


Slaughter in the hen house!

School to develop behavioral objectives

Dr. B. H. Barck and Mrs. Sandra Taylor of Research and Development Service, New Mexico State Department of Education, will meet with a committee representing the Carrizozo Municipal School District on March 16 at 1:00 p.m. for the purpose of developing behavioral objectives (they mean measurable objectives or objectives that can be measured in terms of progress and achievement) for the school and to assist the school in this work using present school philosophy.

The student body at Carrizozo school will be dismissed after lunch on March 16. School buses will operate at that time.

This is the first in a series of workshops, probably four to be held next year, when it will be Carrizozo school's turn to be evaluated under legislation passed in 1970, stating that one third of school in the state will be evaluated each year. Hondo and Ruidoso will also be evaluated next year, Corona school was evaluated last year.

The committee to work with Barck and Taylor will include teachers, administrators, students, board members and school patrons. The meeting will be held in the library and is open to any interested member of the community.

Carrizozo will have most outstanding airport in the area

It looks like all of our money for improvements at airport is now available, and if we get either F.A.A., the 4 Corners Commission or New Mexico Aviation Board to send us their check, we might be able to start in June. Everything appeared in readiness when the F.A.A. changed their requirements to include visual approach landing lights and so our specifications are now being changed. This approximately

\$150,000.00 to be spent on the Carrizozo Airport will make it one of the outstanding airports for towns the size of Carrizozo, in New Mexico.

We would like to hear from citizens interested in the low rent housing proposal. If we have enough interest and can find five people who would be willing to serve on the housing authority that we would have to appoint, maybe we could get something

done on this. If we were to build as many as twenty, we could locate them anywhere in town, less than 20 they have to then be located in one place. These are not Low Cost homes, they are low rent, no liability for payment attaches to the town, county or state. Rent is charged according to a person's ability to pay and the rent includes utilities. We have been informed that, even if we get started on this project

soon, it would probably be 2 years before we could get any houses built, due to the back log of towns asking for them through Housing Urban Development agency. Contact the Mayor, Council Members or City Hall if you are interested and we will have a get together and talk it over.

A lot of the trash around town can be picked up by city employees but a lot more of it could be rounded up by citizens interested

in their neighborhoods and we will send the city truck and crew to get it hauled off. Lets quit letting the other guy do it and each block organize a clean up the alley committee and vacant lots, then notify us and we will haul it off. Census Bureau reports on county

Census Bureau reports official 1970 population of Lincoln County. Lincoln County's official population in the 1970 census was 7,560. Down 2.4 percent from the 1960 figure of 7,744. The Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce reports.

The official population of the state was 1,016,000, up 6.8 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 951,023.

The 1970 census counted 7,368 white persons in Lincoln County, 97.5 percent of the total: 41 Negroes; and 151 persons of other races. In 1960, 99.0 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 583 children under 5 years; 1,966 in ages 5 through 17; 4,136 people 18 thru 64; and 875 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 3,664 married people, 436 who were widowed, 250 who were divorced, and 1,325 never married.

Lincoln County's 1970 population was classified as 100 percent rural.

There were 2,440 households, with 7,340 persons, including 457 one-person households. In addition 220 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 4,950 housing units in Lincoln County, 1,797 of them occupied by owners, 643 occupied by tenants, and 2,510 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 36.3 percent, compared with 36.7 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 2,996 single family houses, 165 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 193 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room

was 12.6, compared with 20.3 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 2,174 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 266 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Lincoln County was \$9,700, compared with \$7,100 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$63 per month, compared with \$61 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

These results are from two 1970 census advance reports for the state: PC(V2) General Population Characteristics, and

HC(VI) General Housing Characteristics. The reports, which contain additional 1970 census data for the state and various areas within it, may be purchased at nominal prices from the Supt. of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402 or from Offices of the U.S. Department of Commerce in major cities.

Further reports giving more extensive statistics on all the characteristics of the population and housing will be published in future months as the 1970 census results are tabulated.

TACTICAL AIR FORCE IS BIG BUYER IN AREA

New Mexico businessmen, merchants, contractors and other suppliers have been the recipients of more than \$1.7 million of Air Force funds for goods and for services provided this Tactical Air Command base up through February of the current fiscal year.

Figures just released by the Holloman Procurement Division for the first seven months of FY 71 show that purchases totalling \$1,765,042 have been made in New Mexico to support the personnel and activities at the TAC installation in south central New Mexico.

The total FY 71 expenditures to date are approximately 58 percent of the \$3,060,948 worth of goods and services purchased from New Mexico suppliers for all of the FY 70.

Downs residents seek grand jury

More than 100 residents of Ruidoso Downs filed a petition in district court in Carrizozo Thurs. seeking a grand jury investigation of alleged conflict of interest in the Ruidoso Downs government. The petition bore 141 names.

It asks that the grand jury seek removal of Ruidoso Downs city council members H. D. Pope and Billie Hale.

The alleged conflict of interest involves allegations that Pope, Hale and five other persons involved in city government also owned land through Ruidoso Downs Development Corp., Inc. that was zoned and offered for sale to the federal government.

The other five are H. A. Parnell, former executive secretary of the local housing authority, and Vaden McCray, former chairman, both of whom were removed from office; and four former members of the planning and zoning commission--Grace McCray, Mrs. Homer Allison, Pope now a council member, and J. A. Crockett.

District Court Clerk Edward Penfield of Lincoln said the signatures on the petition have been checked and are accurate.

He noted that the grand jury, once called, doesn't have to be confined, specifically to what the petition requested.

And he indicated that District Court Judge Richard A. Stanley probably will be the one to call the jury.

Broken power pole starts range fire

Last Friday at 3:40 p.m. the wind broke a pole on the Rural Electric line about six miles due east of Claunch. A grass fire resulted which ultimately burned an estimated 1500 acres of grass and pulled timber land.

Around 400 acres were on the Surratt Ranch, about 200 acres on the Erramouspe Ranch, the remainder on the old Lupe Gabaldon Ranch owned by John A. Hightower.

Five miles of fence were within the blaze but damage was light. There were between 150 and 200 posts and a like number of fence stays burned out.

Cattle in the area happened to be in other parts of the pastures and were not trapped as they might have been.

Quite a number of people discovered the fire early and were instrumental in reducing the size of the area which might have been burned. Two graders from the Corona Division of the State Highway Department and one grader from the Lincoln Station of El Paso Natural Gas Co. arrived at the fire shortly after 7:00 p.m. and worked through the night to make a fire guard around the entire area. The Forest Service was there with men and a cook truck to feed them. The Corona Volunteer Fire Department was there with equipment, also the Mountainair Volunteer Fire Department truck.

In addition there were many more men from all over the area who came and helped control the fire.

Chavez appointed Zozo postmaster

Fred S. Chavez was appointed postmaster of the Carrizozo office where he has been officer-in-charge since March 1970.

Chavez, 46, a longtime resident of Carrizozo, began his postal career as a temporary substitute clerk in January 1957 and rose through the ranks to become the assistant to the postmaster in 1969.

The appointment was announced by J. E. Kerr, regional director for the five-state Denver Region of the U. S. Postal Service. The appointment became effective on March 6. Carrizozo is a second class post office.

There were 19 appointments announced which brings to 62 the number of postmasters named so far by Postmaster General Winton B. Blount in the Denver Region under the new, non-political, merit system established by the Postal Reorganization Act of 1970. The recommendations are made by a regional management selection board.

Senator John Conway REPORTS FROM SANTA FE

Both Houses have now passed the Implied Consent Law and it has been sent to the Governor for his signature. This is probably one of the more significant pieces of legislation to be passed this session. It is a step in the right direction to take the drunk driver off the road.

The sixtieth legislative day is March 20th and this should be the last day of the session. However, the legislature in the past has ignored this deadline and has continued in session to complete its work. We work by the legislative day and not by the calendar day, which theoretically allows us to do this.

Time is a real problem for every member of the legislature. The Corporation Committee this past week conducted a hearing on the Uniform Commercial Credit Code. This is a comprehensive bill which in essence puts all lending under one system. The bill is 208 pages in length and very complicated. The basic problem

in the bill is an increase in the interest rates. As an example, the charges allowable on the national credit cards would have increased from 18% to 24%.

There is no way I could support a bill which contained interest hikes like that. There were many good points in the bill but there simply was not enough time to thoroughly study it. We would have a more effective legislature if we would meet for ten days; introduce all bills at that time; and recess for thirty or sixty days to study the bills and then come back to Santa Fe for committee hearings and voting. It would also give us the opportunity to meet with our constituents and discuss the bills with them.

I would certainly urge all of you who can possibly come to Santa Fe during the session to do so. The sessions and committee hearings are open to the public and all of us want as many people as possible to observe the legislature in operation.

Moving expenses are deductible

Albuquerque, New Mexico -- Self-employed persons are now entitled to deduct moving expenses on federal income tax returns, Maurice E. Johnson, IRS District Director for New Mexico, said today. The Tax Reform Act of 1969 not only liberalized rules on deducting moving expenses but extended the deduction to self-employed people.

Additional deductions under the new law are now permitted for pre-move house-hunting trips, temporary living expenses at the new location for up to 30 days while looking for a permanent place to reside, and expenses related to selling a residence or settling a lease, Mr. Johnson said.

The total tax deductions for the three categories of expenses

may not exceed \$2500, with the deductions for house-hunting and temporary living expenses limited to \$1000.

Deductible moving expenses include the cost to the taxpayer for moving himself, his family, household goods, pets, and personal effects from the old residence to the new one. For the taxpayer to qualify for the moving-expense deduction, his new place of work must be 50 miles farther from

his former home than his former place of work.

A self-employed person is required to perform services full-time for at least 78 weeks during the 24-month period following arrival at the new location. And not less than 39 to 78 weeks services must be performed in the first 12 months.

Full-time employees need to meet only the 39-week rule to deduct expenses.


for additional income was their first concern while the need for better medicare and medicaid for all types of services was cited by 637 persons and need for better transportation was given by 643 persons.

Inside THE CAPITOL

by Fred Buckles

SANTA FE--Rep. William J. Upton, D-Luna-Hidalgo, says the legislature has already raised the taxes \$500,000 to \$750,000 by adopting a new passenger car registration fee schedule of \$16, \$24, and \$36 a year.

Fees vary with weight of cars. Governor Bruce King signed the legislation into law. Rep. Upton favored the implied consent bill that cleared the Senate 37-1 and the House 51-10 and went to Gov. King for action.

Sponsored by Senate Majority Leader Tibo Chavez, D-Belen, the bill sets a level of .10 of one per cent of alcohol in blood as presumptive evidence of intoxication. It is aimed at drunken drivers.

Rep. Upton strongly opposed a bill, passed 40-23 by the House, on club liquor licenses. It calls for revocation or refusal to issue state liquor licenses to clubs which discriminate on the basis of race, religion or national origin, Upton said. "That's the poorest piece of legislation I ever saw introduced anywhere."

He favors annual pay raises for Magistrates Manuel Holguin of Deming and Rosaline Salinas of Lordsburg. Rep. Upton notes both are on Interstate 10 which sparks heavy caseloads from traffic.

Upton said the Democratic House reapportionment plan leaves the Luna-Hidalgo Counties district unchanged. He said the district's population is about 12 per cent above the norm of 14,514 per district. The Democratic Senate reapportionment plan, likely to be passed this week, also leaves the Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra district unchanged. Sen. I. M. Smalley, D-Deming, represents the district.

Upton favors continuing the Universities Study Committee headed by Sen. Smalley. A scrap was under way over continuation of the USC with a \$50,000 biennial appropriation.

Rep. Upton strongly opposes a House bill increasing the powerful Legislative Finance Committee from 7 to 11 members. The issue pitted conservatives against the liberals. The LFC is usually conservative.

Upton soundly whacked pending deficiency appropriations. He said: "There should be some way to punish anyone who allows our people to build up a deficit like they did in welfare and hospital departments."

Upton shaped a 62-member House but did not introduce the plan. It crossed county lines in only six districts. It called for a population variance of only 4 per cent among districts. Rep. Upton said: "Nobody likes it because there is not any political gerrymandering in it." Bernalillo County would receive 19 House seats. Its districts would be one per cent over the norm.

Legislative reapportionment holding the House to 70 seats and increasing the Senate from 42 to 45 members was likely to be adopted.

The Senate passed 26-14 a bill by Sen. John L. Morrow, D-Union-Harding-Coffax, to wipe out the State Corrections Department and revive governor-appointed boards over institutions.

The State Boys' School at Springer, Girls' Welfare Home at Albuquerque and Penitentiary near Santa Fe would be affected. The governor would also appoint the Parole Board, chosen now by the governor-appointed corrections secretary.

Senators favoring Morrow's bill included: Aubrey Dunn, D-Lincoln-Otero; Odie Echols, D-Clovis; Emmett Hart, D-Quay-DeBaca-Guadalupe; Finis Heidel, D-Lovington; Harry McAdams, D-Hobbs; R. C. Morgan, D-Curry-Roosevelt; Morrow and Smalley.

Voting against the bill were Sens. John Conway, R-Lincoln-Otero, and C. B. Trujillo, D-Taos. Rep. Alvino Castillo, D-Coffax, whacked Secretary-managed Corrections and Hospital-Institutions Departments.

Rep. Castillo said: "They're trying to scratch the elephant's back with a fly. And the big elephant is the monstrous executive branch of government that we have."

A Ration accountant, Rep. Castillo charged the DHI and Corrections Departments "have been nothing but sacrificial lambs to the idea of strengthening the executive department."

Rep. Castillo, a House Taxation-Revenue Committee member says: "We're just keeping our fingers crossed that we don't need a tax increase. The HTRC was waiting for the House Appropriations - Finance Committee to shape the big General Appropriations Act before acting on 42 pending tax bills."

A bill by Rep. Fred Luna, D-Los Lunas, would repeal the

DHI, created in 1968, and restore independent, governor-appointed boards to set policies for the eight facilities the DHI controls. *****

Rep. George Blocker, D-Jal, strongly opposes expansion of LFC membership. Blocker, whose district spans the Jal-Eunice areas, said: "They have to work real hard all the year around. When the committee is enlarged it just delays its work."

A motor carrier tax-fee increase was sharply cut in the Senate Finance Committee from \$8.5 to about \$3.5 million a year. But Rep. Blocker says the increase would still be 40 per cent. "This is still a little rich," Rep. Blocker says. A 2-cent-a-gallon diesel fuel tax increase was removed from the bill. The House passed 45-0 Blocker's bill to improve trucker service.

Rep. Robert Johnson, R-Clovis, opposes a pending House bill boosting the state minimum wage from \$1.60 to \$1.75 an hour. The bill erases a lower scale for service employees and boosts rates for agricultural employees. Johnson, a farmer-rancher, says the bill would be a burden on restaurants and agriculture.
