## Close contests in county

This is the year of the "poll" in Lincoln County and New Mexico. Just this morning (Wednesday) the News editor heard the result (given as serious matter) of another poll taken in Lincoln County which shows certain candidates ahead or behind another.

State candidates have been operating on the strength of polls for two months or more. Such as Domenici-Skeen behind and moving up, such as Montoya ahead but moving back. And then there are television polls given almost nightly that show half dozen people in one area speaking for their favorites, or refusing to talk. That group of undecided, or people who prefer to keep their balloting to themselves, estimated at anywhere from 20 to 30 percent of the total vote in

New Mexico -- will undoubtedly decide the outcome of races from the governor all the way down.

Polls taken in coffee shops, men's rest rooms, at football games, or any other gathering place have the happy facet of making news but rather unreliable type for base of any election conclusions.

The News is making only one positive statement -- we are going to vote for Lincoln County's own Joe Skeen, and naturally his running mate Pete Domenici. New Mexico needs all the people it can get like Joe Skeen in state government, and Joe is the neighbor of many and friend of most people in Lincoln County.

Other than that one statement far as we're concerned, Lincoln County voters are on their own. The number of races in county

and district are not so numerous but that voters ought to give them plenty of thought.

The state senate race between Democrat Tom Hamilton and Republican John Conway is a good one. Both men are responsible people who would serve their district. They have been campaigning actively.

Don B. Stark and James L. Strong, both of Ruidoso, have a race going for county commissioner -- take your choice, both are qualified for the job.

Margaret Ellison, Democrat, and Mabel Vigil, should have started even in their race for the county treasurer's office. Your guess about where they stand today is fully as good as any other person.

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## Call boys no longer calling in Zozo

An order from the Southern Pacific Railroad, effective Jan. 10, 1971, doing away with four jobs, known as railroad call boys, was received by Agent F. W. Siegrist early this month.

Call boys have been an institution around Carrizozo for 31 years that Siegrist knows of and probably much longer than that. Their job has been to round up train crews and tell them when their train would depart.

Men included in the layoff are: R. S. Ward, O. H. Simpson, J. T. Moore and Brack Cornett. Ward has been with SP long

enough to receive retirement, Simpson the same at some reduction in retirement pay. Moore is going to El Paso and Cornett's plans are not known.

Fred Vega is now working for SP in El Paso, having been laid off from his job in Carrizozo a month ago.

Agent Siegrist will do the calling now in day time. Richard Coca, night operator will call crews from 4 to 12, and R. B. Cowdery, night operator, will do calling from 12 midnight to 8. The job of clerk has been eliminated at the Carrizozo station.

## ALLEGED MURDERER BORN IN CARRIZOZO

# January 26, 1946, not Carrizozo's best day!

David Sanchez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Abe Sanchez of Nogal, called the Lincoln County News this week from Rosemead, California where he operates his own auto parts business, with the message that the Los Angeles Times reported in its Sunday paper that James Linley Frazier, charged with murdering five persons last week -- was born in Carrizozo, New Mexico.

Courthouse and legal record prove the fact.

Department of Health records show that John Linley Frazier was born in Carrizozo January 26, 1946, the son of William Brady Frazier and Patricia Irene Frazier.

Voter registration records show Patricia Irene Frazier as registered to vote October 4, 1946, and her birthplace as Benson, Arizona on December 27, 1926. This record shows Mrs. Frazier's maiden name as Adams.

A decree of divorce was recorded December 22, 1948 in Lincoln County, Patricia Irene Frazier vs. William Frazier, then living in St. Clairsville, Ohio, part of proceedings was that Frazier

never supported the plaintiff, Mrs. Frazier was granted custody of one minor child, John Linley Frazier. The family owned no community property at that time in Lincoln County.

An Associated Press account of the Frazier story follows:

SANTA CRUZ, Calif., Oct. 27, 1970. The lawyer representing James Linley Frazier, charged with murdering five persons at a hilltop mansion last week, said Sunday: "My personal opinion is that Frazier is crazy."

James A. Jackson, court-appointed public defender for the man accused of killing a wealthy eye surgeon, his wife, two sons and a secretary, said he is considering an insanity plea for the shaggy, bearded defendant.

But, Jackson said in an interview, the evidence against 24-year-old Frazier, as far as he knew, was inconclusive.

Frazier was arrested peacefully Friday, and pleaded innocent at a formal reading of the charges.

Commenting on a newspaper report that authorities have matched Frazier's fingerprints with prints left on the typewriter

used for a bizarre note left at the scene, Jackson said:

"If they don't have Frazier's fingerprints at the typewriter, the evidence is all circumstantial."

Sgt. Richard Damon, acting criminal division commander of the Santa Cruz County sheriff's office, denied knowing about that or any other fingerprint in the Frazier case.

Damon said, "As far as I know none of that information was released through this office. None of us here has knowledge of any fingerprint."

The report that Frazier's print had been taken from the typewriter at the death scene appeared in Sunday edition of the San Francisco Examiner.

The note left at the scene pronounced a "penalty of death" on persons "who misuse the natural environment" and on "materialists."

The victims, shot, bound and dumped in the swimming pool of the \$250,000 home outside Santa Cruz, were Dr. Victor M. Ohta, 45, his wife, Virginia, 43, sons Derrick, 12 and Taggart, 11, and Ohta's secretary, Mrs. Dorothy

Cadwallader, 38.

Jackson, who said he has been in personal contact with Frazier several times, was present Saturday when sheriff's detectives conducted a lineup involving the accused man.

Officers used four bearded youths from a hippie coffee shop in downtown Santa Cruz. The four, plus Frazier, sat in one room while six persons listening through a door that was slightly ajar.

Each man in the lineup was asked to say, "That's cool, man." The six persons wrote on note pads, but details of what they wrote were not available. Also used, Jackson said, was a one-way mirror through which Frazier and the others were observed. Jackson said he didn't know the reason for the lineup or possible conclusions investigators hope to draw from it or the connection of the six persons to the case.

Jackson said he will ask the county for \$20,000 to hire psychologists and others for an examination of Frazier.

Deputies said psychologists already have visited Frazier twice in jail, but they would not say why.

## Reminder to parents about such as curfew, horses, and vehicle tags

Carrizozo Marshall Choncho Morales wants to remind non-resident car owners that after 90 days they should buy a New Mexico vehicle license. The ordinance reads like this:

B. Any person gainfully employed within the boundaries of this state for a period of thirty (30) consecutive days or more shall be presumed to be a resident of this state, but this presumption shall be rebutted upon a showing that the person's employment in this state is for no more than ninety (90) days.

about 9:30 every evening with this meaning for local residents: It shall be unlawful for any juvenile, male or female, under the age of 17 years to be upon any of the streets of the town at any time between the hours of 9:30 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. unless accompanied by a parent or a guardian.

Not many towns have to worry about ordinances about horses on sidewalks and in parks but Lincoln County is horse country and Carrizozo has its share. Town ordinance prohibits the riding of horses in parks, and/or on sidewalks in Carrizozo.



# Inside THE CAPITOL

by Fred Buckles

TAOS -- Polls of 4,314 voters in 15 cities throughout New Mexico showed the Democratic Bruce King-Robert Mondragon governor- lieutenant governor team and Democratic U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya running ahead of their general election opponents. Voters will cast ballots Tuesday.

In U. S. House District 1 incumbent Republican Manuel Lujan Jr. of Albuquerque was leading Santa Fe Democrat Fabian Chavez in six polls of 1,615 voters at Tucuman, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Las Vegas and Espanola. The tally: Lujan, 308 votes or 56.2 per cent; Chavez, 662 votes or 41 per cent; Miss Anita Montano, Las Vegas, of the Peoples' Constitutional Party, 23 votes or 1.4 per cent, and Norbert J. McGovern, Albuquerque, of the Independent New Mexican Party, 22 votes or 1.4 per cent.

In U. S. House District 2 incumbent Republican Ed Foreman of Las Cruces topped State Senator Harold Runnels, Lovington Democrat, in polling in nine cities. They were Belen, Los Lunas, Clavis, Las Cruces, Gallup, Farmington, Carlsbad, Hobbs and Portales.

U. S. House District 2 results: Foreman, 1,437 votes or 54 per cent; Runnels, 1,198 votes or 45.1 per cent; PCP nominee Juan A. Roybal of San Miguel County, 24 votes or .9 of one per cent.

Constitutional Amendment 3, creating one four-year term for elected state officials, was heavily favored in polling of 3,976 voters in 13 cities. The vote: For, 2,337 or 58.8 per cent; against, 1,639 or 41.2 per cent. A poll was not conducted on Amendment 3 at Belen and Los Lunas. The Belen News-Bulletin provided its poll results in Belen and Los Lunas in races to inside the Capital.

Polls were conducted for inside the Capital in the other 13 cities, stretching over the 6-week period from Sept. 9 through Oct. 21. The random poll is unscientific and simply an informal test of voter sentiment.

The summary in the governor race: Democrats King-Mondragon, 2,376 votes or 55.1 per cent; Republicans Pete Domenici and State Sen. Joe Skeen of Picacho, Lincoln County, 1,808 votes or 41.9 per cent; Drs. John A. Salazar and Kenneth J. Eberhard of Albuquerque of the Independent New Mexican Party, 79 votes or 1.8 per cent, and PCP candidates Wilfredo Sedillo of Albuquerque and Alejandro Marquez of Grants, 51 votes or .1 of one per cent.

The U. S. Senate race tally: Democrat Montoya, 2,527 votes or 58.4 per cent; Republican Carter, 1,745 votes or 40.4 per cent; William Higgs of the PCP, 52 votes or 1.2 per cent.

Republicans expected President Richard M. Nixon's speech Saturday in Albuquerque -- just three days before the general election -- to boost major GOP candidates to victory. President Nixon's chief purpose in the New Mexico visit is a strong push for Andy Carter in Carter's bid to oust Sen. Montoya. Nixon was also set to endorse strongly Domenici and U.S. Reps. Lujan and Foreman.

Lujan campaigned in Taos at the weekend and drew 250 to a reception. Lujan pushed for multiple use of public lands for grazing, recreation, timbering, mining and other comparable purposes. In Taos County the Lujan Chavez race is close. Lujan is accorded a slight edge.

Observers say King will carry Taos County by a narrow margin over Domenici. Politicos predict U. S. Sen. Montoya will trounce Republican Carter by a majority.

ranging up to 1,500 votes in Taos County. Taos County's voter registration is almost 2-1 Democratic.

For the Taos County State House seat former State Rep. Alfonso Vigil, Rancho de Taos Democrat and rancher, is favored over Republican Manuel Pacheco, Taos teacher. Republican Rep. did not seek reelection. Vigil served in the House in 1965-68.

In normally Democratic Luna County King was accorded a lead over Domenici in the governor's race but Pete was gaining ground. King may carry Luna by a heavy margin. Bruce carried Luna County almost 2-1 over State Rep. Jack Daniels of Hobbs in the Democratic governor primary June 2. Domenici won narrow plurality in Luna in the big 6-man GOP governor primary.

In Luna County U. S. Senator Montoya was leading Carter. U.S. Rep. Foreman is regarded as the favorite over State Sen. Runnels in Luna County. Foreman carried Luna County by 200 votes in the 1968 general election over Democrat Johnny Walker, then the incumbent.

For the State House seat from the Luna-Hidalgo Counties district State Rep. Carter Kirk, Deming Republican, was accorded a slight lead over Deming Democrat William Upton, former state banking commissioner.

The race was a lively one for the State Senate seat in the Luna-Sierra-Hidalgo Counties district between incumbent Deming Democrat I. M. (Ike) Smalley and Republican Clifford Moody, Luna County rancher and businessman. Smalley shaded Moody by just 36 votes in the 1966 general election.

State Sen. Skeen, Lincoln County rancher, is expected to boost the Domenici-Skeen governor- lieutenant governor ticket especially in conservative and rancher-farmer areas of New Mexico. Skeen talked to a capacity crowd of 750 at Santa Fe at a \$10-a-plate Domenici-Skeen fund-raising dinner. He said he will follow into the lieutenant governor's office two well-qualified Republican predecessors -- incumbent Lee Francis of Cumbre, Valencia County, and Tom Bolack of Farmington.

RANCHERS SHOULD APPLY FOR MEDICARE BEFORE 65

Ranchers in Lincoln County should be sure to apply for Medicare during the three months before the month they reach age 65, even if they continue working, says Bill Riggs social security field representative for this area.

"You don't have to retire to enroll for Medicare," Riggs explained. "But you must apply with your social security representative and provide him with adequate proof of your age," he continued.

Since Medicare is administered by social security, the same evidence is necessary in applying for Medicare as that required when you apply for social security benefits.

This evidence includes proof of your age (such as your birth of baptismal certificate), proof of your most recent earnings (your 1969 income tax return and W-2 forms), and your social security card.

Riggs also mentioned that many ranchers 62 or over may find themselves eligible to receive some social security monthly benefits, even though they continue working, if their net yearly profit is low.

### Brief writeups of eight amendments

The 1970 regular session of the legislature submitted to the people of the state eight proposals for amending the constitution and will be referred to the people in the general election on November 3, 1970.

#### AMENDMENT #1

This amendment would provide for districting municipalities for electing municipal governing body members and allow adoption of municipal "home rule" charters. Except when under general law, districting would require approval of the voters of the municipality, and any governing body member who represents a district would be required to reside in, and be elected from that district.

#### AMENDMENT #2

Most of the material to form a new elective franchise article is taken from the present article and rewritten in clearer, more modern language. To vote, a citizen would have to meet local residence requirements provided by law instead of the fixed 30-day precinct residence requirement and special residence requirements could be provided by law for voting in presidential elections. All local government elections except those for county officers would be held at times other than general or statewide elections; the present constitution only requires separate school elections.

#### AMENDMENT #3

Under amendment No. 3 a four-year term for state executive officers would be established but would prohibit holding office for consecutive terms, except in the case of lieutenant governor who would be allowed to run for the office of governor at the end of his term as lieutenant governor. Four-year terms would begin January 1, 1971.

#### AMENDMENT #4

If adopted, this amendment would eliminate the mandatory state property tax levy for public schools and remove constitutional limitations on the distribution of certain public school income.

#### AMENDMENT #5

This amendment would delete the section requiring a constitutional convention to change the requirements for amending the constitution.

#### AMENDMENT #6

Amendment number 6 proposes to add "financial conflict of interest" as a ground for removal of regents of state educational institutions and allow the legislature to specify other grounds. It would specify that removal proceedings could be initiated only by the governor or by two-thirds vote of the Senate.

#### AMENDMENT #7

This proposed change would exempt from the present constitutional restrictions against state financial assistance to private individuals, any state loan program for post-secondary students at educational institutions under exclusive control of the state.

#### AMENDMENT #8

Although most of the material is taken from the present article it is rewritten in clearer, more modern language in the form of a new taxation and revenue article. It would provide the legislature the tool necessary to set the percentage of value to which the tax rates would be applied by all taxing districts, not exceeding 33-1/3%. The legislature would specify the manner for allocating the twenty-mill maximum property tax levy among the various taxing districts and the present constitutional limitations within the twenty mills would

be deleted. All present property tax exemptions would be retained, subject to repeal only by three-fifths vote of each house of the legislature. The head-of-family property tax exemption would be increased from \$200 to \$600. Bonds of the state and its political subdivisions and income from these bonds would have a constitutional exemption from all taxation.

### Tom Hamilton favors vocational training

Tom Hamilton, Democratic Candidate for State Senate Post 23 has announced that he strongly favors increasing the number of vocational and technical training centers in New Mexico.

Hamilton said, "Thousands of our young men and women do not plan to attend college for a variety of reasons. These people can contribute much to the economic well-being of our state if they are properly equipped with marketable skills to work in New Mexico's labor force."

The Alamogordo candidate pointed out that one of the first questions asked by industrial representatives seeking plant sites is, "What skills are presently available and what can we expect in the foreseeable future?" Hamilton stressed the need for more technically trained people to enter the labor force in New Mexico. "Vocational and technical training schools are our best solution to this crying need," Hamilton said.



## New Mexico tops million population according to census, set at 1,1014,979

Washington—The U. S. Census Bureau at Washington said Wednesday final figures showed New Mexico to have a population, as of last April 1, of 1,014,979 persons.

The figures was a 63,956 increase over the state's 1960 population of 951,023 persons, the Census Bureau said.

Final figures released by the Bureau showed Albuquerque with 243,715 residents, up from 201,189 persons as 1960 and Bernalillo County with a 1970 population of 315,774 persons, a 20.4 per cent rise over 1960.

According to the figures the state's second largest was Santa Fe, with 41,167 persons, Las Cruces was the third biggest city with 37,857 persons, Roswell was fourth with 33,908 and Clovis fifth, with 28,495.

Roswell was the only city in the first five listed by the Census Bureau that dropped in population from 1960-1970. The Bureau said population in the city fell 14.4 per

cent. Counties that gained in population were Bernalillo, Dona Ana, Santa Fe, McKinley, Otero, Valencia, Curry, Rio Arriba, Grant, Taos, Sandoval, Roosevelt, Los Alamos and Luna. All others dropped in population, the Bureau said.

Las Cruces and Santa Fe gained the most population in the five largest cities listed. Las Cruces realized a 28.9 per cent jump, the Bureau said and Santa Fe had a rise of 23.3 per cent.

Earlier this year, tentative figures listed the state's population at 998,847 persons. It said the final count included enumeration of persons not tabulated in the original tally.

The final figures showed that 17 counties lost population and 15 gained.



**Livestock Report**  
 By Reuben Caplan

When the announcement was made last Friday that the 105 year old Chicago stockyards would close completely on February 1, 1971 (the hog department closed last May), it prompted some curiosity among futures traders on the effect of this development.

There is the feeling among some Mercantile Exchange people that closing Chicago, the current par delivery point, will have little effect on futures. Even before the announcement of the closing, Omaha had been designated the par delivery point for the contracts from August 1971 forward with Peoria and Chicago delivery points at a \$.50 premium to Omaha.

It was reported to Merrill Lynch that at the time Omaha was named the par point the Exchange's Cattle Committee considered the possibility that the Chicago yards might close before August 1971 and that there was some thinking in the Committee at that time that as an intermediate measure for the February, April and June futures contracts, Peoria should serve as the par delivery point at 75¢ premium to Omaha.

Futures traders will probably pay much closer attention to the prices in Peoria and USDA reports on direct sale to packers

establishing a new market including financing, sewage and zoning laws.  
 Recent figures on slaughter under federal inspection indicate moderating supplies of cattle. Weekly slaughter totals during September ranged from 625,000 to 650,000 cattle compared with weekly totals ranging from 613,000 to 625,000 during October so far. That slaughter totals will probably continue smaller than September figures seems to be verified by cattle weights which averaged 1104 on steers last week at the seven main central markets vs. 1119 the previous week and 1121 a year ago. Feedlots appear to be current in most areas of the Nation.

**SCMRA gets tour at Stanton**

Twenty members of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met at Fort Stanton State School October 20 to discuss old and new project proposals, and to tour the facility for the mentally retarded.

Roscoe Manning administrator, briefed the group on the programs at the school and the potential for community services for the mentally retarded.

Fort Stanton has 188 retardates ranging from eight years of age to 82, both male and female. Most of the students, Manning explained, are trainable.

Manning told the meeting he felt the state was making good progress in training the retarded to return to the community, but as yet the communities in New Mexico have not developed sufficient resources to take care of their work and living needs.

Fort Stanton currently has four sheltered workshops in operation, with training available to the students in ceramics, enameled jewelry making, weaving and bead stringing. Approximately 75 Fort Stanton students are working in these workshops at the present time.

"We hope to move into vocational training for specific jobs for the retarded outside the institutions," Manning said. "We see this as our biggest potential."

A brief presentation also was given by Miss Carole Gorney, public affairs director for the N. M. Department of Hospitals and Institutions (DHI). Miss Gorney, a member of the South Central Mountain Resource Area steering committee, explained that DHI operates Fort Stanton and seven other state medical facilities and schools for the retarded. These include New

Mexico State Hospital at Las Vegas and Los Lunas Hospital and Training School.



### FORT STANTON INFIRMARY

#### LICENSED UNDER MEDICAID

The 18-bed medical ward at Fort Stanton School has been licensed by the federal government for infirmity care given all residents between the ages of 18 and 64. This will mean a savings to the state of approximately \$17 a day per student in the infirmity.

Approval of the licensing was received from the State Health and Social Services Department, effective October 15.

### Enlistment rights need clarification

R. L. Sherrill, Chairman, and Local Board Members of

Selective Service Local Board No. 14 released the following information concerning Operations Bulletin No. 287, to clear recent public misconception of a registrant's enlistment rights after receipt of his Induction Order.

When a registrant, who has received his Order to Report for Induction (SSS Form 252), presents convincing evidence that a representative of one of the armed forces is prepared to enlist for three or more years of active duty with the regular armed forces, it is the policy of the Director of Selective Service to cancel that order to report for induction provided enlistment will occur on or before the scheduled

induction date, and active duty will begin immediately or within 120 days of such enlistment. With this policy in mind, Local Boards have been requested to cancel induction orders to permit the enlistment of such registrants. Popular misunderstanding of this policy has been occurring in two areas with our local registrants.

1) They frequently confuse active duty with reserve enlist-

ment. Active duty means exactly what it implies, enlistment into an active service unit. The current Director of Selective Service extended this policy in May 1970 to allow registrants to enlist into delayed entry programs of up to 120 days. All enlistment into Reserve units must be completed before the induction order has been received by a given registrant. Reserve units are service units

that will receive six weeks or more of basic training and are held in reserve until emergency activation is necessary. 2) Many registrants believe that such policy is dictated by Local Board Members or the Clerk's prerogative. It is not. All of these policies are the National Headquarters' origin through Operation Bulletin No. 287; the Local Board implements the directive policy.



**WEEKEND SHOULD BE A BUSY ONE FOR SHOTGUNS**

SANTA FE, N.M. -- The coming weekend should be a busy one for New Mexico shotgunners as the statewide quail season opens, sandhill crane season opens in seven southeastern counties and the point system duck season swings into the second weekend in the Central Flyway portion of the state.

Saturday, Oct. 31, is the opening date for the quail and crane seasons. The quail season will be open through Jan. 3, 1971, while the crane hunters will have a one week longer season, closing Jan. 10, 1971.

Quail hunting in New Mexico is normally best in the southern half of the state and indications are that this year will be no different. The southeast corner of New Mexico is always a top bet for quail hunters and reports this year that the Jal-Eumice area will have bumper crops of birds. Also good bird populations are reported around Roswell and in other areas of the southeast, but a lot of grass and heavy cover is going to make hunting extremely difficult.




