they laid him. Now go and give this message to his disciples, including Peter: He is going to Galilee ahead of you; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and ran from the grave, because fear and terror were upon them. And they said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

Yes, the barrier of the tomb was removed, even though a seal was placed upon it; the barrier was removed!

**JESUS NAILED TO THE CROSS
(Luke 23: 26-42)**

They took Jesus away. As they went, they met a man named Simon, from Cyrene, who was coming into the city from the country. They seized him, put the cross on him and made him carry it behind Jesus.

A large crowd of people followed him; among them were some women who were weeping and waiting for him. Jesus turned to them and said: "Women of Jerusalem! Don't cry for me, but for yourselves and your children. For the days are coming when people will say, 'How lucky are the women who never had children, who never bore babies, who never nursed them!' That will be the time when people will say to the mountains, 'Fall on us!' and to the hills, 'Hide us!' For if such things as these are done when the wood is green, what will it be like when it is dry?"

They took two others also, both of them criminals, to be put to death with Jesus. When they came to the place called "The Skull," they nailed Jesus to the cross there, and the two criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Jesus said, "Forgive them, Father! They don't know what they are doing." They divided his clothes among themselves by throwing dice. The people stood there watching, while the Jewish leaders made fun of him; "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Messiah whom God had chosen!" The soldiers also made fun of him; they came up to him and offered him wine, and said, "Save yourself, if you are the King of the Jews!" These words were written above him: "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals hanging there threw insults at him: "Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us." The other one, however, rebuked him, saying: "Don't you fear God? Here we are all under the same sentence. Ours, however, is only right, for we are getting what we deserve for what we did; but he has done no wrong." And he said to Jesus, "Remember me, Jesus, when you come as King!" Jesus said to him, "I tell you this: today you will be in Paradise with me." Continued On Page Four

Three Crosses Continued From Page Two No single event has so moved men as the death of Jesus upon the cross. It has moved men to write the most significant music and the most inspired words. The greatest art of the ages centers upon the Cross. The fact that such inspiration could come from what had been the symbol of the cruelest and most shameful death, is evidence of the deep meaning of this sacrifice. In his book 'The Apostles' Creed for Everyman, William Barclay focuses upon the meaning of the Cross in terms of what it teaches us about God.

1) The Cross reveals to us the ultimate and final demonstration of the love of God. It shows that the love of God is without limit or barrier, or exception or defeat of any kind. Chaplain Ernest Gordon relates an event which took place in a Japanese prisoner of war camp in Southeast Asia during World War II. A Japanese guard insisted that one of the prisoners had stolen a shovel during a work detail. His anger turned into rage, and he insisted that the guilty person step forward. When no one stepped forward, his rage increased to the point that he was ready to shoot the entire work detail. As the guard's rage reached new heights of violence, one of the men stepped forward. The guard unleashed all of his hatred on the man with repeated blows. Finally he lifted his rifle above the prisoner's head by the barrel and cracked the man's skull open with the butt of the rifle. The guard continued to beat the already dead prisoner until he was exhausted. The other men picked up their comrade's body and returned to camp. When the tools were counted, it was discovered that no shovel was missing. No words were needed to explain what the dead prisoner

had done.

If a man can attend one of the finest universities and receive many high honors and degrees upon graduation, but still can't get a particular job or live in a certain part of town because of the color of his skin... if a man's got enough money to buy all earthly material possessions, but doesn't have "cents" enough to know that a man's reward in heaven for leading a good life is far greater than all earthly treasures.

The barriers that need our immediate attention are hate, prejudice, greed, jealousy. The barriers between God - man, male - female, youth - age, rich - poor, nation - nation. Yes, I know that there are a number of things in this world that just can't be changed. The barriers I have mentioned can be moved, and must be moved!

As far as this world is concerned, I think this world had better master itself before seeking to master other worlds. I don't think that foreign policy is bad, but I do feel that our country should take a stronger hold on domestic affairs before taking a large stand on foreign issues. On an even smaller basis every man should seek to master himself before trying to master other men. If each of us can do his own share, no matter how small it may seem we can represent the sparks that start this world burning in the

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Three Crosses Continued From Page Two No single event has so moved men as the death of Jesus upon the cross. It has moved men to write the most significant music and the most inspired words. The greatest art of the ages centers upon the Cross. The fact that such inspiration could come from what had been the symbol of the cruelest and most shameful death, is evidence of the deep meaning of this sacrifice. In his book 'The Apostles' Creed for Everyman, William Barclay focuses upon the meaning of the Cross in terms of what it teaches us about God.

1) The Cross reveals to us the ultimate and final demonstration of the love of God. It shows that the love of God is without limit or barrier, or exception or defeat of any kind. Chaplain Ernest Gordon relates an event which took place in a Japanese prisoner of war camp in Southeast Asia during World War II. A Japanese guard insisted that one of the prisoners had stolen a shovel during a work detail. His anger turned into rage, and he insisted that the guilty person step forward. When no one stepped forward, his rage increased to the point that he was ready to shoot the entire work detail. As the guard's rage reached new heights of violence, one of the men stepped forward. The guard unleashed all of his hatred on the man with repeated blows. Finally he lifted his rifle above the prisoner's head by the barrel and cracked the man's skull open with the butt of the rifle. The guard continued to beat the already dead prisoner until he was exhausted. The other men picked up their comrade's body and returned to camp. When the tools were counted, it was discovered that no shovel was missing. No words were needed to explain what the dead prisoner

had done.

Civil defense issues pamphlet

All Lincoln County residents will soon receive a pamphlet intended to publicize the county civil defense system. The pamphlets go into considerable detail in telling what to do in the event of a nuclear attack against the United States -- they should be read thoroughly and kept on file at home.

The purpose of the brochure is three-fold. First to eliminate confusion should the need for shelters develop, second, it describes protective measures for a family should no shelter be available, and third, the pamphlet describes the nature of fallout radiation -- what it is, how long it lasts, and under what conditions to expect fallout danger.

This form of radiation hazard is generated when an atomic device explodes on or near the ground drawing tons of dirt up into the fireball. This material becomes radioactive and as it sifts back to earth can cause casualties among persons far enough removed from the site of the explosion that they suffered no blast or burn injuries.

It is the belief of experts in the field that nationwide system of adequate shelters could save many millions of civilian lives in the United States should this country undergo nuclear attack.
 Three public shelters are listed in Corona: Roberts Mercantile, old school gym and Presbyterian Church.
 Three in Capitan are the high school, school gym basement and the Methodist Church.

In Carrizozo the following shelters are listed: Courthouse Annex, county jail, high school, school gym basement, bank, Masonic building, Petty's store, hardware, and IOOF hall.




