Brazilian group touring Lincoln Co.

A group of young people from Brazil arrived at New Mexico State University Monday for a tour of ranching, farming, and meat packing operations in southern New Mexico. After a tour of the Estancia Valley Thursday the group will arrive in Carrizozo to stay over night at the Crossroads Motel and will go to Captain early Friday morning. They will tour the Ft. Stanton

College Ranch, learn of cattle cross-breeding program, range research and experiments. Eugene Parker, college ranch foreman, will show them around. Noon lunch will be at Ruidoso and then a tour of the racetrack. The 3:30 race Friday afternoon will be named for the Brazilians. They go back to Las Cruces Friday and leave for Los Angeles that evening.

Ronny Rardin is all-around winner

With first place wins in both bull riding and goat tying, Ronny Rardin of Alamogordo won the coveted \$250.00 trophy saddle given by Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce to the all-around cowboy or cowgirl scoring the most points at the Billy the Kid Rodeo held Sunday in Sargent Memorial Arena. Ronny scored 58.5 points.

Sandy McKinney of Deming came in a close second for the all-around title with wins in girls 11-15 barrel race and pole bending. She failed to score in the flag race which kept her out of first place. Sandy ran the flag race in 9 flat which is real good time but it took an 8.1 to win for Jenny Landers of Alamogordo and that time was followed by Margaret Downs' 8.5 and Joan Alford's 8.6. Sandy scored 46.5 points.

Danny Sons of Roswell scored 42.5 points for 3rd place in the all-around, with his first place win in the bareback bronc riding.

It was perfect rodeo weather in Carrizozo Sunday. Some wind in the morning (Butch Carnell said it was coming down from Corona) and some clouds most of the day made conditions just right. Manny Vigil with town water truck was out in the early morning to wet the arena down and what dust there was after that didn't matter much.

The number of entries increased considerably this year over the centennial event, first time this rodeo was held in Carrizozo last year. There was a good crowd at the arena during most of the day, lots of out-of-town people from distant points like Tucumcari, Santa Fe, Las Cruces, Deming, Roswell and many people coming in to support rodeo contestants from Mesquite, Three Rivers, Corona, Hollywood, Bent, Captain, Nogal, Alamogordo, Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln, Ancho and Carrizozo.

It took a lot of help, does every year, to put on this rodeo and Carrizozo people responded well when asked. The Woman's Club operated the concession stand all day with all profit going to the rodeo. Women doing this job were: Hazel Hayes, Clara Snow, Veda Lou Stephenson, Omy Lindsey, Ruth Armstrong, Alma Mackey, and Eleanor Payton, Mary E. Payne and E.D. Floyd did the set up work and helped all day with this operation.

Chamber of Commerce directors Jete Voss, Bill Payne, Scott Lewis, Albert Roberts, Henry Vega, Dale Lamay and Paul Payton met a number of times planning for the rodeo and come the day, the work was divided around among this group. Bill Payne attended to the ticket selling at the dance Saturday night, with help from his wife Mary Ellen, Albert Roberts and Scott Lewis were doing the rodeo ticket selling Sunday. Bill Payne was out early with his notary seal for entries coming in Sunday morning. Truman Spencer was real good help for the second year.

The staff in the News office took in about half of the total entries before Sunday, Eleanor, Joy and Paul all working at this. Other half were registered Sunday morning.

A rodeo wouldn't go anywhere without secretaries and the Billy the Kid Rodeo had the best around. Barbara Lovelace headed up this group with Eunice McBride and Sharon Hecker doing the bookwork which started at 7:30 a.m. Sunday.

The stock contractor, Wayne Milburn, brought along some good help. Two brothers, Marlon and Walter, and Wayne's wife, helped out real well before and during the rodeo.

The Milburn bulls and broncs were tough as ever this year. Of the 18 entries in bull riding only 6 marked points and only 8 scored in the bareback bronc riding. Most came out of the chutes bucking, some would run away then pitch like \$4.4, usually before the whistle

Hospital job to Giles Construction

Lincoln County commissioners and the Carrizozo Municipal Hospital board of directors opened bids Tuesday on addition and alterations to the Carrizozo hospital, Giles Construction Co. of Alamogordo had the low base bid of \$197,718.00 and will receive the contract in a few days.

Other bidders were Compton Construction of Roswell \$205,719, H.T. Coker Construction of Alamogordo \$198,346, C.O. Holloway of Roswell \$199,950, and Lub Contractors of Roswell \$204,450.

There were two alternates in the bidding, No. 1 for fire-proofing ceiling in present hospital, No. 2 for change to solid core doors, Giles' bid on these two items was \$1217 and \$1568. No additional time will be required for the alternates, the hospital work is to be complete in 210 days from starting date.

Hospital board members at the bid opening were Jackie Spencer and Johnson Stearns along with Alton Whittaker, hospital administrator. All three commissioners, Don Stark, Charles Jones

and Holt Lovelace were present.

The question arose as to who spends the money, the commission or the board the attorney general will be asked to answer this question — probably the board, as official appointees of the commission.

Bid specifications were made up a year ago and the bidding went about \$7,000 higher than first estimated. The county has voted \$142,000 in bonds, Dr. and Mrs. A.N. Spencer have pledged to make up the difference. Furniture will cost

some \$13,000 in addition to the construction cost.

The commission also opened bids on roofing the courthouse annex, Western States Roofing of Ruidoso low at \$1,600. Allen Roofing of Roswell bid \$2200 and Hamilton Roofing of Roswell bid \$1800.

One subdivision was approved the second addition to Lawn Ridge at Ruidoso. Bids calls will be issued this week on three trucks, and used tractor with dozer and ripper attachments. These bids will be opened September 4.

They're choosing up sides as war breaks out in Village of Ruidoso

Mayor George White, recently elected on a platform of economy and stability in government at Ruidoso, was in Carrizozo Tuesday for the civil defense meeting and said they were on the verge of another war in this county -- Mayor White vs. four council members.

The mayor is issuing a letter to people of Ruidoso which tells some of the reasons for the argument. At a council meeting August 13 an employment contract was presented and it was quite evident that the contract had not been read and considered by all present, having just been presented. Mayor White stated that he wished to defer action to the next meeting so the agreement could be reviewed.

At 10:22 a.m. on August 14

Mayor White was served with a notice of special meeting to be held in 38 minutes, purpose to discuss the employment contract. Mayor White believes this 38-minute period for meeting call to be unreasonable.

White is also upset about another situation. The Ruidoso council is aware of possible water shortage, should emergency arise and yet proposes to take into the town large subdivision acreages which would increase the demand for water -- before presenting the necessary bonds to the voters of Ruidoso that would supply money to improve the water supply.

Mayor White is of the belief that affairs cannot be managed in this fashion -- and the war is on.

Lots of shoppers are finding pork a good addition to their outdoor cookery repertoire. You'll probably notice that ham cuts vary less in price than pork cuts from season to season, so ham may prove to be an excellent choice for the grill.

This is the time of year when most fresh pork cuts tend to increase in price. Generally, less pork comes to market at this time of year. Even so you can find some good values in pork cuts, if you shop and compare. Center cut pork chops, of course, cost the most. Rib end or loin end cost least per pound, but you also get more bone.

Barbeque-glazed Ham

- 3/4 cup catsup
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard
- 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1/2 inch slices fully cooked ham (about 1 1/2 Lbs.)

Mix first 6 ingredients for sauce. Slash fat edge of ham. Brush meat liberally with sauce; let stand 1 hour. Grill over coals 5 to 6 minutes per side, turning once and brushing with sauce. Serves 4 to 6.


