# Large turnout for ZoZo Quarter Horse Show

The fifth annual Carrizozo Quarter Horse Show to be held in Sargent Memorial Arena this Saturday and Sunday is expected to be one of the largest held here if number of early entries means anything. They have been coming in real good from a wide area according to Irene Barham, secretary of Lincoln County Rodeo Ass'n, the sponsor.

The judge will be John Daniel of Tolleson, Arizona. The show is approved by the American, New Mexico and the Southwestern Quarter Horse Associations.

Message for this week in comment of woman in Capitan — "Everyone in town wants to help do something during the Stampede. It's a real good thing for the town". With one of the biggest crowds ever seen on one day in Capitan they needed a lot of help.

We thought the entire Stampede was real well organized. The parade Saturday morning went off without a hitch, lots of interesting things to watch in this parade. Three chow lines set up for the barbecue handled a line that started at the exhibition barn and backed clear up beyond the corner outside the Stampede grounds, and not near all the people were in the line at one time. The rodeos were close to two hour events and run off like clock work.

There isn't much in the way of community activity that helps a town more than a big "do" like the Stampede and Capitan people can be real proud of the entertainment they put on July 3 and 4.

Nice to see Sid and Shirley Goodloe back in the serving line at the barbecue. Sid was around when the Stampede went from an event drawing a few hundred people to one that now draws several thousand each year.

## Janice Stierwalt selected queen

The annual Smokey Bear Stampede at Capitan July Fourth week end was bigger than ever this year with three young people of Lincoln County earning honors. Lon Sultemeier of Corona won first place in bull riding, third in bareback bronc riding and was named All-Around Cowboy for the 1970 Stampede.

Ronnie Eldridge of Capitan won first in bulldogging with time of 5.7. Miss Janice Stierwalt, 18 of Ruidoso was selected as Lincoln County Queen to succeed Miss De Ann Jackson of Ancho. Miss Stierwalt will also reign over the Lincoln County Fair and represent Lincoln County at the state fair. Colyn White of Clovis was named All-Around Cowgirl with points in both pole bending and barrel racing.

The county could use some rain but both days of the Stampede the weather was fair and the crowds large. Over 4,500 people attended the barbecue and rodeo Saturday according to Walt Jones. The streets of Capitan were lined with people for the Saturday morning parade which was a dandy in every way. There were 187 participants in the three rodeo performances, the most ever, coming from Colorado, Idaho, New Mexico, New York, Oklahoma and Texas. The new fair building was opened for dancing and drew larger crowds than any previous year. Results of the Smokey Bear Stampede rodeo events follow:

## South Central Mtn. Resource Area committees meet in Tularosa July 14

The South Central Mountain Resource Area executive and steering committees will meet Tuesday, July 14 in the C & C Cafe in Tularosa. The executive committee meeting will commence at 10:00 a.m. and the steering committee meeting at 1:00 p.m.

The program will be a review of the objectives of the SCMRA, by-laws, and other business. There will also be a detailed report on project measures.

At the June meeting in Ruidoso Downs the executive committee heard two new proposals from the Upper Hondo SWCD. The first asked for support of a pilot study on the Oso Watershed to determine feasibility of a combination vegetative - structural control of erosion, primarily in subdivisions. It was recommended by the executive committee for approval.

The second application asked for support of the SCMRA for the program and plan that the

Bureau of Land Management has for Fort Stanton. It involves the N. M. State University continuing experimental work on part, the N. M. Department of Hospitals and Institutions keeping the hospital part, and the Bureau of Land Management developing the rest, including the caves, for recreation. This application recommended for approval.

Robert Scribner, chairman of the executive committee, said his committee recommended that a letter be written to the N. M. State ASC office in support of ACP payment being made on non agricultural land where it is contributing to a pollution problem. The letter will be written.

Project progress report in brief: Capitan Village is still trying to get water for lake and will use part of the Village's water or drill wells at the site, survey has been requested to be made at new site to see if it

Tom Hewitt was one of 18 UTU men in Carrizozo and shown here walking picket line near Carrizozo depot — the first picket ever seen in Carrizozo according to information from people who have lived here a lifetime. President Richard M. Nixon and Federal Court Judge Barrington Parker ordered the workers back to their jobs for 60 days pending settlement of the strike. The strike stems from an 11-year disagreement about elimination of firemen from locomotives.

# Appraisal to go, 3 months to end

Lincoln County Commissioners Don Stark, Charles Jones and Holt Lovelace meeting in regular session Wednesday reported that the State Property Appraisal Department 3 under the direction of Haskell Smith will start redoing the Lincoln County appraisal immediately.

The materials gathered by Nelson & Associates before he quit the job are being used, particularly the maps, and commissioners learned that the state people will do considerable spot checking and then make a decision as to how much of the appraisal has to be redone. They consider the Hondo area a severe problem because of unclear titles in that area.

The appraisal people will use the former jury dormitory in the courthouse for their office in Carrizozo and expect to have office in Ruidoso when they move into that area. Two or three local girls will be employed as typists, the entire appraisal job expected to take two and a half to three months.

A new subdivision located on both sides of US 380 just west of the O Bar O Ranch

turnoff, known as Sweetwater Hills, was approved by the commissioners for Lamoyne Carpenter the developer. This property is the old Snell Ranch, Sec. 13-14, Township 8, Range 11E.

The commissioners appointed a new planning commission which includes Elmer Pirelli of Ruidoso, Walton Hall and Leroy McKnight of Capitan. Pirelli is chairman of the present planning commission. The new commission takes office July 1 and will meet with the county commissioners on July 13 at 1:00 p.m. to set up policies that will empower the planners to act forcibly and yet be answerable to the county commissioners.

Also on July 13 the commission will meet with District Attorney E. A. Williams in regard to summons from District Court in Case No. 8579, Don Hancock and Color Cable TV vs. R. N. Battles d/b/a Sierra Cablevision. Hancock is suing to prevent Battles from setting up a second cable television company in Ruidoso. The commission is involved over granting of

franchise to Battle. Hancock alleges that granting of franchise by Defendant County Commissioners violates Article 9, Section 14 of the N. M. Constitution and is outside the scope of authority of a Board of County Commissioners as provided by the statutes, in that Defendant Battles is a private individual and not a public utility.

The commission has paid lease on north half of Section 16 which will be used as sanitary land

**News and Notes**

Everyone has food favorites they remember from childhood; things they associate with family, home and mother in the kitchen. Maybe yours is a special chocolate cake, homemade ice cream, or fried chicken for Sunday Dinner. My fondest memories are of chicken and dumplings on the 4th of July that only my grandmother could make. Another dish with a lot of nostalgia is the wilted greens salad my mother made all summer. It is a recipe that you might enjoy also.

**Wilted Greens**  
Serves 4  
2 slices bacon, 1/2 small onion, chopped, 1/4 cup vinegar, 1 pound greens, salt and pepper as you like.


Fry bacon until crisp. Set aside and crumble when cooled slightly. Pour off drippings except for 1 tablespoon. Add onion and cook until soft. Add vinegar. Wash greens. Shred or tear in large pieces. Add with crumbled bacon to pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cover pan. Heat over low heat until greens are limp.

Greens that you can use are leaf or head lettuce, dandelion, mustard or beet greens. Greens are more plentiful this time of year and may be a little more economical than in the winter. Many people have these greens in their gardens.

Another delicious summer vegetable is corn on the cob. You can buy it year around in many areas, but it is most plentiful, and therefore less expensive, during summer. Good quality corn on the cob is tender and sweet. Kernels may be yellow or white. When you buy fresh corn on the cob, look for these signs of quality:

Kernels that are plump, but not too large, and that cover the cob well. Yellow corn of bright (not deep) color. White corn that is really white. Husks that look fresh; of good green color, not dried or yellow. Silk ends free from decay or worm injury. Keep fresh corn on the cob cold and moist. Use it in 1 or 2 days.

# Round-Up

Over 40 people attended the Livestock Marketing Meeting on June 25th at the Carrizozo Recreation Center.

Gene Wright outlined the kinds of shrinkage and what the grower could do to reduce the shrinkage. He also explained how different shrinkages could affect the price received. Shrinkage is not affected by weights or breed but more often by feed conditions.

The range caterpillar infestation was discussed. An estimated 100,000 acres have medium to heavy infestation and another 200,000 acres have a

light infestation. Bill Dinwiddie, State Farm Bureau Marketing representative, explained their Bureau Livestock Marketing program. He takes the listing of livestock for sale and tries to sell them. Lincoln County has used this service more than any other county. He emphasized that they sell only and do not take possession of the animals. The National Farm Bureau Listings, a weekly publication for beef cattle was explained to the group. This is an order buying service. They need a larger listing of cattle.

Walt Wilson who is on the Board of Directors of the Southern division of the Producers Marketing Association, explained the contract

forms used by his group. He stressed the need for competition in marketing of livestock. The order buyers are not as active as they used to be and often there is a need for more competition. The producer should market his livestock and not just sell them at the first price that he is offered.

Lincoln County fleeces placed well at the New Mexico Wool Show last week in Roswell. The Champion sweepstakes award was won by Goodrum Bros. Ranch near Picacho. Reserve champion sweepstakes went to the Treat Ranch, Picacho. The Twin Butte Sheep Company of Picacho showed the reserve champion fleece.

"One of the most competitive

and highest quality shows on record," is the way that James M. Sancho, extension sheep specialist at New Mexico State University describes the recent New Mexico Wool Show in Roswell. More than 200 fleeces competed for major awards.

Other champion awards went to the following: Champion fine, Goodrum Bros., reserve champion fine, Goodrum Bros.; reserve champion 1/2 blood, Joe Skeen, Picacho and champion 3/8 blood, Treat Ranch; grand champion junior fleece, Clabe Jones, Tatum; and reserve grand champion junior fleece, Clabe Jones.

Winners in the various classes were: 70's ewe, southern division, J. R. Skeen; 64's ewe,

southern division, 64's ram, Twin Butte Sheep Co.; 1/2 blood ram, Twin Butte Sheep Co.; 3/8 blood or coarser ram, George Sisneros Ranch, Tinnie; 1/2 blood ewe, J. R. Skeen, junior 1/2 blood or coarser ewe, Carol Cooper, Tinnie.

## COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT SIGNED AT FT. STANTON

William W. Campbell, Roswell District Manager for the Bureau of Land Management, has announced the signing of a Cooperative Research Agreement between New Mexico State University and the BLM.

The agreement provides for use of a large part of the Fort Stanton Reservation for research by NMSU in the fields of range, livestock and wild life.

Campbell said "A careful study has been made of the possible uses for the Reservation. We feel that the outstanding potentials are for research

and recreation. This 20-year agreement permits the University to go ahead with their long term research planning, and at the same time sets aside parts of the Reservation for recreational development. The NMSU research program has been under way since 1963, and we feel that a continuation of the studies will substantially benefit New Mexico livestock raisers."

The BLM recently completed a Management Framework Plan which also sets aside part of the Fort Stanton Reservation for future recreational development centering around the caves, and part as a "Natural Area" with no construction developments, and restricted vehicle access.



**Where we stand!**

**A MID-YEAR REPORT FROM CONGRESSMAN FOREMAN**

During my recent travels throughout New Mexico, and in reviewing the thousands of returns from my second annual legislative questionnaire, three of the most often mentioned topics of concern are (1) inflation, (2) the war in South east Asia, and (3) domestic disorder. I am pleased to respond with a current review and status report on these subjects.

**THE DOMESTIC ECONOMY**

The efforts of this Administration, and of a good many Members of Congress from both political parties, has been to taper off inflation without the kind of recession that usually follows the type of wild spending spree our nation experienced in the Sixties. Although unemployment has been up, close to 5%, it is considerably below the 6.7% unemployment of 1961, just prior to the build-up of troops in Vietnam, and the 5.1% average of 1960 thru 1968. Noteworthy, however, is the fact that total employment has hit an all-time record high this year -- over 79 million Americans are employed -- total employment is now almost 1 1/2 million higher than it was one year ago!

Real per capita disposable income -- what individuals have available to spend after allowing for taxes and inflation -- was at the highest rate in history in the first half of 1970.

We are now passing through the first phase of a successful campaign against inflation in which the rate of inflation ceases to rise. As a part of this campaign, the Administration has slowed down the expansion rate of federal spending drastically, from an average rate of 12 percent a year in 1965-69 to 7 percent in 1970 and is projected at less than 4 percent in 1971. We have achieved this restraint on total federal spending while recognizing important new national priorities with respect to the environment, welfare transportation and other purposes. To do this, it was necessary to keep firm control of defense spending, cutbackless urgent nondefense programs and press for greater efficiency throughout government.

The Administration and Congress have not run for the super-

ficially attractive solution of wage - price controls, which no one would want one month after they had been put into effect. The runaway spiral was set in motion by the "new economics" political doctrine of the 60's which promised lower taxes and inaugurated record federal deficits that sank the government into a \$9 billion dollar hole -- culminating in the record staggering \$25 billion deficit in 1968 alone. The new Administration initiated sound, responsible economic policies that gave us a fiscal year 1969 surplus of \$3 billion, reduced the annual increase in federal spending by better than 50%, and curbed the causes of zooming prices.

would be a better location. Bert Pringsten and Bob Scribner developed a letter which will be written to U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare encouraging them to determine if Fort Stanton still has valid water rights concerning water for Nogal Lake.

Tularosa has located a suitable site for waste disposal on BLM land that could be used by Tularosa and Otero County. This land would be requested from the BLM. Mr. Pringsten reported that the N. M. Apple Growers were trying to locate a processing plant in Albuquerque, he also stated the apple production in New Mexico is not near the amount first reported by the producers. Mr. Scribner stated he had written the Extension Service to see if a good information program with suggested improvements in road side sales would not increase the sale of apples.

Assistance has been asked from 4-Corners Commission for White Oaks telephone line, no reply has been received. Concerning Highway 42, Mr. Jones and Mr. Pfeiffer reported that the State Highway Department and county commissioners were all ready to go when some land owners insisted that the right of way be fenced, no money left for fencing. They hope something can be done because if the state oil equipment is moved out of the area it may be years before it will return.

Lincoln County commissioners will write State Land Office requesting action on their application for land suitable as sanitary landfill for Captain Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. There was some discussion as to the exact amount of spring water that could be used for White Oak's recreational lake. Mr. Scribner asked Mr. Littlefield to make an actual field check of this flow.

The nomination committee, chaired by Bert Pringsten, selected the following candidates for SCMRA office: Robert G. Scribner for chairman, Robert Bell for vice - chairman, Delbert Nelson for secretary, and W. W. Gallacher, Jr. for treasurer. No nominations from the floor, these candidates were elected by acclamation.

Clem Weindorf introduced Howard Abercrombie and stated that the Soil Conservation Service has assigned Mr. Abercrombie to work full time with the SCMRA. His office will be in Carrizozo.
