He will study automotive mechanics, automatic transmission and auto air conditioning under the scholarship which will take about a year and then expects to be there another year on his own studying diesel motors.

James C. Stienprels, who will head Carrizozo schools starting July 1, was born in Las Vegas, New Mexico as was his wife Sharon Irby. They have two children, Lynn in the 9th grade and Stanley in the 7th grade.
Supt. Stienprels received his BS Degree at N. M. State, his Masters at Highlands and has done graduate work at N. M. State. He is a member of the National Education Ass'n, School Administrators Ass'n, Research and Study Council, Farm and Livestock Bureau, White Mountain Hospital Board and Socorro - Catron Community Action Committee.

He served in the Infantry for two years, taught at Roy three years, Socorro for seven years and has been superintendent at Quemado for three years. Stienprels is a Lions Club member, the American Legion, U. S. Army Reserve, Socorro County Fair and Rodeo Ass'n, and PTA.
School work does not leave a lot of time for recreation but what spare time there is Supt. Stienprels enjoys hunting, fishing and horseback riding.

Racing at Downs is badly muddled

Larry Calloway, Associated Press writer, was in Carrizozo Thursday of last week and a guest of the News editor at Rotary. He was on his way to Ruidoso to report on situation at Ruidoso Downs and since that day Larry has written a number of articles, the most recent reported in full in the issue of the News.

Talking with Assistant Director Attorney Bill Payne in Carrizozo did not answer the most pressing question -- will the race track open as scheduled on May 23 -- but Payne did clarify some of the legal involvements.

One of the most important dates is April 25 when the State Racing Commission meets in Albuquerque. It is possible for the commission at that time to grant racing days to either of the two receiverships, the Ruidoso State Bank group which filed its suit in Santa Fe, and the minority stockholders group which filed its suit in Carrizozo on the same day.

The second important date is May 20 when the New Mexico Supreme Court is expected to act on the question of validity of the Lincoln County District Court appointed receivership.

Payne said that the question of which receivership might take precedence is not before the Supreme Court at this time, only the validity of the Lincoln County District Court order.

If the validity of the Santa Fe court order were to be questioned it would have to come from Atty. Richard Parson's group, the minority stockholders.

Methodist Conference Sunday
Dr. B. M. Stewart of El Paso district superintendent, will be guest preacher at Captan Methodist Church at 9:00 a.m. Sunday and will conduct their church conference at 5:00 p.m. that day.
At 11:00 a.m. Sunday Dr. Stewart will preach at Trinity Methodist Church in Carrizozo, be a guest at dinner following the service and will conduct the church conference starting about 1:00 p.m.

Not all of the hard questions will be answered by the opening day of racing but events could work out this way. The Racing Commission could grant racing days to either party, the Supreme Court could act and the racing season would open on schedule. There are a few "ifs". Should the Racing Commission grant racing days to the minority stockholder group, it would have to gain possession of the facilities and get a favorable verdict from the Supreme Court. Should the Commission grant racing days to the State Bank group and the Lincoln County court order be declared valid by the Supreme Court, then the stew is still stewing.

The best and most pertinent comment about racing in Lincoln County that we have heard goes like this -- There needs to be some head knocking in Ruidoso and some hard and fast talking to determine that Ruidoso people are willing to forget grudges, willing to overlook old fights, willing to work together for the good of the county.

Details of the several events leading up to present state of affairs follow.

NOTHING BUT TROUBLE
Since the State Racing Commission denied racing dates to Newco Industries, Inc., purchaser of Ruidoso Downs from Gene Hensley the majority stockholder, there has been nothing but trouble for the racing association.

This week a suit was filed in district court in Carrizozo by minority shareholders asking for liquidation of Ruidoso

Racing Ass'n, on the following grounds:

-- Ruidoso Racing paid its majority shareholder, Newco Industries, Inc., \$70,000 to run its racing operation for it.
-- Newco made a 10 year concession contract with New Mexico Sportservice, Inc., without prior approval of the New Mexico Racing Commission, a contract not legal because of the lack of prior Racing Commission approval.

-- The books of the company showed \$475,000 in cash assets last Sept. 8 and this had shrunk by Oct. 1 to \$269,000 of which \$268,000 turned out to be reserve against future race purses made up from money put up by horse owners -- not current cash at all -- and therefore cash on hand totaled only about \$350.

-- Eric Culver, president of Newco, contracted with Gene Hensley, former majority shareholder in RRA, to pay Hensley \$225,000 in the form of \$1250 a month for 15 years, and did not reveal this contract to the Racing Commission when required to do so.

Hensley is serving a five year federal sentence for income tax evasion in La Tuna Federal Correctional Institution, El Paso County, Texas.

-- RRA and Newco have "common and interlocking directors" and Culver is accused of "a further act of mismanagement" in connection with the Hensley contract in view of his allegedly having said he would impress his will upon RRA and cause it to pay Hensley, -- Hensley's payments have,

in fact, been paid by RRA.

Richard A. Parsons of Ruidoso is attorney for the plaintiffs who hold 486 of Ruidoso Racing's 4367 outstanding shares.

ALLOWAY REPORTS ALBUQUERQUE (AP)
Eric N. Culver, a Texas quarterhorse racer, bought control of Raton's La Mesa Park from Ralph Wood Erwin in 1966 without any friction from the Racing Commission.

Now, with a new commission in the saddle, Culver has had nothing but hearings, investigations and denials of a license in his purchase of Ruidoso Downs.

There are no files on the present La Mesa ownership in the Racing Commission office at the State Fairgrounds. The office secretary, Mrs. Harvey Foster, who owns a small amount of La Mesa stock, says simply, "There is no record of the transaction."

About all that is known from recent hearings on Ruidoso Downs is that Erwin sold out and went to work as manager of Centennial race track near Denver. Centennial is controlled by Emprise Corp of Buffalo, N.Y., according to hearing testimony.



For my part in this report, I should say, that after steadily spending sixty days before Easter, visiting and forming a team of young individuals 100 miles apart in some areas, also apart in athletic competition attitudes, without county team precedent, I found myself almost totally exhausted in the midst of the last few finalizing semi-rehearsals.

However, I had an amazingly fine, spirited crew of young adults on our Sunrise Team. They thrust me through it all. Thank God for them.

Miracle one above, means more than 100 youth either formed the Living Cross or were present in other parts of the Sunrise Service. Seventy three stood in the cross during the below freezing breeze. This cross was the Cruz, as it always is.

Miracle two means, that a mature boy of manhood proportions, was correctly selected to lead 1969-70 Boy's Nation, representing some 50,000 current Boy's Staters in United States. Greg Gray, of Gary, Indiana, delivered a masterful sermon of gentle honesty soon after 6:10 a.m. in Valley of Fires State Park Easter Sunday.

Within 36 hours, this steadfast young Christian leader had wasted 10 hours with thousands of others in the Chicago Airport; flew to Albuquerque on a nearly empty plane in 2 1/2 hours; had been given a ride to Capitan on the return of a round trip by young Alfred Klinsy slept 1 1/2 hours at home of Chaplain and Mrs. Klins.

At 4:30 a.m. in the car to Valley of Fires State Park; delivered a 10 minute sermon how we miss the purpose of Jesus; back to Capitan for breakfast; to top of Sierra Blanca Mountain; down steep slide 5 times in 3-man tub-type sled; to Capitan for lunch and color pictures with sheep (Kline family renamed their New Years Day lamb, "Greg"); off to Albuquerque at 2:00 p.m. on plane to Chicago at 5:30 p.m. (MST); met by parents at 9 p.m.; home in Gary, Indiana 9:30 p.m. All in 1 1/2 days!!!

We achieved all of our "impossible" goals, despite mail slow down, temperature way down, strikebound air traffic, car stopping snowstorms, and pre-occupied people who chose less important events. Our goals were: a large living cross of youth, youth team to meet by turns in the 5 central towns of their respective school districts, on each of the 6 Sundays before Easter, and lastly to encourage people of all ages, colors and creeds from all towns in Lincoln County to attend the Sunrise Service together.

Inspiring guidance was given by Girls' Nation delegate, Susan Strode of Alamogordo, thru the sturdy spirited influence of her sermon. Bill Brown of Corona gave excellent singing leadership even though lacking the organ, due to no power hook-up. Mark Sloan of Ruidoso High was just the right person to preside over all events, and to present the sterling silver roadrunner to sterling manhood in the person of Greg Gray.

Robert Coca of Carrizozo set all spines a-tingle as his trumpet sent forth tribute to the glory of the first flashing rays of dawn above Carrizo Mountain. Myrna Pflingsten was well prepared to play the organ in her usual just right manner but the power connections did not fit as Chaplain Kline assumed they would.

Taking speaking parts with Greg and Susan, were: Gloria Lueros of Corona, New Testament Easter Story, Patti English, Invocation Prayer, Bible words from Christ on Truth, Love, Peace and Law. Peter Kazhe of Mesquero, Hospitality invitation, Pat Grantham of Capitan.

The key youth persons in each town were: Capitan Youth Chairman, David Ingalls, Ruidoso Youth Chairman, Pat Farrar, Corona Youth Chairman Cindy Reynolds, Carrizozo Youth

Round-up

I spent Monday in Roswell helping train boys and girls to grade and judge wool. At the same time they observed the wool sale. Attending from Corona were: Brett Carnell, Leslie Carnell, Amy Foster, Mel Gnatkowski, Janet Davidson, Phoebe Foster, Joan Alford, Ward Alford, Tawnya Alford, Janetta Foster, Jack Allen Davidson, Mark Sultemeier, Lois Ann Sultemeier and Allen Sultemeier. Those attending from Hondo were: Cecelia Pacheco, Carol Cooper, Ray Slesneros and Cristina Pacheco.

They judged two classes of wool and graded 20 fleeces. The A-H members had the wool market explained to them by James Goodrum. The buyer considers grade, shrinkage, length of wool fiber and burrs in making his bid.

Adults accompanying the group were: Mrs. Rogene Alford, Mrs. Jack Davidson, Jr., Mrs. Ernest Sultemeier and Mrs. Paul Pacheco.

When I attended the wool sale Monday in Roswell, I thought the market was slow. The buyers were only looking for wool that they needed immediately. They did not seem to be offering their best price and growers were refusing to accept the prices offered. There has been no real market established on the 1970 clip and at present it seems weak. The top bid of 42 cents per pound was refused. Wools are being shown in Roswell and Artesia area during the weekend maybe a price will be established.

New apple spray guides are now available at the County Agent's office. Besides information on apple pests and the sprays that will control them, the guide has plans for a light trap and information on how to use it to time worm control sprays.

Revive houseplants and put them on the road to good growth by repotting. Repotting house plants each spring makes them grow strong during the summer and makes them better able to withstand the winter. Use a pot two inches larger than the previous one. And if using an old pot, scrub it thoroughly. Soak new porous clay pots for at least an hour to replace the air in the walls with water. Prepare a good soil mixture of 3 parts good garden loam and one part organic matter (well decomposed manure, leafmold, compost or peat). After remov-

the plant from the old pot, force the roots apart with your fingers so the individual roots can come in contact with fresh soil.

Crossbreeding of beef cattle will be discussed on April 28th at the Carrizozo Recreation Center starting at 7:30 p.m. Lewis Holland and Bobby Rankin will point out some of the advantages and disadvantages of cross breeding program.

Dr. Holland is in charge of the beef cattle crossbreeding project being carried out at Fort Stanton and the College ranch. He will tell the group what is being done in a cross breeding program here as well as results from other tests.

Dr. Rankin will assist with the program and tell the group how to interpret beef performance records. He is in charge of the Tucumcari Bull Test program and had been in charge of this program since it was started.

The program is sponsored by the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

New Mexico's Wool sales were called last week after early showings revealed little buyer interest. Roswell Wool and Mohair showed wool about an hour Monday and stopped because only one buyer was bidding. Bond Baker Co. Roswell, showed about two hours Tuesday, then stopped, also drawing only one bid on most lots. Artesia Wool Co-op called off its sale scheduled Wednesday. About half a dozen prospective buyers attended, but most said they had no orders. Albuquerque Wool Warehouse, scheduled to sell late in April, postponed its showing indefinitely.

Continued From Page One bined records of the Racing Commission and the attorney general on Culver's acquisition of Ruidoso Downs are about two feet thick, and growing. The story begins early last year, when Ruidoso Downs was probably in more financial trouble than it had ever been in. Eugene V. Hensley and his former wife, Billie, owned just over 50 per cent of the stock in the track.

But Hensley was about to exhaust all appeals on a federal income tax conviction. On March 15, 1969, Culver wrote a desk memo to Hensley. "Dear Gene: Enclosed you will find a draft of the earnest money contract for your examination. I am having a separate contract drawn up and the non-competitive employment contract for you."

the Jacobs operations—and nobody these days seems to be neutral. The Sporting News once advocated that the founding members of the Jacobs family be given a place in baseball's Hall of Fame for their financial support of faltering ballclubs. The same editorial quote Fred Haney, retired manager of the California Angels, as saying, "There were many years when many clubs could not have opened the season without the Jacobs help."

On the other hand there has been the recent campaign by Arizona congressman Sam Steiger, who one horse race periodical said "has been flitting around the countryside" questioning tactics of Emprise. Steiger told the New Mexico Racing Commission on Feb. 21 that the Jacobs enterprises have been "involved with known cosa nostra figures identified in the McClellan Committee report."

In April, Steiger raised his "mafia" cry before the Florida Racing Commission, but acknowledged, "This is all-guilt by association, and this is exactly what it is, I make no bones about it."

He made similar charges on the floor of Congress on two occasions in March. This prompted Jeremy Jacobs to invite an investigation of Emprise, in a letter to U.S. Atty. Gen. John Mitchell. But another part of the Steiger testimony, perhaps more to the point for the horse-minded New Mexico commissioners, was that Emprise and Sportservice have managed to control several tracks in Arizona. There isn't much official documentation about the Jacobs operations in Arizona, but a March 6 report by the Arizona auditor general tells the story of Tucson Turf Club, a closed horse track. It opened only for one season, in the fall of 1967. The auditor general says the land and buildings were leased from Emprise Corp., and the concessionaire also was Emprise, though the public stock sale advertisements never made the connection known.

It isn't necessary to thumb through the underworld to find out where Emprise got the \$600,000 it loaned to Culver and his Newco associates on July 31, 1969. On that same day, according to the attorney general's files, Ruidoso State Bank loaned the exact same amount to Emprise. Most of the money—perhaps 90 per cent—came from Albuquerque National Bank. The note to Hensley for \$510,000 also was arranged through Ruidoso State, which holds the 1,000 shares as collateral for Hensley. On July 31, 1969, Ruidoso State loaned the Newco group another \$500,000.

The bank's loan to Emprise, according to the attorney general's documents, was secured by the full assets of a Jacobs corporation called High Park. The bank's loan to Newco was secured by all the purchased stock in Ruidoso Racing except the 1,859 shares from Hensley, by the "unlimited guarantee" of the four incorporators and their wives and by a \$500,000 life insurance policy on Culver. "The bank required Newco to buy a half-million dollar life policy on me, so they always have that way out," Culver jokingly told the Racing Commission. The policy was written by Equitable Life Assurance, Tom Mosier's company. What interested the commission perhaps more than any of the other July 31 documents was a contract that gives Emprise an option to take over the bank loan and all the security—the stock, the life policy and the unlimited guarantees of the Newco group. "The contract was a letter signed by Ruidoso State Bank president Ed Wimberly and a vice president of Emprise. The New York organization can take over the position of the bank 'in the event of a default' by Newco in any of several other agreements. The defaults, according to the contract, could be in any payment of the Newco note to the bank, the Newco note to Emprise or the agreement under which Sportservice gets the concession at Ruidoso Downs. Wimberly told the Feb. 21 commission hearing: "I am in the first position; and if my note is in default or any of my agreements are in default, then I, by agreement, have given Emprise Corp. the right to purchase my position."

Asked why the agreement was not included in the main loan contract between the bank and Emprise, Wimberly said, "It was a time-saving factor at the time, as I recall."

He said he didn't recall why the concession default was in his agreement with Emprise or if Newco was aware of the agreement. The concession contract, over 30 pages long, gives Sportservice the sole right to sell food and drinks for 15 years, with options to renew for the 10 years after that. The pressure on Newco is that any default in the concession agreement gives Emprise the right to take over the bank's position as creditor and accelerate the note. Even the withdrawal of the track's liquor license by the state is apparently a default in the concession agreement. In one hearing, Azar was asked what would happen if there was no racing license or liquor license allowed at the track.

"We're in trouble," the accountant said. "I mean, well, Emprise at that point would have a lot of options." The two loans plus the Hensley note totaled about \$1.71 million. On Sept. 8, 1969, Azar listed the value of Ruidoso Racing Association stock held by Newco at \$2.12 million. An Azar balance sheet of Sept. 10, 1969, for the Racing Association, listed as cash on hand and in banks \$464,118. But on Jan. 30 a statement of combined assets for Newco and the Racing Association, as of Oct. 31, 1969—this one by an Arizona accountant—listed only about \$350,000 on hand after deduction of "trust funds held for racing purses."

The commission asked what happened to the cash. Azar said that, first, there was a \$165,000 bookkeeper's error in the September statement. That would leave \$300,000 or so in cash. This didn't go into trust funds, he testified. And he said further that, "Bills were paid from Sept. 8 on through Oct. 31." "These disclosures apparently began to interest the minority stockholders. And on April 14 they filed their receivership suit against the corporation.




Quick Pizza

4. Bake at 450 F. for 8-10 minutes.


