Saloon rejuvenated, whiskey the same

Lincoln, New Mexico has a new business... The Bank Exchange Saloon. The saloon is a rejuvenation of the original Bank Exchange Saloon which was in operation during the Lincoln County War, 1877-1881. The original saloon had a few side lines that its predecessor is not pursuing. In 1877 the full name was the Bank Exchange Saloon, Feed Store and Livery Stable and was owned and operated by John Thornton and George Curry. Mr. Curry was later a territorial governor.

The proprietor of the new saloon is Edgar G. Lowrance. Ed is no stranger to these parts as he was born and raised in Pampa, Texas and later moved to Albuquerque. Much of Ed's family homesteaded land in the Corona - White Oaks area and his great-aunt ran the hotel in Corona for many years. Ed has always had a great love of New Mexico history and has done a good deal of film work in and around Lincoln including a feature documentary film on the annual Pony Express Race.

Order placed for Co-op building

Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has placed an order with Central Welding Service and Supply for a 30x54 steel building which will house new office quarters for the Cooperative in Carrizozo.

The new office will be located on lots between the postoffice and theatre building. Completion date is late September and moving expected by October 1.

The building will have a 30x30 meeting room, fully equipped kitchen, drive-in window, appliance display space, all walls will be paneled, the front of building will be finished in Arizona stone.

Bill Myers, now doing customer contact work for the Cooperative, said they were trying to put up a building that will be an asset to Carrizozo and one that local people will be proud of in every way.

The total cost will be around \$25,000.

The second annual White Oaks to Lincoln pony express race will be run Saturday, August 1 starting at 8:30 a.m. near the old Exchange Bank building in White Oaks and finishing at the courthouse in Lincoln.

An added prize for the winner this year will be a \$600.00 Toots Mansfield trophy saddle made by the S. D. Myers company to be given along with other trophies and awards to second and third place finishers.

Pony Express riders will again carry mail under official designation from the Post office Department, in addition to regular stamps on all Pony Express envelopes which will be canceled by Postmaster Hattie Phillips in Lincoln, the envelopes will have seal and stamp of the race placed on each envelope by the race sponsors. Last year over 600 letters made the trip. You can post your letter most any time by addressing your cover envelope to P. O. Box 217 Carrizozo with handling charge of ten cents.

The race last year was a real contest up through the last change of horses at the Hammit turnoff below Captain Gap where Fermin Chavez and Barney Aldaz arrived within seconds of each other. Barney's last horse sort of gave out and Fermin came in the winner. Chavez has entered the race

this year and expects to furnish competition for any competitor.

The first performance of the folk pageant "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" will be given the night before the race on Friday, July 31 at 8:30 p.m. The race starts at 8:30 the next morning. On Saturday afternoon, August 1, there will be an old time fiddlers contest at the pageant grounds, starting around 1:30 p.m., not too long after the pony express race ends.

The second performance of the pageant will be at 8:30 p.m. Saturday. On Sunday, August 2, the Old Lincoln Days parade will take off down the main street of Lincoln County's first county seat, starting time 1:30 p.m. The final performance of the pageant will be at 3:00 p.m. Sunday.

History will be on parade at Old Lincoln Town for most of next week. Visitors come in for this particular weekend from many of the states of our nation and usually there are people from several foreign countries.

Billy the Kid rodeo set for August 16

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce directors Henry Vega Albert Roberts, Jete Voss, Dale LaMay, Scott Lewis, Bill Payne and President Paul Payton met Tuesday night and worked out most details of the Billy the Kid Rodeo which will be held in Carrizozo at the Sargent Memorial Arena on Sunday, August 16.

The Billy the Kid Rodeo was a big event at Three Rivers for a great many years until the sponsoring organization gave it up and the event was brought to Carrizozo last year during the centennial year. It was a two-day event last year held at night and will be a one-day event this year starting at 9:00 a.m.

This rodeo is for young cowboys and cowgirls of the area. Boys 10 and under participate in flag racing, barrel racing and pole bending. Girls 10 and under have three events, flag racing, barrel racing and pole bending.

The trophy saddle inscribed with Billy the Kid 1970 Rodeo will be the top prize as last year when a \$250 saddle was won by Poochie Lovelace. The point system this year will follow established rodeo rules, the more contestants there are in an event -- the more points going to the winner. High point winner in any of the four classes will win the saddle.

In addition to the saddle there will be blue, red and white rosettes for the first three place winners, all printed by Billy the Kid Rodeo. Information, and

halters will be awarded to first place winners in each event. The Billy the Kid Baile, a big success and lots of fun last year, will be repeated. This dance will be held at the country club on Saturday night with Bob Zinn and His Mustangs from Alamogordo providing the music.

Milburn Bros. of Alamogordo will furnish the stock this year. Their bulls and broncs are small but real tough to ride. Makes for thrilling rodeo watching. Rodeo headquarters will be at the Lincoln County News office.

Hamilton has answer to welfare problem.

Tom Hamilton, Alamogordo, Democratic candidate for State Senate District 23, which encompasses Lincoln and Otero Counties, said today, "I'm convinced the answer to our State's welfare problems lies in a very thorough investigative program to determine those individuals who are not eligible or who do not need the aid and removing their names from the welfare rolls". before a special fact finding committee conducting hearings on the O. E. O. programs.





Grant approved for Ft. Stanton

A federal grant of \$7,696 for kitchen and dining room equipment at Fort Stanton has been approved by the U. S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare. Notification of the grant award was made to Callen Hooper, director of federal programs for the N. M. Dept. of Hospitals and Institutions.
The federal money will be matched by \$5,130 from the DHI, and will be used to purchase a new steam supply system, dishwasher and walk-in refrigerator for the state mental retardation training school.

Fort Stanton state school for the mentally retarded has been praised for its program and staff by the executive director of the President's Committee on Mental Retardation.
The Washington official, David Ray, Jr., visited Fort Stanton last month with Dr. Miron Neal, secretary of the N. M. Dept. of Hospitals and Institutions. In a recent report of his trip sent to Dr. Neal, Ray wrote:
"The program at Fort Stanton was most impressive. I found a wide - awake staff and full utilization of manpower, as well as the beginning of a vocational training program."
After his visit to Fort Stanton, Ray told Neal he considered the spirit of the staff and the children at Fort Stanton among the best of any institution he had visited in the country.

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
