## Shrecengost is county chairman

At the Republican County Convention held Friday in the courthouse Bill Shrecengost of Lincoln was elected as party chairman to succeed Dale Wynn of Ruidoso who has served two terms. Shrecengost has been active in county Republican affairs for many years.

Other county officers elected include Don Swallander of Ruidoso as vice chairman, Cathy Anala of Ruidoso as vice chairman, Betty Shrecengost of Lincoln as secretary, Primo Cozzens of Capitan as treasurer. Central committee members elected were Ernest Lueras of Corona and Elfred Jones of Carrizozo. They will serve with Shrecengost, Swallander and Anala on the Lincoln County Central Committee.

# Implied consent bill passes

This week the New Mexico Legislature got started in earnest. There were probably 100 new bills introduced in the Senate, and all indications are that several hundred more will be introduced.

The most significant piece of legislation to pass the Senate is the Implied Consent bill. Basically, this bill states that any person who drives in New Mexico has consented to a blood alcohol test in the event he is stopped by a law enforcement officer, placed under arrest for

driving while intoxicated, and then requested to take a blood alcohol test. If the person arrested refuses to take the test, this fact is then forwarded to the Motor Vehicle Commissioner by an affidavit of the arresting officer, and the individual's drivers license is revoked for a one-year period. Adequate safeguards for the individual are included in the bill, as it allows him to appeal to the Motor Vehicle Commissioner and then to the District Court.

This bill was heard in the Judiciary Committee on Wed. and passed the committee 8 to 3. In a committee hearing, witnesses testify as to the merits or demerits of a particular piece of legislation. On the Implied Consent bill, we had several doctors, a law professor, the chief of the State Police, and a legal advisor to the Oklahoma State Police testify to the merits of the bill. In Oklahoma, with their Implied Consent bill enforced, traffic deaths in the past year have decreased 14%. If this can be accomplished in New Mexico, the traffic death total for 1970 would have decreased by approximately 80 persons.

On Friday the bill was debated on the Senate floor, and we were able to beat down several amendments which would have considerably weakened the bill. The bill passed the Senate 37 to 1, and those of us who are co-sponsors of the bill, have high hopes that it will pass the House in its present form, as it will be an effective tool in our fight to keep the drunk driver off the road.

On Thursday, there was a joint meeting of the House and Senate to hear the progress of the Physical Sciences Laboratory in assisting us to obtain the Space Shuttle program. Kent Roberts gave an excellent presentation of what the Physical Sciences Laboratory has done to show the people at ASA the advantages of our area. There is a \$60,000 appropriation in the Governor's executive budget to enable the Physical Sciences Laboratory to continue their work, and I feel very confident that this will pass the Legislature. Immediately after the joint meeting with the House, the Senate passed Senate Memorial Number 4, which I sponsored, requesting the assistance of the Governor of Texas and the Texas Legislature to bring the Space Shuttle program to White Sands.

The Judiciary Committee is considering judiciary districting bills this week, and I have high hopes that the new judicial district of Otero and Lincoln Counties will be approved by the Committee. I will report on this next week.

# Cummins, Barber, Stearns, Ortiz, Gnatkowski is lineup

Capitan School District #28 had competition for both positions in the school board election Tuesday and 143 people turned out to vote at the Capitan Village Hall.

For Position 1, six-year term, Hollis O. Cummins polled 120 votes, Billie J. Huey 22.

For Position 2, six-year term, Ralph O. Barber polled 100 votes, Harold L. Cartwright 40.

At Corona A. W. Gnatkowski and John Nalda running unopposed were both elected but if Myron Yancey had gone around kissing a few babies or shaking a few hands and saying he was a school board candidate he'd surely been a winner.

The vote at Corona Village Hall was Gnatkowski 54, Nalda 32, and 22 write-in votes for

Yancey. There was a tight turnout for the school board election held in the Multi-Purpose Room in Manire Elementary School in Carrizozo.

For Position 1, Robert J. Stearns received 66 votes to win over Ramon S. Luna with 51.

Paul L. Ortiz was unopposed for Position 2 and received 83 votes.

Election results at Ruidoso: Dr. Howard Tate, unopposed in Position 1, received 330 votes, Dave Parks received 273, Jack Kannady Jr. 82 votes in the race for Position 2 on the Ruidoso School Board.

The newly elected school board officials will take office at the regular meetings schedule for Tuesday, March 3, 1971.

# Request made to include all of Lincoln in SCMRA

The Executive Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met January 19 in Alamogordo. The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by D. H. Dean, Chairman.

The minutes of the Dec. 8, 1970 meeting were read and approved.

The Honorable Walter Mullins, Mayor of Alamogordo, discussed briefly the settling tanks as a potential recreation lake in that area, and indicated that the Beeman Canyon resources might have a greater potential as a recreation site.

Howard Abercrombie stated that Bob Scribner had written a letter to the New Mexico Guides and Outfitters Association regarding their request for assistance. Further action and discussion was postponed until the afternoon meeting of the Steering Committee on a motion made by Fred Thompson and

- seconded by Robert Bell.
- A letter from Don Stark, Chairman of the Lincoln County Commissioners was read wherein the Commissioners requested that all of Lincoln County be included in the South Central Mountain Resource Area. Robert Bell moved that the request be supported and adopted, second was made by Fred Thompson and the motion carried.
- Fred Thompson outlined the following seven bills which are to be introduced in the current state legislative session:
  1. Protect lions, owls, and hawks.
  2. Hunter safety training bill which would include safety training for juveniles.
  3. Wild River system bill including a study of scenic rivers in New Mexico.
  4. Snowmobile Registration Bill.

## Bill creates 4 new judicial districts

The Senate Judiciary Committee in Santa Fe, after a joint hearing Monday with its House counterpart, approved a bill creating four new district judgeships and two new judicial districts in New Mexico.

The substitute Senate bill worked out by both committees would separate Valencia and Sandoval from Bernalillo, and Lincoln and Otero from Dona Ana counties to form the two new one-judge districts.

Two more judges, for a total of 10, would be added to the single-county district at Albuquerque. The Dona Ana district would continue to have two judges.

The bill would give the state 13 judicial districts instead of 11 and 28 district judges instead of 24. The new Lincoln-Otero and Valencia-Sandoval districts would also have their own district attorney offices.

5. Territorial jurisdiction bill which would allow a game violator to be taken to the nearest magistrate court rather than one in the same county as now required.

6. A bill to provide financial assistance to small unincorporated communities for recreation.

7. State Trail System Bill to provide for feasibility study on a state trail system.

Kurt Ziebarth moved to enforce the proposed legislation, second was made by Robert Bell and the motion was approved. The Executive Committee recommended that the vacancies on that committee be filled by the chairman of the Steering Committee.

Under progress under old measures, Robert Bell indicated that the outlets or overflow parts in Bear Canyon Dam could be closed by the time rainy season

sets in this year. This is Project Measure 33.

The next meeting date was set as March 2, 1971 in Carrizozo. The meeting adjourned at 1:30 p.m.

**Called Casa Hogar**

**Pre-Delinquent Youth Group Home to Open March 1**

Albuquerque's first group home for pre-delinquent youth is scheduled to open March 1.

The home, called Casa Hogar, will offer room, board, professional therapy and a home-like situation for youths who have been in minor trouble with the law but who have not yet served any time in a correctional institution.

"SO MANY KIDS get into trouble just because they lack supervision, their parents have rejected them or because they simply don't have any place to go. This is the type of child we are trying to help," said Nestor Baca, president of the board of directors of Casa Hogar and assistant superintendent at the Bernalillo County Juvenile Detention Home.

The entire operation is being financed by Mrs. A. N. (Jackie) Spencer of Carrizozo. "I realized there was a tremendous need for shelter facilities for kids in minor trouble and kids who simply can't live at home. I had some extra money that I wanted to put into something worthy and make it work. This seems to be the place," she said.

Mrs. Spencer purchased a house at 1014 Fruit NW at a cost of \$23,000, is paying for remodeling and will put money into a fund to pay salaries, medical expenses and operational costs for the first year the home is open. The cost of the house plus first year expenses is expected to be \$75,000.

"After that we hope to get matching federal funds and possibly public contributions to keep it going and get others started," Baca said. "I hope this will be the first of many badly needed group homes."

BACA SAID there are always many children in the Juvenile Detention Home, who are not legally supposed to be there but they have no place else to go. "This is just the type of outlet we need." He estimated there are between 300 and 500 youths a year, of the 3000 that go through the home, who need group home situations.

"Right now, we just have to send them back home and all that does is perpetuate the problem, and they get into trouble again and again until they are sent to an institution. We're trying to nip this type of thing in the bud," Baca said.

Right now the only outlets available are the Christian Children's Home which doesn't accept youths who have been in trouble, the New Mexico Boys' Ranch, which is usually filled, Father Ed, the "begging priest" from Springer, who gives boys shelter and food and foster homes which are scarce and usually reluctant to accept delinquent youths.

THE BOARD is reviewing applications for the three persons who will work for Casa Hogar, a house couple and a group worker. The house couple will provide the home-like mother-father atmosphere, and the group worker, educated in social work, will provide therapy to rehabilitate the residents, find them jobs and help them to get out on their own or go back to their real homes.

Residents can be placed by their parents, they can be wards of the court, they can be referred through Health and Social Services or they can voluntarily apply on their own. A waiting list is expected immediately.

There is no time limit on residency, and no fee will be charged, although employed youths will be encouraged to pay part of their room and board.

AFTER THE first year, cost per resident is expected to level off at \$3000 a year.

"After six or eight months, we may be able to qualify for matching federal funds and start other group homes here. We need them for youths who have just left correctional institutions and youths who simply need shelter care."

A number of persons and organizations are aware of the shortage of such facilities and many have tried to get group homes and half-way houses started, but this is the first of its kind to succeed.

"The reason, of course, was the money. All of us saw the need and had ideas, but there is great initial expense and no one could raise it until now," Baca said.

A GROUP has been working to turn the old Lourdes High School into a half-way house for youths who have left correctional institutions or who need shelter or psychological help. But only a fraction of the \$100,000 has been raised.

Mrs. Spencer said the reason she did not offer her contribution to Lourdes was, "It was too institutional. These kids need more of a home-like environment."

Then he covered her just as he had covered the deer. All of the signs told the story.

In the twelve days they hunted this time they found 41 deer and 2 elk that had been killed by lions.

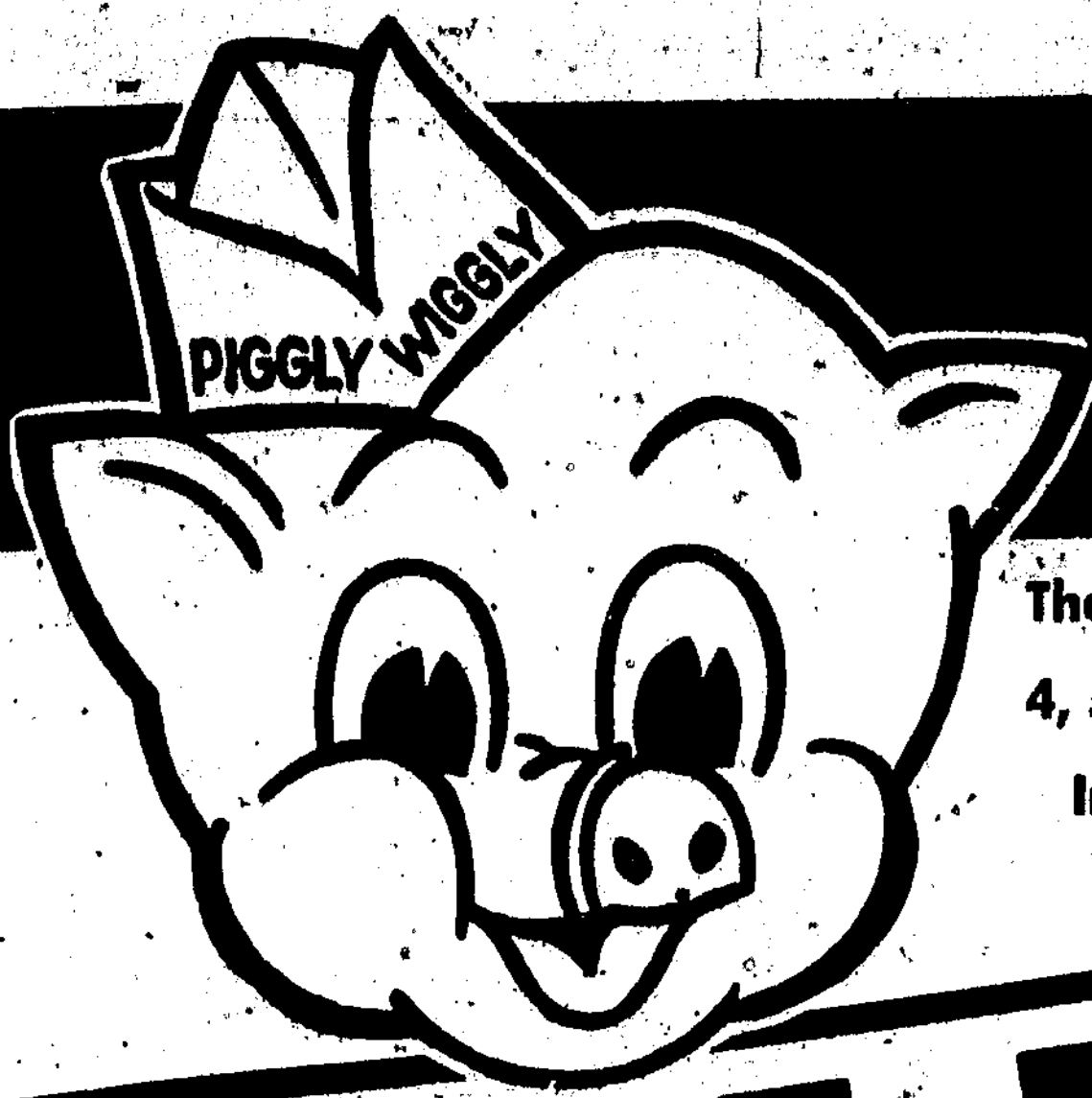
