## Judge Dee C. Blythe rules against Don Hancock and Color Cable TV

Judge Dee C. Blythe of Clovis, heard the case of Don Hancock, Ruidoso Cable TV and Color Cable TV, plaintiffs, vs. R. L. Battles, Lincoln County Commissioners, Village Trustees of Ruidoso, and County of Lincoln.

The plaintiffs were suing to enjoin or restrain the defendants from passing ordinance or granting franchise to R. L. Battles at Ruidoso.

The case was heard November 20 and the decision rendered on December 8 in favor of the defendants, who had filed motion for dismissal on the grounds that plaintiffs could not show that they were injured. Bill Payne of Carrizozo was attorney for the defendants, John Thompson represented the Village of Ruidoso.

A like case was being heard by the state supreme court where by KOB TV was suing to enjoin a cable television system and this court found for the defendants.

Blythe made his decision the same day as the supreme court but did not know of that court's action. The supreme court found for the defendants.

Color Cable TV has had severe service problems in both Ruidoso and Carrizozo almost from the time it installed the system. Battles now has a new cable system in operation in Ruidoso. Financing of the cable system in Carrizozo is controlled by Economy Finance of Indians, apparently Hancock is out of the picture here.

### Cable TV has one friend

At the regular meeting of Carrizozo town council last week there was considerable discussion of cable television service here, several visitors at the meeting complaining about the service interfering with antenna reception and a group of school teachers there to tell the council that cable TV is helpful at school where television is used in classes.

Atty. Elfred Jones was authorized to request that the FCC come into Carrizozo and make a check of the cable TV setup here, probably nothing further will be done, about canceling or improving the service, until this check is complete.

A resolution was passed making acreage acquired by condemnation at the airport a part of town property. The town now has deeded to this ground, less than an acre and can go ahead with airport improvement project.

Lease money for year 1970 was received from Scott-Tex. Occupation license for Snack Bar given tentative approval. Minutes read and approved and bills paid.

## Inside THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- A 12-county law enforcement -- criminal justice systems survey showed Lincoln County with the best jail in the region at Carrizozo, equipped with padded cells and a capacity of nearly 200.

Mesa Consultants Corp. of Albuquerque said the Hidalgo County jail at Lordsburg was "totally unacceptable." It reported inadequate separation of facilities and commodes between men and women prisoners. Luna and Lea Counties were also reviewed in the survey.

Survey results were handed to the Governor's Law Enforcement Policy Board in Santa Fe. They will be inserted in a statewide improvement plan. Improvements will be funded by federal dollars.

The State Education Board adopted sex education guidelines after a two-year study. Methods were suggested for courses from kindergarten through Grade 12. Local school boards hold options on courses. Variations are available for school districts within guidelines.

State Board Member Charles Murphy, Clovis Democrat, said: "As long as it is possible for schools to follow these guidelines, then I think we can be safe." Three board members were absent when provisions were adopted by voice vote. Among absentees were Mrs. Thelma Innon, Deming Democrat, a critic of proposed guidelines. Mrs. Innon represents Luna, Hidalgo and Grant Counties.

State Board Member K. I. Langley, Tucuman Democrat, was on a special committee that reviewed guidelines and recommended amendments. Langley represents Quay, DeBaca and Harding Counties.

State Liquor Director David Sierra asked Atty. Gen. James A. Maloney to probe possible liquor price fixing in Clovis. Sierra said Alcoholic Beverage Control Department agents bought a pint of Jim Beam, 86-proof, 4-year-old bourbon whiskey at the 11 Clovis package stores at the same price of \$3.50. This is a thumping 42 per cent markup over the \$2.48 wholesale price.

Sierra also said his agents found the \$5.50 price for a fifth of a gallon of the same brand of bourbon was the same in all the stores, also a 42 per cent markup over the \$3.95 wholesale price.

Sierra told Maloney: "We were able to further determine that licensees meet once a month at the Clovis Hotel. It is also our determination that all trade practices outside of the operation of each individual's daily business are handled by the Clovis Retailer's Association."

The U. S. Senate passed 70-12 a bill handing title to the 48,000-acre Blue Lake area near Taos to Taos Pueblo. Action ended a 64-year fight by the pueblo for the land regarded by Taos Indians as sacred for religious rites.

Albuquerque attorney William Schaab, special pueblo counsel, said Taos Pueblo may fence the area to keep out trespassers and loggers. U. S. Sen. Clinton P.

Anderson voted against the bill sent to President Richard M. Nixon. U. S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya was paired for the measure. Nixon is expected to sign the hotly contested measure into law.

Republican State Rep.-elect John Bigbee, Encino rancher, favors spending the state general fund expected \$22 million surplus in the 1971 Legislature on non-recurring expenditures. Bigbee said a tax increase would be forced "further down the line" if the surplus is plowed into state general appropriations.

A conservative, Bigbee will represent the DeBaca-Guadalupe-Torrance district. He previously served in the State House in 1965-66 from Torrance County. Bigbee's committee preferences are the major Appropriations - Finance and Taxation - Revenue Committees.

Among well-known Republicans attending an appreciation dinner that attracted 344 in Santa Fe for outgoing GOP Gov. David F. Cargo were Bigbee, Taos County Chairman Tillie Simton of Red River and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Trujillo of Taos.

State Sen. Odhis Echols, Clovis Democrat, will introduce a bill in the 1971 Legislature to add a judge to the Curry - Roosevelt Counties Judicial District. Judge Dee C. Blythe, Clovis Democrat, serves the district now. Echols said the district's caseload will be the largest in the state after January 1.


Two judges will be added then to the Second Judicial District (Bernalillo - Valencia - Sandoval) and one to the First District (Santa Fe - Rio Arriba - Los Alamos). Currently, these districts' caseloads are the heaviest.

Sen. Echols, a member of the Senate Finance Committee, also says: "I'm most reluctant to appropriate the state general fund surplus for recurring expenses. We particularly need to spend some money in education on a non-recurring basis for supplementary materials."

William Carr, Fort Sumner Democrat, is a prospect for State Park and Recreation Commission chairman in the incoming administration of Democratic Gov.-elect Bruce King. Carr is a former commission member.

Lea County House District 4 is vulnerable to reshuffling in legislative reapportionment next year. The district's population is only 9,017, a thumping 38 per cent below the population norm of 14,514 for a House district if the membership is retained at the present 70. Democratic Rep. George Blocker of Jal represents the district.

General election campaign expense reports showed Blocker contributed \$1,200 to the successful campaign of U. S. Rep.-elect Harold Runnels. Lovington Democrat, N. C. Romero Land Development Inc., Belen, was chartered here. Incorporators are 'uncle Romero Garcia, Frank Ray, and Joe Romero of Belen.

## School hires English teacher

Carrizozo Municipal Board of Education met Tuesday night in the school library with all members present, superintendent and secretary, no visitors.

Report given by Supt. James Steineprels on financial situation, cash on hand, school activities and lunch program. List of substitute teachers approved by the board. Policies prepared by Ski Club sponsors (six faculty members) was approved.

Title I money amounting to \$1,912.00 will be used for purchase of supplies and equipment for the present Title I program.

The board passed a resolution calling for an election of two board members for a term of six years each. Declaration of candidacy must be filed in the

superintendent's office no later than 5:00 p.m. on December 31, 1970. The election will be held in the Multi-Purpose Room of Manire Building on February 2 from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Mr. James Florian was hired as English and special studies teacher. He is a graduate of Isleta High School, El Paso, and the University of New Mexico. His wife Sally, will teach elementary classes a half day and library a half day. She has a master's degree from North Texas University and a B. A. Degree from Baylor University. Mr. Florian began teaching on December 7. Mrs. Florian will start January 4.

The superintendent reported on visit of Mr. Waymond Smith,

supervisor of industrial arts, State Department of Education. A study was made to determine the feasibility of vocational education in Carrizozo.

An outline of drug abuse program, prepared by two teachers who attended the state workshop in Roswell, was presented by Steineprels.

The state school board will hold its meeting in Albuquerque January 8-9. Some members of Carrizozo board of education are expecting to attend. A program on behavioral objectives and program budgeting was presented by the superintendent. Warrants approved, meeting adjourned.

Inaugural ceremonies honoring Governor-Elect Bruce King and Lieutenant Governor Robert Mondragon will begin at 11:30 a.m. at the Capitol January 1.

A schedule of events for the inauguration was announced today by Morry Yashvin and Connie Kitzes, co-chairmen of the Inauguration Ceremonies Committee.

The Oath of Office will be administered at noon in the Rotunda of the Capitol. Music by the Santa Fe High School band will start at 11:30 a.m.

A public reception will be held at the Museum of New Mexico, Fine Arts Building, Lincoln and Palace Avenues from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. honoring the new Governor, Lieutenant Governor and their wives.

The festive Inaugural Ball will be held at the College of Santa Fe's Physical Education Complex from 9:00 p.m. until 1:00 a.m., with the grand march scheduled for 10:00 p.m.

Tickets are \$10.00 per couple and \$3.00 for additional lady guests which are available from all banks and building and loan association offices throughout New Mexico, and will be also available at the door.

Dress will be optional. The Governor-elect has indicated he will wear a tuxedo and Mrs. King will wear a formal gown.

### Christmas ideas from Mary Ellen

If you have a mailbox that stands along the road, you have a good opportunity to express your thoughts of Christmas goodwill and cheer.

Whatever decoration you use, remember it must be sturdy, compact, and able to withstand all kinds of weather. Look in your attic for things to use. An old kerosene lantern painted green and red or silver and gold might be added for a lively touch of color. Decorations can be made from tin cans, oil cloth, plastics or pine cones. Metal jingle bells might be used or the mailbox could be completely covered with red oil cloth.

A new leaflet entitled "Educational Toys" compiled by Leo Yates, Family Life Specialist with New Mexico State Cooperative Extension Service could be a big help if you are in a quandry over gifts for children. One question of importance that Mr. Yates suggests parents ask about toys is "Is the Toy functional?" Some toys are not toys at all. An expensive hand-painted doll is not a toy -- it is a collector's item. Some model cars and trains are designed for adult hobbyists and are not for children.

For young children it is advisable to buy serviceable toys that can serve many functions. Unit blocks are an example. Unit blocks, or kindergarten blocks, are wooden blocks constructed on a standard unit. They come in single units (about 1.5 by 2.5 by 5.5 inches), double units (1.5 by 2.5 by 11 inches), quadruple units, cylinders, curves, arches, and so on. You can get them at large department stores, mailorder houses, and stores that specialize in toys.

A set of these blocks has been in our family for 4 years. It is used to build roads, houses and furniture for the "teen age dolls", garages for big trucks, railroad overpasses and many other things. We are still adding some of the fancier shapes such as arches. The leaflet mentioned has many ideas, suggestions and descriptions of children's abilities that are helpful. If you would like a copy please inquire at the County Extension Office.

**NM Boys Ranch launches Christmas letter campaign**

Covering 2000 acres along the east bank of the Rio Grande in central New Mexico, 18 miles south of Belen, is an unique organization dedicated to the welfare of many young boys who otherwise would be homeless.

This is New Mexico Boys Ranch, whose "Flying BR" brand is well known in the state's agricultural circles.

Non-profit, non-political and non-sectarian, Boys Ranch is dependent largely on individual gifts.

The Flying BR provides a ranch type home for boys who need an improved environment and proper

training. Boys come largely from broken homes or families in unfortunate circumstances, none is barred because of race, color or religious creed.

However, each boy accepted must be in good health, deserving and in need. The mentally and physically handicapped cannot be accepted, since funds and facilities are limited.

Each boy is assigned daily chores, which are rotated regularly to avoid favoritism. The boys have won many awards in livestock shows and in 4-H and FFA competition. They attend schools in Belen and participate

in extra-curricular activities.

The general atmosphere at the Flying BR is that of "one big happy family". All birthdays and holidays are observed. On Sunday each boy attends the church of his religious faith. New boys usually adjust easily and soon enter wholeheartedly into the spirit of all activities.

After several years of ups and downs, Boys Ranch is well established. Its staff members believe it is filling a real need. Its boys are receiving training and guidance during the important years of their lives. Ultimate goal of the staff and board members is

to expand facilities so that this advantage can be offered to even more needy and deserving, but otherwise homeless or unwanted boys.

For many years New Mexico Boys Ranch has sent its Christmas appeal to the people of New Mexico. This Christmas letter brings a vital appeal to you this Christmas time. The Ranch desperately needs a generous response to our letters this year as the need has been extremely heavy.

Since it is necessary for the Ranch to raise a large part of our income through mail appeals, we hope you will do your best

for the boys at the Ranch at this Christmas Season. **Round-Up**  
 By Ralph Dunlap

When you bring your tree home you can take measures to keep your Christmas tree fresh and attractive. If you don't want to set it up immediately, place it in a bucket of water in a cool and sheltered spot. Put the tree in a stand which can be filled with water or use a bucket of wet sand for a stand. Just before putting the tree in its stand, cut an inch or two of the trunk off squarely to allow it to take up water more readily. Add a pint of water to the stand each day. Don't decorate the tree with cotton, paper or other flammable materials. Be sure to check lights and wiring for

worn spots and cracks and don't overload electric circuits. After the holiday season, dispose of the tree properly, according to your community regulations. Usually communities have a special tree disposal program. Never burn the tree in a fireplace.

Most insects disappear when temperatures drop, but that's when aphids become a problem. Check hardy plants such as pansies, stock, snapdragons, and chrysanthemums frequently for these very small sucking insects. Choose a warm still day to control them with a fine-mist spray of Spectracide, malathion, cygon or Meta-Systox.

The Fruit and Vegetable Short

Course will be January 20th-22nd, 1971 at New Mexico State University. Some of the subjects to be discussed are: High Density plantings, Nutrition of Apple Trees, Trickle Irrigation and mechanical pruning equipment. Anyone is invited to attend so put January 20-22 on your calendar.

Livestock producers acting as their own agent when selling cattle should watch for danger signals to avoid insolvent buyers. Livestock producers should protect themselves by watching for these danger signals when selling livestock:

Any attempt to delay payment. A request to use a post-dated check.


A request for credit.

An attempt by the buyer to use a deferred payment draft. Insufficient funds in the bank to cover the check.

The over-anxious buyer. Beware of the buyer who "must buy today".

You may want to have your banker check the buyer's financial condition. Be sure to draw up a sales contract.

Always insist on prompt payment, and if payment is made on a bank draft, have your banker verify the draft. Finally, notify the USDA's Packers and Stockyard's Division if you get a bad check or if payment is delayed. The address is Packers and Stockyard's Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Federal Building, Denver, Colo.

## Many Americans devote time to exploring inner space . . . caves

Washington — Only a few highly trained men can explore outer space, but many Americans devote their leisure time to exploring inner space—the estimated 50,000 caves found in the United States.

Members of the 125 chapters of the National Speleological Society have probed some 15,000 of the caverns to date, and are pushing their explorations further.

Biologist Charles E. Mohr, a spelunker, explains the lure of cave-crawling in a chapter of the National Geographic Society's recent book, *Vacationland U.S.A.*

### SCIENCE PLUS PLEASURE

Though he goes underground in search of rare blindfish and similar specimens, Mohr insists: "I do not endure the cramped miseries of playing mouse in a blacked-out Swiss cheese merely for the sake of science. I enjoy caving, along with thousands of others — teen-agers, housewives, businessmen."

All that's necessary to become a spelunker, Mohr writes, is a hard hat, dependable light, and good company. "Spelunkers — the word is derived from the Latin, spelunca, meaning cave — follow a cardinal rule: Never go underground alone.

"They do not fear the collapse of a cave; the formations are remarkably stable," Mohr says. "Dangers lie in human negligence and faulty equipment."

Spelunkers use nylon rope capable of holding up to one ton. Mohr recommends taking along a second rope, just in case. He also suggests packing a flashlight, candles, and waterproof matches to back up the carbide head lamp spelunkers wear.

On his explorations, Mohr eats food concentrates and wears non-slip boots, clothing that won't snag, and gloves. He also carries lightweight wire ladders, pitons, and mooring pins.

### SEARCHES FOR TROGLOBIONTS

Mohr is a specialized caver, whose journeys underground enable him to study the strange troglobionts, the often blind and colorless insects, salamanders, fish, and other specimens who live where there is little or no daylight.

Novice spelunkers start with "tame" holes, the 200 or more public caverns from Anemone Cave at Acadia National Park, in Maine, to Lava Beds National Monument at Tululake, California.

At Mammoth Cave National Park in Kentucky, they can ride boats on Echo River, 360 feet beneath the surface of the Earth. And in New Mexico's vast Carlsbad Caverns, Park Service guides escort visitors on three-mile, underground hikes.

Skilled spelunkers, however, prefer to worm, crawl, and climb through the mysterious blackness of less traveled caves in quest of what may lie beyond the next turn, at the bottom of the next pit, or just out of lantern reach.

Mohr quotes Bill Varndoe, who in 1961 was a co-discoverer of the 426-foot-deep Surprise Pit in Fern Cave, Alabama, on the lure of spelunking. Varndoe, a rocket engineer, says:

"Most of us can only dream of going into orbit. But tomorrow any of us could be standing where no man has ever been before — in a new cave."

## Stanton cave development real costly

The development of the Fort Stanton Caves was discussed by Don Sawyer with Bureau of Land Management at the regional meeting of the National Speleological Society at Lincoln Saturday. He estimated it would take six years and up to four million dollars to develop the caves properly yet it would attract 500,000 people each year.

The preservation of the caves are being considered first and development second. Any development must be planned so that it will not affect the climate within the caves.

The Feather Cave could be developed much sooner and at a lower cost. It would stress the archeological aspects of the caves. People are wanting to see more of these types of things.

Also being considered for the area are nature trails, camp grounds and motorcycle trails. If motorcycle trails are developed it will help keep the motorcycles out of other areas.

His wife, Charlanne, lives on Arabella Route, Tinnie.



**Rail strike will affect Carrizozo**

The Brotherhood of Railway, Airline and Steamship clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees have announced their intent to go on strike at 12:01 a.m., Thursday, December 10. According to Wednesday morning news releases this strike will take place without regard to legislation that may be passed in Washington.

The major issue in dispute is wages. The Emergency Board has recommended a wage increase of 13-1/2 percent or 47.9¢ per hour for 1970; a 9 percent or 36¢ per hour for 1971; 10¢ or 43.9¢ for 1972. This comes to an increase of \$1.28 for majority of union members, based on a median average wage of approximately \$3.44 per hour.

C. L. Dennis, international president, says this is not enough, not enough money and not enough in fringe benefits. The strike will affect all Southern Pacific Railroad employees in Carrizozo.

**U.S. better off than we know**

The United States is better off economically in 1970 than most of us would believe amid a continuous chorus of doom-saying. Gross National Product of the country should reach a trillion dollars annually before the end of the year. This is almost double the \$503 billion recorded in 1960.

According to the Federal Reserve the increase is solid and only to some extent reflects inflation. The nation's industrial output has increased about 60 percent since 1959 -- from an index of 108 to 170.

People employed in the United States increased 15,000,000 since 1960. Eighty million people are employed today -- a figure almost beyond comprehension a decade ago. Not even the most optimistic politician would have promised such employment gains.

For the local retailer, the key to potential prosperity is buying power of the consumer. Well, the retailer has reason to be optimistic. Personal income has reached an all time high of over \$807 billion annually. This is an increase of over \$300 billion since the prosperous year of 1964. During the past year, personal income has increased approximately \$50 billion.

But significantly, personal savings are at the highest per capita level since 1950. Thus, if the local retailer isn't selling, something may be wrong with the quality and quantity of his advertising.

For, as John O'Riley writes in the WALL STREET JOURNAL: "It is not the nature of the American consumer to sit on savings forever."

Zozo to tournaments with mixed-up record



**MARY ELLEN RECOMMENDS A NEW APPLIANCE AS GIFT!**

A most welcome Christmas gift would be a new appliance, the trash compactor or masher. It was introduced to the public this fall. It is intended to contribute to the control of solid wastes. Many authorities tell us we are likely to be buried by the tons of plastic, glass, metal, and paper refuse we dump if we don't find ways to control them. Every day the average American contributes almost five pounds of solid waste to the total accumulated. And, we are rapidly running out of landfill areas.

Attractively finished to match other kitchen appliances, the trash compactor is designed to take its place in the kitchen. Practically all kinds of trash collected in the home may be dumped into the waste drawer of the compactor. When an accumulation of trash is to be reduced, a power ram compacts it with about 2000 pounds

of pressure in a minute's time. A week's accumulation of trash by a family of four can be compacted into one bag. Bags for the compacted trash are of strong paper with a moisture-proof lining. When full, bags can be sealed and set out for the regular municipal collection.

Safety features make it impossible to operate the power ram when the waste drawer is open. The drawer cannot be opened when the ram is operating. Controls for setting the power ram into operation are so designed that a child cannot operate them easily. A two-step starting operation is needed.

The trash compactor has a built-in deodorizer which is triggered when the waste drawer is closed. Additional bags and bottles of deodorizer can be bought as needed.





# Thompson elected vice-president

meeting and made an excellent talk on the merits of White Oaks as a Historical Site and informed the membership of means of accomplishing their program. He also brought signs to be posted at the registered sites.

John and Maggie Kelt of Tucumcari and Herman E. Kelt of Albuquerque were here for the meeting. John brought over a hundred dollars worth of paint which the Kelt family are donating to the project for painting the hall and east room of the school house. Le Roy Acker has donated \$160 in labor and material and has volunteered to help with the painting.

The Association is most grateful to them for this and their efforts in behalf of the program.

**Grazing fee go from 44c to 64c**

In spite of strong requests by the Executive Committee of the NWGA, and similar requests from

other groups, urging continuation in 1971 of the moratorium on grazing fee increases, semi-official word from Washington, D.C., this morning indicates that grazing fees on BLM lands will increase from the present 44¢ per a.u.m. to 64¢ for 1971.

Rumors in Washington recently indicated a higher increase might be made. Requests from livestock organizations for continuation of the moratorium may have tempered the increase to some degree.

In line with recommendations in the Public Land Law Review Commission report, the livestock industry is now drafting legislation for introduction in the new Congress in January to set grazing fees by law on both BLM and National Forest lands. The fee increase for 1971 emphasizes the necessity for establishing the grazing fees by law rather than by arbitrary action of the Departments of Interior and Agriculture.




