# Hondo Valley beautiful to

"Although we had never been to the Hondo Valley east of Ruidoso, we found ourselves extremely familiar with the landscape — the mounds of mountains, the black rainclouds, the vast skies. We'd exclaimed over the autumnal splendor in pictures painted by Peter Hurd, New Mexico's renowned artist, who catapulted to even more fame when he painted a picture of former President Lyndon B. Johnson only to have it disdainfully rejected. (the portrait now hangs in the Smithsonian Institute).

And now we were actually in that beautiful valley, headed to the home of Hurd and his equally famous portrait artist wife, Henriette Wyeth. The Saturday tour was a part of the entertainment scheduled during the New Mexico Press Association convention being held in Ruidoso Downs.

Adobe Hacienda The motorcade left the highway near San Patrico, passed Hurd's private polo grounds, crossed a bridge over the Rio Hondo, rounded a dirt road - and there it was, an unpretentious adobe hacienda on the Sentinel Ranch — the private world of two famous people where philanthropists and philosophers have rubbed shoulders with poets and peons and where the same corial atmosphere greets everyone

alike.

The Hurds were not at home (he was in Hawaii judging an art show) but the visitors were made most welcome by the business managers. Ada and Walt Robinson. As the tourists sat about the long flagstoned portal, the Robinsons briefed them on the ranch, which was named for a mountain of the same name which towers in back of the artists' home. In the days of the Indian raids, explained Robin-. son, a sentinel would be posted, atop the mountain as a lookout and to warn the countryside when enemies were approching.

The main house is built in a Ushap around a courtyard. The original structure, which now houses a very modest kitchen and dining room, is more than 100. years old. It was added as the family grew (to three children). and so did their fortunes.

Free to Roam Then the visitors were told they were free to roam at will and San Juan Digest by Val Cooper

were privileged to invade every nook and cranny of the ranch with the exception of the Hurds' bedroom. They did so without abusing that privilege.

The main quarters also contain Hurd's studio and a cavernous living room, called the gallery. Surrounding the main house are a heated indoor swimming pool, built expressly for Mrs. Hurd whose hands are badly crippled with arthritis, a greenhouse, high enough to hold two tall banana trees and assorted other tropical trees and plants, and another complex which houses Mrs. Hurd's studio, guest rooms and a small office.

Dominating the scene is an easel with an unfinished portrait of Mrs. Charles Tandy of the 6666 ranch north of Amarillo, in the Panhandle of Texas. (Legend has it that the ranch was won in a poker game with four 6's).

Henriette Wyeth's studio was in sharp contrast. Hers was much smaller, laden with dried leaves, flowers and other flora, all neatly arranged around the fireplace. On her easel was a partly finished still life of a large gourd and a small bouquet of wildflowers. The models were placed on a small table on one side of the easel while the other side contained a table with neatly arranged paintbrushes, all

Off the front of the main house, nestled among the trees which surround that side of the hacienda, is a sparkling white gazebo, a birthday gift to Hurd from Robert O. Anderson, president of Atlantic-Richfield Oil Co., a couple of years ago.

Two Studios But it was the artists' respective studios which generated the most interest. Surely no attic contains more memorabilia than Hurd's, From the walls hang swords and guns, polo mallets and other paraphernalia connected with that sport in which he still indulges at the age of 67. Books are everywhere, from the floor to the ceiling, about every subject imaginable from farming and horticulture to Cezanne and other famous artists. In one corner of the large room floor to ceiling shelves contain paints and related supplies. This is about the only seemingly organized nook in the entire studio.

Because Henriette is so meticulous and disruption is disquieting to her, the visitors were requested to enter her studio only a few at a time and to remain near the doorway so as not to chance dismantling anything in the room.

## \$18,000 to \$24,000

Too, because Henriette is so. much better known as a portrait painter she commands from \$18,000 to \$24,000 for her work. Hurd gets \$8,000 for a fortrait from the waist up and \$12,000 if it includes hands. The work he is doing of Mrs. Tandy includes the hands.

A typical day for the Hurds begins with both arising about 5 a.m. and working in their studios until 8. Then they have a leisurely breakfast before returning to their studios to paint until 2 p.m. Both work areas have only one window, on the north side, and both artists work only in the north light, never from artificial light.

At 2 o'clock Henriette goes to her "pool hall" as the folks around the ranch refer to her therapeutic swimming quarters, and her husband usually takes a nap before climbing into the station wagon and driving in search of scenes about the ranch to sketch for future paintings.

The Hurds, who live in elegant simplicity, shun large gatherings and don't like to waste time on cocktail parties. They prefer to entertain small groups on the grassy slopes of the Sentinel or in the gazebo.

The Robinsons say the Hurds both lament destruction of any kind, even to unnecessarily plucking a wildflower. They describe them as utterly delightful people to be around. As we bid adieu to the gracious Robinsons, tingling with the rare privilege we had just experienced we were struck with this thought: Here, from a little ranch in rural New Mexico, lives a gentle couple whose simple tastes and philosophies and whose dedication to their earthly roles have brought enrichment not only to themselves but to the entire universe.

.What a heritage to leave the world.

This section states that the Land Commissioner can allow up to a 33 and one-third percent reduction in lease rates upon renewal of the lease. In other words, he can reduce your next lease up to one third if your range condition warrants such a reduction.

Any claims should be made to the State Land commissioner as soon as possible in order for the range condition to be inspected and the claim validated.

One of these was tradition-adaptation of design from other countries, primarily England, which in turn had its sources in Scandanavia, the Germanic and Slavic countries Italy, France, and China. But perhaps the more powerful source of design was need. Wood was at hand and tools were simple, so that the early furniture was simple and oif wood, pine,

oak, and the favorite manogany. Duncan Phyfe was the most famous American designer followed by Goddard of Rhode Island and McIntire of Mass., but the unknown men who used the boards they hued froin the living tree, pine, oak, cherry, walnut, and birch were the first great American designers and their classic simplicity lives on today.

Mrs. Tyree stressed the influence of the different periods of Early American, particularly through the 17th and 18 th centuries, through the colonial and Federal periods and on through the Victorian. This was a most informative program.







"SKIERS! Now that 'the' season is here, USDA'S Forest Service reminds you that some of the best skiing in the country is at the more than 200 ski areas located on the National Forests. It also reminds you that untimely accidents can put a quick stop to your ski holiday fun. To avoid these accidents, the Forest Service and the National Ski Patrol System recommend you follow these ski safety tips:

-Learn to ski safely at a certified ski school.

-Be physically fit. -Eat a good breakfast; stop for

-Keep release bindings properly adjusted. -Wear safety straps.

<u>-Ski under control: always ski</u> with companions.

-Fill your sitzmark. -Stop to the side of trails and slopes

-Don't ski recklessly. -Stop skiing when you are tiredl. -Obey signs posted in area. -Report accidents to nearest Ski Patrolman or lift operator.

-If lift stops, sit quietly. Do not attempt to jump. Rescue teams will evacuate you.

Copies of a pocket-size leaflet containing these tops and facsimilies of the signs used to mark ski trails are available at National Forest ski areas. Or, you may write to Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, and ask for FS-274, 'Ski Safely."

Homemakers are buying more foods that are pre-washed, prepecied, pre-cooked, pre-mixed and pre-packaged-the convenience foods that save so much time in the kitchen. No wonder since 44 percent of American women now have jobs outside the home. This means there is less time to spend in the kitchen and the heat-and-serve foods thahave become a premium item. The demand for convenience foods has helped trigger an increase in the number of products available. .

In a single year, consumers may have as many as 1,500 new food items to choose fromalthough only 500 or so generally survive for more than a year. Convenience and the cost of developing, testing and advertising new products add considerable to the food bill.

But the U.S. Department of Agriculture recently reported that purchases of non-food items at the grocery store continues to rise. Almost a fourth of what people spend in supermarkets is not for something to eat, but for something to wear, listen to or clean with. For every 77 cents of groceries that goes into shopping carts another 23 cents worth of socks, hairspray, toothpaste-and even encyclopedias-goes in too.

## Lincoln County Agent Reports -

Have you ever wondered why forest soils are so fertile? It's because nature re-uses plant mitrients (nitrogen; phosphorus, " potassium, iron, zinc, manganese and 26 other elements) so essential to growth and production. Roots absorb the raw minerals (nutrients) from the soil and transport them, in solution to the leaves, where they are combined into complex carbohydurate compounds. These compounds are then

stored throughout the plant. including fruit and seed. The leaves too are rich in these compounds. When these leaves fall to the ground, they decompose and soil bacteria releases the elemental nutrients from the complex carbohydrate compounds. These nutrients are then returned to the soil for reabsorption.

Soils become depleted of plant nutrients when fruit, grain, leaves and plant materials are constantly removed without a program of nutrient replacement. Consider the soil as a ban. You cannot expect to make continued withdrawls without making equal deposits. Failure to do so results in bankruptcy. It's easy to redeposit leaves and stems to the soil. The best way to recycle plant nutrients is to 'compost' plant materials. Compost is a that are well rotted. With the dry atmosphere and low rainfall in New Mexico, composting is best done in a shallow pit or trench, although above-ground 'compost piles' are often made.

To each six-inch layer of packed leaves, add-a-one-inch layer of soil. You can shred flower stalks, small prunings, and leaves with a rotary mower having a catcher bag attached. The soil contains bacteria which bring about decomposition. A

tons of pollutants go into the air in the United States alone. This figures out to nearly 1,500 pounds of airborne filth for every American. Twelve million tons of this is particulate matter, such as dust, grit, and cinders. Trees, shrubs, vines, and flowers act as natural traps for this airborne matter. Many plants have fine hairs on leaves and stems which help trap these particles. Plants may remove 80 per cent of ragweed pollen from the air 100 yards deep into a forest. In large cities, trees are such effective dust catchers that they must be washed every once in a while with a detergent solution.

Plants are helpful in detecting dangerous levels of air pollution. After the amount of some air pollutants, such as sulphur dioxide, reaches a certain level, some plants will suffer injury. Since sulphur dioxide is invisible these plants provide a good warning system.

The annual cost of air pollution in the United States is estimated. at \$20 billion. In addition to helping purify the air we breathe, plants provide us with our only source of new oxygen. For example, a 50 by 50 foot section of lawn releases enough oxygen to meet the needs of four people.



**Grizzlies** Undefeated in 11 games

August 9, 1971 Roger St. Louis was hired to lead the Carrizozzo Grizzlies. through the 1971 gridiron campaign.

Carrizozo 24 - Ruidoso 14 The opening kickoff returned 90 yards for a touchdown by Ruidoso's Frankie Calderon was no indication of what was to happen during the 1971 Grizzly football season. Carrizozo came roaring back on their first possession as Jim, Speight capped a 51 yard drive with a 4 yard scoring jaunt-thus began the story of a 1971 "Super Dream Team". Shawn Lock received a 30 yard strike from Gaby Chavez for another score. Then Willie Gallegos began his long trek to the state scoring title with the next 2 touchdowns.

This marked the first time in five years the Grizzlies had upended the strong Warriors from Ruidoso.

Carrizozo 62 - Corona 0 The Cardinals were no match for the powerful Grizzlies. Carrizozo put on the scoreboard 44 first-half points to put the game out of reach. Willie Gallegos scored 3 times, David Roper 2 times, while Jim Speight and Gaby Chavez found paydirt once each.

The Carrizozo Grizzlies now had the confidence, poise, selfdiscipline, but most of all PRIDE: Pride in a new offense and a defense that was to become a nightmare to future opponents.

Carrizozo 42 - Capitan 0 The night was cold, the ground was wet, and the Tigers of Capitan were young and inexperienced but above all outmanned. When Willie G. on the sidelines along with Rusty Leslie and Christy Monrreal, Matt Ellison and Jim Speight took over

and scored twice each while Gaby Chavez and Toro Ortiz scored once each for the Grizzlies who built a 42-0 half-time lead over their Lincoln County rivals.

Carrizozo 12 - Colonia Juarez 8 The long trip south of the border (over 300 miles) proved to be as tough as the Lobos from Mexico. The Grizzlies were tired and the hot sun of Mexico was of no help. Carrizozo could not play the football game in Grizzly tradition but came through when it was needed.

Gallegos and Speight had already fumbled on the 1 yard stripe and things weren't going well. Then the Bob Vest coached line came to life. Led by Bradley, Wells, Barnes, Leslie, Lee, and Monrreal, the Grizzlies began to move. Jim Speight and Willie time and time again dove through gapping holes in the Lobo beef up his 'B' squad, defensive line for big yardage and controlled the game. Willie scored both Carrizozo TD's.

Carrizozo 39 - Clouderoft 0 The trip to Cloudcroft was a quiet one as the words of Katie

rang in the minds of the Grizzlies. As a result Carrizozo played a rough, tough and inspired football game. Led by Gerald Wells on defense and Gaby Chavez on offense, the Grizzlies played to a nearly perfect game. The Grizzlie defense stopped Gordie Burrell and the rest of the Cloudcroft Bears while Chavez led the Grizzlies through the air -and-on-the-ground-to-build a 32-0 halftime cushion. Four different Grizzlie players crossed the goal line stripe led by Gallegos' 3 TDs. One on a 95 yard pass from Chavez and another on a 72 yard run that left'the crowd gasping. Ondther players to score were Roper, Chavez, and Jim Speight. The victory was the Grizzlies fifth without a defeat.

Carrizozo 26 - Roswell 13 The game was billed as a warm-up for the remainder of the Carrizozo schedule. The Roswell Coyotes were idle on this night and the varsity coach decided to

Carrizozo 48 - Dexter 12

A warm October evening in Dexter was the setting for the Grizzlies 7th opponent of the year. The Carrizozo eleven played sluggishly at the start but like champions at the end. Carrizozo spotted the Demons 6 early points-but then "Big Red" began to roll one more time. Gallegos scored 22 points, Speight had 2 TD's, while Ellison and Roper each crossed the goal line once. Another opponent had failed to stop the awesome Grizzly attack.

Carrizozo 60 - Reserve 0

Reserve held the key to the playoffs and Carrizozo knew they had to win to get to the post season playoffs. The Grizzlies failed to score in the first stanza but then Gallegos ran wild as he scored a career high of 32 points that vaulted him into the top spot among the state's leading scorers. Jim Speight had a fantastic defensive game which won him the Associated Press' Defensive Player of the Week. Touchdowns were also scored by: Speight, Roper and Shown Lock. The Grizzlies had now earned the the right to play Melrose for the regional title.

Carrizozo 38 - Hatch 0

An undefeated regular season as well as a 17 game winning streak was at stake as the Hatch Bears took to the field in Carrizozo. This was not the Grizzlies outstanding performance of the year. Fortunately the Bears of Hatch were inexperienced. Only a powerful Grizzly offense coupled with a stout defense, enabled Carrizozo to end its season undefeated and untied. The game marked the end of the regular season with Melrose the Grizzly opponent on

the post-season schedule. Jim Speight and Willie Gallegos accounted for all the points against Hatch. Jim scored 3 times while Willie scored twice.

Carrizozo 30 - Melrose 6 The Melrose Buffaloes were big, fast, well-organized and well coached. Both teams were ready to play and play they did. The hitting was ferocious throughout the game. Teamwork was very evident as the Grizzlies were determined to go home winners.

Gaby Chavez, the Grizzly quarterback, played his best game ever. He mixed his ground game well to complement his air attack. Ball control was an important factor. The Grizzlies had the ball for 10 minutes in the final quarter. Four different Grizzlies, were in the scoring column-Speight, Gallegos, Chavez, and Roper. The win over Melrose, the strongest Class 'A' team to face the Grizzlies, enabled Carrizozo to meet Hagerman for the state class 'A' championship. Carrizozo 20 - Hagerman 7

This was the game for all the marbles. It wasn't an ordinary championship game by any means for Carrizozo. A 10-0 season record, a 19 game winning streak, and a state championship for the third straight year, were all at stake on November 13 at the Wool Bowl in Roswell. But more important it marked the last time these 21 Grizzlies, who had conquered all 10° opponents, would ever be assembled together to play a football game in a Grizzly uniform. The championship was at stake-but after what all had been through together as a TEAM-it was more impoftant that they play a game which all could look back and be proud of. THEY DID.

It can truthfully be said that Willie Gallegos, Jim Speight, Marcos Barela, Shawn Lock, David Lee, Gerald Wells, Bena Bradley, Jay, Barnes, Rusty Leslie and Paul Pino went out having played their hardest and best against Hagerman in their final game in a Grizzly uniform. "Big Red" the "Super Dream Team" from Carrizozo had rolled for the last time in 1971, as the New Mexico state Champions, undefeated and untied, with a 20 game winning streak.

Carrizozo 20 - Hagerman 7 Carrizozo received the opening kick off and were marching the ball downfield without any problems when a Gaby Chavez pitch-out went astray and was recovered by Hagerman on their

own 18 yard line. The Bobcats were not having much success against the Grizzly defense when quarterback Gary Harrell of Hagerman hit flanker


