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## Salaries up, number of teachers goes down

The school budget team led by Harry Wugalter, chief of Public School Finance Division, Department of Finance and Administration for the State of New Mexico and including Carl Wittamore, budget analyst; Mrs. Blanche Collier, elementary education instruction division; Don Harvey, Title I; Bill Lemon, transportation; and Wade Fredrickson, vocational education; spent two days in Carrizozo reviewing five school budgets. Chief Wugalter made several comments about education and budgeting in Lincoln County.

First, he was appreciative of the presence of student council members from Corona and Ruidoso at the hearing. He thought involvement of the student body in problems of administration to be exceptionally fine and one of the means for better communication between students and the administration.

Wugalter found many fine innovative programs in the Lincoln County school districts. State Department officials were most complimentary about emphasis on pre-school and

early childhood as well as the non-graded elementary programs.

Lincoln County is an exception to the average in the state in that local money participation is much higher here. Examples, The Southern Pacific Railroad pays 38.55 percent of the load in the Carrizozo district, in the Corona district El Paso Natural Gas Co. pays 30 percent and the Railroad 15 percent of the load.

During most of the five budget hearings the staff was looking for money, not big amounts, but enough to stretch the budgets

over enrollments that are down. A reduction in teaching staff freed dollars that were used for salary increases, and in some instances the maintenance money was cut back.

There will be three new superintendents in Lincoln County for next school year, Ira Caster at Capitan, Ernest Bookee at Hondo and Jim Steineprets in Carrizozo. Former Capitan superintendent Duane Darling will assume duties as superintendent at Loving next year. Former Carrizozo superintendent Glen Ellison will be on the staff of Eastern N. M. University with an office in Roswell where he will work as recruiter counselor for post-secondary students. Former Hondo superintendent Fermin Montes is retiring. Pat Valliant is superintendent at Ruidoso, Lewis Stratton is superintendent at Corona.

Wugalter said he expected little change from the way budgets were shaped up at the Carrizozo hearings.

The budget dollar in Carrizozo school district will be spent this way: 7 percent or \$19,950 for administration, 63 percent or \$192,607 for instruction which includes teacher salaries, text books and teaching supplies. A \$3,000 item for instructional aide was cut back to \$2750 for two reasons, it was high by state average and the budget staff was trying to pickup \$1800.

Health nurse figure of \$600 carried no percentage. Pupil transportation services will cost 7 percent or \$13,917, operation of plant 9 percent or \$27,100, maintenance of plant 2 percent or \$4,265. (Budget estimate was \$5,000 and cut back to \$4,265).

Fixed charges for educational retirement, social security, bonds, insurance will take 10 percent or \$29,350. Carrizozo is one of only three districts now providing 50 percent of cost of health and accident insurance

premiums, a recent development in school budgeting.

A \$200 item for food services carries no percentage, likewise a \$1,000 item for student activities. Capital outlay, new equipment and improvement, will cost 2 percent or \$4,400. Special project item of \$2,200 carries no percentage.

These items should total 100 percent to make up the total budget figure of \$304,783 for Carrizozo school district.

The point was made at the hearing that if Carrizozo school had more master degree teachers the cost for teacher salaries would be higher, but that more master degree teachers were desirable. There is only one teacher in the Carrizozo system with a Master Degree, Emma Lawson who teaches home economics, highest paid teacher in the system.

Federal money for home economics is being cut back in all schools in the state.

Carrizozo school has experienced a decline in average daily membership from a high of 454 students 3-4 years ago to the 420 students anticipated for the 1970-71 school year.

Teacher reductions were made in three schools, Ruidoso is reducing one-half high school clerk, one special education staff member, and one-fourth custodian. Corona is reducing one classroom teacher.

Figures that pretty well tell the story for all five Lincoln County schools are shown here. ADM means average daily membership, basis used for allocation of state money. Note that the cost of education per pupil ranges from low of \$679 per year for Ruidoso to high of \$1377 at Corona. Ruidoso expects 818 students, Carrizozo with 420 students is operating almost as low as Ruidoso at \$695 per pupil. Top teacher salary figure is new budget, bottom figure from last year. Tax levies cost per \$1,000.

George Washington Carver may have discovered a multitude of uses for the versatile peanut, but to my taste it still is at its best when made into Peanut Butter.

Peanut Butter is the only nut butter produced commercially to any extent in this country. It is valued not only for its taste but is a very nutritive spread because of its high fat, protein, mineral and B-vitamin content. If you've just been using it with the old standby jelly and bread, you might try this "Peanut Butter Pudding" for a change of pace. It makes 6 servings of 1/3 cup each.

1 egg, 1/4 cup sugar, 2 Tbsp. cornstarch, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 2 cups milk, 1 tsp. vanilla.

Break egg into a pan. Beat well. Add sugar, cornstarch and salt. Mix until smooth. Measure into pan the peanut butter and milk. Mix well. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture thickens. Cook and stir 1 minute longer. Remove pan from heat. Measure and stir in vanilla. Set pan in cold water to cool. Pour pudding into a bowl. Cover bowl and chill in the refrigerator.

Why does a woman wear perfume? Perfumes and women go together, and through the centuries fragrance has been used to bolster feminine self-confidence. Perfume is good for morale. A dash of a familiar scent has been known to uplift drooping spirits in much the same way that indulging in a new hat or dress will change a woman's outlook. With the magic of perfume a woman feels like a different person—and because she feels so she actually is.

To some perfume is a thing apart, something fragrant to wear, but with no particular relationship to what is being worn. This is a mistake, because fragrance is as much an accessory as are gloves, handbags or jewelry, and the wrong scent can detract from the over-all effect of your appearance as surely as any other ill-chosen accessory.

On an important occasion, perfume may be the most effective accessory for one's admirers may forget a certain hat or the style of the dress that was worn but a perfume is almost never forgotten. It is like music in its ability to revive memories, and years later when that same scent is experienced, events of long ago are recalled to mind with lightning-like swiftness.

Because of the profusion of perfumes from which to choose, it is something like wandering round in a jungle of delightful fragrances. Your perfume should complement your personality, become a part of you. You must like it, but even more important it must like you. This is because of the mysterious thing called "body chemistry." Besides the ingredients in the perfume, its reaction when it mingles with the oils of your skin is what provides the ultimate effect.

Then how is one to know which perfume is the right one? Do exactly as you would do when shopping for a dress — try it on. A dress or suit should never be purchased without trying it on for fit and becomingness, so make the same test for perfume. Try it on for "fit" and if it suits your chemical personality, you will be happy with it.

To choose perfume is like buying diamonds or furs — no inexperienced in either field attempts to buy these items in an unknown shop — you must depend upon the integrity of the house behind the product, and this is equally true with perfume. Good material makes for good goods.

Once the perfume is selected, the next thing to think about is how to wear it. Do not insult the fragrance that you have taken so much time to acquire, by hastily dabbing it on. To get the most from your perfume apply it correctly. Spray it on the "pulse" spots—the places where the warmth of your body gently diffuses its fragrance so that the scent seems to come from within. These areas are the inside of your wrists, your temples, the crook of your elbows and knees, and the palms of your hands. Summer is the time for the lightest of scents. The floral bouquet type is especially good for this season. The history of perfume is intertwined with the history of the human race; for there are few periods of existence that have not been influenced in some degree by fragrance. When Cleopatra sailed up the River Cydnus to meet Mark Antony, clouds of fragrance swirled before her, announcing her arrival long before her barge came into sight. Pots of aromatic, fans of unguents and sweet-smelling oils perfumed the sails of her craft so that as Shakespeare expressed it "The winds were love sick."



## Round-up

The New Mexico Apple Council will meet at the White Mountain Apple Shed Saturday starting at 10:00 a.m. The 1970 apple production estimates will be compiled for the state. The group will eat at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln at noon with an orchard tour in the afternoon. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

Loco weed is still causing some livestock losses in the county. I got a call from a rancher last Saturday. Upon investigating the cause of the livestock deaths, they were found to be eating an annual peavine which is a type of loco. The grass in the area was short due to a heavy range caterpillar infestation last year. Heavy supplemental feeding will help reduce the losses. Also moving the animals to another pasture may help.

Cattle seem to have special liking for cancelled trading stamps. In experiments at Ohio State University, cattle thrived on a ration including up to 35% trading stamps. Also found palatable were newspapers, magazines, wrapping paper, bags, printed literature, books, packaging materials, disposable clothing. Waste paper was shredded and mixed with conventional feed, formed into pellets.

This work could help solve two world problems - feeding the hungry (if livestock eat waste paper, then more grain is available to humans, along with meat from paper-fed animals, of course), and reducing growing piles of trash.

Early summer is the time to treat your lawn with insecticide to control white grubs. They are the larvae of several species of May and June beetles. Grubs are whitish to gray, have brown heads, and usually lie in a curled position. Grubs feed on grass roots an inch or two below the ground. As they cut off the roots, the lawn will gradually die out in irregular spots.

Grubs come from eggs laid in the ground by several different kinds of tan to dark brown or green beetles. The beetles are strong fliers and are attracted to manure and rotting grass clippings where they lay their eggs. Grubs frequently cause damage to lawn areas that have been manured. The grubs or eggs may already be in the manure or the adults will be attracted to the treated area. The adults are also attracted to lights. Therefore, lawns near street lights or lighted patios often become infested.

Preventative treatments for grubs give the best results.

## Heidel gets mother-in-law endorsement

A candidate for the State Supreme Court today said that one of the most important votes the people of New Mexico will cast in the June 2nd Primary will be in the selection of Supreme Court Justices.

State Representative Finis L. Heidel today said that New Mexico may very well see a complete turnover in the Supreme Court of New Mexico because of the recent retirement of judges who have served many years on the State's High Court. "I believe," he said, "that most of the people in the state are aware of this and will cast

their vote for those who will strive as judges to attain results which will be beneficial to society as a whole."

Heidel pointed out that as a practical matter only what is accepted and enforced by the courts is law. The Lovington legislator said that as far as selection of judges in the upcoming primary is concerned, New Mexicans should consider maintaining a thoroughly judicial attitude about the High Court of New Mexico. "In other words," he said, "candidates should only expect to get two endorsements -- from their mother-in-law and the people of the state." The judicial candidate emphasized, "The Supreme Court of the State of New Mexico is not the place for campaign endorsements of any type and judges should be selected on the basis of their qualifications and experience which will guide them

in meting out equal justice for all."

Heidel said that he was gratified by the insight and response the people around the state have shown in his campaign. "New Mexicans are genuinely concerned about the many problems confronting the courts today," he said, "and this can only mean that the people know the judicial candidates and will vote accordingly."
