

Zozo Grizzlies have varied football schedule

Because of the distance between the "A" group of towns in New Mexico it does not take a handful of wins to make the state playoffs, even a winning season for most district teams.

Carrizozo plays a nine-game schedule. Only two of these games count in the district, being the games with Corona there September 10, and the game with Reserve here October 21.

In front of, between and after the district games are some interesting contests. The Grizzlies open here Friday at 7:30 against 3AAA Ruidoso and the Warriors are expected to field a strong team.

The Corona game comes next, the Captain at Carrizozo, a non-district affair but could mean something because the Tigers might get into the playoffs.

Carrizozo people have been wanting a night in Juarez and September 25 is the night when the Grizzlies play Colonia Juarez a "south of the border" game.

Capitan and Cloudcroft are both in District 4A. The Grizzlies go to Cloudcroft October 1. Roswell JV comes here the 8th just to keep the Grizzlies in shape to play Dexter an independent team the following week.

The long trip to Reserve will be made October 21 and Hatch, now coached by John Dickey, will come to Zozo October 23 to close out the season.

September 3 games include: Cloudcroft at Mountainair 1A; Dulce at Roy, Estancia at Vaughn Ft. Sumner at Melrose, Texico at Hagerman 2A; Reserve at Corona, Ruidoso at Carrizozo 3A; Dexter at Capitan, Cloudcroft at Mountainair, Texico at Hagerman 4A.

Albuquerque Journal headline for Sunday, August 22, read "Jal Carrizozo strong again in AA-A. Probably this is true to start the season. What the Grizzlies lack is depth at any position. Ten boys will be playing both ways which does not leave a lot of room for injuries during the nine weeks of play.

The starting defensive unit should include: Gerald Wells, nose guard; Shawn Lock and Ben Bradley at end; Cristy Mourreal and Rusty Leslie tackles; Jim Speight, Gaby Chavez and Marcos Barela linebackers; Willie Gallegos, Matt Ellison and David Roper in the deep secondary.

On offense David Roper goes to end position with Shawn Lock tackle the same, Mourreal and Leslie, Jay Barnes and Wells at guard, Ben Bradley shifts to center; Gaby Chavez at QB; Gallegos and Ellison halfbacks, and Speight FB.

These boys do have some good help. David Lee and Rito Samora in offensive line, Paul Pino and Mike Barela at end Steve Ortiz just shed cast off arm should be ready for go at FB in a couple of weeks. Harold Leach is capable replacement at defensive end, Robert Schlarb and Andre Hoff will see action at HB position. Jody Ventura is a good linebacker, Artie Ortiz and Fernando Chavez will help on defense probably as backs.

This is the squad that will play a big Warrior team Friday. Joe Howell formerly of Jal is their new coach. Their outstanding boys include at least the following: Blain Miller at QB, Corley Conley at tackle and defensive end, 210 center named Perryman, Underwood a fast soph, Reece McGuire a fast split end, a 220 pound transfer from Artesia at nose guard.

This will be a barbequed cowboy supper starting at 7:00 p.m. Methodist from the Capitan Church are especially invited. service in Carrizozo where James L. Reynolds will preach, presuming that his son recovers from his accident as well as expected. Special music for the morning service will be provided by Organist Jane Shafer and Pianist Paul Payton.

The Carrizozo project was allocated \$165,000.00 and Stearns said that Carrizozo would get priority on next year's money. The \$165,000 will be matched locally.

Dennis Reynolds severely injured

An accident on White Sands Missile Range, about a half mile from main base, last Thursday severely injured the three occupants of one of the vehicles.

The driver, Margaret Hibbard, pulled out to pass and hit an oncoming pickup headon, James Dennis Reynolds, whose father, James L. Reynolds is pastor of Carrizozo and Capitan Methodist Churches, was pinned in the car. The other passenger, Michael Sos was injured.

Miss Hibbard has not regained consciousness Tuesday of this week. Sos was released from intensive care, Reynolds underwent three operations, the first two for brain concussion, the third came when his blood count would not come up and the doctors removed his spleen which was lacerated. Barring unforeseen complications he is expected to recover.

417th FIGHTER SQUADRON HEADING FOR EUROPE

Bright and early Monday morning at approximately 6:30 a.m. the first Sixth-Sircraft Cell of F4s from the 417th Tactical Fighter Squadron will lift off from Holloman. Destination: Hahn AB German.

Crested Cap III will be under way with Col. Jack Bellamy, Commander of the 49th Tactical Fighter Wing, leading the first cell of aircraft. Forty-five minutes later a second cell will follow and the process will continue that morning until all four cells have launched.

Early Tuesday morning the first aircraft of the 8th Tac Fighter Squadron will launch and head for Ramstein AB Germany. On Wednesday the 9th Tac Fighter Squadron will leave for Hahn and on Thursday the 7th will round out the deployment of the 49th, 96th, F4 Aircraft.

Crested Cap III is designed to carry out U.S. commitments made to NATO and commitments made in the 1967 tri-lateral agreement with the Federal Republic of German and the United Kingdom, agreeing that the dual base forces will return to Europe for annual training.

This exercise marks the 3rd time that NATO committed, dual based, 49th has returned to Europe for training since it left Germany in 1968.

A total of 2,000 men will be deployed.

Mrs. Koenig was hitting the brakes as she went into the left curve into town but the two vehicles were moving too fast to complete the turn. The truck just rolled over, coming to a stop at the power pole in front of Central Restaurant. Truck was damaged some, second vehicle not hurt.

Mrs. Josephine Canni, mother of Mrs. Koenig, was severely injured and was taken to an El Paso hospital late Monday after the accident at 3:17 p.m.

Wayland Hill Sr. was an eye witness to the accident. He thought the driver probably failed to see the 25 MPH sign, which appears to be the case, and got into the curve before realizing how sharp it was. There is little slope on this curve. One woman, Mrs. Canni, was trapped.

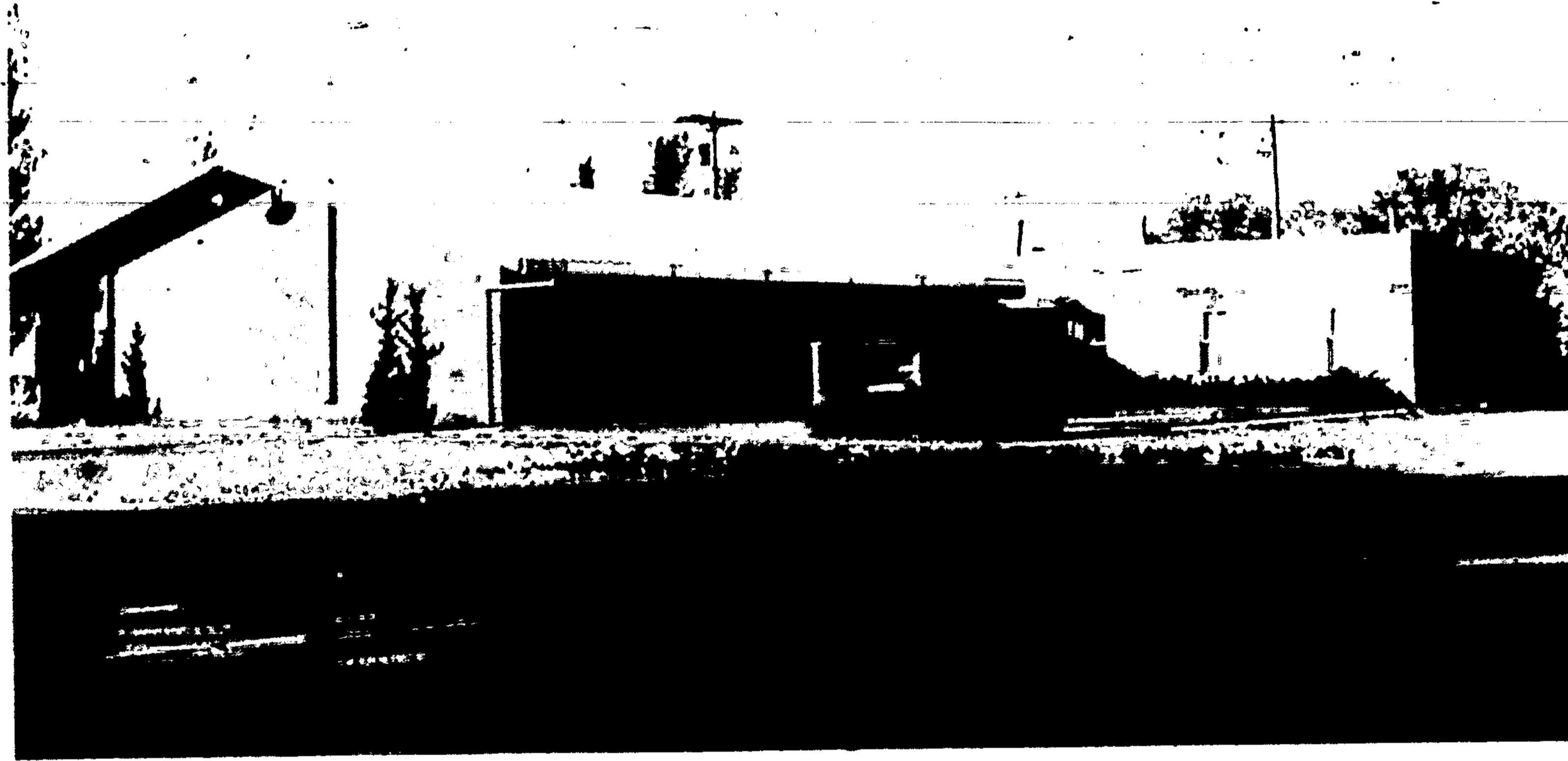

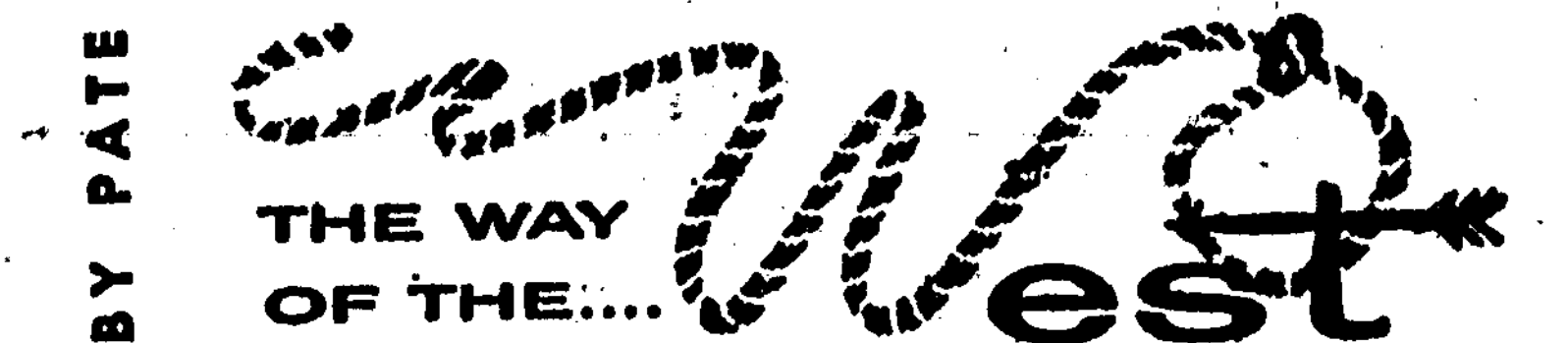

Back in the early 60s the south central portion of New Mexico gained the reputation for growing (or showing) the largest rattlesnakes in the world.

The Village Press area has not done much to support its reputation since "Ole Tex" was skinned, where at least two other areas have a big snake catch each year.

Ervin Crockett, whose ranch borders the Malpais, came to town all shook up one day in July of 1980 because somebody had been out to his ranch and killed "Ole Tex," his pet rattlesnake. Crockett said "I been feedin' him a goat every other day and I had him halter broke and branded with my Rail-D brand. This summer I was goin' to saddle-break Ole Tex so's I could ride him to chase

was making history.

In the meantime, just this August at Indian Steps, Pennsylvania, they had their 11th annual Snake Hunt. Joseph Cooper of Placitas, N. M., sent us the newspaper clippings that were sent to him by his father who lives in Lancaster, Pa.

There were over 2,000 spectators crowding the grounds at Indian Steps Museum Saturday to view a variety of snakes. Forty-three copperheads were caught this year, almost twice the number caught in 1970. About 100 of the non-poisonous variety of snakes were also caught. These included black, water, milk, worm and ringneck snakes.

One hundred and thirty three snake hunters participated in the activities, including 20 women. None of the copperheads were caught by women.

The day's largest snake was caught late in the afternoon by a C. R. Thompson. His snake measured 36-1/2 inches. Hunters came from Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, Washington, Canada and the District of Columbia to participate in the hunt.

Now, if 2,000 people come from all those different places just to see snakes that would be counted in the "throw back" category in New Mexico, the Chambers of Commerce in

Mountainair, Corona (best snake country is right south of them), Carrizozo, Tularosa, Capitan, Cloudcroft, or the Oktoberfest people sure ought to get busy and protect the image of our land. It's an unusual year in the newspaper business when we do not print a picture of at least a seven-foot rattler, and occasionally the length goes to eight feet.

Seems like the least us New Mexicans could do for those
