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Grace Romero receives fellowship

Sister Grace Romero, who has taught school in Carrizozo for six years, will take a leave of absence at the end of this school year and will start work at the University of New Mexico in September on a Master's Level Fellowship for the academic year 1970-71.

Grace taught both high school Spanish and the third grade for three years at St. Rita School before it was consolidated with the public school and since that time she has handled the Miami Linguistic program in addition to teaching third grade in the Carrizozo school.

She prefers working with the little ones who may have language difficulties because they

can be helped then before any language problem might get bigger. She will teach a summer language program in June in Carrizozo.

A letter from Darrel Hindman, director of division of special education for the state, reads in part: "This fellowship is in the amount of a \$2,200.00 stipend, with \$2,500.00 support to the University. We are sure you will consider this award an honor because of the large number of highly - qualified applicants for fellowships and traineeships this year. Congratulations on your selection and best wishes for a successful year of work in your chosen field of special education."

The construction will get underway in the near future.

"Dear Uncle Sam: Why do you allow me only \$600 income tax deduction to raise my child for one year? You allow \$1,200 per year for each Cuban refugee, and if a Cuban boy or girl is in school, an extra \$1,000 per year.

"The Vista Training program costs \$3,100,000 to train just 202 young people, or more than \$15,000 per trainee.

"The Job Corps thus far has spent approximately \$18,000 per year to teach each high school dropout, but you still say it only costs me \$50 per month to raise my child.

"To feed, clothe and train a young man in the armed services costs \$1,076.14, but you expect me to do the same thing for \$600.

"But this one takes the cake:

You allow me only \$600 per year to take care of my child, but will give, through ADC, \$800 per year to take care of one who has no legal father. This seems to say that you think he is more important than mine.

"I am yelling, Uncle Sam, because I think it is time some one pointed out these inconsistencies.

may examine seed and see some difference between lots. Since you cannot tell the quality of seed by looking at it, the only way to determine this is to read the tags.

The analysis tag states the crop and variety of crop seed in the bag, name and address of the seller, origin, lot number and net weight. It also gives the quality of the seed determined by analyzing and testing a sample taken from the seed lot. This quality is indicated by the percentage of the germination, and when present the percentage of weight of inert matter, mixtures of other crop and weed seeds.

The certification tag is a sign to the buyer that the seed has met specific minimum field and seed quality standards of a state certifying agency.

If the seed is treated to control seed-borne disease, a special warning tag must be attached to the bag. If the treatment is

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

Round-up

Apples are in full bloom in the Honda Valley this week. This means that if you expect to have warm, fire apples the grower needs to have his sprayer ready to go. The first spray is necessary within ten days after petal fall and sprays are needed 14 days later.

If you have a codling moth trap you may be able to time your sprays more closely by spraying six days after the first female moths appear. Otherwise follow a 14 days spray schedule.

Codling moth sex lure traps will again be used in the Honda Valley. There were no traps last year at A. T. Pingsree, Dave Bonnell, Juan Montoya and Bill Schreengost. Hopefully these sex lure traps will start operating this weekend. You might check with these people to see if they are catching any moths.

Dr. Darrell Sullivan, professor of Horticulture reports that a rebrand Alar has improved apple quality and even delayed the bloom on experimental apple trees. The growth retardant was sprayed on soon after full bloom. It increased color and firmness of fruit delicious. When sprayed in late September it delayed bloom about five days.

Farmers who take their tractors on the highways, should have a slow moving vehicle emblem. The emblem is a fluorescent orange-yellow, 48 inch triangle with a dark red reflective border. When attached to the rear end of a tractor, a hayrick or any slow moving vehicle, the orange-yellow is highly visible during the daylight hours. The reflective red border glows brilliantly around a hollow triangle when it is in the path of headlights at night. In some states, law requires the emblem to be displayed on all tractors. The emblem is most easily identified and seen when it is located at the rear-center of vehicles about three to five feet above ground. The position permits quick eye contact, is within normal headlight beams and can be seen for as far as a sixth of a mile behind the slow moving vehicle.

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Car Care moves forward with the times

Times do change as sure as the wind does blow once in a while in Lincoln County and over the years the "Car Care" industry has changed so that today both travelers and local people can get the best of service for their vehicles as well as traveler accommodations.

Two pictures show here the change from the days when USA went along the railroad tracks and there was no overpass—up to the present time when USA and US80 intersect making a busy corner and downtown Carrizozo has a number of important stops for people in need of car care. Alberts Roberts, a lifelong resident of Carrizozo, can remember when Ira Wetmore opened the first service station in Carrizozo, in the building across from Peden Drug Store. In those days you got either white or red gas and it was hand cranked out of a pump like the antique you see in one of the pictures.

Along with Ira Wetmore there was a group of three service stations, right where the antique pump picture was taken, operated by Harry Miller, Lewis Adams and Clayton Hurl. None of these buildings, on old Front Street, are occupied. They went out of business shortly after USA was moved over a couple of blocks to its present location.

There was a service station south of the Western Hotel operated by Ed Harris when this street was a busy highway. At that time Alan Johnson and his brother had a garage on down the way a bit. A few people around Carrizozo will remember the gasoline came to town in barrels then.

During the same period of years there were two more stations on the north end of USA beyond where the overpass is located, and they were operated by Myer and Mike Burnett and Albert Roberts who had as his helper Buster Walker and Johnson Stearns along in the '30's.

In those days you could fix a Model T with a pair of pliers and a bit of wire and the car care business was not so complicated. The modern service station pump pictured here fills a tank fast at the same time recording both gallons and money. It takes a whole lot of tools, several instruction books for new model vehicles, and a great many more parts to supply the car care industry in these days.

Carrizozo is fortunate in having one of the largest and best equipped vehicle parts businesses in the southwest—Means Motor Supply which also is dealer for H.C. Scouts and pick-ups. Means also operates a wrecker service and supplies many of the hard-to-get used parts. This business is on west US80.

Ortiz Bros. operate a big Chevrolet Station down town and take care of a great many travelers carrying the Chevrolet card. S. M. Ortiz, owner-operator of the station, also markets gasoline and oil from El Paso in his own transport.

Just a few steps across USA is the Phillips 66 station operated by Weyland Hill. When they're going to have some fun with a pit, hit and throw contest for all interested Carrizozo youngsters, Dale Lamay is the Phillips 66 distributor for both Lincoln and Otero counties and backs up the trade.

The Apache Mobil Station, operated by Calvin McGinnis, will soon have a new home. Orin Martin, Mobil distributor from Socorro, was in town Tuesday helping get the plumbing done for the new Mobil location at the Five Points garage at the head of US 54 South. They expect to be open in this location by May 1.

When repair or overhaul is needed on the really heavy stuff, like tractors and big trucks, they wind up at Dutch Cor's Central Welding Service and Supply where the complete job can be done including everything from trace - tractors to front and loaders, ranch tractors and trucks.

One of the real big news events in Carrizozo history happened when an Airforce training plane tried to take off going south on USA and never made it. The plane crashed right into the Monte Vista station, about 1948. The station was then rebuilt and eight years ago it was brought up to date as you see it today, the rock veneer added last year.

Another genuine sign of changing times, more and more people on the road each year is in the memory of one early-day car care business man who told us they might service 20-25 cars a day. Now it's more like 200-300 cars a day when the traffic really gets rolling and people are heading to the Land of Enchantment from all over the country.
