The Zozo Bee squad won their game with the Ruidoso freshmen.



News And Notes

Table linens are not out of date; they are prettier and more practical every day. They are used as a protection for the table and as a unifying agent for all items placed on the table.

The word "linen" refers to any material used for tablecloths, place mats, or napkins. It does not mean that the item is made of linen fiber. Homemakers have a wide variety of materials from which to choose.

Covers for tables were used thousands of years ago. A desire. for beauty and a need for cleanliness made the use of table linen a natural custom. Guests at banquets in ancient Rome wiped their hands on the edge of the cloth so extra cloths

were necessary. In primitive countries, mais woven from banboo, twigs, or grasses were usual accompaniments to meals. In England during the 15th, 16th, and 17th centuries only nobility used table linens.

The emphasis today is on fun without fuss. Homemakers look for something that requires 2 3 m minimum of care and that best fits their needs. Measuring the table before buying new linens. is essential, A-tablecloth looks best when it extends 12 to 15 inches over the edge of the table. Place mats may be round, oval, rectangular, or trangular. A convenient size is about 14 by 18 inches. Choice of mats will depend on the size and shape of the table.

Even though today's table linens offer easy care, the homemaker still has to know what kind of care they need. The best guide is to read the label for information on care the linea needs and then following thecare instructions.
