Lee will coach Grizzly basketball, Caroline Currie is English teacher

At the regular Board of Education meeting held Tuesday evening in the school library the main order of business was the hiring of two teachers. Mr. Gerald Lee was hired as basketball coach, English teacher and to assist in the Title I work.

Mr. Lee has an M. A. Degree and 15 years teaching experience. He comes from Animas, is married and has eight children. Mrs. Caroline Currie, who comes from Quemado, hired as librarian and English teacher. She has an A. B. Degree and 24 hours toward a Master's Degree. She has had 5 years teaching experience. She has one child of kindergarten age.

Miss Chernesky who had been hired as fifth grade teacher was unable to accept. Her resignation and that of Mrs. Stoneman who resigned from job at lunch room were accepted by the Board. The superintendent reported on progress of football field maintenance. Also reported on

telephone conversation with Mr. Paul E. Barck of the Department of Education who will conduct the evaluation this year. What the Department of Education wants is to work with the school to develop district level objectives with built-in measuring devices. The state department staff will visit the school later this year.

The superintendent reported on work on maintenance on buildings and grounds and the use of NYC students.

The board accepted the superintendent's recommendations and revised the policies of Section 1 (Board of Education policies) and Section 5 (use of school building and equipment by outsiders).

Bids were opened on Janitorial supplies, business machine maintenance and office equipment, concrete work and sale of 1961 Chevrolet.

Racing in the "cool, cool pine" will be embellished by the presence of one of the most distinguished political dignitaries in the state of Texas, Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes, of Texas will be present Friday, July 17, and a race named in his honor will be the feature of the day.

Competing to meet the Lieutenant Governor in the winner's circle will be nine three year old thoroughbreds, contesting their individual merits over six furlongs. Heading the list of starters, in past performances, will be Rifle Barrel, representing C. I. Robson, Sr. and Jr. of Mesa, Arizona; and in all probability will be the post-time favorite. Also, listed in the field are three challengers, who have won at least one race over the local oval this race season. These three challengers include Omar Foster's Jack-Cat-Do; Officer's Straw, owned by C. J. Burnham and Kenneth Jenkins, Farmington, N. M.; and Bill Williams' Jerrisgirl.

Making his initial start at Rukoso Downs this season will be Trait's Triangle, representing Moss Hulsey and Kenneth Ellis, Midland, Texas. Completing the list of entrants is Puny Lee, owned by T. A. Bell and Freddie Howard, Brownfield, Texas; J. M. Frost's Watchette; Little Cheapers, representing James Bailey, El Paso; and Lee Kirk's Congo Bar, who was a winner last year in Detroit, Mich.

Mr. Barnes will be in the winner's circle to conduct post race ceremonies with the winner, owner, trainer, and jockey. First post for Friday's "Ben Barnes" day card will be 1:30 p.m. MDT.

6-year-old gelding is high point horse

Skip Ken, a six year old gelding owned by Carolyn Bader of Los Lunas was the high point horse at the Quarter Horse Show held in Sargent Arena the past week end.

The Palamino gelding was placed first in the class of geldings of 1966 or before, carried his owner to a first place win in the senior western pleasure class, won first in the geldings of all ages class shown by Jeff Bader, carried Jeff Bader to a first place in the western pleasure class for 11 and under, and was named the grand champion gelding of the show.

Skip Ken is one of Pat Dunning's horses, bought by the Baders from the Milliron Lazy Three Ranch two years ago.

This was a bigger horse show than has been held in Carrizozo in previous years when the youth activities were split off to another arena. There were 172 entries Saturday and 124 entries Sunday.

Judge John S. McDaniel of Tolleson, Arizona took plenty of time to look at each horse and was very careful and thorough in his work both days. The weather was about as ideal as could be for Lincoln County in the middle of July - hot and dry with little wind. The town water truck operated by Manuel Vigil, did a good job of wetting things down.

Zone Six Soil and Water meeting brings area conservationists together

The annual Zone 6 meeting of the Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors will be held in Carrizozo July 23 at the recreation center starting at 10 a.m.

One of the important subjects for discussion will be pollution control. A panel moderated by Draper Brantley of Carlsbad SWCD will use the theme "Polluting the '70s'".

Panel members include William Atkinson, Resource Conservationist PVRD who will discuss pollution problems present and future in the Pecos Valley; Fred Woods, district sanitarian, will discuss pollution problems in rural areas. Bill Ball, pollution committee chairman for Macho - Roswell SWCD

will discuss solving county pollution problems. Bill Lee, first vice president NMA SWCD, will discuss possible pollution, legislation and its effect on agriculture. This panel discussion will get underway at 1:15 p.m.

The meeting will open with remarks by David McGee, zone chairman, followed by invocation by Louis Merritt. The welcome will be given by Lee Straley, chairman of Carrizozo SWCD.

Lincoln County will be represented by 10 4-H members who were winners in the recent County contests. Six hundred and thirty one 4-H'ers have pre-registered for the contests which conclude with an awards banquet Thursday evening (July 16). 4-H members 14 through 19 years of age will participate in the senior contests at New Mexico State University. The New Mexico State 4-H Council will meet in conjunction with the senior contests. Among business will be election of council officers for 1970-71. 4-H'ers will be housed in Garcia Hall on the NMSU campus, with the contests, demonstrations and judging to take place at different locations on campus and in the area. In addition to the contest activity, a food consumer workshop, called "Teena Goes Grocery shopping" will be offered on Wednesday. Three girls from each county can participate in a program

designed by Miss Louise Garrett, NMSU Extension nutrition specialist.

The object of the contests is educational, but time is also allocated for recreation. A get acquainted party is scheduled Tuesday evening, followed by a record hop Wednesday and the banquet and dance Thursday. The university malorium will also be available for use by the 4-H'ers.

Included in the three-day judging, demonstrations and contests program will be home economics and agricultural demonstrations, together with horse, livestock, crops, meats and land judging. Contests will include public speaking, dress revue, a tractor operators contest and an automotive operators contest called an "Autorama."

The concluding banquet Thursday begins at 6:30 p.m. in Corbett Center, with 4-H'ers attending the contests to be in attendance, along with donors to a number of 4-H activities. Installation of the new 4-H council officers will take place during the banquet, together with presentation of awards to contest winners.

Mrs. Paul Pacheco, 4-H leader of the Hondo Valley 4-H club, Mrs. Mary Ellen Payne, Lincoln County Home Agent and Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln County Agricultural Agent will accompany the group. Mrs. Payne will act as assistant superintendent for the Food Demonstrations at the contest.

Safety and Survival demonstration intended particularly for housewives

The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department is inviting the public, and especially housewives with children at home, to attend a demonstration of ways to take care of children (and adults) in cases of shock, choking like happens from swallowing too large an object, heart attacks, shock and other cases where immediate help, before doctor or hospital care is available, is needed if the person is to survive.

The demonstration will be under the direction of Mr. David James from the State Fire Marshal's office in Santa Fe, and will be held at the fire station Monday July 20 at 8:00 p.m.


