Sunday Liquor voted in

Lincoln County turned out an even 1000 votes in the special election Tuesday and gave a good majority to most of the 10 amendments on the ballot. Sunday liquor got off to a poor start but came out a winner. There were no big majorities voting against this issue and two precincts, Hondo-Picacho and Ruidoso went strong for the issue to put it over.

The final count was 383 for to 339 against.

Amendment No. 3, the right of citizens to bear arms, was a big winner in Lincoln County, 811 for, 124 against. The pollution amendment, No. 9, did about as

well with 625 for and 286 against.

Amendment 1, voting age, carried 550-362. No. 2 carried 508-386. No. 4, uniform text books, carried 591-405.

Vietnam veteran scholarship carried, No. 5, by 514 to 398. No. 6, the property assessment amendment went over big, 596-293. No. 7, exempting tax on water users, failed 388-480. No. 8, a poorly presented proposition unclear to many people, also failed 389-460. No. 10, deleting authorization for property tax levy, carried 497 to 362.

Clerk Alice King, assisted by Petra Sandoval and Barbara Lovelace, took Ruidoso Downs by phone first, followed by Carrizozo.

Voting in these two precincts was phoned to both wire services by News editor, which accounts for report in morning newspapers that liquor issue was lagging in Lincoln County. Liquor was loser 104 to 126 on basis of first two precincts in.

Ruidoso phoned in shortly after Ruidoso Downs, followed by Corona by phone. Margaret Rench brought in the Capitan box. Hondo-Picacho finally came in by phone at 9:00 p.m. The final tally of voting in Lincoln County went to wire services shortly after nine, too late to get in the morning papers.

The Tigers played another of their aroused games by completely dominating the play both offensively and defensively again as they have in winning their last three games.

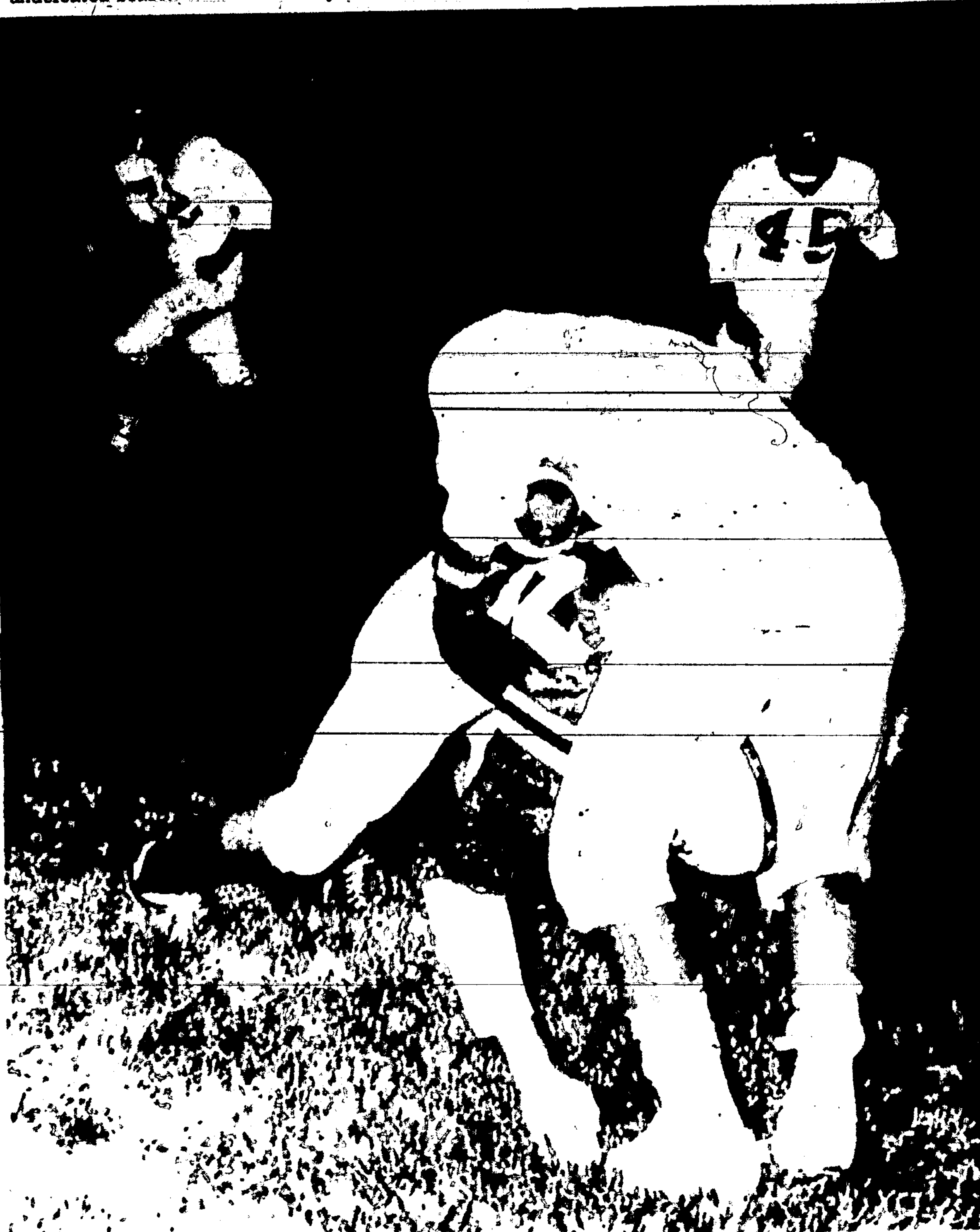
The Tigers scored in five plays the first time they had the ball. Ted Sisneros scored on a good double reverse. Bronson Cummins added the PAT.

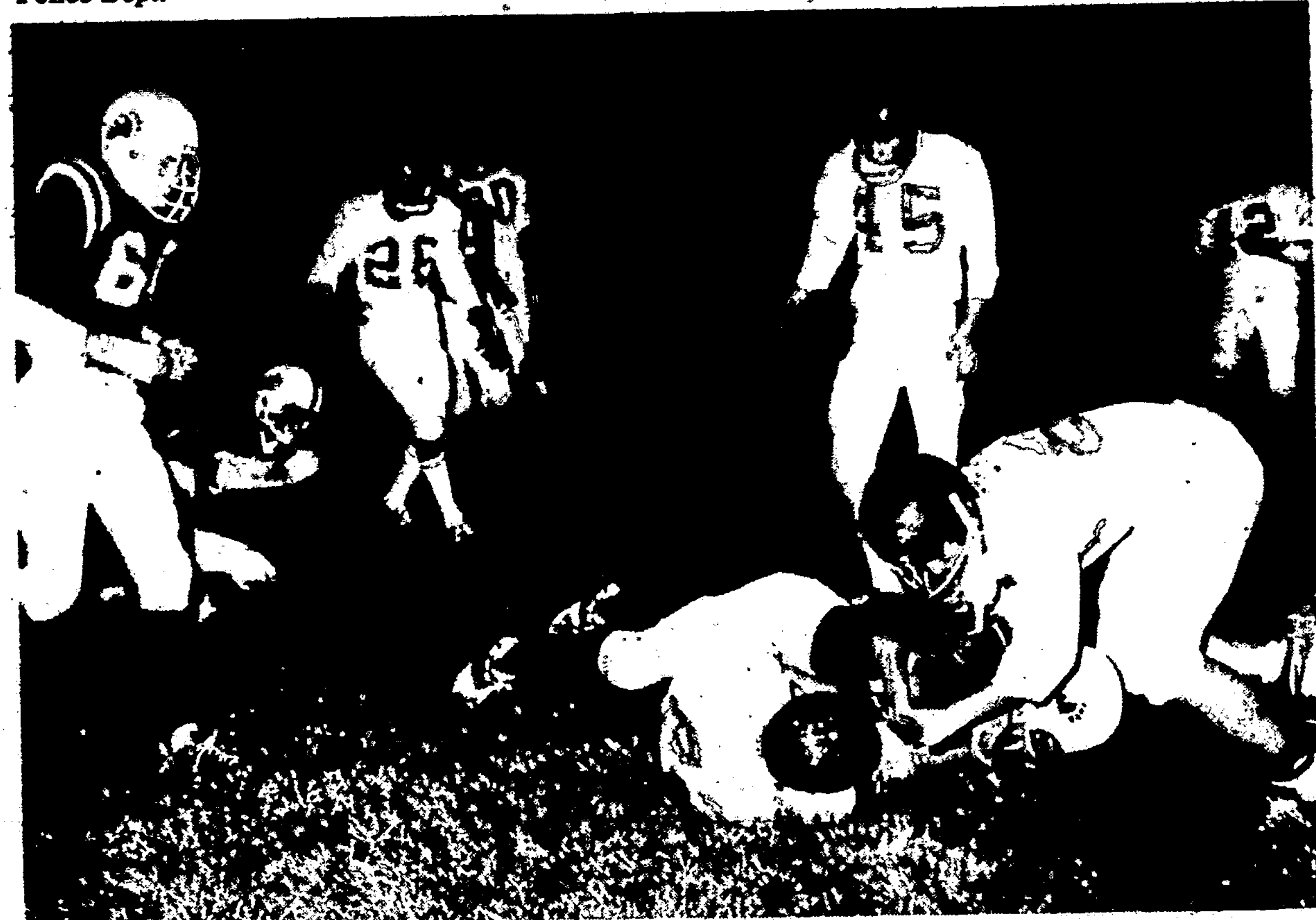
There will be four sessions on hunting safety. Anyone successfully completing the course will receive a "Safe Hunter Certificate."

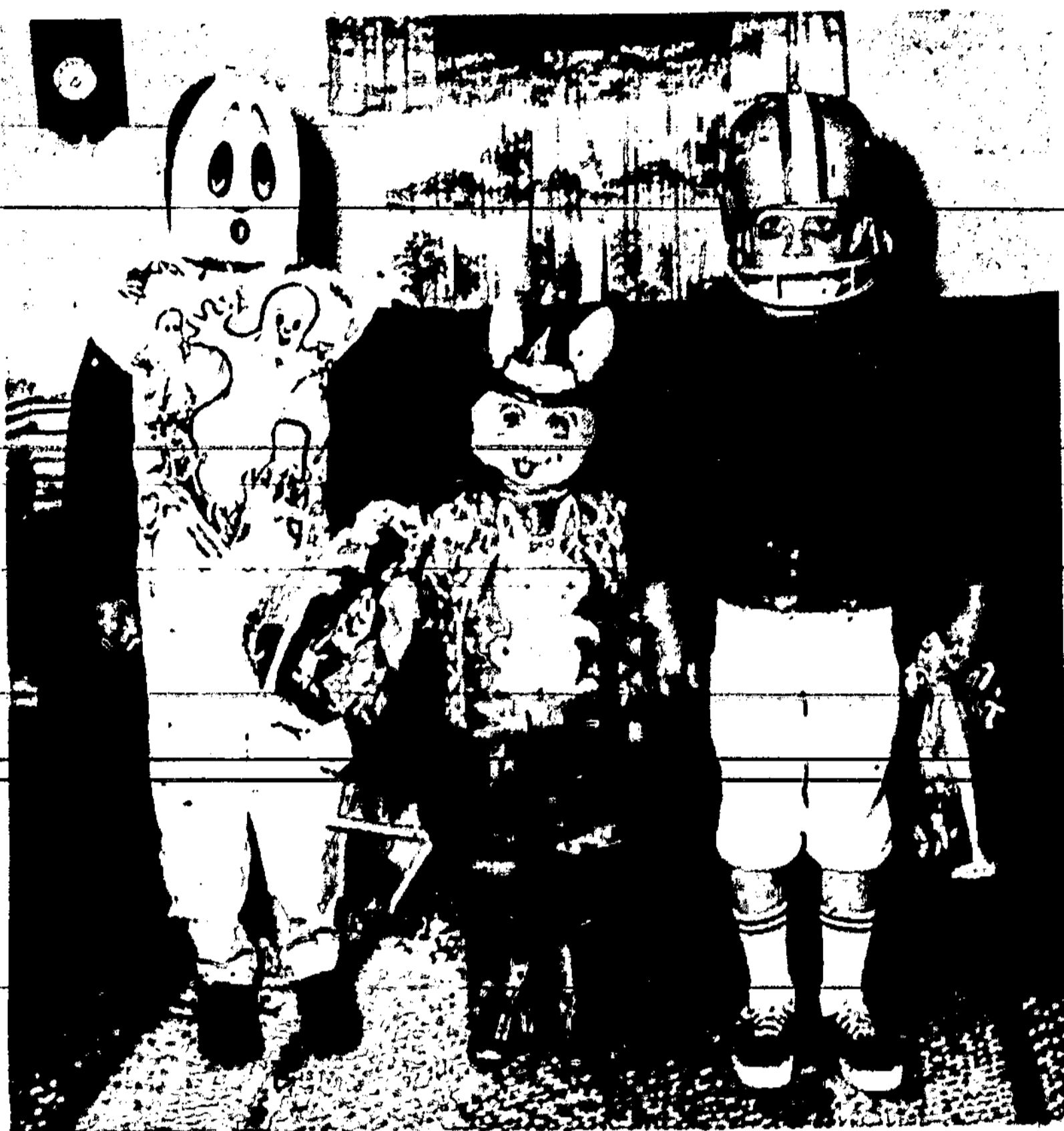

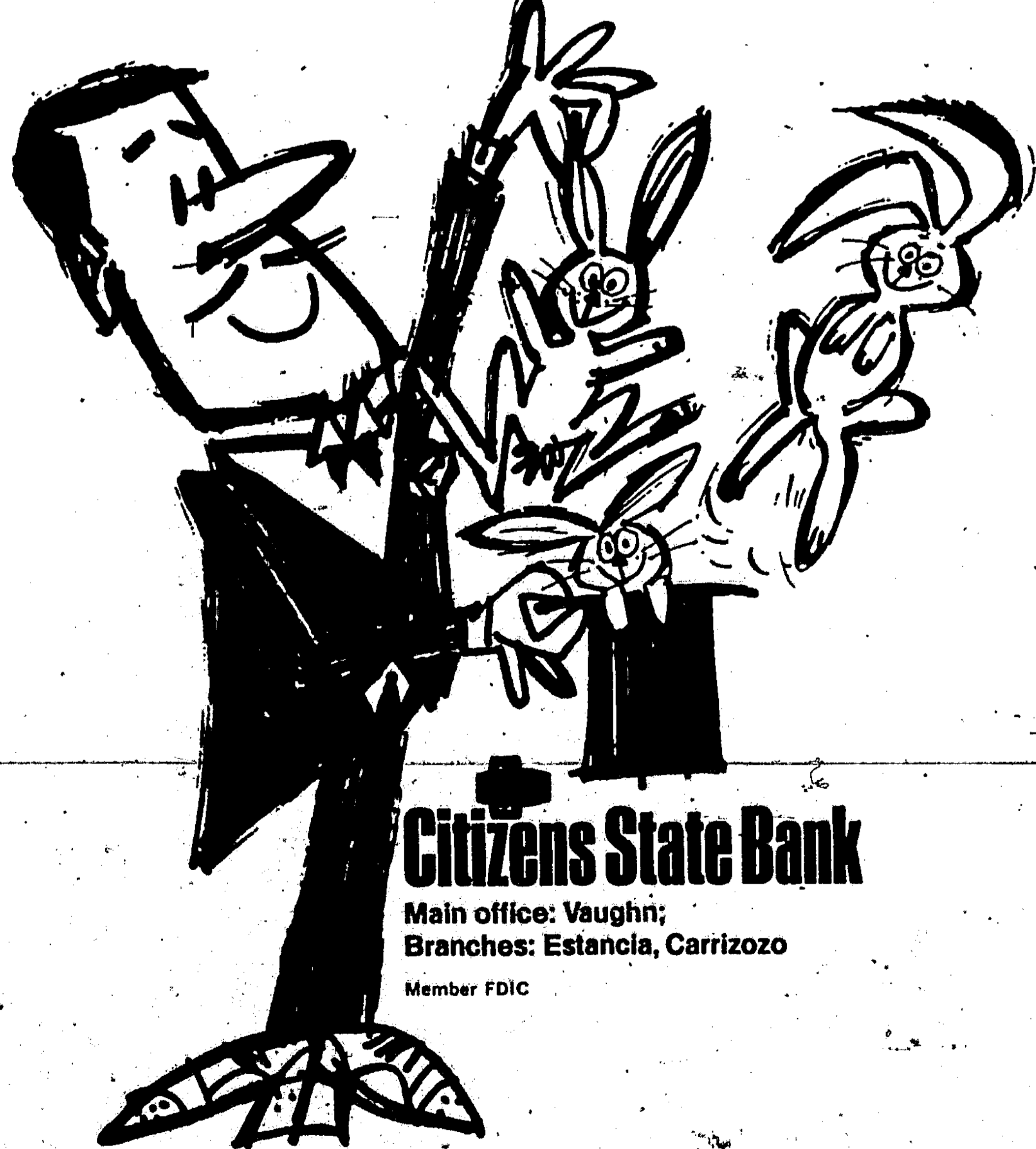

Grizzlies to face big team

Two Class A semifinal football games will be played this weekend. Melrose comes to Carrizozo for game to decide region championship, game time 7:30 p.m. Friday on Laabs Field. Hagerman goes to Farmington for game with Navajo Mission at 2:00 p.m. Saturday.

In both semifinals and finals, a flip of the coin has decided the site of the play-off game, the first time two particular schools meet. Thereafter the site alternates when these two schools meet. Should Navajo Mission beat Hagerman, and Carrizozo beat Melrose — the championship game would be played at Far-

mington because Navajo played in Carrizozo last year.

Lots of football to come before any state championship game. The Melrose team is big, big, big. They lost a game to Fort Sumner, then another to Tatum, but since that time Melrose has come on to win 6 straight.

Their offensive line is real big, sporting some 200-pounders. Jesse Hough, a defensive guard weighs 270. A fullback, Craig Kerr, weighs 200 and is really strong. Joe Reed, offensive tackle, is outstanding defensive linebacker at 195. Lyle Willoughby at 205 is real strong at tackle. Melrose relies on a running

attack and they've been able to make it work.

The outcome of the Navajo-Hagerman game is sure no cinch. The Indians are known for springing surprises, they will be on their home grounds, but Hagerman is strong and this game should be a rouser.

In case of tie in either of these games on score, outcome will be decided on downs. Should downs be tied, then each team will get four downs and winner will be team making most yards or most score. In championship game co-champions will be declared should the game end in a tie.

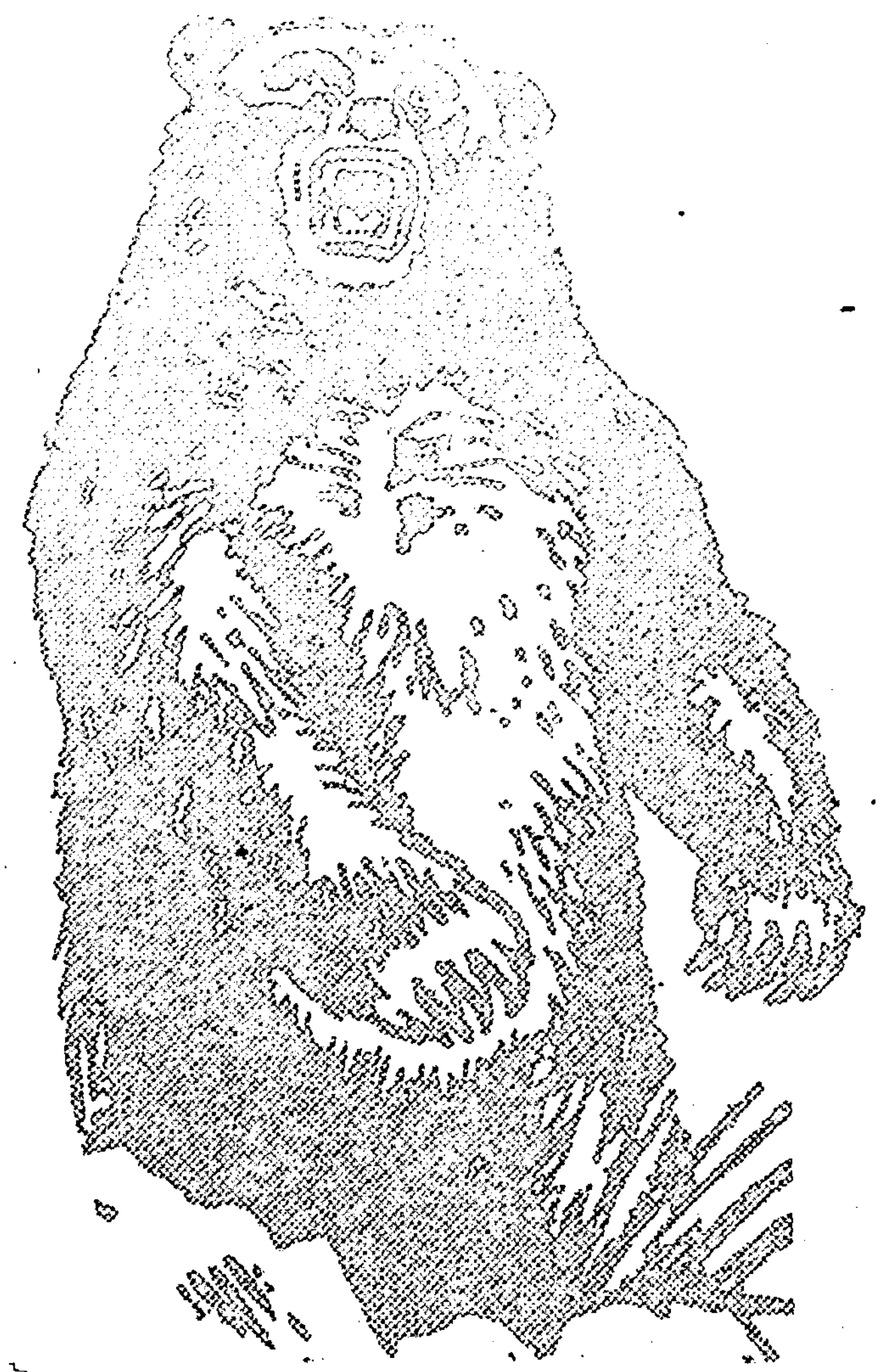

Grizzlies extend victory win streak to 18 straight

After a first quarter when timing was ragged and offense was going nowhere, Carrizozo Grizzlies caught fire in the second stanza and went on from there to beat Hatch 38-0 to close out the regular season.

In the second quarter, aided by a penalty, Jim Speight rushed the ball 24 yards on four consecutive plays and scored from two yards out. Matt Ellison ran for 2 to make the score 8-0.

Then the Grizzlies moved the ball 85 yards in four plays. The big gainers were a 42 yard pass from QB Gaby Chavez to David Roper and Willie Gallegos' 27-yard touchdown run. Willie also ran the 2 points; score 16-0.

Hatch was the first team seen by this sports writer that was same size as Carrizozo, or a bit smaller. Their offense just didn't have any fire.

On the next drive Chavez connected on two of three passes good for 31 yards and climaxed by Willie's second TD of the night, this time for 14 yards out. Ellison was stopped short of the goal for the PAT. Score 22-0.

Carrizozo band was on the field at halftime with good music and entertainment.

To start the 3rd quarter, Gallegos carried the ball for 42 yards in three trips to set Speight's 3 yard TD dive. The extra 2 were added by Willie, score 30-0.

In the 4th quarter the Hatch coach was helping the Grizzlies, his comments to the officials cost Hatch 30 yards in one walk. Speight found a big hole and scampered 15 yards for his 3rd touchdown of the night. Ellison ran for 2 more making the final score 38-0.

Rushing yardage department: Gallegos 167 in 19 attempts, Speight 144 in 19 attempts. In passing: Gallegos caught 3 for 40, Roper 2 for 64, Ellison 2 for 33 and Pino 1 for 15 yards.



Gallegos tops in state scoring

Carrizozo Grizzlies closed out their regular season of football Friday with 38-0 win over Hatch and Willie Gallegos added 16 points to his season total making 148 which is top in the state for all classes of schools.

Willie had good help from several other Grizzlies in Carrizozo's drive to an undefeated season.
