## DWI's picked up Friday found to be loaded with 'speed' and marijuana

State Policeman Andy Benevisez, assisted by Marshal Choncho Morales picked up three young men on a DWI charge at 12:35 a.m. Friday at the south end of Carrizozo. All had been drinking, but after a search warrant was obtained and the vehicle searched a quantity of methamphetamine better known as "speed" worth from \$600 to \$700 was found plus a small amount of marijuana.

The vote in Lincoln County in Tuesday's primary was light, the outcome of the several contests pretty much as expected in this county. Lincoln County did not go with the state pattern in this election as in the general election two years ago.

Joseph M. Montoya won the state senator race over Richard B. Edwards in this county and in the state on the Democratic ticket. Harold Runnels won unopposed for U. S. Rep. Bruce King was expected to carry Lincoln County in the governor race but the state outcome not so certain. King went all the way winning over Jack Daniels.

The U. S. governor candidate that worked hardest in Lincoln County certainly got the most votes here. This was Orlando V. Gallegos but state wide it was Robert A. Mondragon winning in a real close race with C. B. Trujillo who got only 36 votes in Lincoln and David H. Kelsey who polled 117 here.

Betty Firiona carried Lincoln and the state for secretary of state.

For state auditor the Lincoln winner was Frank M. Olmstead, also the state winner. Jesse Kornegay unopposed for state treasurer. David L. Norvell was big winner in Lincoln for attorney general and won the state in same manner over Gary O'Dowd.

Lloyd W. Miles won the commissioner of public lands race in Lincoln and the state over Alex J. Armijo. For state corp. comm. the Lincoln winner was John W. Flynn, state winner Wednesday morning was Floyd Cross.

Finis Heidel won supreme court race over Stephenson, Oman and McManus unopposed in their supreme court races on the Democratic ticket. Hendley also unopposed for court of appeals judge.

The race for state senator, Lincoln - Otero District, was won by Tom Hamilton over Don

Hancock in a fairly close contest, Hamilton carried seven of the twelve precincts, but he won the big ones for his 357 to 245 victory.

Unopposed Democratic county candidates were Billy Gene Payne, Kenneth A. Huey and Austin A. Pritchett, magistrates; Charles A. Jones and James L. Strong, commissioners; and Margaret Ellison, county treasurer.

Republicans had the same problem in picking a state winner they missed in several contests. Anderson Carter was expected to win the U. S. senate race over Harold G. Thompson and David F. Cargo, he did by some 350 votes in Lincoln County and was a "big winner in the state outcome. Ed Foreman unopposed for U. S. Rep.

No one was betting much on the six-man Republican governor race in Lincoln County except that Steve Helbing was a close neighbor, campaigned hard here and had a slight edge. Helbing won in Lincoln, carrying all but the two Carrizozo precincts, Pete, V. Domenici won the state race.

Lincoln County rancher Joseph R. Skeen figured to get most Lincoln votes, he did winning 474 to 59 for Becht but the state outcome not so certain prior to the election. Skeen won going away and will be the lieutenant governor candidate.

Robbin Bishop unopposed for secretary of state. Larry M. Humphrey won both Lincoln and the state for state auditor. Lawrence Hess unopposed for state treasurer. Gerald Pittman won both Lincoln and state in the attorney general race.

Lincoln voted for Dow, George W. Beach won the comm. of public lands race. Russell D. Bradley for state corp. comm.; John T. Watson for state supreme court 4-years; Thomas F. McKenna over Ernest Corey for state supreme court pos. 1 and Daniel A. Sisk unopposed for state supreme court pos. 2.

The race for state representative (Lincoln - Sierra) on the Republican ticket was won handily by Arthur H. Evans. His opponent W. E. Rush did not campaign much in this county. Evans carried in Lincoln 294 to 135, he also won the race in Sierra 382 to 151.

Lincoln County Republicans running unopposed in the primary were Holt Lovelace and Don Stark for commissioner; Alice King, clerk; Mabel Vigil, treasurer; Marian Schlarb, assessor; Ernest Sanchez, sheriff; and Kenneth Nosker for probate judge.

## Quarterhorse Day at Downs Friday

Ruidoso Downs, N. M. -- Friday, June 5 will be a day for "quarter - horse" lovers at Ruidoso Downs. This day brings into focus, the first major confrontation of the leading two year old quarter horses on the grounds. The event is the trials for the twentieth running of the "Kansas Quarter - Horse Futurity" at 350 yards with an estimated purse of \$220,000. This year the "Kansas" will be run in two divisions, with the fastest ten qualifiers running in the finals on Sunday, June 14, and the second ten fastest qualifiers going in the "consolation" on Saturday, June 13.

The trials have been split into sixteen divisions, representing 155 horses. Eleven of the "heats" will carry ten runners, while the remaining races will each feature nine youngsters. Each of the trials has drawn a fairly evenly matched band of the finest two year olds in the nation, to insure an afternoon of close finishes and swift times.

Headlining the afternoon's program will be such standouts as Carlotta 2, recent victress of the Sunland Park Spring Quarter Horse Futurity; Full Moon Zestee, winner of the Blue Ribbon Downs Futurity in January, and third in the "Sunland Park"


