## Law enforcement planning commission organized and ready to commence

The recently appointed Region II Law Enforcement Planning Commission is organized and ready to commence its work. Holt Lovelace, Chairman of the Commission and Lincoln County Commissioner announced. The seven-member Commission was one of three regional planning commissions appointed by Governor Cargo in mid-June to assist the Governor's Policy Board for Law Enforcement in preparing an annual statewide comprehensive plan to improve New Mexico's Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice System and to assist in determining needs and priorities for distributing federal action monies to implement the statewide comprehensive plan. This year, \$985,000 in federal funds are available to New Mexico for this program.

The Region II Commission encompasses a 12-county area consisting of Catron, Socorro, Lincoln, Chavez, Lea, Eddy, Otero, Dona Ana, Sierra, Luna, Grant and Hidalgo Counties. Region II serves some 315,600 people, approximately 30.8% of the State's population.

The Region will receive from the Policy Board \$9,388,18 in Fiscal Year 1969 and \$21,642,20

in Fiscal Year 1970 federal funds to carry out its work. This will represent 90% of the Regional Commission's budget with the remaining 10% being local contributions in the form of county and city governmental services, or possibly some cash.

Commissioners Lovelace, Mc Carty, Roach and Smith attended a two-day orientation meeting in Santa Fe on July 23 and 24 with the staff of the Governor's Policy Board for Law Enforcement to learn about their new non-salaried responsibilities. Elie Gutierrez, State Planning Officer and Vice-chairman of the Policy Board, stressed the importance of each regional commission assessing the local resources, problems, and needs each year to come up with a regional practices. Units of local government make application for federal assistance to the Governor's Policy Board for Law Enforcement which will base its decision upon the recommendation of the regional commission involved and conformity with State and regional law enforcement plans. The Region II Commission has selected William Jespersen of El Paso as its full-time Project Coordinator.

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





The nurses saw only three cases of frost bite during the long winter and except for some flu and an occasional case of pneumonia there were little respiratory illness. What shocked them most was the acute sunburns. What kept them busy most were the breaks and the fractures resulting from men slipping on the ice.

After 12 months at Thule June and Barbara feel isolated from the mainstream nursing. They have not become involved

in the new technics of nursing gossip. They said they have a lot of catching up to do.

Socially neither nurse both of whom are single, lacked for date, with 2,000 men around they said you got to be kidding.

Neither June nor Barbara dated lets simply say it was a morale matter: a way to avoid situation.

They gave many parties as they had so many rations.

The ladies preferred to cook their own meals and eating in their own quarters.

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
