Deer checkpoint at Nogal Turnoff catches gaggle of game violators

Nando Mauldin, assistant chief of enforcement for the Game Department, with John L. Mechler, Gary L. Rickman, A. J. Campbell and Robert Parish, district wildlife officers, manned the checkpoint at the Nogal turnoff from the start of the deer hunting season, first time in years there has been a game checkpoint at this location.

Starting with the season opening Saturday, November 21 quite a few hunters did their bit supporting New Mexico schools -- all fines from game violations go to the general school fund, the court costs go to the court administrator.

Most of the violations came from not tagging deer, which amounts to illegal possession. Gary L. Chant came in with two deer, one with his tag, one with his wife's tag. Handwriting looked about the same and on checking the officials determined that his wife was in Grants at that time. Chant was fined \$50 and \$10 cost for exceeding the bag limit on deer, and tagging a deer with his wife's tag.

The following paid \$25 fines plus \$10 costs for illegal possession of deer by failing to tag: On November 21 and 22, first two days of hunt, Robert J. Herrera, Fernando L. Sanchez, Salvador A. Morales, Jr., Charlie P. Bustos, Miguel C. Portillo, Freddie Padillo.

Salvador A. Morales, Jr. also paid \$60 plus \$10 for hunting with an invalid license. Frances F. Butcher paid \$25 and \$10 for unlawful possession of spike deer without an ether sex validation. Charles Navarro paid \$50 and \$10 for improper tagging, to-wit putting his son's tag on his deer. Michael Kirby killed deer but claimed lost his billfold at checkpoint, then went back and found his billfold at the point of the kill, had tag in billfold. This case was then dismissed. Parfino Martinez killed doe, did not have permit, claims he has permit at home, will appear November 26.

The cases were all heard in Lincoln County Magistrate Court in Carrizozo, Judge Friday Sherrill presiding.

Airport Condemnation Set

The case of Town of Carrizozo vs. Thomas K. Karr for condemnation of less than acre of land adjoining the Carrizozo airport has been set for hearing November 30 in Judge Richard Stanley's district court in Carrizozo. The town is seeking the small acreage to complete airport improvement work.

Coach Jerry Lee has 40 boys out for basketball but starters unknown

Carrizozo starts its basketball season off with Alamo "B" on Dec. 1 at Alamo. The first important contest will see the Grizzlies at Hagerman on Dec. 11.

At this time Coach Lee has no idea who will be our starter for the opening games. We have about 40 boys out from the 9th through the 12th grades. We have about 16 boys that could all turn into fine ball players before the season is over. The boys that will eventually be the ones we depend on will be the hard workers and the ones with the best attitude. Basketball reflects attitudes more than most sports.

The boys that will play the most ball early in the season will be those that practice during the vacation and appear to be the best team men and ball handlers. None of the boys will be hitting the basket too well for awhile. We will probably never have a first five all season. The starters will vary because of too much team balance.

My observations of District 5's basketball is that it tends to be a little wild on the ball handling but the boys from this District are unusually strong. Carrizozo seems to have also followed this tendency.

We will be trying a new style of basketball here this season. We will try to accomplish these objectives.

Learn to successfully break a full court press. Most successful teams in New Mexico believe in the press so it is a must to be able to break it. My team last year played teams from all over New Mexico last year and were pressed hard 27 out of 29 games. We will press ourselves at times when necessary.

Our game will look rather deliberate compared to most basketball played in this area. We will try to fast break if the opening is available. We will not use the "Snowbird" but rather a spread which takes advantage of the whole team.

We will use multiple offence from a point stance. We will also use multiple defence employing possibly 3 or 4 defences per game. We don't plan on mastering all of these ideas until midseason.

The boys are working real hard and their attitude is fine. All we need now is a lucky start and we will be a team that will pull many upsets this season.

Roger Baer of UNM will open the meeting with discussion of "Lava tube formation in northern Calif." At 10:30 Carol Hill of NSS will discuss "Mineralogy of Fort Stanton Cave". An open session will be conducted at 11:00 a.m. and noon break at 1:30. At 1:00 p.m. Don Sawyer of BLM

will discuss "Development of Fort Stanton Cave". John McLean of NSS is on the program at 1:30 with discussion of "Cave Meteorology". Coffee break at 2:00. At 2:30 Dr. Arthur H. Harris of UTEP will discuss "Pleistocene Faunal Remains from Dry Cave" and at 3:00 p.m. John Corcoran III of NSS will give "Historical Notes of Fort Stanton Cave". Another open session at 3:30, and end of technical session at 4:00.

There will be a carbide lamp, slide contest at 4:00 and banquet at 6:00.

On December 6 there will be a scavenger hunt in Stanton with fantastic prizes. If there is enough interest, a walking "seminar" on BLM's development plans for the Fort Stanton cave and related cave studies will be held.

Recommended Christmas mailing dates start December 1


Of course, it will also be a big help to your post office. Key suggested latest dates by which Christmas mail should be deposited are as follows, but the postmasters urged customers to mail earlier wherever possible:

Domestic Mails (Except Alaska and Hawaii): a. Distant States
Parcels - December 1
Greeting Cards - Dec. 10
b. Local & Nearby Areas
Parcels - December 11
Greeting Cards - Dec. 15
In addition, the area Postmaster's noted several key dates applying for civilian international mail, as follows:
To Canada and Mexico - Surface

Parcels, Dec. 4; Greeting Cards, Dec. 9; and Air Parcels, Dec. 16.

To South and Central America - Surface Parcels, Nov. 13; Greeting Cards, Nov. 18; and Air Parcels, Dec. 14.

"These same dates apply for the various types of mail for Europe. Earlier the Area Postmasters announced deadlines required on military mail going overseas, as follows - Nov. 6 for surface parcels, Nov. 20 for "SAM" (space available parcels), and Nov. 27 for "PAL" (parcel airtel service). Further details on these basic parcel services for the military, as well as dates applying for other mailings to servicemen are also available at the area post office.

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INSIDE THE CAPITOL — BY FRED BUCKLES

SANTA FE — The Judicial Council would move Union County into the 10th Judicial District with Quay, DeBaca and Harding Counties in the 1971 Legislature in major reshuffling the state constitution requires after each census.

Caseloads vary sharply among the 11 judicial districts. They should be equalized as near as possible. Some districts are huge. They impose a heavy travel burden on district judges. The decennial review is intended to produce better administration of justice.

Other Judicial Council proposals: An Eighth District of Colfax, Taos and Mora Counties, Colfax, Union and Taos are in the district now. The proposal sparked strong objections because of travel problems and the divorce of Mora with its common ties in the Fourth District with Guadalupe and San Miguel.

A separate district for Dona Ana County, Dona Ana is now in the Third District with Lincoln and Otero Counties.

Remove Valencia County from the Second District with Bernalillo and Valencia and form a new district of Valencia and Torrance Counties.

State Sen. C. B. Trujillo, Taos Democrat, underscored objections to the proposed redistribution of Northern counties.

Sen. Trujillo, 38, an insurance agent, predicted the 1971 lawmakers' meeting "will be a hectic session." He said, "There is a big surplus (\$9 - \$10 million). Everybody wants a chunk of that surplus.

Unless somebody exerts some leadership we will be in real hot water."

Trujillo seeks the chairmanship of the Senate Finance Committee in a lively scrap among Senate Democrats. He has been on the SFC and Legislative Finance Committee four years. Trujillo sees no need for a tax hike in 1971.

Trujillo says the state surplus should be spent on non-recurring projects. If the surplus is allotted for general appropriations, he says, a 1972 tax increase will be required. He hopes the State Supreme Court withholds its decision in a pending Sunday liquor sales suit until the legislature has a chance to act.

Trujillo believes objections of church groups and small liquor licensees to Sunday liquor sales have decreased. He has sponsored Sunday liquor sales legislation in previous sessions. Taos County is tourist-oriented.

State Rep. George Blocker, Jal Democrat, says legislative reapportionment will be the hottest issue in the session opening Jan. 19. Blocker said Lea County will lose one of its four House seats in reapportionment under the 1970 federal census.

Rep. Blocker said multi-county House districts will also be hurt by reapportionment. The multi-county districts: Luna-Hidalgo; Lincoln-Sierra; Guadalupe-De Baca-Torrance; Union-Harding-Mora and Catron-Socorro.

Blocker will again oppose a public employe collective bargaining bill. He says: "We have a State Personnel Act with protection for good employes. I see no reason to go any further than that."

Rep. Blocker favors a general branch banking bill. New Mexico law allows only limited branch banks now. Blocker says: "I'd be willing to try general branch banking. It would pump a lot more available capital into the state. It hasn't hurt Arizona."

Sen. Odie Ethols, Clovis Democrat, claimed solid support of 17 senators and three "leaning" toward him in his bid for Senate majority whip. Ethols needs votes of 15 of the 28 Democratic senators to win the key party job.

Ethols was the top contender for the post to manage registration. State Sen. Jerry Apodaca, Las Cruces Democrat, sought an opponent for Ethols. Apodaca noted Senate President Pro Tem R. C. (Ike) Morgan of Portales and Ethols both represent Curry and Roosevelt Counties. He objected to handing two major leadership positions to senators in the same

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district. Apodaca also said Republicans Anderson Carter and Ed Foreman carried Curry County in the general election in losing battles against Democrats Joseph M. Montoya for the Senate and Harold Runnels for U. S. House in District 2. Jerry said the whip's job is a partisan party assignment. "Ethols said Sens. Morgan and Tibo Chavez, Belen Democrat, endorsed his candidacy. Chavez is Senate majority leader. Senate Democrats will choose leaders in a caucus during the pre-session legislators meeting Dec. 11 - 12. Sen. Chavez was set to attend the National Conference of State Legislative Leaders Nov. 30-Dec. 4 in San Juan, Puerto Rico. His plane fare will be \$331 on a tourist class excursion rate.

Deming banker Claude Leyendecker is chairman of a New Mexico Bankers Association committee on upgrading the State Banking Department. The committee's recommendations will be given to State Rep. John J. Mershon, Cloudcroft Democrat, in early January for action in the 1971 Legislature. Mershon is House Appropriations-Finance Committee chairman.

The Banking Department has experienced heavy employe turnover for years. Spokesmen also said state banks are not receiving the inspections they should. "Five banking commissioners have served in the topsy-turvy administration of outgoing Gov. David F. Cargo: William Upton of Deming, now a state representative-elect from Luna and Hidalgo Counties; Charles Mc Connell, Grant Brumlow, Guthrie Bennett and S. J. Sanders. Sanders is in the job now.

Wool price lower than synthetics

Wool has been selling in Roswell during the past week for 35 to 37 cents per pound. About 500,000 pounds of fine staple wools were sold. This price is about 90 cents per pound on a clean basis. Wool established a new record as this is the first time the price of wool is lower than synthetic fibers.

Your evergreen shrubs need special treatment to prepare them for winter. You can improve their hardiness if you give them some loving care as the cold weather arrives. The foliage of evergreen shrubs often "burns" or becomes brown during the winter. This is caused by desiccation or drying of the leaves. You should act now to prevent such damage. Water the soil around your shrubs thoroughly this fall before the ground freezes. If dry weather occurs during the winter, apply more water whenever the soil is not frozen. Evergreen plants lose water from the leaves whenever the temperature is above 40 degrees. The greatest losses occur during the warm windy weather. Adequate moisture must be present in the soil to replace that which is lost by the leaves. Apply a two-inch organic mulch of sawdust, wood chips, pine needles or peat moss around your shrubs. This will conserve moisture and help prevent the soil from freezing. Thus, more water will be available for your plants and the possibility of winter burn will be reduced. Broadleaf evergreen shrubs of questionable hardiness may need extra protection during the winter. They may be enclosed in burlap, or you may erect a plastic film screen around them.

Woolgrowers are going to be asked if they would be interested in a ram performance testing station. This was the outcome of a discussion at a meeting at the Artesia Experiment Station last week. This would give the ranchers who raise their own rams a chance to compare the performance of their ram lambs with others. They would be under the same feeding conditions. If you are interested let me know. Also recommended were investigations into methods of boat control on sheep and cattle or irrigated pastures including alfalfa.

rather small, you still may want to select a large turkey, roast and serve it for Thanksgiving dinner. Then you can cut the leftover turkey from the bone as soon as possible, slice the meat and portion into packets suitable for other mealtime needs. Wrap the turkey slices in freezer paper or foil, label and freeze immediately. Follow the same procedure with diced, cooked turkey that you plan to use in turkey salad and soups. USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service says, supplies of turkey are plentiful for the holiday season. You'll want to serve this high-protein meat often to your family.

Two dishes that may fit your family meals are:
Turkey-Rice Soup
4 cups turkey stock
1/4 cup finely diced onion
3/4 cup diced celery
1/2 cup diced carrots
1/4 cup rice
3 tablespoons fat
3 tablespoons flour
1 cup diced cooked turkey
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Heat stock to boiling. Add the vegetables and rice to stock and cook slowly. Melt fat, blend in flour. Add a little hot stock to flour mixture and blend until smooth, then stir into soup. Add turkey. Cook, stirring constantly, for 10 minutes longer. Remove from heat and add chopped parsley before serving. Serves five.

Turkey Gumbo
2 small onions, diced
2 tablespoons fat
4 cups turkey broth
2 cups canned tomatoes
2 cups bits of cooked turkey
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon paprika
2 cups cooked rice
4 cups cooked okra
Cook onion in fat until tender but not brown. Add broth, tomatoes, okra, turkey, parsley and paprika. Heat and simmer for 10 minutes. Taste for seasoning. Add cooked rice. Heat and serve. Makes 4 to 6 servings.





sold for less than par and accrued interest, nor shall any discount or commission be allowed or paid on the sale of such bonds. The County reserves the privilege of waiving any irregularity or informality in any bid.

Interest shall be bid in multiples of one-eighth or one-twentieth per centum and only one interest rate may be bid for each maturity. Supplemental coupons are not permitted.

All bids shall be sealed, and except the bid of the State of New Mexico, if one is received, shall be accompanied by a deposit of five per cent, either cash or certified check, of the amount of the bid, which shall be returned if the bid is not accepted; and if the successful bidder shall fail or neglect to complete the purchase of said bonds within sixty days following the acceptance of the bid, the amount of the deposit shall be forfeited to the County, and in that event the Board of County Commissioners may accept the bid of the one making the next best bid, or if all bids are rejected, the Board shall re-advertise said bonds for sale in the same manner as herein provided for the original advertisement. If there be two or more equal bids and such bids are the best bids received, and for not less than par and accrued interest, the Board of County Commissioners shall determine which bid shall be accepted.

The Board of County Commissioners will take action awarding the bonds or rejecting all bids not later than twenty-four hours after the expiration of the time herein prescribed for the receipt of the bids. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder at a Ruidoso bank as soon as practicable, and within sixty days, or at the successful bidder's request and at his expense, delivery will be made elsewhere as requested. No official bid form will be provided. Financial and other information may be secured from the County's Financial Advisor, Stern Brothers & Co., 1000 Bank of New Mexico Building, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The legality of the bonds will be approved by Messrs. Tallmadge and Tallmadge, Attorneys at Law, Denver, Colorado and Messrs. Kegel and McCulloch, Attorneys at Law, Santa Fe, New Mexico, whose unqualified joint approving opinion, together with the printed bonds and a complete transcript of the legal proceedings, including a certificate stating that no litigation affecting the validity of the bonds is pending, will be furnished the purchaser without charge.

fastened with glue or tape. Store pesticides only in their original containers and check to see that all container caps are tight. Fumes can be deadly and spilled pesticides are as bad.

Choose a cool, dry area to store your chemicals. Locked cabinets, storage rooms or sheds are ideal. Keep all pesticides off the ground to prevent corrosion or deterioration of containers.

Store liquid pesticides at temperatures above freezing. Freezing not only may cause the container to break, but some pesticides break-down or "spoil" at low temperatures. The frozen material may go back into solution after adequate warming and agitation, but it is best not to let the pesticide freeze in the first place.

In most instances, store herbicides and growth regulators in separate areas. This will help prevent contamination of other stored chemicals. Finally, never store pesticides near food, feed or other chemicals. And make sure your storage area is locked at all times.

Round-Up

Chelates, or sequestering agents, are commonly recommended for the control of iron or zinc deficiency in plants. Both terms are used interchangeably and mean the same thing. Very simply, a chelate is a compound made up of a metal atom and an organic component. The metal atom, usually iron or zinc, is held to the organic component with a loose to strong bond. Metal chelates are soluble in water. Chelates work well in our New Mexico soils because they decrease the activity of the metal atom. This decreased activity prevents the metal from being made unavailable to plants because of the action of our alkaline soils. The decreased activity of the iron or zinc atom makes it more available to the plants.

The solubility of iron or zinc metals is greatly increased by chelating agents. For this reason, iron or zinc chelates can be applied directly to the plant leaves, or to the soil.

Possibly the greatest advantage of chelated iron or zinc compounds is their price. Chelates are much more expensive than iron or zinc sulfates, but chelates are much more effective. Because of the greater effectiveness of chelates or the sulfate salts of iron or zinc to control a deficiency depends upon the preference of the homeowner.

Check with your county extension agent for publications giving recommended rates of the chelates and salts for control of iron or zinc deficiency.

As insect, weed and disease problems drop off this fall, any farm and home owners will be left with a variety of unused pesticides.

But how many pesticides did you use this year? And more important, "Where are they now?" They may be "stored" in aerosols, bags, cans, bottles, plastic containers or drums. Some may not have been used for several years.

Many may be old, unlabelled or improperly stored. Careless pesticide storage is an invitation to disaster. And of the people killed by pesticides each year, over half are curious children.

To prevent pesticide accidents, burn or bury all pesticide containers. In burning, avoid inhaling toxic smoke; in burying containers, make sure they're 18 inches deep and away from all water sources. Many accidents result in re-using pesticide containers, so dispose of all cans and bottles as soon as they are empty. In some areas, sanitary landfills will accept pesticide containers for disposal.

Before storing pesticides, make sure that all labels are securely


