

# Grand Jury returns five indictments against three individuals

The Grand Jury that began deliberations in the District Court of the Third Judicial District in Carrizozo in April and continued through to May 10, issued its first interim report at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday.

This report states that the jury considered criminal matters presented by the District Attorney's Office and a total of five indictments were returned against the following three individuals:

Josephine McTeigue, aka Josephine Cisneros, aka Josephine Toombs,  
Billie Hale,  
H. D. Pope.

In addition to the criminal matters considered, the jury made thorough inquiry into all matters referred to in the Petition which resulted in the empaneling of this Grand Jury.

As requested by the Petition, the jury investigated the alleged conflict of interest of past and present members of the governing body and the planning and zoning commission, namely H. D. Pope, Billie Hale, Grace McCray, Mrs. Homer Allison and H. A. Parnell, their relationship to the Local Housing Authority of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, and their interests, direct or indirect, in lands owned by them and/or Ruidoso Downs Development Corporation, Inc.

It was concluded that each and every person named above, either directly or indirectly, acquired an interest in a tract of land which was offered for sale to the Housing Authority.

Further, that each and every person named above failed to disclose such interests in the

land and after being warned of a possible conflict of interest on more than one occasion, organized a corporation, which corporation was to own said land.

J. A. Crockett failed in his duty while Councilman, to inform the City of Ruidoso Downs, regarding the misrepresentation and conflict of interest involved concerning the tract of land that was offered for sale to the Housing Authority.

It is our recommendation that none of such persons should participate in any action by the City of Ruidoso Downs affecting the said property now owned by Ruidoso Downs Development Corporation.

Article IV states: As requested by the Petition, we investigated the alleged failure of H. A. Parnell to return public records

of the Village of Ruidoso Downs to the Village Hall. It should be noted that after our request, H. A. Parnell promptly presented the records in question to this Grand Jury. It was concluded that Parnell was in violation of the applicable article. It is also recommended that action be taken by the proper body to make a definite determination of the status of the Executive Secretary of the Housing Corporation.

As requested we have considered the position held by Billie Hale and H. D. Pope as Village Councilmen, together with proof adduced before us and have presented appropriate accusations, in writing, to the District Court in and for Lincoln County.

As requested we investigated the alleged conflict of interest

of the former chairman of the Local Housing Authority, Vaden McCray, and the former Executive Secretary of the Local Housing Authority, H. A. Parnell, in relation to their interest in lands owned by them and/or the Ruidoso Downs Development Corporation.

It was concluded that both McCray and Parnell, either directly or indirectly held interest in a tract of land which was offered for sale to the Housing Authority, and failed to disclose such interests, thereby constituting misconduct in office.

Indictment 7234 charges that on or about the 15th day of March 1971 Billie Hale bribed Andrew Miller, a Ruidoso Downs Village employee and a person likely to become a witness. Indictment 7237 charges that on or about the 15th day of March Hale committed extortion towards Andrew Miller to wit: Threatening to do unlawful injury to the person of Miller.

Indictment 7235 charges that on the 15th of March H. D. Pope committed extortion towards Andrew Miller, by threatening Miller with the loss of his job and threatening to do unlawful injury to the person of Miller. Indictment 7236 charges that on the 15th of March H. D. Pope bribed Andrew Miller, Ruidoso

Downs Village employee and a person likely to become a witness.

Indictment 7238 charges Josephine McTeigue with the murder of Billy Tooms and Eric McTeigue. Witness called included: Ernest Sanchez, Mrs. Cleo McTeigue, Corrine Hulstine, Bernice B. Elkin, M.D., FBI Expert, Jimmy McTeigue, Dr. Horton and McKinley McTeigue.

Accusation No. 7239 Accuses that on or about November 15, 1968, H. D. Pope being a member of the Ruidoso Village Council and serving on the planning and zoning commission, had a conflict of interest in his official dealing with the local Housing Authority. In the opinion of the Grand Jury Pope's actions amounted to failure, neglect and refusal to discharge the duties of the office contrary to Section 5-3-4(2).

Accusation No. 7240 accuses that on or about November 15, 1968, Billie Hale being a member of the Ruidoso Village Council had a conflict of interest in his official dealing with the Local Housing Authority. His acts amount to failure, neglect and refusal to discharge the duties of the office.

The Grand Jury inspected the

Lincoln County Jail and inquired into the status of all inmates therein. They found the jail to be clean, well maintained and well supervised, considering the lack of budget available to the Sheriff for such purposes. It was the Jury's specific recommendations to the County Commission that across the board increases of \$100.00 per month be authorized for all the Sheriff's personnel. In addition that the jail be remodeled to provide a commissary and an exercise and recreation area with direct sunlight to facilitate the holding of long term state and federal prisoners.

Also, the Grand Jury feels that the amount of \$3.00 per day per prisoner is inadequate for detaining federal prisoners; and would recommend that the County Commission request an increase to \$5.00 per day per prisoner.

Juan Chavez served all days except the last when the interim report was signed.

## Newspaper mail rates go up!

Unless a federal judge frustrates the U. S. Postal Service, this is the last week a postcard will cost a nickel.  
Postage rates are going up next Sunday. It will take eight cents to mail a letter, 11 cents if you send it by air. Second and third-class mailing rates, plus some fourth-class rates, will jump from 10 per cent to 20 per cent. Special delivery and registered mail costs also will go up.  
And the price of a postcard will be six cents.  
The May 16 boost comes under what the U.S. Postal Service claims is its authority to make temporary increases in postal rates pending a recommendation by the Postal Rate Commission. The action is being challenged by a group of mail users, led by magazine and newspaper publishers, who seek to halt the increases until the rate commission has time to act.  
The commission is to begin hearings next Monday on a permanent \$4.5-billion-a-year revenue proposal.  
U. S. District Court Judge William B. Bryant is tentatively scheduled to rule early this week on the legality of the rate hike. But postal authorities are confident he will not block the increase.

## Capitan voters give big majority to \$200,000.00 school bond issue

Capitan voters indicated Tuesday that they are back of their school and a big majority of them want a new multi-purpose building for the school. On the vote at village hall for \$200,000 in bonds the count was 130 for the issue and 44 against.  
The Capitan school board met Wednesday night to canvas the ballots and will proceed with the job immediately.  
The new multi-purpose building will house a gymnasium, considerably larger than old gym and up to present-day standards. The new gym together with the old will provide opportunity for all students to participate in physical education program.  
Capitan school uses its cafeteria for many occasions beside feeding students. The new cafeteria will replace one in barracks building.

## Inside the Capitol By Fred Buckles

SANTA FE --- State Finance Director Robert Kirkpatrick underscored a crucial point in a talk here to New Mexico Taxpayers Association. The state is moving from an economy heavily dependent on federal spending to one much broader-based.  
Observers have stressed a need for years for New Mexico to develop an economy pegged to private enterprise. Recent employee cutbacks at federal installations at Albuquerque, Los Alamos and other cities underline the need for the long-awaited major shift in emphasis.  
Kirkpatrick told 250 at the taxpayers association annual meeting state spending is rising 8.6 per cent a year but revenue is gaining only 5 per cent annually. He said three choices to close the gap are open: Operate state government more efficiently, generate more revenue with stepped-up economic growth or raise taxes.  
The 1971 Legislature ordered a \$60,000 tax study. Property and extractive industry taxes will receive special attention. Tax bills will be written for action by lawmakers next Jan. The state's money position is serious.

Sen. John Morrow, D-Union-

Colfax-Harding, says creation of a Corrections Commission was a major achievement of the 1971 Legislature. A rancher, Sen. Morrow was sponsor of the original bill signed into law by Gov. Bruce King.  
Effective July 1, the legislation calls for a 7-member, governor-appointed commission for the State Boys School at Springer, Girls Welfare Home at Albuquerque, State Prison near Santa Fe, Probation and Parole Division and Juvenile Probation Services Division.  
Gov. King says he will name the new commission about June 1 so members can familiarize themselves with their duties. The Corrections Department is managed now by Secretary Howard Leach. Sen. Morrow said: "It's much better to have a board than a single manager of the department." The freshman senator said: "One of the major stumbling blocks of the session was trying to pick up the deficit. I can't understand how anybody on a budget could operate so promiscuously."  
Lawmakers reluctantly voted \$6 million in deficiency appropriations to enable troubled state agencies to pay bills in the current year ending June 30.





Morrow commended a new law requiring proof of ownership to move cattle intrastate or interstate. The sponsor was Rep. John Bigbee, R-DeBaca-Guadalupe-Torrance.

Morrow said also a new statute placing livestock haulers under Corporation Commission regulation is beneficial. Rep. Clifton Moreland, D-Tucumanari, was the bill's author.

Senate reapportionment, signed into law by Gov. King left Morrow's Union, Harding and Goffar district unchanged. The bill's sponsor, President Pro Tem R. C. (Ike) Morgan, D-Portales, is among only four senators elected in 1970 required to run next year. Morgan represents Roosevelt and Curry Counties now. His new district

spans Roosevelt and DeBaca Counties.

District Judge Santiago Campos said he will uphold the issuance of two liquor licenses in Clovis by ex-State Liquor Director David Sierra last December. Sierra was named by ex-Gov. David F. Cargo, a Republican.

Sierra awarded the Clovis licenses to Dr. Charles W. Plett and Jack Zarris of Roswell and Western Continental Motels, Inc. of Hobbs over objections of Clovis City Council. Democrat Carlos Jaramillo, Sierra's successor, tried to void Sierra's action. Democratic Atty. Gen. David Norvell of Clovis backed Jaramillo's decision.

Western Continental Motels, Inc. and Dr. Plett and Zarris contested Norvell and Jaramillo's move in a Santa Fe District Court suit. Judge

Campos said Jaramillo should be restrained from cancelling the licenses. Dr. Plett is new Chaves County Republican chairman.

Status of a license issued by Jaramillo to Johnnie Mack Goodman was uncertain. Clovis City Council turned down Charles H. Haas, another Jaramillo selection.

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 An effort seemed under way to persuade the King administration to replace State Corrections Secretary Howard Leach and Prison Warden Felix Rodriguez. Ex-Corrections Secretary John Salazar of Albuquerque apparently headed the attempt. The new Corrections Commission will name a corrections secretary after July 1.

Miss Mettie Jordan of Eunice said an inequity exists in teacher retirement provisions against

teachers who retired in 1968-70. Miss Jordan noted they had received a much smaller cost of living increment than teachers who retired in 1967. She also stressed benefits of teachers who retired in 1968-70 are tiny compared to those handed the teachers retiring July 1 and afterward this year in new legislation.
