Soil Stewardship Week May 16-23

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which places emphasis on man's obligation to God as stewards of the soil, water, and other related resources, will be observed locally, May 16-23, according to Mr. Lee Straley, Chairman, Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District. "The World and They That Dwell Therein," the theme of this year's observance, underscores the responsibility which each citizen has in fulfilling his or her role as caretaker of the

realm. The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District and some 3,000 companion Districts throughout the nation along with their State and National Associations are sponsoring the event for the 17th consecutive year. Among the local events designed to encourage widespread recognition of Soil Stewardship Week are observances in all churches, and all schools, proclamations by the municipal bodies, pamphlets and posters distributed and displayed.

The Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District will distribute upon request to churches of all faiths program blanks, bulletin inserts, posters, and booklets created particularly for this year's observance.

The materials were prepared by the National Association of Conservation Districts, in consultation with a Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee composed of leading church men in the nation. The committee consists of the Rt. Rev. John Geo. Weber, National Catholic Rural Life Conference; the Rev. Harold S. Huff, Methodist Church; the Rev. Henry A. McCanna, Town & Country Church; Dr. C. Wilson Brumley, Southern Baptist Convention; and Mr. Osgood Magnuson, Dept. of Church & Country Planning.

Total closure lifted from Lincoln Forest

Robert A. Cook, Forest Supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, announced today that as of noon, April 15, 1971, the total closure of the Lincoln National Forest, in effect since April 14, has been lifted. Rain and snow has finally fallen on the parched mountains, enabling the Forest Service to lift the closure which had virtually eliminated all public use of the forest due to the extreme fire danger.

In spite of the moisture, however, a very real fire danger

still exists, and campfire and smoking restrictions are still in effect on the Lincoln National Forest. Campfires are permitted only in designated forest camp and picnic areas, and smoking is permitted only in the camp or picnic areas or while traveling on paved or surfaced highways.

The Forest Service extends their sincere thanks to the public for their cooperation while the closure was in effect, and request continuing assistance in keeping wildfire out of the forests.

Dr. Buren Stewart is guest minister

United Trinity Methodist Church in Carrizozo will have M. Buren Stewart, district superintendent, as special guest Sunday to preach at the Sunday morning service and conduct the annual conference right after church.

A potluck dinner will be served at the church following the conference.

Christmas tree plantation request to SCMRA

The Executive Committee of the South Central Mountain Resource Area met Tuesday, April 13, 1971 in Ruidoso. The meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. by Robert Scribner, Acting Chairman.

The minutes of the March 2, 1971 meeting were read and approved. Project measures were discussed and those measures on which progress had been made since the last meeting included P.M. 75 -- Carrizozo Municipal School Beautification; P.M. 22 -- Cox Canyon Stabilization; P.M. 40 -- Fort Stanton Historic Site; and P.M. 77 -- Alamogordo Recreation Lake.

Three new requests were taken into consideration for presentation to the Steering Committee. The first was a request from the New Mexico State Forestry for assistance on a Christmas Tree Plantation Pilot Program.

A number of small plots would be established for Christmas tree planting in an experimental program. Ray Polasky moved that the measure be adopted, second was made by Kurt Ziebarth, and motion carried.

The second proposal came from the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions for consideration of a Christmas Tree Plantation training program for students at Fort Stanton. Included would be training and limited supervision of students in the planting, pruning, and care of Christmas trees. Carole Gorney moved for adoption of this project, second was made by Ralph Dunlap, and motion carried.

The third request also came from the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions for beautification and development of land use for Fort Stanton. Carole Gorney moved for approval, second was made by

Lewis Merritt and it was approved.

It was felt that these three measures had a great potential and could be closely coordinated with each other. Ray Polasky suggested that seeds for Christmas trees; and utilization of pine cones and boughs in Christmas decorations could be a program for the students at Fort Stanton.

The group approved a request from the Otero County Commissioners for the inclusion of all of Otero County in the South Central Mountain Resource Area. Robert Scribner appointed Robert Hall, Kurt Ziebarth, and Ed Brecheisen for nominating committee regarding the election of officers for the coming year. The Steering Committee of SCMRA meeting was called to order at 1:15 p.m. by Robert Scribner, Chairman.

The minutes of the March 2, meeting were read and approved.

Robert Scribner moved that an agenda change be adopted, with the Executive Committee meeting to begin at 10:00 a.m. and to conclude at 12:00 noon; and the Steering Committee meeting to commence at 1:00 p.m. and adjourn at 3:00 p.m. Fred Thompson seconded the motion and it carried.

The program for the afternoon was presented by Jerry Baker of the New Mexico Department of Development. Mr. Baker emphasized the importance of cooperation of state agencies and local groups having common interests, programs and goals in coordinating community development. He outlined a plan to set up a council on community development and relations to improve scheduling and coordinating programs. He cited the tourist industry, limited market surveys, business attractions, and information.

INSIDE THE CAPITOL

Senator L.M. Smalley, D-Luna-Hidalgo-Sierra, assessed goals of the University Study Committee continued by the legislature. Sen. Smalley is USC Chairman.

He said: "The main purpose of the committee is struggle for stability of the universities and if the regents are able to maintain and accomplish that stability the committee will be perfectly satisfied as long as it continues in that manner."

"But the committee would be available for investigation of any disorders or disruptions." Other USC members include Reps. Richard Carbajal, D-Belen, and Robert Moran, R-Hobbs. The new panel is considered moderate, compared to the conservative 1970 USC lineup.

Appraising the 1971 Legislature, Senator Smalley said: "You don't always measure a legislative session by what has been passed but by some of the bad legislation that didn't get through. You have to summarize bills that were introduced and bills that were passed."

"And if society was maintained on an equilibrium that was not disruptive I think you could call it a good session. Sensationalism is not necessarily an indication of a constructive session. It's the hard work that members do that accomplishes good legislation."

University study committee strives for stability

Senator Smalley said a legislative memorial was passed requiring state agencies to encumber their funds before expenditure "so there will not be a repetition of deficiencies as experienced in the last session."

Senator C.B. Trujillo, D-Taos, said the legislature worked "toward a more equalized distribution of school funds. Eventually we will get there." An equalization distribution fund of \$5.7 million was voted for school districts unable to meet minimum standards with the regular distribution.

Senator Trujillo said the Sunday liquor sales issue was finally settled, at least partially. He said: "Package stores may have to be added in the future." The new Sunday liquor sales law permits sales by the drink and in clubs only. It is subject to local option district referendums November 2 at a special statewide election.

Senator Trujillo said the Legislative Finance Committee will pursue a study of truck fee and tax increases. Trujillo is LFC vice chairman. Smalley is on the LFC because he is Senate Finance Committee chairman.

Senator Trujillo said: "In the future we need to look at the gaming situation." He noted horse race tracks are already legal

in New Mexico. "If we don't get into legalized gambling in the next few years," Sen. Trujillo said "some of these surrounding states are going to beat us to the punch."

Trujillo said New Mexico should spread its tax base. He referred specifically to slot machines, dog racing and off-track betting.

Gov. Bruce King appointed Hollis Cummins, 42, Capitan Democrat, to the new State Hospitals and Institutions Board, Fort Stanton Hospital in Lincoln County is under the board's jurisdiction. An active Democrat, Cummins manages and owns a food market and dry goods store.

Gov. King also named former State Rep. Kelly Mora, 51, Raton Democrat, to the new State Hospitals and Institutions Boards. Miners' Hospital at Raton, center of a current controversy over commingling of funds, is under the new board's control. Mora is safety director at Kaiser Steel Corp.'s York Canyon Mine.

The annual round of school budget hearings opened Monday at Fort Stanton. Before the hearing Public School Finance Director Harry Wugalter said estimated fiscal 1972 Fort Stanton Schools enrollment is 570 children, down 25 from the present school year.

Wugalter said the proposed fiscal 1972 Fort Stanton Schools budget was \$454,427. Wugalter said: "The Fort Stanton district is making a maximum local effort on financing. Additional supplemental funds will be provided to assist the district." Fort Stanton teachers have an average of 16 years teaching experience. The state average is 11.3 years.

State Finance Director Robert Kirkpatrick reported to Gov. King on the state's money condition: "With respect to specific revenue sources, collections this March receive from oil and gas production and property taxation rose substantially from the previous year's level."

"Oil and gas school tax revenues in March amounted to almost \$1.5 million, 12.8 per cent increase from last year, and severance tax revenues rose 16.2 per cent. The primary cause of this gain in revenues was a rise of 25 cents per barrel in November in crude petroleum prices."

"However, because petroleum production has declined in the past half-year, and the decline is continuing at an accelerated rate, the over-all increase in the state's revenues from oil production has been less than it might have been."



 mation on sources of financing and capital as some of the functions of the various departments within his organization.
 Under new proposals, the Steering committee adopted the three additional project measures that had been approved by the Executive Committee. The first was a Christmas tree plantation pilot program to test and experiment with Christmas tree plantations on several small plots. This proposal was made by the New Mexico State Forestry Department, Kirt Ziebarth moved that it be adopted and second was made by Fred Thompson. It was approved as Project Measure 78.

The second request was for a training program for students at Fort Stanton in the planting, pruning, and care of Christmas trees. This came from the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions, Lewis Merritt moved for approval and second was made by Stan Green. This was approved as Project Measure 79.

The third measure adopted was the request made by the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions for assistance in beautification and development of land use at the State Hospital at Fort Stanton. Robert Bell moved that it be adopted and second was by Fred Thompson. This will be Project Measure 80.

The Steering Committee discussed legislative projects adopted by the South Central Mountain Resource Area and the problems that arise when support or approval is suggested or granted at the last minute. The chairman, Robert Scribner, being unfamiliar and not having time to analyze the measures, moved that more specific and detailed information and time be given and that the bills be presented in legislative form when presented to the group for support, or adoption. This move was seconded by Stan Green and the motion carried.

The following progress was reported on various old measures:

- P.M. 77 Alamogordo Recreation Lake: Stan Green said studies and investigations are being conducted and acquisition of land being contemplated.
- P.M. 33 Bear Canyon Dam: Robert Bell indicated the ports will soon be plugged on the existing structure.
- P.M. 34 Otero County Landfill: & 50 Fred Wood said that within 60 - 90 days acquisition of a site could be completed.
- P.M. 68 Otero County as Great Plains Conservation Program: Robert Bell said he expects this to be given approval.
- P.M. 35 Lava and Native Stone Sale: The Department of Development Market Survey was being made to include Carrizozo and Corona resources.

Round-Up

The Lincoln County Disaster Committee met on April 15th and reviewed the drought situation in the County. The extremely dry winter and the early spring has reduced the normal soil moisture drastically and only a series of above normal rains can restore the soil moisture. The spring grass and annual herbs need this moisture before they can produce any forage for the range livestock. They recommended that procedures be started so that a drought area could be declared on May 1, 1971 unless conditions improve appreciably.

The Brucellosis program in New Mexico will be reviewed at a meeting of Lincoln County Cattlegrowers April 27, starting at 2:00 p.m. in the Recreation Center in Carrizozo. Speakers will be:

- Lee Garner, New Mexico Livestock Sanitary Board
 - Dr. R. H. Pyles, Animal Health Division, Ag. Research Service
 - Jim Brown, New Mexico Cattlegrowers Association.
- The Brucellosis program vitally affects all cattlegrowers in Lincoln County. Presently breeding cattle from New Mexico cannot be shipped into Oklahoma, Arizona and several other states without first being tested and certified from Brucellosis. This situation can become worse unless something is done about it. We have had two outbreaks in beef cattle herds in Lincoln County during the past year. Cattle from other areas were responsible for bringing the

Brucellosis infection into the County. Plan to attend so that you can more fully understand the Brucellosis situation.

There were some early sales of wool in the Roswell area bringing from 18 to 32 cents per pound. The medium wools are bringing the higher prices. Lincoln County livestock received 30.5 cents per pound. The fine wools are selling mostly from 23 to 25 cents per pound. An estimated 900,000 pounds of wool were sold in Roswell during the past ten days.

I visited several orchards last Thursday and Friday. The apple prospects are varied. The Picacho-Hondo area had a good bloom and no freeze damage at that time. The San Patricio-Gleicoes had a freeze that killed most of the Red Delicious blooms. Unless there are more late blooms, the Red Delicious in this area will be short. The Golden Delicious and Rome Beautys have prospects for a full crop yet, although there can be freeze damage until early May.

Lucio Zamora was planting a new orchard on the hedgerow system. He is planting a semi-dwarf spur type tree on 20 foot rows and 8 to 12 feet apart in the row. This will be a short solid row of trees in the mature orchard.
