Historic sites is discussion topic at Resource Area meeting in Carrizozo

The South Central Mountain Resource Area will hear a report on the local historic sites Tuesday, September 1, in Carrizozo.

"The Steering Committee of the SCMR has requested Mr. Merle Clark, New Mexico State Planning Office, Historical Division; to discuss historical sites in Lincoln-Otero County Area," announced Mr. Bob Scribner, Chairman of the SCMR. "Mr. Clark will make his presentation at the regular meeting of the SCMR, 1:00 p.m. Tuesday, September 1. This meeting will be held in the Lincoln County Commissioners' room in Carrizozo," added Scribner.

There are already several historical sites in this area, with old Lincoln so designated, and also a state park, Fort Stanton and White Oaks are historical sites but with limited improvements at this time. "The SCMR is promoting historical sites for two reasons: To recognize and protect them and to encourage more tourists to stay within the area longer," commented Scribner.

"In addition to the discussion on historical sites by Mr. Clark, the Steering Committee will review the new project applications. One of three applications is a request to include Otero County in the Great Plains Conservation Program," stated Scribner.

Bank Securities offers stock to public

Bank Securities, Inc., of Alamo-gordo, parent bank of Citizens State Bank in Carrizozo, has filed with the Securities Exchange Commission in Washington a request for authority to offer to the public 120,000 shares of common stock and have received authority to go ahead with this sale.

The 120,000 shares will be sold at \$25 per share and \$1,500,000 in convertible debentures due in 15 years carrying 7-1/2 percent interest payable semi-annually.

After the first five years these debentures can be converted into Bank Securities stock at \$27.50 per share, after the second five years at \$32.50 per share, after the third five years at \$37.50 per share. Sales will be handled through officers of Bank Securities, Inc. Bank Securities, Inc. is the only registered bank holding corporation in New Mexico. This filing with the Security Exchange Commission makes it a public held corporation. There are four banks presently in Bank Securities, Inc. and applications are pending with the Federal Reserve Board of Governors in Washington for two more, the American Bank of Commerce in Albuquerque and First National Bank in Portales.

Carrizozo enrollment steady at start of year

At school budget making time last May it was estimated that Carrizozo schools would have average daily membership of 420 students this school year, not including kindergarten, which is a Title I program. The figures given to the News Tuesday total 410 students, down 10 from the estimate. Most of this loss is in the upper six grades. Carrizozo school had 208 students in grades 7-12 at the close of the 1969-1970 year and is starting the 1970-71 school year with 195.

There were 215 students enrolled in grades 1-6 Tuesday, plus 19 in kindergarten.

The fifth grade has the distinction of being the largest class in Carrizozo school with total of 44 students in two classes.

Thirteen trials for All American

Friday, August 28 will be the big day that one-hundred twenty-six of the nation's fastest two-year old quarter-horses will be competing for berths in the three divisions of the "All-American Quarter-Horse Futurity". The finals for the "world's richest horse race" will take place on Labor Day, Monday, September 7, consisting of the ten fastest qualifiers out of the trials. The other two divisions of the "All American", which are classified as "consolation" races will be run on Saturday, September 5 and Sunday, September 6. The total purse distribution for all three of these "All-American" dashes will be \$670,000, making this, by far, the richest horse race in the world.

The list of entries who have made their final payments in order to start in the trial heats reads like a complete list of this year's biggest money winning two-year old quarter horses in training. With the exception of only a few, nearly all of the major stakes winners for the season are counted among the entrants in Friday's trials. Another interesting aspect to add a tinge of excitement to the "big" race is the fact that three of the trial participants made late penalty payments in order to be eligible to compete for a starting berth. These penalty payments amounted to the sum of \$13,000 per horse, which will certainly give these particular entrants an added incentive to qualify for a shot at the big money. The three horses making these late payments were Tru Tru, owned by Mr. Dub Seely, Knob Noster, Missouri; Astro Sun, owned by Mr. Clary W. Spencer, Edmond, Okla.; and Mona Pollita, owned by Ellen P. Chance, Houston, Texas.

Among the leading contenders for qualifying positions are Full Moon Zestee, owned by John Thompson, Marland, Oklahoma. Full Moon Zestee was the victor of the Oklahoma Futurity, run at Lamasa Park, Raton, N.M. and is the winner of over \$100,000 during this racing season. Also slated as a starter in the trials is Jet Charger, owned by Bud Warren, Perry, Oklahoma. Jet Charger is also a winner of over \$100,000 this season.

First post for Friday's "trial day" card will be 1:30 P.M. MDT.

THE WAY OF THE WEST

We'd say that the second Billy the Kid Rodeo was a success in the way it was intended to be. It should be repeated -- and made better another year. A rodeo is not put on especially to bring people to town, though that is a good point. And, a rodeo is not put on by people just to help fill out their day because in a small town most people have a full working day right along.

There are two good reasons for a rodeo in Carrizozo -- in this order. (1) It provides a day of activity for youngsters doing some of the things Lincoln Otero (and other counties) youngsters like to do best. (2) It's a difference between a town being active in a civic way -- or doing nothing.

The Chamber of Commerce directors who met frequently planning the Billy the Kid Rodeo wanted to put on as good a show as possible while staying as close to shore on money as possible. We can see lots of little ways where this rodeo can be made better, and some not so little. We've heard it so many times -- that Carrizozo is not a rodeo town -- and after two years experience we're ready to argue with the people and believe the record will prove them wrong. Making a better rodeo will help make Carrizozo a better rodeo town.

That's what those rodeo people were doing last Sunday.

Drowning is the 4th most frequent cause of accidental death in the nation.

Being a Lifeguard takes hours of lifesaving, safety courses. He must have completed the American Red Cross course in Senior Lifesaving and water safety. New vaccine is being offered

The new measles vaccine (Rubella) is being offered to school children, grades 1 through 6 and preschool children, ages 1 to 6.

German measles has caused hundreds of mothers to have babies that were born deaf, retarded, or with heart trouble. To stop the spread of this disease, every elementary school child should be immunized. (Rubella) and 10-day red, hard measles, (Rubeola) are NOT the same disease. If your child is protected against 10-day measles, he still needs an immunization against 3-day measles. Since many rash-producing diseases are often mistaken for 3-day measles, we recommend that you allow your child to take this vaccine—even though you may think he has had the disease.

EXCEPTIONS: Immunization should not be given if: (1) your child is on medication; or (2) if your daughter has begun menstruation. If this situation exists in your family consult your family doctor about the vaccine.

Hamilton has plan for tourists

"Policy makers in education are killing the goose that lays the golden egg, by establishing exceptionally early starting dates for the state's school system", according to Tom Hamilton, Alamogordo Democrat who is a candidate for State Senatorial post 23 representing Otero and Lincoln Counties.

Hamilton referred to the 1970 school starting date as August 20 to 27. He pointed out that this deprived the tourist business employers of the student's help at the peak of the season. Hamilton asserted that in the neighboring states to the east, which he says is our prime tourist market, the schools do not begin until after Labor Day. He contended that the bulk of our state's tourist trade visits New Mexico during August and the first week of September. The Alamogordo pharmacist also pointed out the early starting dates curbed many visitors to Lincoln and Otero Counties who live in Albuquerque and other cities in the northern part of New Mexico. He said parents usually want to stay at home for a week or so prior to school

opening to "clean up the loose ends and finish back-to-school shopping chores."

Hamilton has been conferring with Benny Quintana, State Tourist Director; and C.W. "Buddy" Ritter, President of the New Mexico Hotel and Motel Association. The candidate said "Tourism is one of our state's principal sources of "new money". He called attention to the figures released by the U.S. Department of Commerce that the average tourist spends \$30 to \$35 per day.

"This is not the kind of money that we can turn our backs on, or even relax for a moment the fine service, hospitality, and other advantages New Mexico establishments offer the tourists, establishments offer the tourists.

Hamilton called for later starting dates and shorter vacation periods during the school year which when combined would fulfill the requirements set for of 180 school days, by the North Central Association for accreditation.

IN conclusion, Hamilton said, "We work to provide summer employment opportunities for our students, then just as the summer trade reaches its peak, and the students are well experienced in their jobs, school starts and the student, his employer, and the people of New Mexico are the losers".

Beware of the inferior extension cord. Extension cords that are too small or plugged into the wrong power source can cause a loss of power or even a fire. Farmers should use only type SFO cord for supplying portable electric motors on the farm. A light duty extension cord is not recommended for loads of more than seven amperes and the cord should be no more than 12 feet long.

Farmers should not plug several cords together, but buy one long enough to reach any anticipated location. Sometimes, farmers need extension cords of 100 feet or more and this is no place to use an extension cord from the lamp in the house. Conductor size is important, too. It is recommended that you use number 14 for cords up to 35 feet in length; number 12 up to 75-feet; and number 10 up to 100 feet. If the cord is too small, the motor does not get enough electricity and will lose power. In extreme cases, the cord may get too hot and burn. Motors that are sluggish during starting or just don't seem to have enough power probably aren't getting the electricity they need. This is often the case when long extension cords are used.



Parcel Post rates to be increased

An increase in postage on parcel post will go into effect November 14, Acting Postmaster Fred Chavez said today.

The increase of 15.4 percent was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission July 16 but is being delayed by the Post Office Department as an encouragement for the early mailing of Holiday gifts.

Postmaster Chavez said Postmaster General Winton M. Blount hopes to provide an incentive for families and friends with servicemen overseas to use the low-cost military mail service so their gifts will arrive before December 25.

To ensure delivery by surface mail of parcels to servicemen overseas the parcels should be mailed by November 7. The rate increase effective November 14 will apply to all parcels.

Also effective the same date will be a 6 percent increase in the postage rate on catalogs. The two increases are expected to yield about \$123 million in additional revenue.
