
Such was the case of dedication of United Trinity Methodist Church in Carrizozo, Sunday,



What people want to do gets done!

In ten years living in The Village Press area we've seen a lot of good things happen. And, almost without exception. they came about because a majority of the people concerned wanted them to happen.

There are windfalls, of course. Like the fine rains of August which made southern New Mexico look like a wild flower garden. Like the special benefits that come to several of our communities from generous people. Like a good early fall of snow that makes for winter recreation in the mountains. Like a team that jells and unexpectedly goes all the way.

Recently talking with young coach, we learned his thinking on coaching psychology, its simple. You first do the necessary basic coaching jobs so the players are capable of carrying out assignments. Then, you lay the work out on the table. This player has got to do this, and that player defense that man, and the team has got to perform at top level if they want to win the tough one this week. No rough talk or handling is necessary.

A team is people. What there people want they can get. You can sort out the good from the common on that basis. May be they don't know how which keeps them from winning, but more likely they just don't want the victory bad enough to go all out for it.

Some day enough people up and down US 54 will decide this road needs attention and start screaming. That's what it will take to impress the powers in Santa Fe, people wanting something done. You can apply this thinking to a lot of graveled roads around the area.

Go ahead and list the projects you think ought to be done, in your town, in the area. You may be all by yourself in such thinking.

The best thought to be gained from this bit of reading could be this--first you gather up the team, acquire some skill and knowledge of job at hand, then lay the work on the table. If enough people agree the job ought to be done ... you've got á winner.
