Mental Health Assn. organized here

Until just recently, here in Carrizozo you could -- drink yourself to death, 'shoot' yourself into a bad trip, or just knock yourself out emotionally without anyone really caring -- so long as you didn't offend against the law. Perhaps a few too many did just this? Now, however, there are some who do care, and care enough to get involved with such unfortunate people.

In the last two months a number of Carrizozo people -- from the Hospital, from the School, from the Welfare Agency, from the local Agencies, from the Churches -- were asked to meet with staff members of the Southwest Mental Health Institute, a mental health organization based in Las Cruces.

One immediate result of these meetings was the recognition that

many of the people running the afore-mentioned organizations here in Carrizozo were dealing separately with the same own problems, each in his own field. Like the three blind men who bumped into separate parts of the elephant and figured each was dealing with a leg or a trunk or an ear, no one agency, whether medical or social service or religious, could visualize the whole problem. Consequently there was no coordinated or effective remedy. Other facts emerging from the discussions held were:

- (1) that we had no follow-up resource for people-problems, once medical or social or religious aid was offered to meet a given emergency.
- (2) We do have considerable ability to provide assistance for

our own people who experience the wretchedness of alcoholism or drugs, or extraordinary emotional problems, or their combinations.

(3) We do have people in our Carrizozo service organizations who do care about their unfortunate fellow townsmen.

(4) We had better quickly begin to do something together to help the growing need. Time is clearly not on our side.

Thus there was born the Carrizozo Mental Health Association. This group seeks to provide unified assistance to Carrizozoans in need. Comprising membership initially from the staffs of the Lincoln County Hospital, the local Social Service Agency, the Carrizozo School Faculty, the local Law Enforcement Agencies and the various Churches, together with

help from the staff of the Southwest Mental Health Foundation in Las Cruces, a drive is now underway to provide help in personal cases referred to the group, to introduce community education in the affected fields, and to broaden membership among those of our people who care about their unfortunate neighbors.

This neighbor may be just short of his 'teens' or just short of his tomb, in any case he's in trouble, he lives here in Carrizozo, and he needs help. If you think you'd like to help please come to the open Workshop to be held at the R.E.A. building in Carrizozo on the evening of February 3rd. If you are in trouble and want help you can call anyone of these numbers day or night:

Bowling Tournament at Rec Center

Carrizozo Invitational Bowling Tournament started January 15 in the Recreation Center Men's Handicap Singles, Handicap Ragtime Doubles and Handicap Team Event. The tournament will end Sunday, January 31.

Teams may be five men, five women or mixed and may bowl as many times as desire but no more than three of the same bowlers may cash together more than once. Team entry fee is \$20.00. All male entries must be A.B.C. members or eligible non-members, female entries must be W.I.B.C. members or eligible non-members. Prize fee returned 100 percent.

Handicap Ragtime Doubles can be two men, two women or mixed and the Doubles may bowl anytime lanes are available and as often as they choose except a bowler may cash only once with same partner. Entry fee in this event is \$3.00. Prize fee returned 100 percent.

Men's Handicap Singles will be four games across eight lanes with entry fee of \$10.00. There will be three squads with limit

of 24 bowlers per squad, entries close when all squads are filled or 8 p.m. Singles on January 30 at 4, 6 and 8 p.m.

Stark re-elected Board Chairman

Lincoln County board of commissioners meeting for the first time in 1971 re-elected Don Stark as chairman for the fiscal year 1971-72.

On recommendation of Bureau of Revenue, succession tax division, the commission re-appointed Herbert Smith of Ruidoso and Leandro Vega Sr. of Carrizozo as probate appraisers.

Delegates representing White Oaks attended this meeting and asked to be notified when and where on White Oaks Historic Site would be held.

The commission is advertising this week for bids on vehicle insurance, fuel oil and gas for the road department.

Dr. Dale Wynn of Ruidoso was appointed to the Ruidoso Hospital board of directors, taking the place of Johnny Williams, William Edgar of Capitan was re-appointed to serve on the Carrizozo Hospital board for a term ending December 31, 1975.

County coroners appointed were Dr. W.O. Horton of Ruidoso and Dr. A.N. Spencer of Carrizozo.

Plans for three subdivisions were approved: Pinescape Addition for Alpine Acres, Robledo Ridge and Elena del Rae Unit Three.

The next commission meeting will be February 8.

Inside THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- The 30th Legislature opened Tuesday with the 113 lawmakers blessed with a \$14 million state surplus, no tax boosts in sight and thorny scraps over legislative, judicial and State Education Board redistricting on their hands.

New House Majority Leader David Saliman, D-Union, Mora, Harding, nominated new Speaker Walter Martinez, D-Grants. Whether a major reshuffling of House leadership can successfully manage partisan issues to adoption holds the key to success for new Democratic Gov. Bruce King's program.

Freshman Sen. John E. Conway, 36, R-Lincoln-Otero, will propose a new judicial district composed of Lincoln and Otero Counties. Conway, a lawyer, says: "I want to get our own judicial district down here." He stressed the Lincoln-Otero Counties case load justifies a separate district and one district judge.

Dona Ana would be split off from Lincoln and Otero into a separate judicial district. The Judicial Council composed of district, Court of Appeals and Supreme Court Judges and others supports the proposal.

New Sen. Conway noted Sen. Morgan's Senate reapportionment plan creates a district of Lincoln, Catron and Socorro Counties. It allots two senators to Otero County. At present Conway and Sen. Aubrey Dunn, D-Alamogordo, represent both Otero and Lincoln. Morgan, senior senator in service with 18 years, represents Curry and Roosevelt Counties.

Conway says the whopping Lincoln-Otero County district "is more than twice as big as Rhode Island and Connecticut together." He will co-sponsor and implied consent law with Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen. The bill will call for alcoholic blood content tests for suspected drunk drivers.

Sen Conway supports a mandatory jail term of at least 60 days for possession of marijuana and probably eight months for sale of marijuana. He says too many defendants receive suspended sentences now for conviction of possession of up to one ounce of marijuana. The current penalty is a maximum of one year in jail.

Conway opposes general statewide branch banking. But he withdraws final judgment pending study of specific bills set to be introduced. He favors Sunday liquor sales with a local option provision. Conway says: "Lincoln County with its emphasis on tourism and horse racing very definitely needs it." Conway is on the Senate Judiciary and Corporations Committees.

House Transportation Chairman George Blocker, D-Jal, representing Lea County District 4 including Eunice, will play a key role in the 1971 Legislature. Blocker is senior House member with 18 years.

New State Liquor Director Carlos L. Jaramillo and two liquor agents screened 33 new applications for two new Clovis liquor licenses. Jaramillo was

under a Santa Fe District Court temporary restraining order enjoining him from cancelling two new Clovis permits issued by his predecessor, Santa Fe Republican attorney David Sierra.

The two licenses, Jack Zarriss and Dr. Charles Platt of Roswell and Western Continental Motels of Roswell and Hobbs, won the order January 11 from new District Judge Santiago Campos. Judge Campos set a hearing today (Thursday). He ordered Jaramillo to show cause why the injunction should not be made permanent.

In the politically-tinged, piping hot issue Democrat Jaramillo, new appointee of Democratic Gov. Bruce King, canceled the Zarriss-Platt and Western Continental Motel liquor licenses. Jaramillo's stand was supported by an opinion issued by new Atty. Gen. David Norvell, Clovis Democrat.

The 33 new applicants included Virgil Beagles, former New Mexico Young Democrats president, and T.W. (Hap) Whitley, father of Bob Whitley, 1968 GOP state treasurer candidate. Bob Whitley was a top aide to Republican governor candidate Pete Domenici of Albuquerque in the 1970 general election campaign. Zarriss and Dr. Platt reapplied for a new license. Western Continental Motels did not apply again.

Firing of Paul Santistevan of Springer as a \$7,200-a-year group worker at New Mexico Boys School at Springer was withdrawn after a pre-hearing conference in Santa Fe and Santistevan resigned his post.

State Corrections Secretary Howard Leach had fired Santistevan December 28. Leach had charged "conduct tending to interfere with the efficient operation of the agency" and "refusal to accept a reasonable and proper assignment from an authorized supervisor."

Group Worker Ike Trujillo of Springer quit his \$5,760-a-year job at the State Boys' School after 15 years. Trujillo told Jack Newton, assistant director of professional services, he resigned because he had not been promoted. Trujillo said: "Too many chiefs working and not enough Indians."

Raul A. Sedillo of Belen, son of longtime Valencia County Democratic chairman, quit his \$5,040-a-year job as State Land Office fieldman after slightly more than eight months. A Land Office top aide said the fieldman force is being cut by four employees because of a slackening of work.

Gov. King appointed six new members to the State Soil and Water Conservation Committee and renamed A.B. Fleming of Clovis. The appointments: Jose A. Gurule of Cuba, replacing Pablo Goodman of Los Lunas; Dan Roybal, Santa Fe County, succeeding W.P. Cater, Questa; A.D. Brownfield Jr., Luna County, for Noel Rankin, Silver City; E. Roe Seward, Colfax County, for Richard Wooten, Springer; Bill Lee, Lea County, for O.F. Crawford, Roswell, and Lewis Merritt, DeBaca County, for Dick Montoya, Sandoval County.

News And Notes

When you find that a product or service is not as represented, a complaint is justified. To make your complaints more effective and assure they receive prompt attention, review the suggestions listed below:

First, try to solve the problem locally, or if it is a problem requiring the manufacturer's attention, state all the facts clearly in your letter.

Save all correspondence, bills, warranties, and documents relating to the problem.

Address your letter to the president of the company if possible. The names may be obtained at the Public Library in Moody's Industrial Manual or Poor's Register of Corporations. If it is not possible to obtain the name of the president or another officer, address your letter to the Consumer Relations Dept.

Keep a carbon of your letter.

Include copies (NOT ORIGINALS) of any documents that relate to the problem.

Type your letter if possible. If you don't have a typewriter, don't hesitate to write in long-hand.

Include all information - nature of the problem, where it was purchased, model number, price, brand name, and any local adjustments made.

Be firm, but polite. Avoid abusive statements or sarcasm.





Inside THE CAPITOL by Fred Buckles

SANTA FE -- The new House majority leader, Rep. David Salman, D-Union-Mora-Harding, will manage Gov. Bruce King's legislation on the House floor in the 60-day session opening next Tuesday.

Salman says he will aid new Speaker Walter Martinez, D-Grants, to run the House in an orderly manner. Salman will also try to keep House Democrats informed on major legislation and the trend of events.

Rep. Salman says: "I don't think we have a healing problem. From what I can ascertain the Democratic members are happy with their committee assignments. From what I can see there are no wounds to be healed."

House Democrats split in the speaker's race won by Martinez over Rep. George Fettingler of Alamogordo 27 - 21. Some Fettingler backers, miffed at the committee assignments made by Martinez, promised a fight in the legislative session.

Rep. Salman pinpointed a major issue: "How do you divide up the dollars among the requests for state agencies, institutions and schools?" He said legislative reapportionment will also be a key topic.

Salman, a top House manager in his second term, says: "We will have a number of bills dealing with our ecology and environment that might cause some controversy."

Salman, a member of the Legislative School Study Committee, also says: "What may be one of the most divisive issues if both reach the House floor is the Sears-Truskle formula and the ISSC formula for school finance. Education will suffer adversely if such a confrontation and conflict is engendered."

Salman says the Sears-Truskle plan "has not been met by a great deal of enthusiasm by teachers, legislators and educators."

Salman says 18-year-old voting should be submitted to the people as a constitutional amendment. He favors 18-year-old voting. A special election may be needed on the issue, Salman explains.

He says: "If we wait until 1972 to vote on 18 year old voting the 18 year olds could not vote in 1972."

Rep. Salman predicts that the legislature will take positive action on Sunday liquor sales. "I don't anticipate too great a conflict on it," he says. Salman favors negative option Sunday liquor sales. Sunday sales would be permitted in a county unless voters rejected them in a referendum.

Salman says a public employee collective bargaining law is inevitable. He said a statute would provide machinery for bargaining and possibly head off the controversy. Salman voted against a public employee collective bargaining bill in the 1970 Legislature.

He calls the branch banking issue "a tempest in a teapot." New Mexico permits limited branch banking now. Salman says: "With the limited branch banking we have now and with bank holding companies, I don't see any need to change the

present legislation." Salman is a director of First National Bank in Las Vegas, a unit bank. He expects legislation for economic development of the small Northern New Mexico communities.

Salman will serve on the House Natural Resources Committee and the Printing and Supplies Committee. The printing and supplies panel hires House employees.

The State Highway Commission will meet today (Thursday) in Clovis. Among agenda items are proposed highway abandonment of a stretch of old US-66 in Quay County and road repairs from the US-84 junction through Tecolotito to Upper Anton Chico.

Gov. Bruce King appointed Dr. Harold McDonald of Clovis to the State Board of Optometry. Dr. McDonald, 53, has offices in Clovis and Fort Sumner. He is a past president of the New Mexico Optometric Association. Dr. McDonald is also board chairman of Vision Services Inc. The new Senate majority whip, Odie Echols of Clovis, met Friday in Santa Fe with Gov. King on legislation to be introduced in the coming 60-day session. Echols represents Curry and Roosevelt Counties. State and Congressional officials pushed designation of Albuquerque on the new Railpax system at an Albuquerque meeting. The proposal backed by the U.S. Department of Transportation places Clovis, Fort Sumner, Vaughn, Belen, Grants, Gallup, El Paso, Deming and Lordsburg on the Railpax system.

A strong effort developed to pinpoint Albuquerque on the system. Gov. King, U.S. Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, U. S. Rep. Manuel Lujan Jr., Corporation Commissioner John Abraham and Howard Geis, Corporation Commission traffic and rate chief, supported the drive at the Albuquerque meeting.

New Atty. Gen. David Norvell of Clovis and State Liquor Director Carlos Jaramillo of Santa Fe moved quickly to invalidate two new Clovis liquor licenses issued in closing days of the Cargo administration.

Ex-Liquor Director David

Sierra issued the permits to Roswell applicants over the objections of Clovis City council. Sierra held Clovis did not follow established publication procedure in its objections to his choices.

Norvell, former House speaker, said in an opinion procedure used were within the spirit if not the letter of the law. The hassle over the Clovis licenses prompted King to then replace Sierra with Jaramillo at the outset of his administration.

The Lea County property tax dispute was argued at length before the State Supreme Court. The issue is a 16-2/3 per cent assessment ratio versus 33-1/3 per cent.
