## Zozo Grizzlies shotgun Ruidoso Warriors

The games between Carrizozo and Ruidoso have been a long dry spell - for the Grizzlies. Just about the same time that rains started making this country real green, a new Coach came to Grizzlyland with right formula for breaking the five-year football dryspell.

The Grizzlies beat the Warriors Friday night by a score of 24-14 in a game that was thrilling from start to finish. The coach responsible is Roger St. Louis who came to his first head coaching job here after being assistant at Biddleford, Maine for three years. One of the reasons Coach St. Louis came

to New Mexico is that his wife is from Artesia, a town about as well known for champion teams as Carrizozo.

First the kickoff, then the bomb. Carrizozo kicked off, Warrior Frankie Calderon ran this kick back 90 yards for a touchdown, point failed, score 6-0, maybe a minute of the game gone.

The Grizzlies kept their cool and poise all evening, especially on offense in the first half and doubly so on defense in the second half. The Grizzlies started a drive, Speight carried the ball three times for 36 of the 51 yards and TD. Point failed.

Coach St. Louis told the News sports editor that he felt sure his team could run on the Warriors which is why they tried to convert by running. He was right but some bad breaks fouled up the PAT's. Score 6-6.

Without Calderon the Warriors might have had trouble. He made a ten-yard burst right up the middle to score his second TD. Blaine Miller on sweep around right end added the extra. Score

at end of first quarter 14-6. Gaby Chavez had a 2-6 night on passes, but one was a big one. He saw Shawn Lock alone in the Warrior secondary and connected. Shawn went over for the counter, PAT failed. Score Zozo 12-Ruidoso 14.

Although the Tigers were out weighed 25 pounds per man and lacked experience they played an excellent game to the end. Bronson Cummins scored both Capitan touchdowns one for 58 yards. With only 16 seconds remaining in the 4th quarter, Willie Gallegos earned his "C" for the night by intercepting a Warrior pass and scooted 40 yards to score. He was helped by block thrown by Lock on Miller. You might say Shawn had the lock on Miller most of the night. Sorry about that pun, but can't resist. Final score Zozo 24, Ruidoso 14.

Ruidoso is the Class AA team expected to go all the way in their district. Coach Tiny Howell, new at Ruidoso, had the state winner in Double AA last year. ### KIEL BONNELL DIES IN LIGHT PLANE CRASH

A light plane crash about 8:30 a.m. Monday took the life of Kiel (Bo) Bonnell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Bonnell of Alamogordo, when the aircraft fell in the desert approximately two miles south of Dog Canyon road.

Bonnell's body was recovered shortly after 2 p.m. by a ground party directed to the scene by search aircraft which took the air following a 1 p.m. report that a plane was missing.

Bonnell had made his first solo airplane flight a few days prior. The missing plane was reported by Mark Sloan, pilot for Bank Securities, Inc. which the elder Bonnell heads and who was Kiel's instructor.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Grace Methodist Church in Alamogordo.

### Sierra awarded \$365,000 damages

A District Court jury in Carrizozo deliberated nearly three hours before returning a verdict in favor of Sierra Blanca Sales Co., in a civil suit against Eric Culver and the Ruidoso Racing Assn.

The jury awarded \$365,000 to Sierra Blanca, which included \$150,000 in punitive costs.

The suit was filed July 27, 1970, alleging that an employment contract between Sierra and Culver and the racing company was breached. The contract was for 15 years at \$15,000, the suit alleged.

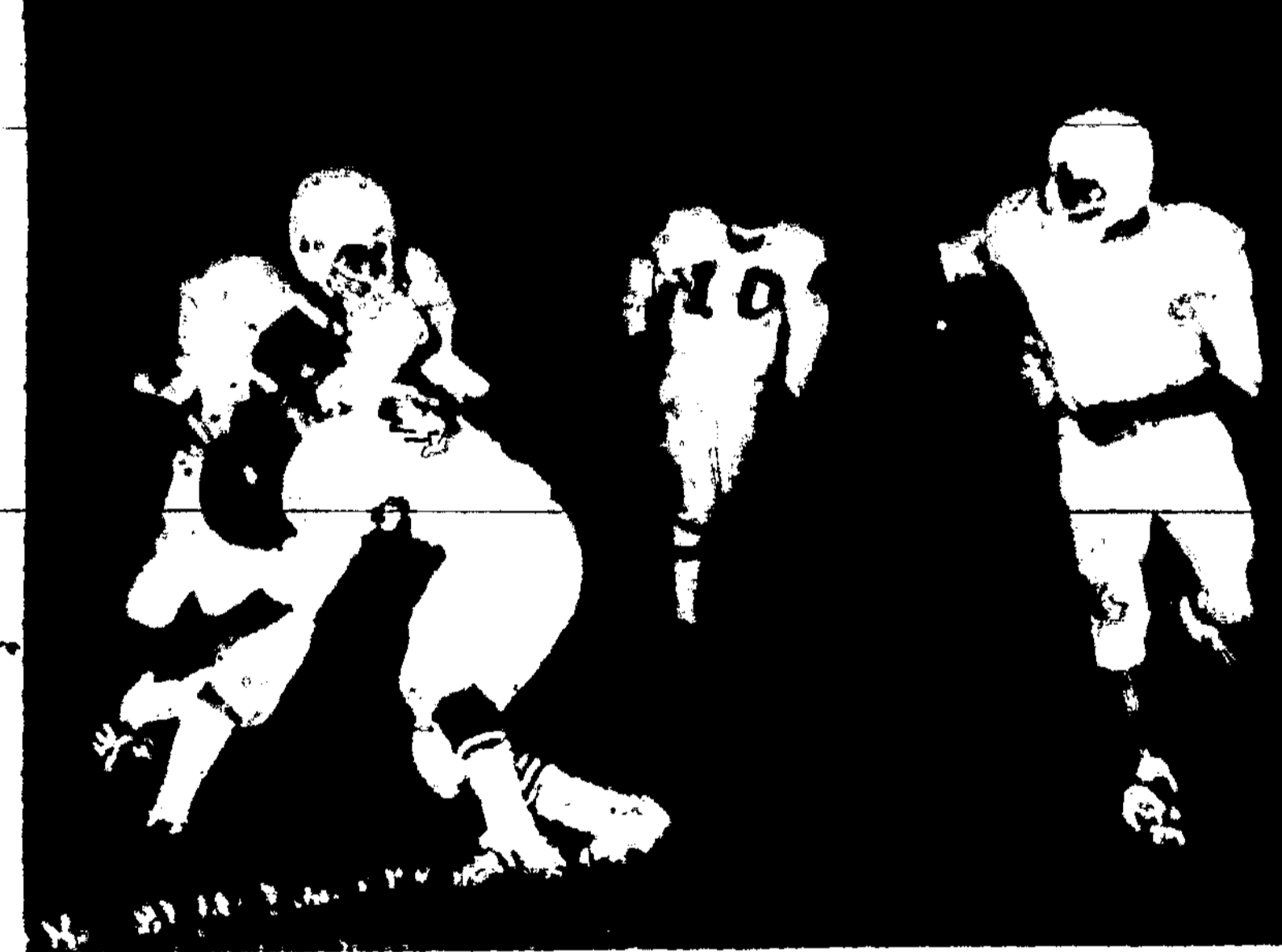
In the four-day trial held at the Lincoln County Courthouse before Dist. Judge Dee Blythe, testimony detailed the business transactions between Culver, who owns considerable racing stock, and the various racing associations.

Albert Rivera, Alamogordo attorney who represented Sierra, alleged that Culver failed to meet the contract agreements.

Joe Sommer of Santa Fe represented Culver and told the jury there had been no breach of contract and stated that Sierra was not entitled to any damages.

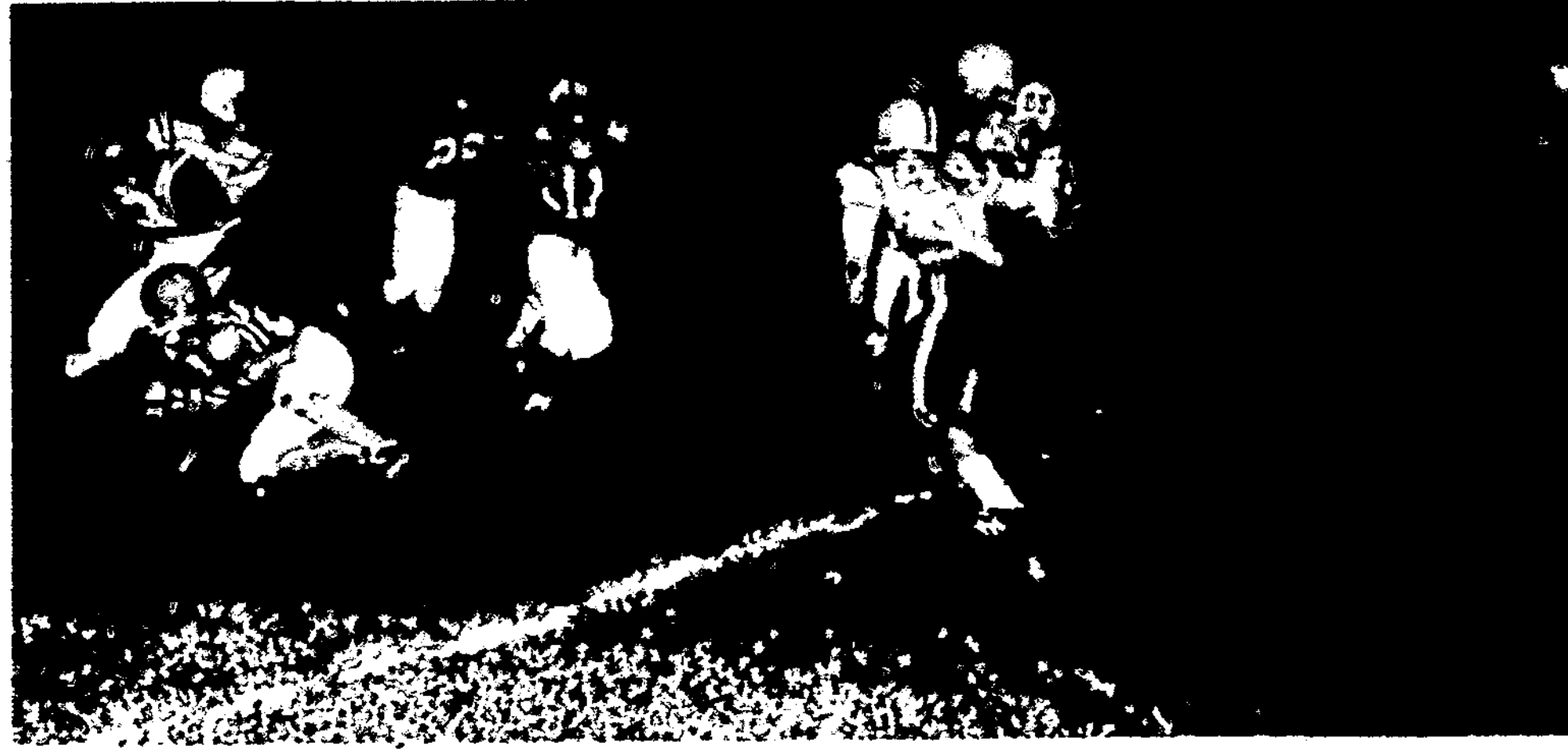

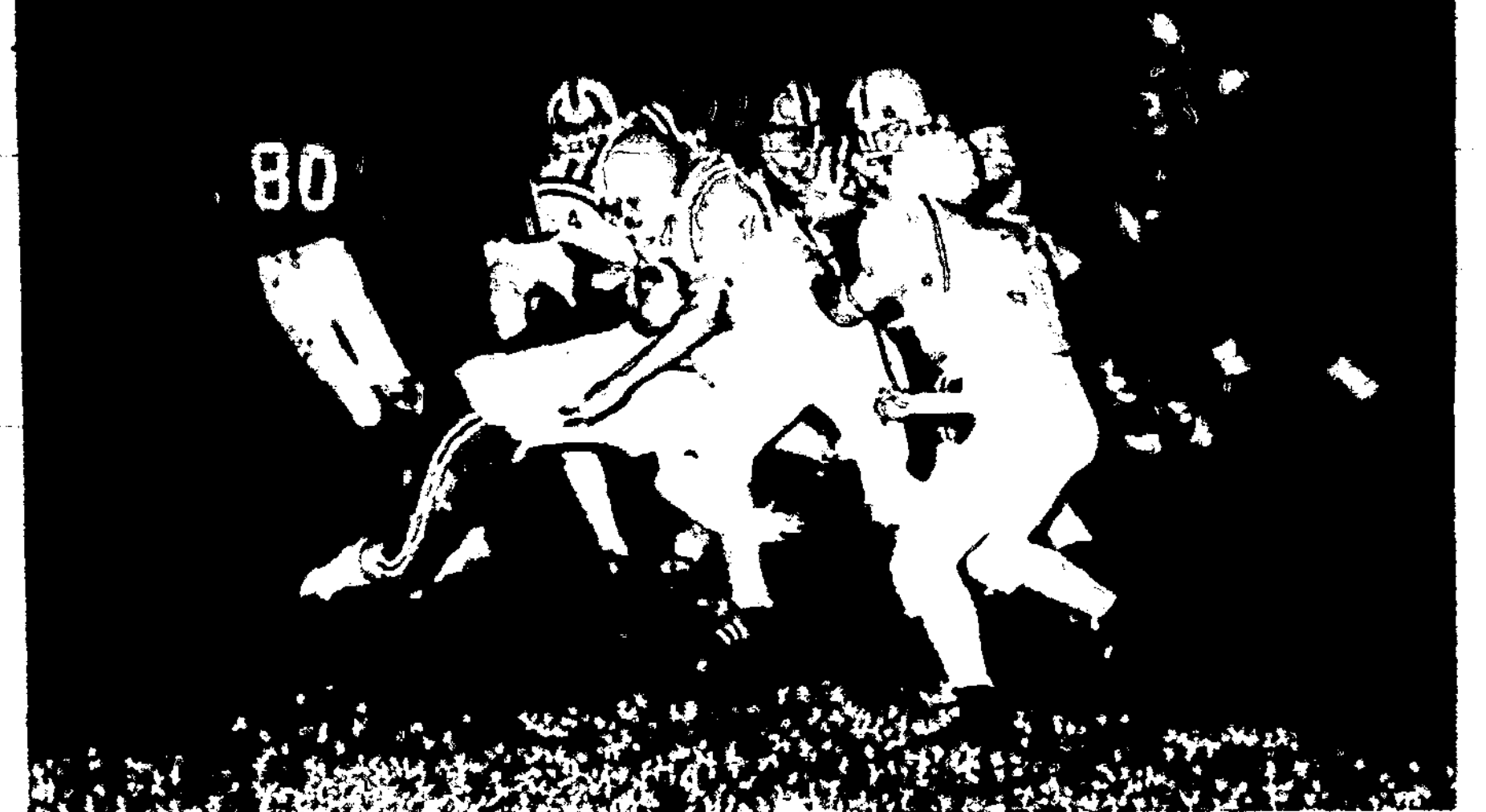

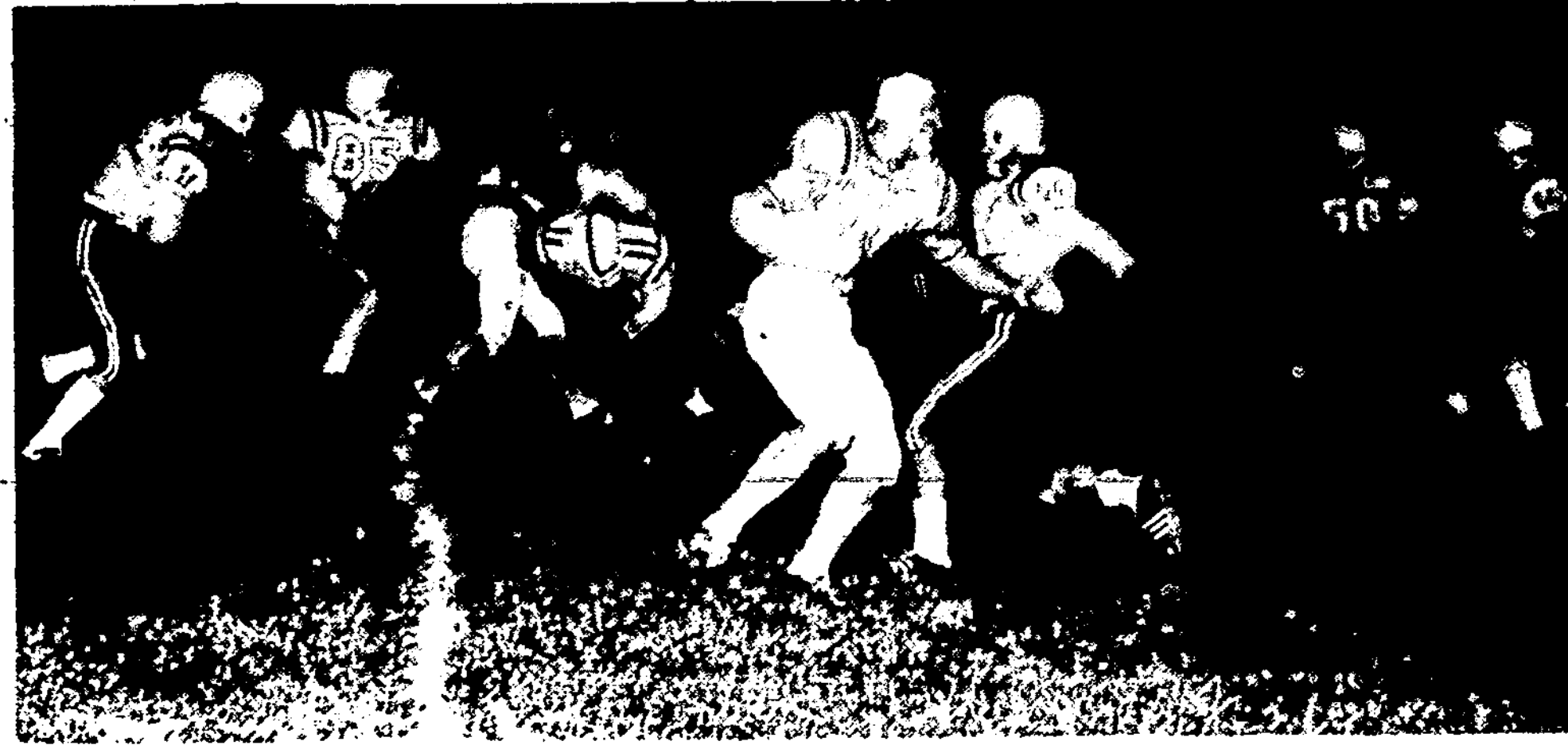

Mrs. R.L. Chilton, state president of the NMAWCD Ladies Auxiliary, gave a brief report on the Auxiliary's activities. Her emphasis was the special need for publicity of all programs. She also projected the idea that this could be an added job for the Auxiliary which would aid the entire conservation program.

Just before the field trip to Ft. Stanton to observe its Pasture rotation system, Jasper Koontz of Ft. Sumner spoke on the value of such a system in the planning of a range and conservation plan of better use of soil resources.

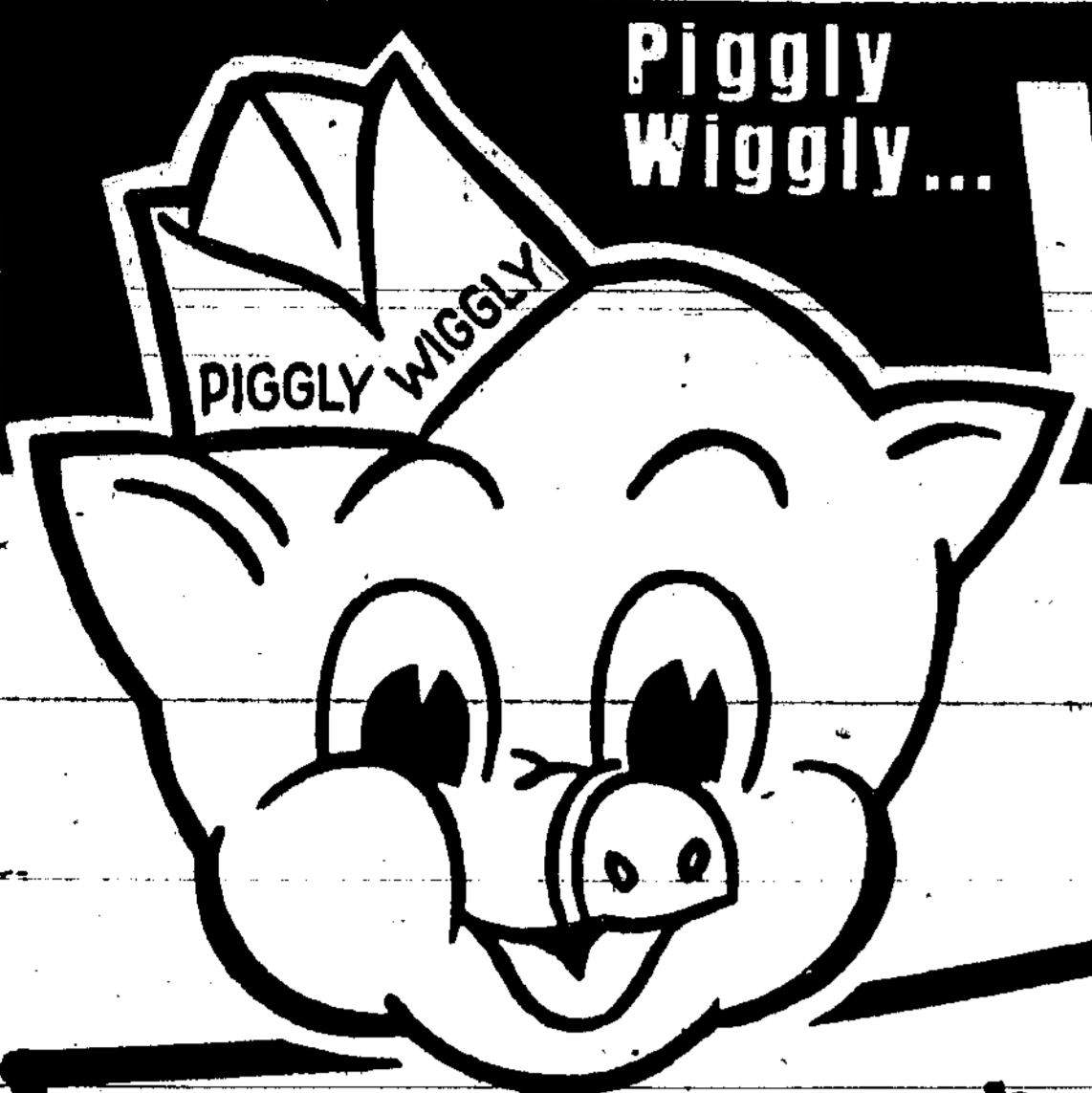
