Public land hearing scheduled May 27

A public hearing on the proposed classification of approximately 30,000 acres of public land for Multiple Use Management has been announced by J. W. Young, Las Cruces District Manager, of the Bureau of Land Management. The hearing will be held on May 27, 1970 at 2:00 p.m. at the Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico.

The public lands are located approximately 20 miles north west of Carrizozo in the Bureau's Chupadera Mesa Planning Unit. The lands lie within the Harvey Investment Company Ranch.

The purpose of the hearing is to obtain comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed classification. Mr. Young states, that the proposed classification was published in the Federal Register on May 5, 1970, page 7085 and anyone wishing to make written comments should send them to District Manager, Bureau of Land Management, P. O. Box 1420, Las Cruces, New Mexico 88001, within 60 days from the date of publication of the proposed classification in the Federal Register.

All persons interested in the future of their public lands are encouraged to attend the meeting or submit their written comments.

Three boys going to state meet

The Carrizozo track team coached by Lee Fleming and Tommy Pannel scored 41 points at the district meet in Jal last Saturday, a record high for the Grizzlies over a long span of years. Jal won the meet with 105 points, Eunice second with 95 and Carrizozo placed third. Charles Mackey set a new district record in the pole vault at 13.1 and qualified for the state track meet. Alfonso Lucero vaulted 10.7 for 4th place. Mackey also qualified for the state meet in the 100-yard dash with a 10.4 time. He won 3rd in the 100, the video tape showing him coming in 1st.

Marc Ellison was 2nd in the 2-mile run with 10:51:3 time good enough to qualify him for the state meet. Marcos Barela did the 2-mile in 11 flat for 5th place.

David Lock won 2nd in the high hurdles in 17 flat also qualifying for the state meet. Paul Pino won 3rd with 17.2 time. Mackey won 3rd in the 220 dash in 23.4, missed state meet by 1/10th of second. Tony Ball placed 4th in the mile run with time of 4:59.5, real good time for a freshman.

Ray Roper, Willie Gallegos, David Roper and Charles Mackey ran the 440 relay in 45.5 for 4th place, missed qualifying by 1/10th. This same quarter did the 880 relay in 1:36.8. The medley relay team ran 4th but was disqualified for stepping on line.

Paul Pino, Tony Ball, Jay Barnes and Russel Leslie ran the mile relay in 3:59 for 4th place. Willie Gallegos broad jumped 18.5 for 5th. Gable Chavez threw the javelin 145.2 for 3rd. Alfonso Lucero did 141 for 4th.

The three boys who qualified will go to the state meet Friday and Saturday in Albuquerque with Coaches Fleming and Pannel.

May 10-16 proclaimed State Hospitals Week


Governor David Cargo has proclaimed May 10-16 as State Hospitals Week in New Mexico in recognition of the second anniversary of the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions (DHI).

The proclamation, presented by the Governor to DHI Secretary Dr. Miron Neal, also noted that May 10-16 was being observed throughout the country as National Hospital Week.

Fort Stanton, a school for retarded children and adults located in Lincoln County, is one of eight facilities operated by the DHI.

Establishment of the Department of Hospitals was approved during the 1968 session of the State Legislature and became effective May 16 of that year. The DHI now cares for more than 1700 patients, including the mentally retarded, the aged and chronically ill.

In commemoration of State Hospitals Week, Fort Stanton Administrator Roscoe Manning invites the public to visit the school and observe some of the programs for the mentally retarded.

Athletic Director and Head Basketball Coach Louis R. Henson of New Mexico State, one of the winningest coaches in the nation, will be guest speaker at the annual all-sports banquet tonight (Thursday) at Carrizozo School.

Coach Henson was born and raised in Okay, Oklahoma, attended Corners State College in Oklahoma two years and then transferred to N. M. State in the spring of 1953. He received his Master's Degree at State and during this time started coaching Las Cruces High B-team making a 42-7 won-loss mark and was promoted to head coach at the same school.

In 1958-59 the Henson coached Cruces Bulldogs won the N. M. Class A state basketball championship with a 24-6 record, repeated the next year with a 27-3 year. The following year his team went 29-1 for the season and another state title.

In the spring of 1962 Henson accepted the head coaching position at Hardin - Simmons in Abilene, Texas. He was a winner there as coach and also athletic director.

In April of 1966 Coach Henson returned to his alma mater to become head basketball coach, following a 4-22 won - lost season at State. The Aggies did not wait long to come up in basketball. His first season was 15-11. His second season brought a hard-earned 23-6 record and the name "The Amazin' Aggies". This team placed third in the NCAA far west regionals.

In 1968-69 Henson's Amazin' Aggies went to a 24-5 mark and 9th in final coaches poll. Henson's fourth year at State produced the greatest single sports season in NMSU history. The team finished third in the nation with a 28-3 record.

Carrizozo lettermen will be honored and awards will be given for all sports.

Corona Auxiliary sponsors poppies

On Saturday, May 23, all of us will be asked to wear a red memorial poppy. As most of you certainly know, once each year Americans observe Poppy Day which is a voluntary tribute to our dead and disabled servicemen.

By accepting one of these poppies from a member of the American Legion Auxiliary or some other volunteer we aid the living victim of the past wars while honoring our dead. The poppy grew in the battlefield of France and Belgium where American servicemen have fallen during two World Wars. In the years following the first World War the poppy came to be recognized as nature's tribute to the war dead, and it was soon adopted as the American Legion and Auxiliary's official memorial flower.

These memorial poppies you will be offered have been made in hospitals and workshops where the suffering of the war still exists. The disabled veterans who make these flowers are able to gain a dual benefit from their work -- the poppy program gives many men their only opportunity to support themselves and their families; and it offers them a productive pastime with which to combat long hours in the hospital wards.

Volunteers who offer the poppies to the public, unlike the disabled veterans, receive nothing tangible for their work, however, these workers gain

satisfaction from their contribution to a program which honors the war dead while assisting the living. Money dropped into contribution boxes in exchange for poppies goes directly to the welfare activities of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary; all funds are used for the aid of disabled veterans, their families and the families of deceased servicemen.

Understanding the character and purpose of Poppy Day, would any of us wish to ignore this appeal? I am sure all of us will consider it a privilege to wear a poppy again this year on Poppy Day.

News and Notes

More-easy-care fabrics for children's clothing are showing up this spring and for us working mothers especially, isn't that wonderful news?

Acrylics, cotton, polyester, and nylon fibers are being used alone or in blends to achieve easy-care clothes. When shopping for children's clothing, it's important to learn if everything on the garment is washable - lining, interfacing, and buttons. Trims such as lace, braid, and rick rack are especially popular this year. Be sure to find out if they can be cleaned the same way as the rest of the garment. Trim that needs to be removed when the garment is washed is an unnecessary waste of time for the busy mother.

When using washable fabrics for making children's garments, also select washable linings, trims, interfacings, and buttons. Preshrink linings, trims, and interfacings before construction. Some of the new washable fabrics have soil resistant that sometimes show up on permanent press fabrics. These washable fabrics with soil and crease resistant finishes not only keep children's clothes neat but save on the cleaning bill.







Fort Stanton Hospital 1855-1970 observes hospital week



PICTURE NO. 1 — Established in 1855 as a military outpost to protect the settlers from Indians, Fort Stanton has been in almost continuous use since then. This picture, taken in the 1880's, shows the Fort Stanton parade ground much as it appears today.



PICTURE NO. 2 — Some of the original horse stables still stand at Fort Stanton. Perhaps horses were saddled from this area when the Fort was abandoned at the start of the Civil War. Kit Carson may have boarded his steed in one of these stalls after he recaptured the outpost for the Union in 1842. Or cavalry soldiers, who became involved in the Lincoln County War of 1878, may have mounted for duty nearby.



PICTURE NO. 4 — Today Fort Stanton serves as an educational and training facility for the mentally retarded of New Mexico. Operated by the State Dept. of Hospitals and Institutions, Fort Stanton is one of three DHI MR facilities. Where soldiers once marched on the parade ground, more than 200 children now find a place to live and play.



PICTURE NO. 3 — This was a frequent scene during the period from 1900-1953, when Fort Stanton served as a tuberculosis sanatorium for the Merchant Marine Hospitals. Hundreds of seamen were treated at the hospital, which was the first federally-operated TB sanatorium.



PICTURE NO. 4 — All that remains of a once thriving World War II internment camp at Fort Stanton are a few dilapidated buildings near the Bonito River. The camp was established as the first of the war to house the 400 men of the scuttled German luxury liner Columbus.

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

Art Salas likes work in hospital

Art Salas, assistant administrator at Fort Stanton, made a decision seven years ago which he thinks was the smartest choice he ever made.

A native of Lincoln, Salas was working as an insurance agent in 1963 when he went to Fort Stanton to sell a policy to a social worker. During the transaction he learned his customer was leaving the school soon, and so he went and applied for the job.

"I wanted to get into the hospital field," Salas said, "and I've never regretted it. I think it's great."

In 1968, Art had another decision to make. At that time Fort Stanton was a tuberculosis sanatorium, but the TB program was being transferred to Fort Bayard to make room for a mental retardation facility. Art had the choice to transfer to Fort Bayard or remain with the new MR program at Fort Stanton. He stayed and two years later was appointed assistant administrator.

Asked why he stayed with the mental retardation program, Salas said, "I felt times were changing and progress was being

Fr. Stanton receives \$11,353 Title I grant

A federal Title I grant of \$11,353 has been approved for Fort Stanton to purchase equipment and hire two summer teachers for various training programs at the state school for the mentally retarded.

Title I funds, used several years ago to equip a kitchen and sewing room, will now provide additional home furnishings and appliances to increase the home economics unit by two rooms.

Pre-vocational training will be enhanced with the addition of a summer teacher and teacher aide during the months of June through August. The Title I funds also will help expand the present sheltered workshop for jewelry making, and allow the addition of rug weaving.

Others judging in the junior contest were: Lois Ann Sultemeier, Joan Alford, Bret Carnell, Mark Sultemeier, Janetta Foster and Ward Alford. With each county being allowed to have 20 contestants, all those judging will be participating in the county contest in Roswell on May 23rd.

It pays to control cholla cactus is the tentative conclusion of a one-year study on three ranches in Lincoln County. The results measured on the three ranches by Dr. Rex Pieper of NMSU is:

The location "2" was in lower vigor than the other two locations because of low rainfall during the summer of 1969 and gave the greatest response. This would appear to indicate that as grazing becomes heavier, competition for moisture becomes greater between grass and cholla. The measured benefit ranged from 20 to 128 pounds per acre in these studies.

Several counties have reported rather large increases in cholla in recent years. These noxious plants are easiest controlled and for less cash outlay when they are first observed to be increasing on a ranch. The areas reported above had approximately 300 plants per acre. Many ranchers have indicated that labor saving die to opening the ranges will justify the cost of control.

Dear Mrs. Dale:

This morning I read with great interest your letter to Mr. Payton the editor of the Lincoln Co. News and decided to write you this letter since you asked if any person had put the column Rambling Around Lincoln County in book form, this column was authored by Mr. Paul Baker who now lives in the state of Calif. I have been working on this very project for a number of months, slowly gathering copies of all the Rambling Around columns that were printed beginning Jan. 1956 and going up in to 1959. I have the big majority of these columns in my possession thanks to Mr. Lenard Hunt of Roswell, New Mexico, the husband of the late Frances Wells Hunt who was born and raised in White Oaks, N. M., Mrs. Emma Pingsen Armstrong of Tucuman, N. M., her father being the editor of a paper in White Oaks in the early days and then Mrs. M. U. Finley, a pioneer resident of Lincoln County but now living in Clovis, N. M. I know where the copies of the Lincoln County News for the years of 1956 - 57 - 58 - 59 are on file and as soon as I find out what columns I am missing I will go and make copies so that I will have them all. I hope in due time that it will be possible for me to put these columns in book form and feel sure that Mr. Paul Baker will assist me in any way possible.

It might be well to introduce myself to you so that you will know how I fit in this picture. I am the son of William (Bill) M. Kelt who owned and operated a cattle ranch near Coyote, N. M. in Lincoln County for many years. John Dale was a friend of my fathers and I personally remember the Dale family living at Ancho, N. M. back many years ago. I notice you mention Ola C. Jones who was the Supt. of Schools for Lincoln County a number of years back. Mrs. Jones signed my graduation diploma. I just wrote Mrs. Jones a letter the last few days asking her assistance on another one of my projects which is the early history of White Oaks, N. M. and its pioneer citizens. I have been working on this project for about 2 years gathering up old photos from all over the United States and other material such as old newspapers printed way back beginning in the 1880's.

You will be interested in knowing that I suddenly decided to work on my family genealogy some two or three years back and this is how I got interested in the history of White Oaks where my mother was born in 1890. She will be celebrating her 80th birthday on June 2, 1970 and is still in real good health and working everyday here in our store. She is really a big help in working on the White Oaks history and also she enjoys reading all the letters I am receiving from old timers of Lincoln County. I am having to write hundreds of letters and it is paying off. Just today I received four letters from different folks who sent me valuable information on White Oaks.

Back to the Rambling Around columns. The big majority of these columns somewhere will have something to say about White Oaks since many of the pioneer people interviewed by Mr. Baker had sometime or other lived in White Oaks, many of them coming there in the 1880's. As you read in this column on Mr. and Mrs. John Dale they were married in White Oaks, N. M. on February 14, 1897.

I might also tell you that on March 14, 1970 a large group of interested people met in Carrizozo, N. M. and formed the White Oaks Historical Assoc. Roy Harman the Postmaster in Carrizozo being elected Pres. myself as Vice Pres. and Mrs. Larue Lane Wetzel, White Oaks Route, Carrizozo was elected Sec. - Treas. Other directors elected were Bryan Hightower, Herman Kelt, Sr., Charles Wetzel, Ellen Queen Cady, Zane

Leslie, Bud Payne and R. A. Crenshaw. We plan to install a museum in the old White Oaks school house in due time. The old school house made of brick and stone and is still in real good shape considering that it was built and finished on Nov. 30, 1893. Here is a big chunk of history laying in White Oaks and we hope to make it so that many people can enjoy seeing this history on display. Membership in our assoc. is \$5.00 in case you would like to join us in this venture.

I am going to send you six copies of the John Dale Rambling Around column since you were asking where more copies could be gotten. You mentioned the two weekly columns and then there was another printed sometime in 1957 and I made a copy of it for you also. If you desire more copies please feel free to write me for same.

If by any chance your family might have any old photos made in or around White Oaks in the early day, of picnic groups, homes, business buildings or anything referring to White Oaks or that vicinity I would love for you to send them to me so that I might make copies and return the originals right back. It just could be that the Dale family might have something that could use in my White Oaks project.

In closing I would like to say that Mr. and Mrs. Paul Payton or the Lincoln County News in Carrizozo are certainly doing a great service for their readers by printing different articles dealing with early history of Lincoln County that are sent in from time to time by their readers. I for one appreciate their efforts very much.
